CHAIRPERSON KALLOS: Good afternoon.

Thank you for joining us for this hearing of the Committee on Governmental Operations. Kallos, Chair of the Committee. You can Tweet me at Ben Kallos. Today, I am joined by Council Member Matteo, Council Member Greenfield, who both served on the committee, as well as Council Member Mark Levine, as well as bill sponsor, Robert Cornegy, hopefully as well, Council Member Helen Rosenthal. Those are the two bills we'll be voting on today, which will improve the regulatory climate for small businesses. The bills aim to increase educational opportunities for business owners to learn about the city's regulatory system while also protecting consumers and enhancing customer service provided by agencies to business owners particularly by agency inspectors.

First, we will vote on Introduction 456-A sponsored by Council Member Rosenthal. This bill will require the Office of Administrative Trials and Hearings, OATH, to conduct an annual assessment of OATH tribunal dismissals. Next, we will vote on

Introduction 725-A sponsored by Council Member Robert
Cornegy. This bill will positively impact agency
services by expanding the existing practice of
allowing business owners to fill out a survey about
their experience when they have been inspected by

I'd like to thank my staff for their work they did to assemble this hearing including Paul Westrick [sp?], my Legislative Direct and Shijuade Kadree, Counsel to the committee, Laurie Wenn, Policy Analyst to the committee, and John Russell, Finance Analyst for the committee, as well as David Seitzer our former counsel to the committee who couldn't help but coming back. [coughs] With that said, I'd like to invite Council Member Cornegy to open with a few words on Introduction 725-A.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you, Chair Kallos. Thank you for allowing me to speak briefly to Intros 456-A and 725-A being voted on here today. These bills were a part of a package initially considered at a joint hearing of the Committee on Small Business, Consumer Affairs and Gov Ops in April. And, I think they both moved the city in a positive direction with respect to how we deal with

small businesses. I sponsored 725-A to ensure that the city does not -- does the outreach needed to get business owner feedback on the inspections they undergo. We've taken previously such a---such as creating a business owner's bill of rights and implementing customer service training for inspectors to have achieved the goal of reforming our business inspection system to be supportive rather than punitive. But, unless we hear from business owners who are going through inspection after those reforms, we really can't know if those changes were effective. We don't know it at all. We have to ask, and ask in a way that shows we're truly interested in the answers. This bill would give business owners the power to shape how our inspection regime evolves in the future. I'm proud to sponsor it and urge the members of the committee to vote on it.

I'd also like to add myself as a cosponsor of Intro 456-A. I believe that OATH does a
great job of officially adjudicating the summonses
business owners receive, and look forward to that
agency taking on more of this work in the coming
months. Council Member Rosenthal's bill will ensure
that the agencies and the Council are focused on the
