COUNCIL MEMBER VANN: The number two academic high school in the city of New York is Bedford Academy.

COUNCIL MEMBER VANN: A 96% graduating rate, a 100% regent scholarships, 95% placement in college. And so you can imagine how proud I am and how pleased I am to represent the community where Bedford Academy is located, and the hard work that they go through day to day, so that they could excel and become the excellent institution that they are, and the promise of the future for all of us who live in New York City. I am honored and proud to recognize today both the academic excellence and the athletic excellence of those who are here, who represent Bedford Academy. It is my honor, and I'm proud to do that. like to [applause] ... would the clerk please read the proclamation.

3	proclamation. Whereas the Council of the City of
4	New York is proud to honor the Bedford Academy
5	Panthers for upholding Bedford Academy High
6	School's legacy of achievement and congratulates
7	them on winning their first PSAL A division
8	championship, and whereas Bedford Academy High
9	School was established in September, 2003, and its
10	motto, "Academic empowerment is the birthright of
11	every child", is evident throughout its
12	curriculum. With rigorous academic standards and
13	a focus on learning together, Bedford Academy
14	students are constantly challenged to do their
15	best. As a result, they develop a commitment to
16	education that leads not only to graduation and
17	college, but into a lifelong passion for learning.
18	And whereas under the leadership of Principal
19	Adofo Muhammad, Bedford Academy High School has
20	earned an A on the New York City Department of
21	Education's progress report since its inception.
22	And it is currently ranked as the number two
23	school in New York City and number one in
24	Brooklyn. 90% of the students who attend Bedford
25	Academy have passed every regency exam in all

subject areas, earning advanced regents diplomas, 2 3 making Bedford Academy's graduation rate 96%. And 4 whereas the Panthers, Bedford Academy High School's boys varsity team, recently demonstrated 5 the great alchemy of education, ambition and 6 teamwork. On March 20th, 2010, the Bedford Academy 7 8 Panthers won their first City championship title in Bedford Academy's history by winning the PSAL 9 10 Boys Basketball A Division. Their shared commitment as a team is matched in their academic 11 endeavors as well. The team's academic average is 12 90%, with the highest average being 99.93. 13 whereas the 2009-2010 Bedford Academy Panthers 14 15 include fourteen outstanding players, Lamel 16 Bannerman, Leonard Brown, Maliq Brown, Gianni 17 Carrington, Yves Casimir, Brandon Craigwell, Imadu Durham, Brent Jones, Christopher Kotay, Anthony 18 19 Mason, Jr., Shavanti Reed, Masamba Sam, Shawn 20 Snagg, and Denzel Williams. They have been guided 21 this season by coach Robert Phelps, assistant 22 coach Sassin Lawrence, assistant coach Shawn 23 Simpson, as well as managers Faith Brewster, Yotunde Ojo, Ron Pace, Tala Russell, and now 24 25 therefore be it known that the Council of the City

So I wanted to have this event today to thank everyone at St. Mary's for everything they do, to thank all of the children at St. Mary's for being such angels, and also to recognize the past director of St. Mary's, Dr. Burt Grebin, who recently passed away. And I'll let the folks at

You should stop into the family reading room, you'll note a plaque that that room was donated ... dedicated in the blessed memory of Chuck's parents. So I want to thank Chuck for making sure that this institution never forgets St. Mary's, and I also want to thank one of my neighbors who I bumped into at Chelsea market who helped me come up with this idea that we should thank Dr. Grebin and his family. So let me,

MR. MEARA: Thank you very much.

Dr. Grebin, who everyone knew as Burt, was a great man, and dedicated his life to improving the care of children with special needs and their families' interests as well. He helped create services for children that were never available to them before. And we are a better country in the care of children for the implementation of the ideas that were initiated by Burt Grebin. And so we at St. Mary's who will follow in huge footsteps will do everything we can to continue to provide the care and services to our special children, because they are extraordinary, and they deserve extraordinary care. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: And if I could as the clerk to read the proclamation.

4	is proud to posthumously honor Dr. Burton Grebin
5	for his extraordinary service to St. Mary's
6	Healthcare System for Children, and to the
7	community at large. And whereas if the true
8	measure of a man is revealed in his good deeds and
9	actions, then Dr. Burton Grebin was indeed a man
10	of exceptional character. He was a true pioneer
11	in health care for children with special medical
12	needs, and the president and CEO of St. Mary's
13	Healthcare System for Children for 36 years. And
14	whereas under his leadership St. Mary's Healthcare
15	System for Children grew from a 40 bed nursing
16	home for children into a \$100 million healthcare
17	system that is the New York region's largest
18	provider of post-acute care for children, serving
19	more than 4,000 children in the hospital or in
20	their homes every day, and whereas today St.
21	Mary's Healthcare System for Children is
22	internationally recognized for introducing
23	innovative care strategies and programs that have
24	revolutionized care for children with special
25	needs. During Dr. Grebin's tenure as president,

2	St. Mary's established the first certified
3	pediatric traumatic brain injury and coma recovery
4	unit in the New York metropolitan area, the first
5	and largest pediatric AIDS homecare program in New
6	York State, the first pediatric palliative care
7	and end-of-life program in the United States, the
8	first long-term pediatric homecare provider in New
9	York State, and the first and only
10	interdisciplinary pediatric feeding disorders
11	program in New York State, and one of nine in the
12	United States. And whereas Dr. Grebin's passing
13	is a tremendous loss for his family, friends,
14	colleagues at St. Mary's, New York City, and the
15	thousands of children whose lives he helped
16	fortify. On this occasion, let us reflect on Dr.
17	Grebin's enduring contributions, draw inspiration
18	from his selfless service to others, and remember
19	him with profound gratitude. Now therefore be it
20	known that the Council of the City of New York
21	most gratefully honors Dr. Burton Grebin for his
22	extraordinary service and contributions to New
23	York City. Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for the
24	entire Council, Daniel J. Halloran, Council
25	Member, 19 th District, Queens.

MS. SHULMAN: Thank you, Chris, for having us here today. I would like to say about Burt Grebin, whom I know for many, many years, he was a pioneer in the field of pediatrics. He took children and mainstreamed them into society, when other institutions would not meet that challenge. And he is a man that is worth following, he is a role model for all of the young doctors who are going into pediatrics, that all patients deserve the kind of treatment they need to make them heal. And so I am very happy to be here, because Burt left us a little too soon, and we wanted him to stay forever. But of course that is not possible. So all of us here today are here because we want the world to know that a man like Burt Grebin did exist, and existed in the City of New York, and in the County of Queens. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, Claire.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER HALLORAN: The most

important thing we can do is make sure our children are taken care of, and the children have no better caretakers for them than they do at this facility. Going in there to see the renovations that are going on right now, the entire physical plant is being redone, and they're even looking to the future. They're looking at potential geothermal power, they are people who are on the cutting edge. And we have one of the two sons here. I know your brother couldn't be with us today. But we have an incredible legacy, and we will always have the children first and foremost, and I thank everyone at the St. Mary's Center for everything they've done. Keep up the good work.

MR. GREBIN: This is a big honor and my father is very proud. Even though he's not here - you've got a little something to say?

Look, just a second. My dad would be very, very honored. He was incredibly ... he was just a tireless advocate for children, and for children's rights, and for the rights of children who have really very few options, because things are so tough for them. But St. Mary's has grown from a

little seedling when he found it in the mid-70's to its \$100 million operation today, it's a mighty oak of children's care. And the little leaves and the little buds that come out are here with us now, a couple of them, and I've got to say, like I'm just so honored and proud that my dad has delivered this to the City of New York. He was born and raised in Queens, and he's here. I can feel him in this room, and I want to thank you all. I'm very proud and I want to thank you, I want to thank you. Nothing at all? All right. I want to thank you very much.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you all very, very much. Thank you all very much for all of your work. [pause] All right, well we've had, keeping on our roll a very moving ceremonial today. If I could ask the next ceremonial to come up, which is Police Commissioner Ray Kelly, Inspector Osgood and the members of the New York City Hate Crimes Task Force, and if I could ask any of the members who want to, but certainly the Staten Island delegation, Council Member Mendez and Council Member Chin, to come on up. but in particular as it relates to today's ceremonial, the members of the Staten Island delegation, Council Members Rose, Ignizio and Oddo, and also Council Member Mendez and Council Member Chin. We wanted to take a moment to thank the police commissioner, Inspector Osgood and all the members of the Hate Crimes Task Force. saying earlier today in a press conference that not every New Yorker knows about the Hate Crimes Task Force. In a way that's a good thing, because they haven't experienced hate crimes. But in a way I wish everybody knew what a terrific, elite squad of detectives we have that work 24 hours a day to try to deal with any time any New Yorker is targeted for who they are or who they are perceived to be. We are lucky to have individuals who take on work, police work in general, none less individuals like all of you who take on extra hard police work, dealing with people who are victims of a crime that is so personal, and you do it in a way, and before being on the council, I was the executive director of the New York City Gay Lesbian Anti-violence Project. So I know firsthand how sensitively you deal with victims

and their families when they're in these tough moments. So I really want to thank you and all of your colleagues for all of your work, and for your tremendous partnership with all of us in the New York City Council. Today we want to thank you for the really, really swift work as it relates to the anti-Latino attack that happened in Council Member Rose's district and the series of anti-Asian attacks that happened in Council Member Chin and Council Member Mendez's districts. You solved those crimes just about as quickly as humanly possible. And as I understand it from talking to the inspector over the weekend, many of you were up for four days straight with no sleep. You literally wouldn't rest until the individuals who committed these horrible crimes were brought to justice. So I really wanted, on behalf of all my colleagues, to take a moment today to thank all of you for all of your work, but in particular in response to these incidents, and if we could get a round of applause for them, for the Hate-Crimes Task Force. [applause] And before we hear from the inspector or the commissioner, if I could just pass down the mike, I want to make sure each

3 COMMISSIONER KELLY: T want to 4 thank Speaker Quinn and all the City Council for recognizing the outstanding work of the Hate 5 Crimes Task Force. We want this type of crime, 6 7 hate crimes, to be absolutely the last thing that 8 happens in our city. We simply won't tolerate 9 them, and we devote more resources to 10 investigating hate crimes than any jurisdiction in America, as far as I know, and probably the world. 11 These detectives use all of our resources, the 12 state-of-the-art technology, the real-time crime 13 14 center. They use old-fashioned shoe leather, and 15 they relied on both of them to make about ten arrests, I guess it was, just in the last two 16 17 weeks, of crimes that obviously you're aware of and made the headlines. They used video 18 19 surveillance, they used the goodwill of the 20 public, and they mined databases to stop the 21 violence and to bring the perpetrators to justice. 22 So I want to [applause] I want to congratulate and 23 thank Inspector Mike Osgood and all the members of the team here. Obviously the unit is bigger than 24 25 this, but these are the representatives who did

such outstanding work in just the last, actually a week and a half. And I want to thank them for making certain that we defend the culture of tolerance and diversity that is really the strength of our city. So thank you very much for recognizing that.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you,

Commissioner. Let me have the clerk read the

proclamation, then we'll hear from the inspector

and Council Members Chin, Mendez and Rose, if they

want to say anything. And if the clerk could read

the proclamation?

CLERK: Council, City of New York, proclamation. Whereas the Council of the City of New York is proud to pay tribute to the New York City Police Department's Hate Crimes Task Force for its excellent service to the community. And whereas on March 30th, 2000, the City introduced a Hate Crimes initiative to help reduce the number of hate crimes and enhance hate crimes investigations and prosecutions in New York City. At the forefront of this initiative was the creation of a Hate Crimes Task Force within the NYPD, a dedicated citywide team of investigators

who are responsible for investigating all hate crimes and related incidents. And whereas under the visionary leadership of Commissioner Raymond W. Kelly, the Hate Crimes Task Force has accrued a successful track record of aggressively pursuing all cases of bias crime, and has provided comprehensive responses to every incident. whereas within the last two weeks, five elderly Asian women in the lower East Side were preyed upon and severely beaten by three young teens, including two girls and a boy; on April 5th a hardworking young Mexican immigrant was attacked so viciously that he suffered a fractured skull. Last October an openly gay man was leaving his neighborhood deli in College Point, Queens, when he was savagely beaten by two men screaming homophobic slurs. While the victim was still clinging to life in a medically-induced coma, one of the suspects had already been arrested and charged. In each of these incidents, all believed to be bias crimes, the NYPD's Hate Crimes Task Force has made swift arrests. And whereas hate crimes not only affect individuals who are attacked because of their perceived race,

2	ethnicity, religion, age, gender, gender identity,
3	disability or sexual orientation, they also tear
4	at the very fabric of our free society. The
5	NYPD's Hate Crimes Task Force performs an
6	extraordinary service to all New Yorkers. With
7	continued support from the Council and the
8	community, this elite group of officers has
9	brought us closer to fulfilling America's great
10	promise of freedom and equality for all. Now
11	therefore be it known that the Council of the City
12	of New York most gratefully honors New York City
13	Police Department's Hate Crimes Task Force.
14	Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for the entire
15	Council. Margaret Chin, Council Member 1 st
16	District, Manhattan, Rosie Mendez, Council Member

First I need to note that I want to acknowledge that we received a letter from the five borough presidents indicating changes to their F10 allocations. me also note for a moment some, the legislation that we are voting on today. First I want to thank the staff Terzah Nasser and Mack Carlin, who worked on Intro 24A. I'd also thank Chair Sanders for his work on that legislation. Let me take a moment to speak about Intro 35A. I want to thank Chairperson Koslowitz for shepherding this bill through the Consumer Affairs Committee, and Council Member Jim Gennaro, the sponsor of this bill. Before we speak about Intro 35A, let me just take a moment, I want to recognize that we're joined in the balcony by Professor Doug Museo's sophomore class of Baruch College, if they could stand and be recognized for a moment. [applause] Thank you for coming. Disregard anything Professor Museo tells you, he's not usually right.

Unless he told you that the Speaker and the Council are a brilliant group of people, then he's absolutely correct. But back to Intro 35A, I want to thank Alix Pustilnik, Lacey Clarke, Mack Carlin and Rob Newman and Margaret Nelson, who worked on this piece of legislation. This is a piece of legislation that does basically two things. One, for the first time in 20 years, this piece of legislation will give the horse carriage industry in the city of New York a rate increase. no other industry in the city of New York that has had ... that is regulated by the city of New York that has not seen any rate increase in 20 years. Beyond that, this bill will also make permanent changes so this never happens again, and the fares for horse carriages will now be indexed on inflation and not have to wait another two decades for an increase. Beyond giving a fair increase in fares, this piece of legislation will also strengthen the regulations around horse carriages in the city of New York in two different ways. One, in a way focused on safety of the riders, putting in new requirements such as reflective devices on the carriages, and also greater

training requirements for all drivers. There will
also be greater restrictions and rules relevant to
the horses' safety, limitations, no longer will
the horse drawn carriages be allowed to go south
of 34^{th} Street. Beyond that there will now be
greater regulations around the stables, in
addition greater requirements around blankets for
the horses, and most noteworthy, a five week
vacation mandated by law outside of the city for
the horses. I've heard some grumbling that
Council members would like that passed for
themselves. That will not be happening. But it
is in fact part of Intro 35 for the horse carriage
industry. I want to thank everyone who worked on
this piece of legislation, which in my opinion is
a fair balance between having regulations that
protect the horses that are a part of this
industry, but keeps an industry but keeps an
industry but keeps an industry that supports 300
families, 300 working men and women, and is a
critical part of our tourism industry, alive
during one of the toughest recessions in history.
We're going to ask for quiet in the chambers.
CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Could we have

silence in the balcony, please? Escort the woman out.

4 SPEAKER QUINN: She is not

supportive of the bill, I am fairly certain. That said, you can't make everybody happy, move on.

And I say I believe this bill will protect horses.

But as importantly as protecting the horses, it will protect the economic interests of the 300 families that are supported by this industry.

This is not a time for the City of New York to take action that will put 300 men and women out of work and put their families at great economic risk. So I want to again thank Council Member Koslowitz and Council Member Gennaro for their support, and call on Chairperson Koslowitz.

COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: Thank

you Speaker Quinn. The horse carriage industry is
a famed historic part of New York City. Many

visitors see it as an integral part of their

experience here. On Monday, the Consumer Affairs

Committee passed Intro 35A, a bill that will keep

and improve this New York City tradition. It will
allow carriage drivers to receive a long-awaited

rate increase that will bring their wages up to

date with New York City's standard of living. At
the same time, this bill will also protect the
welfare of the horses who keep this industry
going. It will regulate the industry by making
sure that the horses are treated humanely. We are
in a troubling time for the City's economy, and
the preservation of this historic industry is
vital. People all over the world come to New York
City with plans to take a carriage ride through
Central Park. This bill insures they can continue
to do so in an environment that treats both the
horses and the drivers fairly. Thank you to
Speaker Quinn, Council Member Gennaro, Lacey
Clarke, Damien Butvick, Alix Pustilnik and Rob
Newman for all their hard work on this bill.
Thank you very much, and I have to add that I am
happy to have voted on this bill in the 1990's
that raised the rate, and I'm happy again to vote
for this bill.

the details of the bill. Let's talk a little bit about the record of this very good industry. The ASPCA came and gave, you know, testimony at our last hearing on the bill. They out there, they say, by their own testimony, about 260 days per year checking up on the industry and going into the stables. And it was their testimony that they have never written a violation for cruelty to this industry. No driver, no owner, no stable operator has ever gotten such a summons. And it's certainly, as I said, not for lack of looking, because they're out there 260 days per year. 14 Also, it has never been the case that the ASPCA has made a recommendation to the Department of Health to suspend or revoke or not renew the license of a driver or an owner or a stable operator because they're either cruel or they don't groom the horses or they don't like the way they drive, and they certainly are in a position to make such a recommendation to the Health Such a recommendation has never, ever Department. been made, and that has been corroborated by the Department of Health, who also oversees the industry, and has never taken any action to do

So with regard to the record of the industry, it is stellar. I'm proud of the good job that they do for the industry, for the horses, and for the people that come from all around the world to ride in the carriages. I first got involved in this issue in 1990, when I first started at the Council, I was the staff person that got the job to look into the issue that they were bringing before the Council at the time, because I was the only one on the Council that knew anything about horses. Back in ... I had been riding, you know, 25 years up to that point. You know, it's 45 years, I need a bigger horse these days, but I'm happy and proud to have played a role here, and I wish to ... and I hope that my colleagues would be able to vote for the things that are in the bill that the Speaker talked about, like the mandated stall sizes, so that the horses can live in comfort; the five weeks vacation; the doubling of the checkups for the horses by the vets; setting age limits, both on the young side and on the old side for what horses can work, based on their age; the winter blankets, the waterproof blankets; making the carriages

safer; making sure they've got proper brakes on the carriage. Most of them have, they have those already, but now it will be mandated. And also to do the rate increase so that we can have this industry do all the reforms that we want them to So it's ... so let me thank the Speaker for her great leadership. This could have been an issue that, you know, could have been sidestepped, but it was the right thing to do and the fair to do, to do it and to do it right. So I thank the Speaker for that. I thank Karen Koslowitz, the Chair of the committee, all the members of the committee that voted for the bill, which they all did, the number of sponsors that are on the bill. I want to thank Ramon and Laura Pope and Rob Newman and Lacey Clarke and Damien Butvick and the good people of the horse carriage, who I have been happy and proud to know for the last 20, and people from the animal rights community, who came forward, who worked with the Council staff to get the good recommendations in place. So it's my hope that everyone will support Intro 35A, and I thank you, Madam Speaker for your great leadership.

2	SPEAKER QUINN: Thanks. Let me
3	make note of an important action coming out of our
4	Zoning and Franchises Subcommittee and our Land
5	Use Committee today, relevant to Council Member
6	Levin's district in Rose Plaza, I want to first
7	thank the Chair of the committee, Leroy Comrie,
8	for all his work on this, the Chair of the
9	subcommittee, Mark Weprin, for all of his work on
10	this. I want to thank Gail Benjamin and Ramon
11	Martinez and all of the staff of the Land Use
12	Committee for their work, but in particular,
13	Council Member Levin for his tenacity and work on
14	this issue as well. And I'm very happy to report
15	that we were able to make some changes in the Rose
16	Plaza proposal to get to a point where we will all
17	be able to vote on a proposal today, for a
18	rezoning in Brooklyn that, amongst other things,
19	will include in it 30% affordable housing, an
20	increase from what the original proposal began
21	with when it came to the City Council. We've also
22	seen an increase in the number of units that have
23	a larger number of bedrooms since the proposal
24	came to the City Council, and also improvements in
25	clarifications in the public nature of the public

space and the waterfront access in this proposal.

So I think we should all be very proud of our work today, making a good proposal better, and significantly increasing the affordable housing that will now be available for New Yorkers, in particular residents of Brooklyn, and I want to thank everyone who worked long and hard, well into yesterday, to get this proposal to the point that it is at today. Let me first call on the Chair of the Land Use Committee, Chairperson Comrie, and

then Chair Weprin, and then Council Member Levin.

COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE, JR: I want to congratulate Council Member Levin for doing what was necessary to stick to his principles yet do the things, create an opportunity for an agreement on this project. It's not easy for a member that came in running on the issue of overdevelopment in the community to deal with an area that is being developed in a rapid pace. And I just want to congratulate him on focusing on the issues, articulating to the members all of his concerns, and making sure that at the end of the day there was an opportunity so that all parties could come to the table and be heard. It's

important in these issues that there is a high level of communication, so there's no ambiguity, and Council Member Levin was clear and concise and focused about what he wanted for his community, and I want to congratulate him. I also want to congratulate the Chair of the subcommittee, Council Member Weprin, for all of his work in helping him with getting to that, and getting to yes. You know, this was our most ambitious agenda so far, in our short time in our roles as Land Use Chair and Land Use Subcommittee Chair, and I want to thank him for being consistent and focused on helping the member. In our roles that we sit in Land Use, we have to do whatever we can to help the member to get a project to where everyone understands it, and I think that, you know, sometimes we have to get blood in the water to do that, but you get it done. And as New Yorkers, you know, we don't always agree in the beginning, but as long as we can agree at the end, you know, it's a positive thing. I want to thank Gail Benjamin and the Land Use staff for everything that they did to keep me focused on what was necessary to be conveyed to the members also. And

hopefully we can continue utilizing this project to make sure that our community can be dealt with in a manner that it wants, and that a member's opportunities to make sure that a project is shaped according to their agenda can be done, but also making sure that a project can be developed so that the City can continue to benefit. also want to congratulate and thank Ramon Martinez for understanding when to call me and when not to call me. And if you know Ramon, you know there's no fine line there at all. But clearly also, you know, we had some other projects that were very important that will be voted on today's agenda, the Streetscapes residential project, which also opened up an opportunity for us to have a serious discussion to try to make sure that there is an area in this city that needs to be addressed, and I want to thank Council Member Dilan for bringing that to our attention. It was not actually part of the Streetscapes preservation text amendment, so it could not be resolved today, but we are going to make sure that that has an opportunity to be vetted and truly resolved. We also had some land use projects, some projects that were voted

through the Landmarks Committee that were projects that were also done with a lot of conversation and actually a lot of cooperation. And I think that while it was a large agenda for the committee, it was a positive agenda, and I hope that all of our committee meetings can continue to have a high level of discourse and communication. Thank you, Speaker Quinn.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Chair Comrie. Chair Weprin?

Madam Speaker. I've been asked to elaborate a little bit on some of the things the Speaker laid out on this project. I too want to thank those who were aforementioned thanks, especially Speaker Quinn and Council Member Comrie, and of course, Steve Levin, who really fought very hard for a lot of the improvements and a lot of the aspects of this package. You know, this Land Use assignments 51 to 53 request a zoning text amendment change from the manufacturing M31 district to a residential R73 district, and establishing a C24 overlay within the R73 district. In addition they asked for a zoning text amendment to apply for the

inclusionary housing program, and a special permit
which allows for the construction of three
buildings instead of four, due to the site's
unique configurations. The Rose Plaza project
will provide 30% of the total number of apartments
to be affordable forever, to households with
incomes ranging, it will be divided into one third
will be 40% of AMI, one third will be 60% of AMI
and one will be 120% of AMI, creating 226 units in
total. Furthermore, the project also provides
33,200 square feet in public open space, a
publicly accessible landscaped waterfront
esplanade, and 29,000 square feet of commercial
and community space, through the provisions of a
restrictive covenant and previous restrictive
declarations covering a traffic study,
environmental cleanup, a visual corridor, and
historic resources, the owner, and any future
owner, is bound to these agreements, which run
with the land in perpetuity. Again, I thank all
those involved in this very unique negotiation,
and I'm glad it came to a happy ending. Thank
you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very

much, Chair Weprin, and as I mentioned before, I think all of us agree that Council Member Levin as a new Council member deserves a lot of credit and praise for having had such success on a big and comprehensive rezoning so early on. So I wanted to congratulate you, and I also know you had an older member, a senior member, however you want to talk about it, Domenic Recchia, helping you with some behind-the-scenes advice, even though he's not paying attention. So I wanted to also thank you, Domenic, for helping guide Council Member Levin in this effort as well. Council Member Levin.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you,
Madam Speaker. First I would like to thank
everyone who worked so hard to make an agreement
on this project possible. I thank Speaker
Christine Quinn for her steadfast support during
this process, Chairpersons Mark Weprin and Leroy
Comrie, Chairman Domenic Recchia and Chairman
Erick Dilan, for their support and their guidance
as well. I would also like to thank Ramon
Martinez, Chuck Meara, Gail Benjamin, Amy Levitan,
Christian Hilton, Carol Shine and the entire Land

Use staff, as well as Ashley Thompson, Rami Metal, 2 3 and Hope Reichbach from my staff for their hard 4 work and the support of Community Board #1 in Brooklyn, Rabbi David Niederman, and other 5 religious leaders. In addition I would like to 6 7 give a special thanks to Assemblyman Peter Lopez, 8 not only for his support, but also for teaching me a thing or two about fighting for affordable 9 10 housing. This project has not been without 11 controversy, but I am pleased to report that we 12 have come to an agreement that will move us one step closer to reclaiming another section of the 13 14 Williamsburg waterfront. Once developed, Rose 15 Plaza on the river will bring 754 units of housing to the waterfront. 30%, or 226 of those unites, 16 17 will be affordable to low and moderate income 18 families. 144 of those will be family-sized 19 units, with 74 set aside for three and four 2.0 bedrooms. Affordable housing is desperately 21 needed throughout the city, and it is essential to 22 communities like Williamsburg that have suffered 23 from gentrification over the past several years. 24 The quarantee that 30% of the units in this 25 development will be affordable to families, and

that half of those will be set aside for community
residents, will insure that our waterfront is open
to everybody in the community, not just those who
can afford a luxury condominium. Rose Plaza will
also expand the important Williamsburg waterfront
esplanade. Public access to the waterfront and
increased open space has been a goal of this
community for many, many years. Following
environmental remediation of this site, this
project will provide a link from the esplanade at
the Schaefer Landing development just to its
north. Responsible development is essential to
the economic revitalization of our neighborhoods.
The approval of the Rose Plaza development marks a
high standard for those who seek to redevelop our
city's valuable waterfront property. Thank you,
Madam Speaker, for your support and for the
opportunity to speak. Thank you.

However, when added to the U.S. Census alongside other, more acceptable and contemporary classifications, like 'Black', 'African-American', including the term 'Negro' only makes self-identification more confusing for people who respond. This perverse terminology in turn splinters an entire group of people by defining them as such. As a result, communities of color, specifically black communities, do not seem as large as they truly are, due to an outdated term, which costs our community our fair share of the Federal money and resources that are allocated based on census data.
