Good afternoon, everyone.

First, I want to acknowledge the death of 41year-old Sarah McNally, a beloved bartender who was
killed at her work workplace in Council Member
Holden's District earlier this month. Our thoughts
are with the Maspeth community and Sarah's loved ones
during this very difficult time. This tragedy comes
as we approach Workers Memorial Day on April 28th,
and Building Safety Month, which is observed every
May to raise awareness about the importance of
workplace safety. It's a reminder of the need to
advance stronger protections to ensure that our
workers are safe while on the job.

April 13th marked the start of Cambodian New Year. Our Cambodian communities have always been an integral part of our city's social, cultural, and economic landscape. To our Cambodian community here in New York City, I wish you a Happy New Year.

April 15th was Jackie Robinson Day. This year is the 77th anniversary of Jackie Robinson breaking Major League Baseball's racial segregation barrier when he became the first Black player and started at first base for the Brooklyn Dodgers. On this day, we reflect on his remarkable legacy and the enduring impact of his activism that extended beyond baseball.

I want to also take a moment to wish our Jewish neighbors a peaceful and joyous Passover which starts on Monday evening at sundown. This important holiday is a reminder of the importance of reflecting on history and passing on its lessons to future generations. Earlier this week, the Council's Jewish Caucus co-hosted a model Passover seder with community partners and holocaust survivors, and I want to thank everyone who made that event such a success. To everyone celebrating Passover, Chag Pesach kasher yesame and a

April is also Earth Day, which serves as an important call to action to act with urgency and protect our planet. We must continue to work to achieve our zero waste future and build up our green infrastructure, so that New York City can do its part to fight climate change. I hope all New Yorkers have a great and active Earth Day.

April 24th is traditionally our annual Denim Day, a day committed to supporting survivors of sexual violence and increasing public awareness about this important issue. Denim Day was started in the aftermath of a rape trial in Italy where the survivor was blamed because of the jeans she wore. A Gaming Facility Text Amendment that will allow applicants with a proposed gaming site in the City to be considered by committees of local officials established by the State's casino licensing process. Currently, casinos are not permitted for use within New York City zoning. This Text Amendment would resolve this zoning conflict while maintaining communities' decision making authority on casino licenses within the State's application process, which first requires approval by local community advisory committees or CACS. Only applicants who submit an application before June 30th, 2025 and are awarded one of the three gaming facility licenses, authorized by the State Commission, after CAC approval and Gaming Facility Location Board recommendation, would be able to operate in the City. Potential sites would be limited to high density commercial and manufacturing areas.

80-01 Broadway Commercial Overlay; an application to bring several existing commercial uses into

Introduction 689-A, sponsored by Council Member Crystal Hudson, would codify the Cabinet for Older New Yorkers into City law. The cabinet, made up of commissioners of 23 City agencies, and shared by the Commissioner of the Department for the Aging or DFTA, was established in September 2022 to help improve programming and services for older New Yorkers. This legislation would fill out the cabinet's membership with additional agencies and mayoral offices, and expand the list of required invitees for cabinet meetings to include the city's public libraries. The DFTA Commissioner would be required to report annually to the Council, Public Advocate, Comptroller, borough presidents, and the public on the cabinet's activities. Thank you to our staff members Christopher Pepe, Chloe Rivera, and Saiyemul Hamid.

In essence it's a blank check no pun intended - but it is a blank check to applications that we have not reviewed. The barometer of measure for who is allowed to benefit from the Zoning Text Amendment is, if they submitted an application that was approved by the New York State Gaming Commission - in other words, another body is going to say this application merits the meeting of what we did today. And we won't see it. We're taking away that tool from ourselves. Why would we unilaterally give up a level of authority that we have over Land Use matters? The second bill is Intro 815, I am very proud to co-prime with Council Member Brannan and Council Member Nurse. This would add language to Local Law 122, uh, of 2021 that was authored by Council Member Brannan, and it would require the Office of Long-Term Planning and Sustainability to create an Inland Flood Hazard Area Map that determines which areas outside the federal designated coastal flood areas are most vulnerable to extreme rainwater and stormwater flooding. This would basically take those areas that are on the coast and have all those protections, and it would move them to areas that flood. Another long bill but a good one.

the unique needs of older New Yorkers. As our city and our nation rapidly age, this council is fighting for older adults by establishing laws that directly benefit and impact older adults now and in the future.

I'd like to also quickly draw your attention to two bills I'm introducing today with Council Member Nurse and Public Advocate Williams, Intro 825 and Reso 371. Right now individuals leaving city jails have little choice in how to access their commissary funds, as the Department of Correction provides a check with the balance of funds. For many unbanked New Yorkers, they will need to pay a fee to cash this check, and it can take hours or days to do so, which can be challenging for individuals coming out of jails with limited resources. This will require the Department to inform any individuals who are leaving incarceration, verbally and in writing, in a language they can understand, how much money remains in their commissary account, and to return all unused funds in a method of preference, including cash or certified check, prior to the individual leaving Department custody.

I'd like to thank Legal Aid, Freedom Agenda, and Fortune Society for helping craft this bill. The accompanying Resolution 371 supports a State bill that would provide up to \$2,550 over 6 months for individuals released from State Correctional Facilities to provide greater support to folks upon release for things like food, clothes, housing, and transit. These bills will ensure New Yorkers can leave jails with resources they need to succeed and not end up involved again with our justice system. I urge you all to co-sponsor them, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: I would like to recognize Council Member Gutiérrez, followed by Council Member Brewer, and Council Member Bottcher.

Similar to the City's existing partnership with MetroPlus Health for health insurance for low-income New Yorkers, a City-run renters insurance product would create affordable protections for the most vulnerable New Yorkers, save the City significant dollars in emergency shelter costs, and generate revenue. It's a win-win for New Yorkers and the City's bottom line. I encourage my colleagues to sign on to Intro 817, thank you.

Resolution 63 calls on the State to establish a tax incentive program to encourage developers to plant new trees in development sites. I think we all know the importance of trees. Developers are required to protect existing trees and to replace trees that are damaged. But, they're not required to add new trees to sites where there is development, where they did not exist before. And we want as many trees as possible.

COUNCIL MEMBER BOTTCHER: It's no secret that we are in the midst of a major mental health crisis in New York State. Addressing this crisis can feel overwhelming at times as it involves reversing decades of disinvestment and failed policy, and because mental illness is intertwined with so many other issues. We need more immediate steps that will help now, and my team and I have identified an effort under way in New York right now that, uh, I believe should be supported. It will help address the major shortage of social workers in New York State. To become a licensed master social worker, individuals must graduate from an accredited Social Work Program, they have to have at least three years full-time supervised postgraduate clinical social work experience, complete training, and identification and reporting of child abuse, and pass a standardized test administered by the Association of Social Work

COUNCIL MEMBER BOTTCHER: they saw 3,000 social

Today I'm introducing Reso 361, this resolution comes directly from the work I've done in conjunction with community members and the Association On Neighborhood Development to establish a set of Land Use principles. I'm so proud of the work that has helped to guide us in our Land Use decision making process, and I hope to build on it in the years to come.

Among one of the demands I heard loud and clear from my community, is that we do not want corporate landlords buying up small homes. This is a trend we've seen on the rise in the City - and nationally - with private equity firms having spent hundreds of millions of dollars over the last few years, buying up smaller apartment buildings all over Brooklyn and Queens. One firm, the Carlile Group, brought more than 150 apartment buildings in Brooklyn since 2020.

Hand in hand with corporate ownership was what we see is a decline in needed repairs and ever increasing rents, driving up the cost of housing stock in this city, intense displacement. We must stop allowing profit over people to occur in this city, especially with regards to our housing stock. In our effort to make this city affordable for New Yorkers, no stone should be unturned. I encourage you all to sign on to this resolution which supports federal legislation that would prevent hedge fund control of housing in our city, allowing greater opportunity for the families of our city. Please sign on to 361, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER KRISHNAN: Bad landlords have long used LLC's and other murky legal structures to hide their entity identities and avoid responsibility for their buildings. That is why I am proud, with Council Member Linda Lee, to introduce the Landlord
