CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Good morning we are council members Lappin, Gentile, Weprin, Koo, Levin, Garodnick, Lander, Ignizio, Reyna, Palma,

Yes we have a quorum and according to

the rules of the council we have to call up a vote that was not completed in the Landmarks Subcommittee pursuant to council rule 11.10E. As chair of the Land Use Committee I am calling up application number 20145162 SCQ, a 456-seat primary school in council member Halloran's district to the full Land Use Committee to enable the committee and the council to act in a timely manner. We have some items to be read through, to be voted on today. Preconsidered Land Use number or PS 317 in the Bronx, council member Palma's district, community board nine, item number 20135772 SCX. It's to build an approximately 379-seat primary school facility located at 1024-1036 White Plains Road in the

2 As I said earlier in council member 3 Halloran's district Queens, community board 11.

4 It's a 456-seat primary school being considered.

Item number 20145162 SCQ to build a new school located on the north side of 48th Avenue between

7 210th and 211th Streets in Bayside Queens.

And we have in the speaker's district, Garodnick's district, and Lappin's district... [off mic] ...it's, she said it's Lappin. Lappin's claimed a piece of it, I'm not going to dispute her on what she said... And now I have Diana trying to correct me and I thought I heard it right. Anyhow we are...

Motion of power pursuant to withdraw. It's Land Use numbers 945 and 946. No one has the east Midtown rezoning. Item numbers N 130247(A)[N 130274(A) ZRM]

ZRM and C 130248 ZMM encompassing the community boards five and six.

Then we have for acceptance a project in council member Dickens' district known as Harlem Dowling, Land Use number 954 in Manhattan community board 10, item number C 130272 HAM, it's a HPD mixed use development. And also Land Use number 955 which is related to Harlem Dowling. Item number C

2 | 130271 ZMM the amendment to the zoning might have 3 | to allow that to happen.

And council member Vann has arrived. We have in council member Gentile's district. This is also a motion to disapprove. Disposition the city owned property in Brooklyn Community Board 10. It was for to try to dispose of two properties located on block 6037, lot 102 and block 6339, lot 164 pursuant to zoning. Council member's asking us to do a motion to disapprove it's item number 130266 PPK.

And then the last item for today is in council member Revera's district, in the Bronx and community board six is known as the Daly apartments, item number 20145153 HAX. It's a HPD request for an exemption for a real property taxation, termination of the prior exemption, and voluntary dissolution of current owner for the properties located in the Bronx.

Again all of the items have been fully vetted in the subcommittees and fully discussed. I want to thank the subcommittee chairs for holding the hearings. If any member would like to speak to any item on the record? Council member Lander.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you very
3	much Mr. Chairman. I want to speak to the 456
4	Street primary school located on 48 th Avenue
5	between 210 th and 211 th Street in Bayside in council
6	member Halloran's district. As you know we
7	considered this extensively in committee and this
8	was one of the most significant challenges that we
9	faced in our committee and we all know that the
LO	need for school seats in District 26 in Queens is
L1	very significantly overcrowded. We heard from a
L2	couple of principles from overcrowded schools and
L3	we have never in my tenor on the subcommittee
L4	rejected a school sighting. At the same time we
L5	heard quite a lot of community concern, that
L6	community board voted no, number of the elected
L7	officials raised concerns around traffic, parking,
L8	making sure the school will be zoned locally and we
L9	really had a lot of conversations and weighted very
20	heavily. In the end I am recommending a vote of aye
21	and I want to just explain a little bit why and
22	council member Halloran who's district is is
23	supportive of this recommendation as well. We had a
24	lot of conversations and I talked to the current

council member, to council member elect Paul

2	Vallone, to the adjacent council member Mark
3	Weprin, to assembly member Nily Rozic, state
4	senator Tony Avella and I don't want to speak for
5	all of them because I don't know that they are, I
6	don't think that they're all supportive of the
7	project. I know that they're, that they're not but
8	as I said the current council member is. Let me
9	tell you what the School Construction Authority and
10	the Department of Education. I have a letter from
11	Chancellor Walcott this morning outlining efforts
12	to address a meaningful number of those concerns.
13	First clarifying that it is a zoned local school.
14	So I don't go through the normal zoning process.
15	The Community Education Council for District 26.
16	There's some history in the past the people were
17	concerned about. About students from other
18	districts and about how the zone would get
19	determined. It's a K-5 school and there was some
20	concern it might be a K-8 school. Parking is a big
21	issue that had been raised and we have the letter
22	that council members have here reflects that there
23	will, the project will include accessory on-sight
24	parking spaces so that the school can reduce school
25	related parking demand in the surrounding

community. There was a traffic study completed as
required and there was a commitment to follow up
and review those findings and recommendations in
the year prior to the opening of a new school and
consult DOT on any additional studies or surveys
required. And finally an issue was raised about
the, a lot across the street and although the
Department of Education of School Construction
Authority have not determined an explicit need at
the sight at this time for the sight. It will be
referred to other city agencies for their review of
potential community uses of that lot subject to
available funding in the future. And there is a
commitment from the department to work with the
chairman, with the speaker, with me, and with other
elected officials as this process moves forward. So
it, it none the less we know remains contentious as
the, a school sighting sometimes do. But with all
of that reflected and again out of my conversation
this morning with council member Halloran who is
supportive I recommend an aye vote on this item.

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: I would also before council member Jackson speaks note that this is a overcrowded district. All of the schools that are within a three mile radius of the district are severely overcrowded now. District 26 is a district that is gaining in population exponentially and there is a real need to sight another building in that area. If you look at the statistics for the other adjoining schools they are all well over 110 percent, up to 200 percent overcrowded because District 26 has been one of the prenatal school zones in the city where normally it's home of the highest school to our ratings in the city. Especially in Queens and there's a desire for many parents to send their children to District 26 so I understand the, the need to ensure that the, the children are coming from local areas to local

I consulted with, as I mentioned, council member Halloran, council member elect Vallone, council member Weprin who represents the adjacent district, assembly member Rozic, and state senator Avella. The state senator and the assembly member testified in opposition to the school at the hearing which we had yesterday. And I have spoken with each of them and they'll have to you know I think they, the, the assembly member I know is appreciative of the items that have been addressed in this letter whether that you know changes her position but you know she's not right on those

3	he is opposed to this sighting. And you know I
4	don't know whether this goes, this letter, the only
5	thing I know for sure is what I said before. I
6	spoke specifically I share this information with
7	the current council member and with these things in

9	concerns that he had raised. Okay thank you.
10	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Any other questions
11	on it. Council member Reyna?

aware of communication from the CEC. What I do want to say is that what was, is affirmed in this letter is that it will be a zoned local school and therefore subject to a CEC zoning vote because you know, that is you know the one power essentially that remains to the CECs is to vote on local zoning and that was part of the concern that neighbors expressed which is when a school is sighted without a zone then there is room essentially for the sighting to go around the CEC and not include them. The commitment in this letter to have it be a zoned District 26 school makes you know is subject to a vote of District 26 to approve the boundaries and so it'll have to go through that process as zoned local schools do. So they will have a you know a meaningful role to play in the, in the process of this school sighting.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: My understanding is the CEC approved zoning for new schools in the area. Councilman Reyna if my, my understanding is that the CEC did approve the zoning to allow for a new school to be in the area.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: I know that the process has to include the CEC before it comes to us and so therefore if there's no opposition on the record, there may not be an official letter in support of but there's no official opposition.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Right. And they did earlier this year vote to approve zoning lines for new district schools in the area.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: Okay. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Council member

Ignizio.

COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO: Yeah, if, if I can I think my colleagues would appreciate this fact. This is clearly a not in my back yard scenario where the local residents are saying we need more better streets and parking or whatever at the expense of kids who are in overcrowded schools. I dealt with it myself in my own district of PS62 and you know there are members that are representatives that you know that appreciate that fact and there are those that don't. But I, I think clearly this is an area where they need the school seats and this is, there is a loud vocal minority of people that are opposed that I would imagine

They really need another school facility in that area. With that I vote, oh I'm sorry with that, any more comments. With that I would recommend a yes vote to everything on today's calendar.
