SPEAKER ADAMS: Good afternoon, everyone. reminder, masks are encouraged to be worn throughout the state of meeting in Council chambers and let's continue to take the necessary precautions to stay safe. Today, we're voting on several legislative land use and finance items. Before I begin, I want to thank each and every one of you for your hard work. And the countless hours spent on negotiating and deliberating on our budget. This is our first budget as a new city Council. And it was not always easy. But we are making major investments for New Yorkers and our collective recovery from the pandemic. I've said before that the Council's work on the budget does not end here. Because there was more work to do to ensure our communities have the increased investments they need and deserve to become safer, healthier and stronger. And I am deeply appreciative of you and our entire staff for delivering this historic budget.

And yet we surely know there is still unfinished business. The school funding issue is at the top of our priorities and has been highly contentious. So

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I'd like to take a second to address it. We all care about our districts, particularly the young people and students in our communities. We understand how the pandemic has impacted their education and well-being of teachers, school staff and parents. That Karen passion we feel about our districts and our young people means we all have more in common than we may realize. As a body and city, we need to work together to ensure this issue of great importance to our communities is resolved. I know the strength of this body when you united can and will deliver the results our local schools need.

We know that when the school budgets came out, it became imperative that we had to address it. That's why we brought into budget negotiations and elevated its importance. Even though it became clear, the budget process would not be an effective vehicle.

Despite our increasing city funds for our schools by more than \$700 million. We know the challenges within these recently released school budgets. We face a real challenge. Billions of dollars in federal funding tied to stimulus dollars are running out. That's a fact. And this is a problem we need to come together to, to solve. I'm committed to

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our students need.

leveraging the power of our body to support us in solving this issue. With the leadership of our education chair, Councilmember Rita Joseph, and all of you, I want this to be an issue that we address side by side with our parents, teachers, students, advocates, and other education stakeholders. Arguments back and forth, without tangible solutions do not advance progress. Progress comes from rolling up our sleeves and uniting to get to the core of the issues. Over the upcoming weeks, that's what I want us to do, what I am going to do and what we're committed to do: to support you, and representing your communities and schools and advocating for what they need. I that can be something that we work on and are committed to collaborate on as a body. And as we as a city Council will fight for exactly what

Now, I want to take a moment to acknowledge that our city has lost a fellow New Yorker to workplace and traffic violence. Earlier this month, 45-year-old Robert Godwin, a livery driver was driving in the Bronx and Councilmember Stevens district when a speeding hit and run driver slammed into him. We pray for Robert's family and friends and stand with

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2 our workers and advocating for safer streets and working conditions.

This weekend, we will observe Juneteenth, a holiday commemorating the end of slavery in America. Juneteenth is a very deeply meaningful day for me, my community and all New Yorkers. It serves as a time to reflect on the path towards liberation, equity, and justice for black communities. And some of that we still have to accomplish as a country. For the first time this year though, Juneteenth is officially a city holiday, allowing us to fully celebrate the emancipation of black people in this country and commit to securing equity and freedom for our people. I hope that everyone will attend a local Juneteenth Celebration in your communities. June is also African American Music Appreciation Month, and yesterday, I was overjoyed to join the black, Latino and Asian caucus to once again celebrate and pay tribute to legends and pioneers of black music and culture. As a member of this body, this was my fifth time attending this great event. And I must admit, as I did yesterday in front of many of you that I truly was starstruck with my colleagues, as we honored greats like Patti LaBelle, Ralph McDaniels

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Doug E Fresh, Busta Rhymes, and Fat Joe -- who somebody says is skinny Joe now. As someone who grew up in Hollis, Queens, this is the harmony and pulse that raised me and inspired me to develop a lifelong love of music. Let's continue to uplift the legacy of artists, talent and brilliant creators during African American Music Appreciation Month.

Sunday is Father's Day, we celebrate...

Yeah, we... Let's applaud the fathers, yeah. Woo hoo! We celebrate all of our fathers, our fathers to be, grandfathers, and father figures who play an integral role in our families and communities. Our fathers are role models for our children, and set an example for the next generation. To all of the fathers who have shaped the lives for the better, including my wonderful husband, Jay, and my dearly departed daddy, Ervin James Edie. I miss you dad with every beat of my heart. Fathers, we thank and salute you on your special day. Happy Father's Day.

I also would like to announce, for those of you who do not know, our dear Lance Pahlavi will be moving on, who is not here today. He's with his wife and his baby. And Lance if you're watching, we

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appreciate all of your work in the city Council for all of these years, and we wish you the very, very best in your next great thing.

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I also want to proudly announce for those of you who aren't watching, we have a brand new First Deputy Chief of Staff. Her name is Faiza Ali.

Yes, we do love Faiza. Faiza, we welcome you to senior staff. And we thank you for all of your years in this Council this amazing institution.

Now let's dive into our agenda for the day. We will be voting on the following land use items:

Sutter Place NPC. Application by HPD to facilitate the development of four new 100% affordable housing buildings on city owned vacant land, with approximately 46 units and commercial space in county Councilmembers Nurse and Barron's districts. EMS station 17, new facility, site selection, acquisition of property, and zoning special permit for new FDNY EMS station in Councilmember Stevens district. 98th 3rd Avenue rezoning will facilitate the development of an eight-story mixed use building with 24 housing units, eight of which will be affordable, pursuant to

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2 MIH and ground floor commercial space in

Councilmember Restler's district. We acknowledge our staff George Sarkisyan Former Deputy Director of the Land Use Division. He had his day... his last day at the Council last week after eight years in central staff. Arriving at the Council in 2014, after serving as district manager for Manhattan community board 11, George was instrumental in helping to lead numerous neighborhood planning efforts including the East Harlem community plan. Beloved by his colleagues and land use for his empathy, leadership

and sense of humor, George will be greatly missed by the Council, but we wish him all the best as he moves

on to become the new chief of staff at HPD.

[Applause]

The Council will also be voting on three resolutions to set the penalty interest rates for property tax owners who pay their tax bills late. These are regular votes taken every year by the city Council. Last year recognizing the impact of the pandemic, the Council voted to lower these penalty rates to the lowest level ever. These current rates mean that most homeowners are charged a penalty interest of 3% if they do not pay their taxes on

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This year, we are adopting rates that are only slightly higher than last year. These rates we're adopting today will be the second lowest rates ever. We do not take the idea of raising penalties lightly, but we must do so to ensure that we have timely compliance of property tax payments. With interest rates rising and inflation up, keeping penalty rates unchanged would put the reliability of the city's largest revenue source at risk. So the step we're taking today is the one that balances penalties as low as possible, while still ensuring that the city retains its proper cash flow to pay its bills on time and maintain city services. Now while it is important that we set rates that encourage the timely payment of property taxes, we recognize that there are homeowners who are struggling and still need help. And in those cases, charging higher interest rates does not help resolve their issues. That's why today, I am directing my staff to prioritize the work of the reintroduction of Introduction 1262, and asking chair Brannan to fast track a hearing on this This legislation would set up a process to bill. allow the city to charge a minimal interest rate on small property owners who are behind in their taxes

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and engage with the city to manage their taxes by

entering into a payment plan or deferral program.

This will allow these property owners time and space

to resolve their debt at a manageable pace and a

6 minimal cost.

We are also voting on Introduction 347 sponsored by Majority Leader Keith Powers that will suspend the annual tax on state-licensed retailers selling liquor wine or beer at retail for on or off premises consumption within the city of New York for the tax year beginning in June 2022. Currently, the liquor license surcharge is imposed on the distributors and commercial importers of beer and liquor. It is paid by all establishments in the city that require on premise and off premise liquor license including restaurants pubs, hotels, grocery stores, liquor and wine stores, entertainment venues, etc. surcharge is imposed and the license fee is paid to the state at a rate of 25%. SEBCO IV: The New York City Department of Housing Preservation and Development seeks a partial 40 year exemption from real property taxes for property located at block 2697, lot 18 and 19, and block 2732, lot 31 Bronx

Councilmember Pireina Sanchez, that would determine a

public emergency requiring rent control in the city
of New York, continues to exist, and will continue to

4 exist on and after July 1 2022.

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We're also voting on introduction 558-A, also sponsored by Councilmember Sanchez that would extend the rent stabilization laws. Pursuant to state law, to maintain rent stabilization laws, The Council must periodically determine whether there is an ongoing housing emergency, defined as a vacancy rate of not more than 5% of the city's rental housing stock. an emergency continues to exist, the Council may pass legislation extending the city's rent stabilization law until the following determination is due. This determination is based on data and findings from a triennial survey known as the Housing and Vacancy Survey or HVS, which is sponsored by HPD and the Census Bureau. These pieces of legislation declare the Council's determination that there is an ongoing housing emergency and that the emergency will continue after the current expiration of the rent stabilization law on July 1 2022. Introduction 558-A continues the laws that allow for residential rent regulation. It would also amend the expiration date of the New York City rent stabilization law from July 2 1, 2022, to April 1, 2024, which would put the HVS 3 and renewal of rent regulation back on its ordinary

4 triennial cycle.

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Thank you, Audrey Son and Jose Conde for your help as staff members. And finally, the Council will also vote on Introduction 303-A sponsored by Councilmember Alexa Avilés. The bill would require the Department of Homeless Services and the Human Resources Administration to track and report certain data regarding rental assistance programs. In order to better understand the outcomes and impact of various rental assistance programs, additional data is needed. This bill would require that DHS and HRA track and report on outcomes of the City Fighting Homelessness and Eviction Prevention Supplement, or CityFHEPS, a rental assistance program created for New York City residents. The bill would provide greater transparency around enrollment rates and utilization, including how long an individual or family has enrolled in the CityFHEPS program before actually utilizing the voucher. And we thank you to our staff, Amanda Kilawon. Thank you very much for your attention. Now I would like to turn it back over to our majority leader.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Speaker

Adams. We're now going to move into discussion of

Leader Joe Borelli.

MINORITY LEADER JOE BORELLI: Thank you. brief word about the interest rate a bill we're passing. This is something normally that some of us Today, we will make an exception to that because the transition we're going to make at the next stage or the stage after that, whenever it happens is the Payment Plan Bill, which is something long sought. So we can still hold accountable bad actors who aren't paying their taxes, and when enough bad actors don't pay their taxes, the rest of us have to pay to make that up, but also allows people to come up with a payment plan, to agree to a plan, and then as long as they're trying earnestly to pay back what they owe to the city, we will give them a much, much, much lower rate. So this is a win because we get to get the money that we're owed from taxpayers, and eventually we'll have a payment plan option for many of those who certainly need it. So thank you.

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2 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you for your 3 efficiency Minority Leader. We'll now go to 4 Councilmember Avilés.

COUNCILMEMBER AVILÉS: Thank you. Thank you for the opportunity to speak briefly about intro 303, a bill I've sponsored and which is before you for a vote today. This bill was previously before the Council last year by Councilmember Alicka Ampry-Samuel, whose work I really greatly respect. As everyone in the room knows, the City Fighting Homelessness and Eviction Prevention Supplement is a critical Rental Assistance Program for families facing eviction and homelessness. This bill will require the Department of Homeless Services and HRA to track and report the council enrollment data on the FHEPS program. This is a common sense legislation that helps all of us in the room and other policymakers accurately gauge the effectiveness of the CityFHEPS program. Data is a critical tool we can use to help craft the best strategies to prevent homelessness, and further to help us understand how we might modify existing programs to meet the needs of those enrolled. I look forward to the implementation of this law and working with advocates

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2 to make sure that we're paying attention to the 3 picture that is painted by this forthcoming data.

Thank you for your help in the passage of this legislation.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. Now to Councilmember Barron, followed by Councilmember Stevens.

COUNCILMEMBER BARRON: Thank you very much. Му colleagues, do you realize that you are taxing property owners, and giving those who have liquor license a break on taxes? Do you realize that Madison Square Garden pays zero taxes? And do you realize the state has a stock transfer tax... we fought for that upstate. They collect 14 to \$16 billion from the stock transfer tax and rebate it all back to Wall Street, the rich. And here you come. Instead of saying "zero" so you won't default. you would have said zero, why are you working on this wonderful bill to help the good payers pay, you're going to tax them 4%, And then 7% and then 12%, and say we got to... we got to act or else we'll default. That's why they do it late to get you panicking. got to hurry up and do this or else we will default. It should have been zero. Some of these are elderly,

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2 who already have their mortgage paid. So their

3 mortgage does not include any tax property. It's not

4 in an escrow account, because they pay their

mortgage. They pay their taxes independently, which 5

means this bill is going to penalize any of them for 6

7 being late, the good actors for being late. In this

8 economy for black and brown people, particularly our

seniors, you are going to be late. And because of

this pandemic, give them a break. Come on, y'all. 10

11 Give him a break. Don't let people tell you that we

12 got to hurry up and do this, because if we don't,

13 we're going to default. Well, if you do zero, you

don't default, because you act it. And then they 14

15 wouldn't have to pay it, and then when you finally

get this other benevolent program, then you can add 16

17 something on if you choose, but I'm voting no on

18 those three resolutions.

19 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go

20 to Councilmember Stevens followed by Councilmember

21 Restler.

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2.2 COUNCILMEMBER STEVENS: Good afternoon, L.U. 61

2.3 and Res 0250 from the start was a project that I

However, after meeting and having several conversations, we were able to get a letter of commitment from the EMS stations, and they have committed to working with the Councilmember regularly and meeting regularly not only with the Councilmember, but with the Community Board to ensure that they are hearing concerns and rectifying them in an adequate way and to ensure that they will be good neighbors. Thus I will be supporting this project and urge my colleagues to support it as well. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. No we'll go to Councilmember Restler followed by Councilmember Farias.

COUNCILMEMBER RESTLER: Great. Thank you. Firstly, I'd like to congratulate my friend Leila

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Bozor on her nomination to the City Planning Commission. I had the privilege of working with her in city government and she is an excellent professional who will prioritize affordable housing and the real needs of our communities. So I want to also congratulate one of the second best borough presidents in New York City, Mark Levine, for that great nomination. And then I'd also just like to share some information on 93rd Avenue, which is a land use item we'll be voting on today. This was certified before the start of our new terms. it's a gas station on one of the last manufacturing zone blocks in Boerum Hill, that they'll be converting into housing. Nine of the 29 units that are going to be built will be affordable and an average AMI of 68%. And in addition, the developers committed to make a contribution of \$100,000 to the Trust for Public Land, to make improvements to open space and playground space at Wycoff Gardens, the NYCHA development across the street, which we appreciate.

It's critical that when developers come into our community, they address the infrastructure needs that we face. That has not happened consistently over the

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that.

years. And it's something that we're looking to revise project by project. I hope that as we certify... as the projects certified during my term moving forward, we'll have a greater opportunity to shape them in positive ways. But I think we got this to a reasonable place in the end. So thank you for

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will now hear from Council Farias.

COUNCILMEMBER FARIAS: Thank you majority leader. I'm just saying a couple words in support of the adaptions of the tax interest rates that we are... that are proposed today. The Council has to adapt the interest rates that are charged when property owners are late on their tax bills. We are adopting late payment interest rates that are low by pretty much every metric, lower than any interest rate you can get on a home loan, lower than record lower than what's recommended by the Banking Commission, which includes the Comptroller, Department of Finance Commissioner, and Mayor. They are lower than what any other city charges as late payments. We are also fast-tracking the bill as previously mentioned Intro 524 that would allow even lower interest rates for

- 2 homeowners who are struggling. This is important.
- 3 We can target relief to those who need it, while
- 4 settling rates to effectively encourage those who can
- 5 pay to pay on time. This body is making a proactive
- 6 choice in determining a much lower rate than if we
- 7 did not act on these percentages at all, which would
- 8 have allowed a much higher, heavier fine at 7%.
- 9 We're doing right by our communities. And I
- 10 encourage my colleagues to vote yes.
- 11 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now
- 12 hear from Councilmember Yeger.
- 13 COUNCILMEMBER YEGER: Thank you, Mr. President.
- 14 Two years ago -- not in this chamber on the Zoom -- I
- 15 proposed an amendment in the middle of the... of the
- 16 meeting to change the proposed interest rate to zero,
- 17 as the gentleman from East New York suggested
- 18 | earlier. The... the false metrics that we're being
- 19 presented with is that if we don't do it today... we
- 20 don't pass these rates that have been presented to
- 21  $\parallel$  us, 4%, 7%, and 13% -- usurious; there's no question
- 22 | that they're usurious -- then the world will shut
- down, the city will go bankrupt, because some default
- 24 | rate will otherwise kick in and we're going to be all
- 25 | terrible people. It's not true. It's not true.

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2 Today is the 16th. The session... the time that we

3 have to do this is by the 30th: 14 more days. We can

4 do it in 14 days. We can come back and do a tax

5 penalty rate that makes sense. The Banking

6 Commission proposed rates of 6%, 12%, and 18%. So

we're patting ourselves on the back, because instead

8 of rubber stamping the Banking Commission like we

9 typically do, we've knocked them down a sliver but

10  $\parallel$  still higher than what it was last year.

So we are raising the interest rates, as the gentleman said. We're raising the interest rates.

We can say we're not but we are. And when we talk about the inflation problem that the city has, if it doesn't get his dollar now, then well, it's going to be worth a little less than six months. So... so do the people who can't afford to pay their taxes. They have that problem too. And all we're doing is slapping a usurious rate on top of them if they can't afford to pay their taxes. Asking them to have a debt that includes an additional interest rate isn't going to make them pay their taxes any faster.

So the question really is, can we accomplish the same thing, encourage people to pay their taxes by adopting the same rate that we had last year, which

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was 3%, 6%, and 13% instead of 4%, 7%, and 14%? And why does it have to be that raise more than what it was last year? I'm voting no as my colleague will for the reasons that I said but also because we can do better, and the idea that we're trading it in now for a player to be named later, for a bill that we're going to fast track in a month or two, instead of just getting it right right Now when we're all standing here is silly, and we can do better. So I urge you all please, wrapping up, please vote no on 192, 193, 194. I think we can do better for the people who sent us here. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, and I'll hear from Councilmember Sanchez.

COUNCILMEMBER SANCHEZ: Hello. I am... I would like to speak in support, and hopefully my colleagues join me in supporting Intro 558 and Resolution 247.

Together this bill and resolution will support the New York City Council's role in New York City's Rent Stabilization Law. We have a very limited role in the City of New York, and that is to review the findings of the New York City Housing Preservation and Development and US Census results of the housing and vacancy survey to determine whether there has

- 2 been a 5% vacancy rate of apartments in the city of
- 3 New York... residences in the city of New York. So
- 4 the HPD, and census found a vacancy rate of 4.54%,
- 5 | with unevenness, of course, across the city.
- 6 Manhattan had the highest vacancy rate at 10%, but
- 7 | places like the Bronx, our lowest income places, had
- 8 a vacancy rate of 0.78%, and it was also exacerbated
- 9 by income levels.
- 10 So we received the findings of the HBS on May 16.
- 11 We had a hearing on it on June 7. And I want to urge
- my colleagues after lots of very deep and thoughtful
- 13 | questioning of the agency. We agree... I agree. So
- 14 please join me in supporting these two pieces of

We saw that with the senior citizens' rent exemption. They are not filling out paperwork because it is difficult to do so, because the people that we are trying to help are elderly in many, many cases, do not have access to the internet, do not have the ability to do all this paperwork. I see my clock is going off forever, so

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communities to speak to concerns and reach green goals, Intro 531 which deals with drainage infrastructure outages, I won't go more than that about it, because I have a bunch here want to get done in time. Intro 529 would... It would expand the type of green vehicles that DCAS can be used to purchase for city use, Intro 532 would require DEP to create a plan for establishing the city's coastal waters as a vessel no discharge zone, and Intro 530 would require DEP to alert our community boards and our offices 48 hours in advance of any work that DEP will undertake that could lead to discolored water or a reduction in water pressure. Finally, I've got a resolution... Resolution 239, which urges the state to pass on the governor to sign Senate 1075 and... and the Assembly 6319, also known as the Rape Is Rape Bill. This bill has been passed 10 times in the assembly, most recently in January of this year, but it's not moving in the Senate. Currently New York State penal law defines a rape only as a forced vaginal penetration of a woman by a man. State's rape definition does not include force oral or anal penetration by man to woman, does not include the rape of a man at all, and does not include force

2 penetration with an object. This state bill would

3 expand the definition of rape in New York State. I

4 just want Gay Men's Health Crisis, Women In Need, and

5 WomenKind for this important initiative. And I think

6 the Council should go on the record and support this.

7 Thank you.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you Councilmember Gennaro. Thank you. We're going to Councilmember Narcisse followed by Councilmember Restler.

COUNCILMEMBER NARCISSE: Good evening... I mean, good afternoon, everyone. I'm asking my colleagues to join me to sponsor two bills that I have introduced, Intro 0543 and Intro 542. 0542 would require the Department of Education, The Administration for Children's Services and the Department of Correction to issue a yearly report on educational statistics and related incidents pertinent to juvenile delinquents, juvenile offenders, adolescents offenders in ACS and DOC facilities. This report must include statistics on educational programming, enrollment, available services, rate of violence for such delinquents and offenders, and other related indicators.

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experienced a tremendous amount of mental trauma throughout the COVID pandemic by requiring the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, in consultation with the Department of Education and the Administration of Children's Services to establish protocols for responding to students experiencing mental health crises. The protocols will include guidelines for immediate response procedures for returning to school, training requirements, and protecting the safety and wellbeing of the student body.

Our young people are indeed our most precious asset, and we must nurture and care for them. As such, I hope you will join me in co-sponsoring these two important pieces of legislation.

I would also like to briefly recognize the upcoming celebration, like my speaker, Adrienne Adams, just mentioned: Juneteenth. On July 19, 1965, thousands of black slaves were working the fields of Texas and other southern states, received the late news that their freedom had been withheld from them for more than six months by rebellious slave masters who had refused to acknowledge the

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COUNCILMEMBER RESTLER: Firstly, I'd like to thank the speaker for keeping our attention on the real need to address education funding in this The budget didn't do enough. The mayor budget. needs to hear loud and clear from all of us and from our communities that this needs to be fixed. It is my number one priority. And I really want to thank her for helping us lead the way and appreciated her remarks very much today. I'd also like to speak on helicopters. New Yorkers shouldn't be forced to suffer from severe noise and air pollution so that the privileged few can get to the Hamptons or JFK faster, or so that tourists can see Brooklyn Bridge Park from above. Yet every day helicopters take off from public health pads to serve the extremely wealthy at the expense of our environment and our well-being. This isn't just a quality of life issue. It's a climate issue. Every month there are roughly 4000 non-essential helicopter flights from our EDCowned, New-York-City-owned helepads, accounting for a monthly average of more than 50,000 gallons of fuel spewed into the air. There's no other form of transportation that's nearly as wasteful. One helicopter idling on the heliport has the same impact

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as more than 40 cars idling, all so a Wall Street banker can avoid taking his car, let alone public transit. Tourist helicopters are even more wasteful as they circle and idle in the air burning fuel and causing noise pollution that can impact our health and cognitive development. Today, I'm introducing a bill to ban... ban non-essential flights from the two EDC-owned heleports in Manhattan with the leader on this issue, Gale Brewer, from the Upper West Side and our economic development chair, Amanda Farias, as well as Councilmembers Hanif, Avilés, Hudson, Gutiérrez, Marte, and Rivera.

And then just briefly, I'm proud to be a coprime on the public advocates bill to ban solitary confinement. Solitary confinement is torture. It has no place in our city. It must stop. It must end. And I'm very hopeful that we can pass (inaudible) bill as soon as possible. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now call on Councilmember Ossé followed by Councilmember Dinowitz.

COUNCILMEMBER OSSÉ: Thank you Majority Leader.

Improper containerization of trash is an issue that plagues my district and a large part of our city.

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When trash is not properly containerized, especially trash from large apartment complexes, litter is scattered all over the sidewalk. This is not only an aesthetic nuisance, it is unsanitary, attracting rodents. Currently the pet quilty for improper waste containerization is from \$50 to \$200, depending on the number of violations. For buildings with management companies and big landlords, this amount is considered to be pocket change, not a lesson learned to deter one from engaging in improper behaviors. To have cleaner and healthier streets, we must make sure that we truly hold bad actors accountable. This is why I'm introducing Intro 544 today was sanitation committee chair Sandy Nurse that will impose a graduated sanitation violation based on the number of units in a building and the number of repeat violations.

I also do want to talk about a disagreement that
I had with a member of this body. At the beginning
of this month, we acknowledged the month of pride,
which is a celebration and a respect for LGBTQ folks,
not only in this room, but across our city. And
yesterday on the bird app, also known as Twitter, I
had a disagreement with a colleague about Drag Queen

Story Hour, which is a culture program that teaches youth about gender diversity, respect, love and dignity. I wish this member was in the room today to hear what I was saying and be as confident as she was on line as she could have been in this room. colleague called progressives, as well as queer performers, and also uplifted comments against me, calling me and all of us groomers. If any of you don't know what the word groomer means, it's basically calling individuals pedophiles. This colleague, called a member of this body, her colleague, a pedophile, myself a pedophile. statements are untrue, I condemned these statements. And I hope that this colleague takes into account how serious this issue is not only for me, but how she disrespected the LGBTQ community in the month of pride. I demand that she makes a public apology again, not only to me, but to... to the entire LGBTQ community. And I hope this body can hold her accountable for her disrespect and her lies that she spread online. Thank you.

[Applause.]

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: We're now going to call on Councilmember Dinowitz, followed by Councilmember Brewer.

Thank you Majority COUNCILMEMBER DINOWITZ: I want to bring attention to two resolutions I'm introducing today, both which aim to bring important reforms to our institutions of higher education. Education is supposed to be a great equalizer, but if that's to be the case, our colleges and universities cannot have inequitable barriers to entry. And if our campuses are to be a safe space for students, our colleges and universities must have the necessary tools to ensure that. The first resolution, Res 0237, calls on the state legislature to pass, and the governor to sign the fair college admission act, which would prohibit legacy preference and early admission policies at undergraduate institutions. Legacy preference in admission gives a significant leg up to applicants with familial ties to alumni, and as a result many selective universities enroll more children of alumni than either black or Latino students. And applying early decision also gives those students with the finance with financial flexibility the equivalent of 100

added bonus points on the SAT, which results in the
an average of 24 wealthy students for each low-income

4 student at elite institutions.

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The second resolution, 238, calls upon the City University of New York to compile data on bias incidents and hate crimes reported into a single report, contain more specific information about the nature of these acts, and importantly to educate faculty and staff about the rise of such incidents and how to report them. We're in a time when we're seeing an increase of hate crimes and acts of hate in our city. Our CUNY campuses are not immune to this trend. We must have detailed data not only to understand it, but how to provide meaningful education. And this includes by the way... this includes hurtful and harmful language, including words and terms of harm the LGBTQ community like groomer, which... which my colleague just mentioned. It fear mongers. It hurts people. It hurts entire groups of people, and universities are supposed to be places of learning, not just of academics, but how we live together, love and appreciate one another. So I hope you all sign on to these two critically important resolutions that will reverse trends of

2 inequity and bias in our colleges and universities.

3 Thank you.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you Councilmember.
We go to Councilmember Brewer followed by
Councilmember Schulman.

COUNCILMEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. On the education front, I do want to thank the speaker and look forward to working with the education committee, Rita Joseph, and with the staff. I do think that will \$5 billion and a very large sum in different pots, certainly not broken up into U of A's, we will be able to figure out how to address the concerns that my parents have and parents across the city not to mention the school communities themselves.

Number two, I want to thank Councilmember

Restler. I've been working on helicopters and noise

and their fuelage for many, many years. I just want

to point out the extent of this concern. If you look

at 311, which is just one data set that -- just like

all of you I feel very strongly about data -- last

year, 2021, I don't know if there was anything, maybe

housing that has such a large response. 26,000

unrelated helicopter complaints regarding noise to

2 | 311, and 21,600 came from Manhattan, and then this

3 year... January till May of this year, 10,000

4 complaints to 311, 7400 from Manhattan. As we speak,

5 there is an RFP going out for the Manhattan Wall

6 Street heliport, and there's no reason why that RFP

7 should include nonessential helicopters for the

8 operator.

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Number two, as Councilmember Botcher noted, we've all been fighting to not have a heliport in Hudson River Park. So this is the time to address this issue. We can't take care of New Jersey. We would love to have those... I've flown in a helicopter with no windows or doors to take... for tourism. It's ridiculous to have them flying over New York, but at least try with those that are in our purview.

Number three, I have Intro 525 which would basically deal with this issue of the theft of catalytic converters from cars and trucks. I assume some of you have the same problem in your districts. They steal. They sell them in junkyards and chop shops because of the precious metals found inside. I have so many complaints about this. And obviously, those that participate in this particular bill would be subject to increased fines and...

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you Councilmember.

COUNCILMEMBER BREWER: ... specifics. I just want to enter the fact that one of the complaints is coming from it's a nonprofit community delivering meals and when they get there to deliver the meal in the truck,...

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you Councilmember.

COUNCILMEMBER BREWER: ... while waiting, there is
no catalytic converter. Thank you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're going to hear from Councilmember Schulman followed by Councilmember Bottcher.

COUNCILMEMBER SCHULMAN: Yes, thank you, Majority Leader. I want to echo the sentiments of my colleague, Chi Ossé, who I believe actually was... was really measured. I want to say that we can disagree with each other in this body, and that's fine. But once we get to the level where we create comments that incite violence against us, that's not... that's not appropriate... totally inappropriate.

And I have never felt as vulnerable as I have today. When I ran in 2009, I was threatened. And I had to go to the police. And they arrested the

person. And I haven't felt as... as vulnerable as I do today, because there are comments on here telling me all kinds of stuff that are going to be done to me. That was... things I should do to myself, that I'm deranged, and that is not appropriate at all. And that was because... not because a colleague disagreed with me, because she actually said that people, as part of the LGBTQ community are deranged, and that is totally inappropriate for this body and

for the city.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you Councilmember. We're going to hear now from Councilmember Bottcher, followed by Councilmember Cabán.

COUNCILMEMBER BOTTCHER: Today I am introducing legislation that will provide mental health services in family shelters. We all know that our city is experiencing an unprecedented housing crisis, which has led to a terrible number of our fellow New Yorkers being unhoused. What most people don't know is that nearly two thirds of homeless New Yorkers are families with children. 8400 families with more than 14,000 children slept in shelters last night. So we've got to ensure that they have safe and secure

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2 | housing, but we also have to ensure that they have

3 the services they need including mental health care.

4 Currently, families are referred to outside clinics

5 | for mental health services and long wait times,

6 operating our operating hours that fail to

7 accommodate their schedules, further increase

8 roadblocks to appropriate care.

So our legislation would require that the city offers these services to families within shelters. I want to thank WinNYC and its executive director, Chris Quinn for bringing this issue to us and helping us to develop this legislation and Co-Prime sponsors Ayala, Ossé, and Rivera. Meeting this critical need is an important step in breaking the cycle of homelessness that's affecting generations of New Yorkers.

I've got to also speak out about the extremely harmful rhetoric that has been used by a member of this body. I cannot think of a more nauseating term than the term groomer. That's what child molesters do. They cultivate trust with someone they're about to victimize. Enough. Enough of that word. Enough of this rhetoric.

## NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you Councilmember.
We're going to now hear from Councilmember Cabán,
followed by Councilmember Abreu.

Saying that I'm proud to co-sponsor on the solitary bill that received introduction today. I'm also proud to be introducing Intro 526, which would guarantee free childcare at every public meeting where it's requested. I'll talk more with folks about how important that is, especially in the world we're in now, where we're all being asked to come back in in person. But as much as I want to continue discussing legislation,

I feel called to take a moment to address the repugnant remarks of my Queen's delegation colleague, and the disrespect from our colleagues who left the room and aren't here to listen to the pain that we're feeling in this moment.

## [Applause]

As a queer New Yorker, and as co-chair of the LGBTQIA+ caucus, let me say, that Drag Queen Story Hour NYC is a wonderful, wholesome, vital program.

Inviting colorful, playfully-dressed performers, to read our children's stories is an invitation for our

2 kids to dress up, to explore, to see themselves as

3 unique individuals with the right to be however they

4 want to be in the world. It shows queer youth and

5 | their peers alike that each of them is valid, that

6 they all belong, that we all belong.

And so as a career public safety advocate, I have to add that it's exactly this kind of program that gets to the root causes of hate, and prevents violence down the road. That is that Drag Queen Story Hour NYC is not only a great educational program, it's an important piece of public safety infrastructure.

By contrast, my colleagues rumor rhetoric poses a danger to public safety. Casting this worthy enriching program as a form of child abuse is an incitement to violence against our queer and trans neighbors, friends, and family. And it cannot be tolerated ever. Especially now. At a time when queer and trans youth are being targeted for violence, discrimination and forced general inspection regimes everywhere across the country. And so I call on my colleague to apologize and to renounce such hate speech going forward. And I want

2 to thank everybody else in this room who is holding
3 space for us. Thank you.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're now going to hear from Councilmember Abreu, followed by Councilmember Feliz.

COUNCILMEMBER ABREU: It's really hard to follow the very powerful testimony of my colleagues. I just want you to know my... my heart and thoughts are with you all.

I'll just go right into it. As Chair of the Committee on State and Federal Legislation, I am honored to be introducing legislation with my colleagues that would combat the iron pipeline and come up with new innovative solutions to deal with gun violence from the guns already in our neighborhoods.

I'd like to thank our co-sponsors, Camilla Hanks, public safety chair, Deputy Speaker Ayala, Majority Leader Keith Powers, Majority Whip Selvina Brooks powers, Councilmember Feliz and Riley, Salamanca, Velázquez, Linda Lee, and Pierina Sanchez.

Importantly, this legislation will include vital information at the dealer level, allowing us to name

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2 and shame dealers that are not properly running

3 background checks, adhering to waiting periods, or

4 otherwise allowing for the flow of guns into our

5 city.

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But our bill goes further than simply addressing the flow of guns. We know what leads to gun violence, not investing in prevention methods like youth programming, mental health support, and the critical infrastructure and environmental design elements that have been shown to reduce gun violence. I want to note that next Friday, June 24, at 10am The Committee on Public Safety and Committee on State and Federal Legislation will... will hold a joint oversight hearing on access to firearms and city and state efforts to curb gun violence. I encourage my colleagues who attend to testify.

I'd like to thank the Speaker's office for placing faith in me to execute on this bill, and for the assignment to this bill. Thank you, Madam Speaker. And like to thank the... the drafter, Jesse Forn, and also my Chief of Staff, Amber Moore, and my deputy chief of staff Delisa Quigley. Thank you.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will now hear from Councilmember Feliz, followed by Councilmember Riley.

COUNCILMEMBER FELIZ: Thank you Majority Leader.

Let me start by also saying that I stand with all my

colleagues, and standing against all types of hate.

Today I have the honor of introducing an education legislative package together with Majority Leader Keith Powers, Chair Justin Brannan, Chair Rita Joseph, and so many other colleagues: a package to improve opportunity for students in our educational system. Our children have unlimited potential, and we must give them every single tool so that they can be prepared for every step of their educational journey. Our public education system has over 1 million students. And for far too long, many students, including low income students of color, have lacked access to schools that we usually refer to as elite or Ivy League high schools, for example, and 20, Stuyvesant High School admitted 700 students, and only 10 of them were African American, and only 20 were Hispanic, 760 Students had made it and only 10 African Americans and 20 Hispanics were offered admissions. This legislative package will help

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're going to hear now from Councilmember Riley, followed by Councilmember Brooks-Powers.

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COUNCILMEMBER RILEY: Thank you Majority Leader.

The FDNY is the second largest fire department in the world. New York's Bravest protecting... New York's

Bravest protecting and serving New Yorkers across all five boroughs. We are grateful for your service, the sacrifices, but historically there is an undeniable injustice when it comes to diversity and inclusion within the organization.

Today, I'm proud to introduce two pieces of legislation with Bronx Borough President Vanessa Gibson that will enhance inclusion and promote cultural competency in the workplace. Intro 552 calls for an annual report of the demographics of a fire department members of firehouses. Calling for future transparency in gender, race and ethnicity, as well as the number of individuals who reside in the area in which each firehouse serves. Intro 553 requires a plan for ongoing training on harassment, inclusion and diversity for all fire department members and staff. It also encourages accountability and seeking a report that demonstrates how the department is implementing that training. Representation matters. There is a lot going on each and every day. Brave heroes in our underserved

with Councilmember Abreu and several of our

2 | colleagues, I'm proud to be a co-sponsor of Intro

3 | 518, which will require a report on trafficking of

4 illegal firearms. New Yorkers deserve streets free

5 of violence, which is why we must do everything

6 possible to address the gun violence epidemic. We

know that many guns come to the five boroughs via the

8 | iron pipeline, which illegally transport weapons

9 mainly from southern states and enables unspeakable

10 | violence here at home.

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This bill will centralize the information we have on this pipeline, and help this Council determine how we can effectively curtail the flow of firearms into our communities. I'm also proud to introduce Resolution 235 In partnership with Councilmember Sandy Nurse, which was the product of our transportation tour of her district earlier this year.

We know now that lead... lead paint is an extreme hazard to our health and physical safety. But in many neighborhoods with elevated train structures, lead paint is an ever-present hazard. A recent sample from the elevated J-M-Z line in Councilwoman Nurse's district reached 63,000 parts per million, 12 times the allowable rate. This is an issue... an

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life.

Thank you.

issue of environmental health and safety, and we must address this disproportionate impact on communities of color. I urge my colleagues to join us on Res 0235 and call for the MTA to remediate its elevated structures and help protect New Yorkers quality of

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear from Councilmember Hanif followed by Councilmember Hanks.

COUNCILMEMBER HANIF: Thank you so much. I had some bills that I wanted to talk about, but you'll receive an email about that. So I just want to just share how painful it is to listen to these testimonies coming from my queer colleagues and I want to lift up their courageous words.

My colleagues Councilmembers Ossé, Schulman,
Bottcher, Cabán have shared with us, and I want to
raise my voice and condemning the vitriolic rhetoric
that a colleague of this body is spewing, inviting
violent, transphobic and homophobic attacks across
the internet, that too during the month of pride.
Our celebration of pride and the queer movement
should include educating every single member of this
body on the continued fight for the safety of queer

- 2 New Yorkers. We can't say we are committed to just
- 3 fighting what's happening outside of New York, and we
- 4 | know what's happening outside of New York:
- 5 criminalizing queerness and criminalizing sexual and
- 6 gender identity within our curriculums, and youth who
- 7 are transitioning.

- New York is the birthplace of the queer movement,
- 9 | and I urge this body for our unwavering support of
- 10 | our queer colleagues and the queer community,
- 11 including queer youth, queer folks who are
- 12 | incarcerated, queer immigrants and more. We are not
- 13 | always going to agree in this Council, which was
- 14 mentioned, but we owe it to one another to treat each
- 15 other with basic dignity. I also want to lift up our
- 16 | trans community and our trans young people and share
- 17 | that I am proud to have funded Drag Queen Story Hour
- 18 | in fiscal year 23, and I sure as hell plan on funding
- 19 them in fiscal year 24 and however long I'm here.

- 22 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're going
- 23 | to go now to Councilmember Hanks followed by
- 24 | Councilmember Nurse.

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COUNCILMEMBER HANKS: Thank you, Majority Leader.

I would like to echo the sentiments of Councilmember

Hanif. Yes, you know, I had... I was introducing my

first bills today. But it is truly important to make

sure that we all rise and raise our voices to hate

and discrimination. And so I echo the sentiments of

my colleagues, and I have tremendous respect and love

for Councilmember Carr who stayed. Who's here.

As a stepmom of a trans child, this kind of rhetoric is... is what these young people are, you know, feeling of not being validated, and it causes them to take their lives. It causes them to be depressed, and we think it doesn't matter, but it does. Everything that you say matters. Words matter. And so I am truly, like, devastated that our colleague is fuming this kind of rhetoric. So I am going to also email you my... my statements of my bills to pass that along to make sure that we do not, you know, pass on this moment to speak out and speak loud against hate.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you,

Councilmember. We will now go to Councilmember

Nurse.

COUNCILMEMBER NURSE: Thank you. I was going to
talk about save the planet bills, but I'm not going
to do that. I just I just want to also express in
solidarity my disappointment and quite frankly,
disgust with the behavior of of Councilmember
Vicky Paladino. And I think New York sometimes
thinks we think we're in a safe little bubble, but
we're not. Just this last week, 30 armed fascists
went to a pride event and they were pulled over
before they got there. We don't even know what would
have happened if they arrived. We're watching right
now at the national level a justice process about an
attack on our nation. And many New Yorkers went down
there to participate in that on January 6. So we
are we are not in a in a little progressive bubble
at all. And that language does incite violence. In
DC, we had Pizzagate I don't know if you all
remember where pedophilia and groomer language led
to a shooter who went into this place and shot
people. So this is not a joke. And what happens on
social media can no longer be taken as lightly.
And I just want to say to all of our queer LGBTQ

members here, I love you. I truly love you. I'm

so... so grateful to be on this Council with you.

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you so much.

And I would have your back, and I would have the back of any member in this body who was facing violent rhetoric or violent attacks no matter where, or what side of the spectrum you are on politically. So I just want to say I'm sorry that this happened to you. And I'm sorry that these members were not brave enough to stand here and face this. And they should they should come back here and apologize. So thank

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will now hear from Councilmember Avilés followed by Councilmember Sanchez.

COUNCILMEMBER AVILÉS: So I to stand in full support and solidarity of my colleague, Chi Ossé, and the LGBTQ community here, inside these chambers and outside in the community in condemning this disgusting behavior of Councilmember Vicky Paladino.

Don't be confused. This is not criticism or difference of opinion. This is defamation. This is a violence. This is hate speech. And this is not the first time she's done it. She has also spewed racist remarks very candidly on social media. I expect that this body and our leadership will strongly and publicly condemn these comments. And we

2 may want to consider fully funding Drag Queen Story
3 Hour and every New York City public school across...

[Applause.]

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COUNCILMEMBER AVILÉS: We stand with you and like my incredible Council colleague, Sandy Nurse, I too love you and will stand with you every step of the way.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We now go to Councilmember Sanchez followed by Councilmember...

COUNCILMEMBER SANCHEZ: Okay. Thank... Thank

you. Yes, I just wanted to speak in solidarity of my

colleagues as well. I love you, too. You have so

much love in this Council. We're with you. And

we're going to stay here and we're going to fight for

you. We're going to fight alongside you. And I'm

just sorry that this... that this is coming from this

body. Love you guys.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're going now to Councilmember Krishnan.

COUNCILMEMBER KRISHNAN: Thank you. I also wanted to add my voice to the absolutely abhorrent comments by Councilmember Paladino. This has no place in our city, in our communities, and let alone in the body of government. I want everyone... all

our colleagues together to send a message loud and clear, that to all LGBTQIA colleagues and in particular to Councilmember Ossé that we are here with you all, we will fight by your side to make sure that we rid this Council chamber and our city have the kind of hate and intolerant comments that we have heard and seen and read about in these last few days. It has no place here. And I say it as someone also... also from Queens, from Jackson Heights, the birthplace of the LGBTQIA+ movement in Queens. As someone who finds Drag Queen Story Hour beloved, and also I've expanded it and doubled it in my community for this year, which is what we should be doing in every district. And I say it as a father of two young children who have attended Drag Queen Story Hour, and who I know, like all our children, must be exactly learning the values that Drag Queen Story Hour and drag culture espouses: Love, pride, and joy. That is what we reflect all together. That is a love that we send to all our colleagues affected by this hate. We will send that message loud and clear. Thank you.

[Applause.]

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Okay. We're now going to hear from Councilmember Gutiérrez followed by Councillor Menin.

COUNCILMEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: Well, if you don't know by now, I love Chi. He is my neighbor in my district in Brooklyn, and my neighbor here at chambers. I too want to just elevate the comments by all of our colleagues who are in support of calling out this bigoted behavior and commentary.

I think talking about stuff on social media has a serious impact. As a sister of a queer New Yorker, I would be absolutely proud... absolutely proud to continue to stand with my queer colleagues, because all our... all of our words have impacts and... and I'm sorry, later is not going to cut it. The damage has already been done. And as the mother of a sixmonth-old, I can't wait to bring my baby to Drag Queen Story Hour when she can understand it, because it is a beautiful program that teaches us about diversity, literacy, inclusion and re-instilling that it is okay to be exactly who you are, to be beautiful, to be colorful and to be unapologetic. And the only apologies that I think matter right now we're from Councilmember Vicki Paladino. It is not

the Queens way. And we know that. So I want to extend my solidarity to all the members were offended but particularly Chi... Councilmember Ossé, as chair of the Cultural Committee here, I think he has been absolutely graceful in his response, and she has been the complete opposite. So I hope that we collectively can hold her accountable. And I also

demand an apology. Thank you.

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MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear from Councilmember Menin followed by Councilmember Won.

Speak in solidarity with my colleagues. I'm a proud supporter of Drag Queen Story Hour. I fund them with \$10,000 in three public libraries in my district.

And I also want to say the number of comments since I've been a Councilmember in January that I received about Drag Queen Story Hour from my constituents, who are huge supporters of it, who asked me to make sure to fund it, again was incredible.

And hate is hate. And the first thing when there is hate speech, is to condemn it and to call it out.

And so many of these colleagues here have had my back

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when there have been antisemitic incidents in my district. I just wanted you to know I have your back. And there's absolutely no place for this at all.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear from Councilmember Won.

COUNCILMEMBER WON: I am absolutely horrified by the behavior of my colleague towards my other colleagues, whom I dearly love as well. And I think it is only appropriate that there are actual tangible actions taken, like an oversight hearing and an investigation on my colleague, especially in the Ethics Committee by Councilmember Yeger, because I think this is not something to take lightly, especially when it is violence that is incited upon other colleagues. And I do think that it is necessary, because it's also an HR violation as well.

And for those who have stepped out of the room in support of homophobes, or homophobic behavior, or anti-trans rhetoric, I think that is also something that should be taken very seriously as well. So I hope that this is a conversation that continues to make sure that we are not allowing this to continue on in our city nor in our Council, especially by

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other Council members that represent thousands of New Yorkers. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you and we'll now hear from Councilmember De La Rosa.

COUNCILMEMBER DE LA ROSA: Well, I just will also wanted to express solidarity with my colleagues. want to say that it's shameful that these words and these comments, and they were doubled down on by Councilmember Vicky Paladino. We have a responsibility here as public servants, to comport ourselves with a level of respect and dignity for everyone in this chamber, no matter where we are in our in our beliefs, no matter how we live our lives, and I want to apologize, since she didn't have the nerve to stay here, I want to apologize for the hurt that has been inflicted on our colleagues today. But I also want to say that as a mother of a young child: Children do not know hate. We teach hate through our actions. And we have a responsibility here to make sure that our kids are loving, and are able to love themselves as much as they love each other. So this is not just about comments on a Twitter page. is about what we're teaching the next generation of children who are watching us right now live and in

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2 living color. So I love you guys, I will fight with
3 you.

But also, there have to be consequences. Because this is not about freedom of speech. This is about hate speech and how we condemn it. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. I'm going to let Councilmember Hudson finish, but I just want to also offer my support... my full support to all my colleagues who feel... or are... feel attacked and harmed right now. And I'm very proud to call you all my friends and colleagues and really proud of the work that you guys do every single day. And I'm very sorry that you feel hurt and attacked right now. And with that, I want to offer Councilmember Hudson to say the last word.

COUNCILMEMBER HUDSON: Thank you. And I specifically asked the majority leader to go last because I was expecting Vicki to be in here and I wanted to make sure that I had time to calm down after all of the remarks.

But I just want to unequivocally condemn her flagrant, homophobic and transphobic comments. These attacks on our community and on my colleagues in the LGBTQIA+ caucus should never be tolerated by this

body. It doesn't matter that this is pride month because our capes do not come off on July 1. And yes, I said capes, because to be the first or the only to be out and proud to stand tall in the face of the type of bigotry and hatred that all members of the LGBTQIA+ community face, but particularly the type that black and brown trans women, gender non-conforming, femme, and non-binary folks experience takes a superhero-like courage every single day.

It wasn't long ago that I myself was called a faggot while walking into a press conference to condemn the burning of a pride flag at a gay bar in The irony has never been lost on me. And to Harlem. know that I walk into these chambers every week, having taken an oath to uphold the charter of the city. And the constitution of the state. colleague who has taken the same oath has the audacity to bring such hatred into these halls is infuriating. If we don't speak up now, New York City will no longer be the beacon of hope we have known it to be. The LGBTQIA+ caucus may be small, but we are mighty. When you come for one of us, you come for all of us.

[Applause.]

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COUNCILMEMBER HUDSON: And let me be clear, to my colleagues who call themselves allies. I don't want to see anyone at another Pride Parade, a march, rally, a gay bar or party if you have not condemned the bigotry and hate that we are currently facing. I urge this body to demonstrate strength in the face of hate and take immediate action to make it clear that these remarks are unacceptable in the Council or anywhere. And thank you to all of the colleagues who have spoken up. Thank you to my colleagues in the caucus for sharing their stories. Thanks, Majority Leader.

[Applause.]

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Councilmember Hudson. We're going to now call on Speaker Adrienne Adams to close out today's stated meeting.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Well, Councilmember Hudson, I guess... (crosstalk)

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Okay, before I... before I do that, sorry... (crosstalk)

22 SPEAKER ADAMS: will get the last word, but I
23 will defer... (crosstalk)

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Madam Speaker, I just have to make an announcement that the Queens

delegation is supposed to be meeting immediately
after this. So please directly go there right after.

SPEAKER ADAMS: I am so proud of my colleagues in these chambers. And just so honored that you took the opportunity for the space that you were provided today to speak your minds on such an abhorrent, embarrassing, and disgraceful display on social media.

Councilmember Carr, we truly thank you for staying. You could have left but you stayed. We thank you for staying in these chambers.

The remarks were reprehensible. Condemnation is a word. Action is a movement. This body strongly condemns hate and hate speech on every level presented. We are here to protect the public, not to harm the public. We are here as examples to New Yorkers, to our families, to generations that will come after us standing in great chambers like this. As speaker of this New York City Council, the word condemn again, is just a word, but I will use it in respect of my colleagues that asked for today. I condemn the words the hate speech thrown out cavalierly by our colleague.

My heart hurts for my colleague, Lynn Schulman, who I have seen moved to tears today. And I... as I fight back my own, I'm thinking about her and her struggle. This will not be the last word on this topic and on this subject matter. The stated meeting of the June 16 2022 meeting is hereby adjourned.
