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2	SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Madam
3	Public Advocate. Good afternoon to all my
4	colleagues. Hope everyone's having a good summer.
5	Today we're voting on legislation that will expand
6	eligibility for the disability rent increase
7	exemption program in New York City. Thanks to State
8	Authorizing Legislation the governor just signed
9	into law this week we are able to increase the
10	maximum income for the level of eligibility to 50
11	thousand dollars. This is a critical step to
12	maintaining housing affordability for thousands of
13	disabled New Yorkers across the city. As people
14	remember a couple of weeks ago we signed the same,
15	similar legislation for SCREE. I'd like to thank
16	Kelly Taylor and Tarsi Nasser [sp?] from our
17	legislative team for the work on this bill and I'd
18	like to call the primary sponsor Council Member
19	Rosenthal to say a few words.

21 | bill through the city council process expeditiously. You know this is just a great day for affordable housing for New York City residents. We're going to open the door for even more of our citizens to have access to government support for

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their housing in situations where they're paying
more than 30 percent of their income toward housing
that uh, rent will now be capped at 30 percent of
their income for all

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Excuse me
Council Member. Please may we have some quiet in
the chambers so we may hear Council Member

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Everyone's just being joyous for me.

[laughter]

Rosenthal. Please... [crosstalk]

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: I, I hear the joyous murmur. So we know that about 8,000 citizens currently are able to take advantage of the subsidy. We're hoping this will open the door to thousands more. And I look forward to the council playing a large role in getting the word out.

Because most important thing now is to let our fellow New Yorkers [cross-talk] know about this opportunity. Last night we had a housing clinic in my district to discuss the new rent, the increase in the rent cap for seniors. There were hundreds of people who game, who came to the housing clinic. I think we're going to have the same result as we get

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2 the word out for our disabled New Yorkers. So thank
3 you very very much.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you. I have a little bit of an administrative point of order at this point. We have the Fire Marshalls in the room. I think there are too many people standing along the sides. We really need to clear the space a little bit. If our security director will be coming by please respect his directives. Thank you. The council will also be voting on two pieces of legislation to improve online access to city government data. One bill sponsored by Council Member Lander pertains to city laws and the other sponsored by Council Member Kallos pertains to the city record. And we could also maintain silence, thank you. These bills will require that the city publish laws and the city record online promptly and in a user friendly format. The city record publishes thousands of notices each year but accessing it is either time sensitive or expensive. Putting them online in a searchable user friendly format will unlock this information for interested New Yorkers. We're committed to making the city government as transparent and inclusive as possible

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and making these documents more accessible to the
public is a simple but significant way to
contribute toward that goal. I'd like to thank
David Seitzer, Tim Matisoft [sp?], Rob Calandro
[sp?], and Rachel Cordero [sp?] from our
Legislative Division who all did great work on
these bills. I thank them for their contributions
and I would like to call first on Council Member
Lander and then Council Member Kallos to speak
about the bills

much Madam Speaker and thanks also to Chair Kallos. They say ignorance of the law is no excuse but that doesn't mean that we're supposed to make it difficult to know what the law is. I'm very pleased that this bill will help us do more to let New Yorkers, especially those in the research and advocacy and legal communities but all New Yorkers have an easier time accessing the laws we pass here, the laws that have been passed over the years. Since this law was originally introduced the administration has stepped forward and put a link on the law department's website but there's still a long way to go to make it downloadable in bulk so

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that you can search all the laws relating to when you have to sweep your sidewalks or what the rules are regarding night clubs or anything that you want to know about the law is downloadable in bulk, easier to search, and maximize the usefulness to all users. So thanks to Dave Seitzer that, council who worked on the bill to the chair who's been a strong advocate for open government and to the speaker for helping us move this forward.

council Member Kallos: Speak on behalf of two bills that will open government laws and notices to public online where New Yorkers expect to find it. The City Council's commitment to reform and public engagement under Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito has been exceptional and these bills are just another part of that. Council Member Brad Lander's open law bill follows on a precedence set by Hammurabi a millennium ago bringing the laws to the people on stone tablets and today that means online where it belongs. City record online cosponsored by Council Member and Technology Committee Chair Jimmy Vacca will open meetings, land use procurement, and other vital city information to the public and to public private

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partnerships to build the next great app to make
our government more accessible. I want to thank
David Seitzer Committee Council to the Government
of Operations for his hard work on these bills.
Both will help to open information for the 21st
Century Government that works for the people.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Council Members. Today the City Council will also be voting on legislation requiring the Department of Education to evaluate and prioritize the installation of door alarms linked to exterior doors in our city's schools. We're asking the DOE to thoroughly examine the need for security measures that will prevent unauthorized departures from school premises by students. We're also instructing the DOE to prioritize facilities that serves students with severe special needs and elementary aged students. By May 30<sup>th</sup> of 2015 the DOE will submit a report to the council outlining the results of their evaluation and providing a timeline for alarm installation. Additionally we'll be requiring the DOE to submit an annual report describing training on student safety protocols for DOE personnel. This is a bill that will make our

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educational facilities safer for students and give
parents the peace of mind they deserve when they
send their children to school for the day. I want
to thank Iesha Schaumburg, Jen Atwell, Joan
Polanyi, Lyle Frank, and Terslen Aser [sp?] for
their work on this and I would ask Council Member
Cornegy, the lead sponsor, strong advocate on this
bill to say a few words.

Thank you Madam Speaker. I feel very humble to stand here on this day when the city council will vote on the first bill I've introduced. This is an emotional moment and an emotional topic. I never had the pleasure of meeting Avonte Oquendo but over the past few months I spent time with his mother, his grandmother, spoken with his father, heard from his brother, and been joined on the steps of city hall by his cousin and others who love him. I'd like to acknowledge the presence of Avonte's mom and grandmother and extended family right now.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: I'd also ask that representatives of the press respect their desire to be present for this important moment

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without being asked for interviews. Avonte's family knows and appreciates that all of New York developed feelings of love and connection for that young man. When we learned he was missing we saw, and saw the image of, the images of him running out of his school we wanted to help search and just do anything to bring him home. Sadly our prayers and best intentions were not enough. Avonte's life was lost. I'd like to ask for a moment of silence today in recognition to that loss.

[pause]

after Avonte's death was confirmed I learned that the problem of unalarmed doors was not limited to the public school he attended. Symeir Tall, Talley-Jasper, a pre-k student in my district slipped out of a side door at P.S. 59 and then there were other children from Brooklyn to the Bronx, from charter schools and public schools. Their principals were horrified and their parents were panicked. That reality is why I introduce this bill and why 46 of my colleagues and the public advocate join me as sponsors. It's also why parents and advocates across the city have spoken out and rallied in

2	favor of the bill. This is an important bill and I
3	believe that it will be effective. The Department
4	of Education and the City Council have reached
5	agreement on all the provisions of Avonte's law and
6	more. We're going to work together to get this
7	done. And that agreement to cooperate is critical
8	because it tells the world that we're committed to
9	the same goal of keeping our children safe. We're
10	also joined by so many advocates for children.
11	Parents in the autism community who are celebrating
12	our vote on this bill. I'm grateful to students
13	first, the citizens committee for children, QSAC,
14	Autism Speaks, New York City Parents Union,
15	Teamsters Local 237, and a council for supervisors
16	and administrators for their votes of confidence.
17	Most importantly Avonte, and Symeir Talley Jasper's
18	families know that we have done our best to make
19	this situation right. I felt blessed to watch them
20	grow in advocacy and strength during this process.
21	And I look forward to celebrating with them here at
22	city hall when this bill is signed into law.
23	Finally I'd like to thank my speaker Melissa Mark-
24	Viverito for her leadership and for the staff
25	resources that made it possible to get to this

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point. Special, extra special thanks to Chairman

Danny Dromm whose leadership of the Education

Committee I respect greatly. Thanks also to public advocate Letitia James for signing on as an early co-sponsor and for speaking out in favor of the bill at every step. I've equally, I'm equally grateful to each of you and to Asia Jan Joan Tisler [sp?] and Dina Shell all staff who work, whose work was instrumental. And with that I urge each of you

to vote yes on Avonte's law today. Thank you.

Robert. The level of passion and commitment you've demonstrated to this issue is, is very inspiring, thank you. Finally we also will be voting on a resolution sponsored by Council Member Debbie Rose urging President Obama to include immigration reform and issues of importance to African immigrants as a topic of discussion in the United States Africa Leader Summit next month. I want to thank Julian Beckford, Jennifer Montalvo, Rob Calandra, and Rachel Cordello for their work on this resolution. I'd like to additionally thank Laura Poppa [sp?], Matt Gowab [sp?], and Rob Newman

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[sp?] for other work and leadership on all the legislative items on the agenda today. And with that Council Member Rose can say a few words.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Thank you.

Colleagues I rise today to urge you the support passage of Reso 357 calling on President Barrack Obama to include comprehensive immigration reform on the agenda of his first United States African Summit taking place next month on August 4<sup>th</sup> through the 6th in Washington D.C. I wish to thank Council Member Menchaca for adjusting his schedule to hold this hearing on this resolution so quickly and the members of the Immigration Committee for voting to approve. I'd like to thank Speaker Mark-Viverito for her support of this resolution and her and her staff's efforts to bring it to a vote today and Julien Beckford and, and Jennifer Montalvo for their assistance to bring this so that it could be sent to the white house and placed before them as they prepare the agenda for the summit. As you know many, I, in my district there's an area called Park Hill which is affectionately known as little Liberia, I have the largest Liberian population of any city outside of Africa as well as many

2	immigrants from Nigeria, Sierra Lion Gianna, and
3	the Ivory Coast and Ginny [sp?]. This is reflective
4	of an overall trend. The number of African
5	immigrants in the United States has doubled since
6	2000 to more than 1.6 million. And New York City is
7	the home to a significant number of these
8	immigrants. They contribute significantly to our
9	local economy and to their home economies through
10	remittances creating a vital link between two
11	continents. Given these factors America, Africa
12	should be a vital part of the discussions on
13	immigration reform taking place in the United
14	States right now. Our current immigration system
15	presents significant hurdles to those from the
16	African continent who wish to study and work in the
17	United States. For example the diversity visa
18	lottery must be reinstated. It is one of the few
19	ways for Africans to immigrate to the United
20	States. There are also concerns regarding our
21	refugee and the asylum processes. This discussion
22	on this agenda should also emphasize securing
23	access to educational and economic opportunities
24	for women and girls throughout Africa. If the
25	obstacles women face is exercising their rights

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were eliminated it would help assure Africa's economy and social development and in turn would benefit the United States. I hope that all of you can support this resolution today thank you.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you Council Member Rose. And that concludes communication from the speaker.

Madam Public Advocate. I wanted to speak on the ULURP Application in my district that we're voting on today. On 49<sup>th</sup> Avenue it will continue the progress in Long Island City that has been happening for the last several years bringing 140 unit residential building to a newly zoned parcel. The project will bring much needed affordable housing to the neighborhood at, I might add, a lower AMI than had originally been proposed. I'm pleased to have worked with the developers to bring a first of its kind project to the building. We've secured in agreement in writing where there'll be affordable rehearsal and workspace for artists that will be built out and a significant portion of the

ground floor of this project. I'm also pleased that
developer has worked with us and will include
organized labor as a part of this project including
making sure that the building service workers will
have union jobs, union benefits, and union pay
which is incredibly important to me. Finally the
change in the zoning map will round out the Long
Island City special district which is a zoning
district that allows for a solid mix of
residential, commercial, and manufacturing which is
unique within the city. And while the zoning map
change is small it is important to the future of
Long Island City. It's a good project, one that I'm
proud to support and I want to thank Chairs Weprin
and Greenfield and the members of the Land Use
Committees for their support and encourage all of
my colleagues to vote aye. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. Council Member Dickens.

Public Advocate. I rise to ask for support for preconsidered intro 422. I thank the speaker and her

to be a part of this legislation. I thank my

half of their income in rent. And by expanding DREE
eligibility we will ensure that more New Yorkers

increases that would force many to choose between
paying the rent and buying food or critical

8	no, Council Member Rose.

10	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: It ends today
11	PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Gentile.
12	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Little did Eric
13	Garner [sp?] know his words would be prosthetic
14	when he uttered this last Thursday. It ends today.
15	My colleagues I'm here today with a heavy heart but
16	a steadfast determination. On today we laid to rest
17	my constituent Eric Garner Jr. who came to an
18	untimely and brutal death at the hands of the NYPD
19	during an attempted arrest. He was unarmed,
20	nonviolent, alone, and had no history of violence.
21	Those who were charged with protecting the public
22	stood idly by for seven minutes with Mr. Garner's
23	lifeless body at their feet. They made no attempt
24	to try to help him, apply CPR or resuscitate him.

As I watched the constant streaming of the horrific

2	video of Eric Garner's encounter with NYPD I was
3	unable to turn away from this compelling indictment
4	of man's inhumanity to man. While images of blatant
5	indifference played over and over I am sickened by
6	the cavalier attitudes of all involved and
7	frightened that not one took pause to rethink their
8	actions. Did they not hear what the world heard,
9	the constrained cries of 'I can't breathe. I can't
10	breathe' over and over until there wasn't anymore.
11	These images are etched in my mind denying me peace
12	of mind and once again our communities mourn, our
13	community is in mourning not only for the loss of
14	the life or Eric Garner but also because once again
15	we are reminded of how little value our lives have.
16	Seemingly the value of three packs of unlicensed
17	cigarettes outweighs the value of a life. Well as
18	Mr. Garner said it ends today. No more. We have to
19	demand a thorough, and I have demanded, a thorough
20	and swift investigation of what happened to Mr.
21	Garner and the actions of the NYPD officers and EMS
22	workers on July 17 <sup>th</sup> . We have demanded to know why
23	all of the officers are not removed from duty
24	without pay or on restricted duty. There were up to
25	eiv officers involved in this incident. We have

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2	demanded a review of NYPD and FDNY policies
3	including the use of deadly force. So reflexively
4	used in this incident. Our public safety chairwoman
5	Vanessa Gibson who I can't thank enough for all of
6	her support will, we've asked her to hold a hearing
7	and we expect that all involved agencies will
8	testify. And we should thank all of you for your
9	support of Mr. Garner's family, myself, my staff,
10	and my district during these trying times. Our
11	community mourns, it demands justice. This cannot
12	be business as usual. This cannot be white washed.
13	This cannot be given short shrift. Thank you.
14	[applause]

16	Williams.
17	COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you
18	Madam Public Advocate. First I'd like to

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: On, secondly I too wanted to... most of my comments obviously have been in the media when it comes to the Eric Garner incident. And I want to stand behind the leadership of Debbie Rose. One thing in particular that I want to point out is I believe that in order for us to move forward we have to 100 percent acknowledge that race is an issue in this case and in so many cases that have come before it. And I appreciate many of the things that have been said by the commissioner and indeed by the mayor. But like was done in high point North Carolina where we moved forward in police community relations. There the commissioner acknowledged publically of the wrongs that were done to that community. It is important that this administration, this police commissioner validate the experiences of all of communities in New York City. And until we do that publically, validate the problems and the issues and the feelings of communities black and brown in

particular in dealing with the NYPD in this
community it will be difficult to move forward with
the great work that has been laid out and some of
the things that I think are helpful. So I say again
it is important that we validate that race has been
an issue in this case, in all the cases before it.
If we don't acknowledge race as the issue we
unfortunately have heard many of these words
before. And we will hear it again. So I ask this
administration, I ask this commission, I ask us all
to please take a moment and publically acknowledge
and validate the experiences that many of us have
felt. And I just want to thank Debbie Rose and
applaud her again for her leadership. Having been
in similar situations I know how hard it is to
guide a community constructively and you're doing a
fantastic job and I want to say thank you again.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member Van Bramer.

COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much Madam Public advocate. Before I talk about a very important bill that Council Member Levin and I are introducing today I too want to

2	thank Councilwoman Rose for her incredible
3	leadership and her passion. And some of the things
4	that we've been sharing personally here just
5	reinforced how special Council Member Rose is. But
6	to the legislation that we're introducing Council
7	Member Steve Levin who's an amazing council member
8	and terrific friend are reintroducing our
9	legislation to have the city of New York have a
10	cultural plan which calls on the city to analyze
11	current cultural priorities, determine how
12	different communities are being served and how they
13	propose to improve the services through studying
14	the conditions of artists in the city today and
15	determine a plan on how New York City can remain an
16	artist friendly city in a time of skyrocketing
17	grants and other economic pressures. We introduced
18	this plan of response to the lack of cultural
19	planning for New York City. At various times there
20	are many cities across the country, in fact the top
21	10 cities in population have cultural plans, New
22	York City is the only one that does not. So we are
23	introducing this legislation once again in hoping
24	all of the colleagues will support it. The arts are
25	a major part of the soul of New York City and

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making sure that everyone in our city has access to the arts and to culture and making sure that there is equity across boroughs and neighborhoods is incredibly important. A cultural plan will get us to that point. And with that I want to thank Madam Public Advocate.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you.

Council Member Rosenthal.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Thank you very much Madam Public Advocate James. I'm excited today to be introducing two pieces of legislation. Intro 423 to monitor the participation of worker cooperatives in city procurement and resolution 358 calling on the state to amend the general municipal law to afford the city greater latitude to advance social goals through the contracting process. A special thank you to my colleagues who have cosponsored intro 423 on worker cooperatives. Council Member Menchaca and Arroyo. I'd also like to thank all of the organizations and non-profits that testified at the Committee on Community Development hearing earlier this year and worker cooperatives led by Councilwoman Arroyo. Through these pieces of legislation I look forward to establishing more

2	thorough monitoring to the types of businesses that
3	receive contracts with an eye for expanding the
4	number of worker cooperatives that do business with
5	the city and working with our state legislatures to
6	give this city opportunities to pursue social
7	justice policy directly through its contracting.
8	Another example came up today when we were talking
9	about those with disabilities who are less likely
LO	to get city contracts in any other group. I invite
L1	my colleagues to sign on to these pieces of
L2	legislation, intro 423 and reso 358 and look
L3	forward to expanding the conversation on how the
L 4	council can find more creative ways to further our
L5	shared policy goals of a more equitable,
L 6	sustainable, progressive, and just New York City.

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2 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: I just want to 3 rise because in my emotional state I forgot to say 4 thank you. I, I forgot to thank the speaker who has 5 been phenomenal in not only providing resources of staff and time but she's actually come to the 6 7 district a number of times. I'd like to thank the public advocate who has also been there for us and, 8 and, and provided support, and to all of my council 9 members because you've been so supportive of my 10 district and our needs. And I, I just, it would 11 12 have been very remiss of me not to thank all of you 13 including the mayor and the police commissioner for 14 the, the support that you've given my district. 15 Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. Council Member Treyger.

COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: Thank you Madam
Public Advocate. I, speaking about two, two pieces
of legislation. The first is Intro 425. After Sandy
the city conducted an analysis of areas such as
food availability and fuel availability both of
which are critical. However, we also have to make
sure we have access to, to communication systems in
order to coordinate the search and rescues

2	operations, provide information to the public, give
3	the public the ability to seek out vital
4	information and let victims to alert loved ones
5	that they are safe. This legislation lays the
6	ground work to conduct an assessment of our
7	existing communications infrastructure in some of
8	the city's most vulnerable communities impacted by
9	Sandy including Coney Island, Red hook, Rockaway,
10	Staten Island, and parts of Manhattan. In addition,
11	and make no mistake it is my belief that this is
12	the first step towards establishing a system of
13	free Wi-Fi in, Wi-Fi access in these communities
14	not just from a recreational standpoint but from a
15	public safety and disaster preparedness purpose. So
16	I ask my colleagues to please support Intro 425.
17	I'm also asking my colleagues very quickly to
18	support Resolution 359. Sandy caused an estimated
19	19 billion dollars in damage with 30 thousand homes
20	and 23 thousand businesses impacted. Many of these
21	working class and middle class families have used
22	their life savings to get back on their feet. The
23	SBA, the federal agency provided nearly 550 million
24	dollars in loans to over 10 thousand homeowners and
25	roughly 190 million dollars in loans to over 12

Today I'd like to first of 4 all thank all my colleagues for all their support over the last few weeks and all and, and again 6 7 thank the speaker for this first, this freshman year allowing it to be successful for all the 8 quidance that, that has been delivered. But I'd 9 also like to take a moment to talk about a 10 11 gentleman who we lost recently who was an 12 inspirational figure in my life and to most of my 13 colleagues in government; Mr. Paul Gibson Jr. Mr. 14 Paul Gibson was, he started his career in this very 15 chambers as Council to the then President of the 16 City Council Frank O'Conner before becoming the 17 first African American Deputy Mayor in the City of 18 New York. He handled his responsibilities with great dignity and grace at all times hearing 19 20 government and is in commercial life. He, he's done a lot of phenomenal things here in the city of New 2.1 2.2 York in public and private sector. His work as the 23 Chief counsel to the NAACP is, is renowned as well as, just a lot of the work that was done here and 24 25 and for that reason we are very fortunate to know

2	Mr. Paul Gibson Jr. in Southeast Queens and we are
3	fortunate to have him in our community. He's one of
4	our great leaders and represented the best of what
5	we can become. And for this I, I, I, I shall
6	miss him very much. And for the record I think that
7	he's a phenomenal role model for all of us and
8	really a trailblazer here. And just wanted to put
9	that for the record. And thank you Madam Public
10	Advocate for the time.
11	PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Congratulations
12	again on your nuptials.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER MILLER: Thank you.
14	PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member
15	Deutsch.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER DEUTSCH: Thank you Madam
17	Public Advocate and congratulations Council Member
18	Miller for passing the ring. I'm asking for your
19	support for Intro 410 which will reduce congestion
20	and promote safety on our highways. This bill will
21	increase the amount of tow trucks available to

increase their arrival time and efficiency. Tow 24 truck companies require a permit in order to

respond in the event of an accident or breakdown.

And by utilizing state of the art technology to

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2	legally operate on highways in New York City.
3	Currently permits are only awarded to a single tow
4	truck company per highway or highway segments. As a
5	result disabled vehicles are often forced to endure
6	long waits for a tow truck to arrive. As such a
7	disabled vehicle on the highway blocks traffic,
8	creates traffic jams, in addition can pose a hazard
9	to other motorists. The irony of this situation is
10	that other tow truck providers may be close by and
11	available to provide assistance but their services
12	may, may, may not be solicited. This bill requires
13	that more towing companies be permitted with a
14	mandatory minimum of at least two providers per
15	high way or high way segments. Furthermore tow
16	trucks must be outfitted with GP.S. tracking
17	devices in order to qualify for the permits. This
18	will give police the ability to, to assess where
19	the nearest available tow truck is located so that
20	our highways can be cleared of obstructions as
21	quickly as possible and ease the burden which can
22	be sometimes for hundreds and hundreds of
23	motorists.

24	and it wasn't until the teacher got back to the

classroom that she realized that the visiting

student, this kindergartner was not there and
reported it to me. Of course we followed the
protocols, we called the police, we called the
parent, we pulled the records, and the parent's
phone wasn't working. So I marshalled the forces
and we went to tell this parent we don't know what
happened to your child. He slipped out one of the
21 doors that we have on the floor. Thank god that
when we got there the child was there. He had
decided he didn't want to stay in school because
his teacher wasn't there and he didn't know the
children in that class. And he had gone across a
major thoroughfare but thank god had gotten home
safely. So I understand what great relief this
brings to those in charge of our young children and
to the Avonte family, Avonte's family I just want
to say the sacrifice, the loss that you have
suffered has now been memorialized in this bill. So
we want to thank again Council Member Cornegy for
doing that. I also want to remind people as I'm in
my African attire which I'm often in that today is
101 days since the loss of the 300 girls who were
kidnapped in Africa. We want to keep that in mind.

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COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Yes, thank you.

colleague from Staten Island Debbie Rose and I say that this tragedy is a result of the broken windows policy that says let's take people who are committing minor offences because we think that in the future there might be something of a gross nature. And we need to stop the policy of the broken windows that is being implemented by the police commissioner. It's a policy. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: I rise to stand with my colleague Council Member Debbie Rose. Eric Garner was not the first but he must be the last. Today I'm pleased to introduce three bills with Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer, my predecessor in the Governmental Operations

2	Committee, a true mentor and partner. Intro 415
3	saves the video records. It would preserve and
4	upgrade our historical records for the sake of
5	accountability and scholarship and so you can watch
6	some old proceedings if you're feeling a little bit
7	insomniac. Intro 416, a traffic notification bill
8	would ensure community involvement and
9	communication in traffic changes by requiring DOT
10	to provide 30 days' notice to community boards of
11	street changes. And Introduction 417, open
12	production would put production information online
13	to property, to properly inform residents and New
14	Yorkers of the arts happening in their community. I
15	for one am a huge fan of local productions and
16	it'll give me for one an opportunity to go see my
17	favorite shows being filmed right here in New York,
18	the biggest film set in the world that happens to
19	be where 8.5 million people live. Resolution 353 in
20	support of the passage of the companion bill to
21	congresswoman Maloni's HR-863 in the senate,
22	members of the Women's Issues Committee and Chair
23	Van Bramer of Cultural Affairs Committee join me as
24	co-primary sponsors in calling on our nation's
25	capital to represent the incredible stories of

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women chroughout history. Resolution 334 in support
of a statewide and national ban on misuse of
antibiotics in livestock production. The widespread
practice of using low dose antibiotics in livestock
feed creates a breeding ground for antibiotic
resistant bacteria which is dangerous to human
health. These resistant bacteria pass from factory
farms to our food systems resulting in millions of
Americans becoming ill each year. I'd also like to
recognize four interns food policy fellow Ryan
Rinod [sp?], summer interns Ian Schwartzberg [sp?],

21	continue to wrap ourselves around a community that
22	needs so much support and as chair of Public Safety
23	we will hold a hearing on many of the reform
24	policies and we will work with this administration
25	with our mayor and our commissioner and I truly

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want to just thank you so much for your strength and know that I am always here to support you. So

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member Levine and his son.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Thank you. Actually Madam Public Advocate I'm ably assisted today by both of my sons, Daniel who you've seen and also Alejandro who's here as well. And I, I want to start by acknowledging what, what has to be the most moving statement I've heard on the floor of the city council in my here by Council Member Rose. Thank you for that. We will not soon forget your words and your leadership. I want to call the attention to my colleagues to two items I'm proud to introduce today. First is resolution 355 which addresses the scourage of bullying in New York City's public schools. Today nearly 20 percent of high school students are subjected to physical and emotional abuse on public school property and many others through cyber bullying out of school hours. And I'm thrilled that a young leader in my district

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Anthony Vargas has called attention to this issue and has proposed a solution. And I think Anthony's in the balcony. If so maybe he could rise and wave. And give a round of applause to Anthony Vargas.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: He, he has proposed that all young students be mentored by older students in the public schools, peer to peer mentoring which helps to boost self-esteem and emotional strength among younger students to prevent the problems that lead to bullying. Proud to be introducing this resolution in support of that policy. Also quickly want to call my colleagues attention to Intro 420 which would address the increasing problem of major construction adjacent to school buildings. Problem in my district that P.S. 19, 163 on 97<sup>th</sup> Street where a 20 story tower is proposed to be erected just footsteps away. This law would require very strict codes related to noise that affect students during school hours for any construction within 75 feet of a school building so that no child during school hours is subjected to noise louder than 45

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decibels and would require robust monitoring of such construction in any of these cases. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you.

Council Member Dromm.

COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Thank you very much Madam Public Advocate. I also want to express my support and solidarity with the remarks of my colleague Council Member Debbie Rose from Staten Island as well as other comments that were made. I stand in solidarity with you in fighting this tragedy. But even more importantly than it was a tragedy it was an injustice. And we as council members have an obligation to fight back against these types of injustices. And I want you to know that I want to stand there with you and be a part of correcting what is wrong with that system. Thank you for your, for your leadership in that. And I also want to take this opportunity to thank my interns Andrew Folly [sp?], Alan Fayola [sp?], and Miranda Rosero [sp?] during, who are working in my office this summer in the legislative office as well as other interns in my district office who I will announce at the next stated meeting as well.

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2 So thank you to them and thank you Council Member 3 Rose.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member Mealy. Council Member Richards.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Good afternoon. I stand to ask my colleagues to support Resolution number 356 today. In September world leaders will come to New York City for a summit at the United Nations on Climate Change. Related to this summit there will be the people's climate march, a demonstration to demand that the world respond to climate change crisis and develop an economy that works for both the people and the environment to make a world with good green jobs, clean air, and healthy communities for everyone. This march is slated to be the largest demonstration in history to demand action on climate change. 1199 is one of the groups this week who recently signed onto marching in the march as well as other, hundreds of other groups including the Environmental Justice Alliance and the New York League of Conservation Voters. I'm urging all of my colleagues at the legislative body of the new, of New York City to recognize the danger, the dangers

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of climate change and the threat that it imposes on human and the environment. Please join me in endorsing the people's climate march, New York City is, which we are scheduled to proceed near the United Nations Summit on Climate Change that will

7 take place on September 21<sup>st</sup>, 2014 right here in 8 New York City. The summit is aimed at catalyzing

9 action by governments, businesses, and industries

10 helping the world shift toward a low carbon
11 economy. So I ask you to sign on. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council Member Gentile.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Madam Public

Advocate I'm pleased to stand with the speaker and
other members in support of Intro 409 which allows
the Department of Sanitation to immediately remove
illegal clothing collection bins from public areas.
These bins are the latest...

COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Yes. Not only are these bins eye sores in many cases they deceive well intentioned New Yorkers who believe they're donating their used clothes to charity. The clothing collected in these bins is not donated to

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charity but often sold by the pound. There is
nothing nonprofit about it. These bins are illegal,
unsafe, and undermine the efforts of the legitimate
charities that actually collect clothing for those
in need. So this new bill will impose strict
penalties on the shadowy companies engaging in this
illegal practice. So I want to thank the speaker
and her staff and the mayor for their diligent work
on this issue. My office and all our offices has
received countless complaints about these bins so
I'm happy to co-sponsor along with the speaker and,
and the other members this important legislation so
I ask all of you to join us as co-sponsors on Intro
409.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. Council Member Rodriguez.

COUCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

First of all it's sad to say that we cannot promise

New York that we will not have another Diallo

[sp?], another Eric Garner in the near future.

That, especially those of who that represent

community colors in that we are not, that we are

also people of color. We know that it's a matter of

time when another case will happen because it's a

2	matter culture, it's a matter of the training that
3	have been provided they NYPD for years, for
4	decades. I am happy to see that with the new
5	leadership, with a new commissioner police officer
6	are being instructed even not to be cursing when
7	they been trained in the academy. And that's only a
8	beginning. So we have seen, we have experience how
9	a number of police offer they being a speaking,
10	approaching our jumpster, people of colors in the
11	street in New York City. So I'm very painful to see
12	that Mayor de Blasio promised that he will a, a
13	full investigation will happen after the dayvo
14	[sp?] Eric Garner but unfortunately we cannot
15	promise our people that we will not deal with
16	another situation such as that in the near future.
17	At the same time I would like to congratulate the
18	men and woman, the NYPD who do the good work, the
19	majority of them. And to say that yes we have bad
20	apple in the NYPD as we have bad apple everywhere,
21	in governments, in the finance industry, in the
22	NYPD. And we need to get rid of those bad apple
23	because we cannot continue adding more name after
24	Diallo, Anthony Vyas [sp?], now we have Eric.
25	Enough is enough. And I hope that with the new

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leadership, with a new commissioner and the mayor radical change should happen on how the NYPD being trained so that we can build a better relationship between the NYPD and our community. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Council, Council Member Menchaca.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: Thank you Public Advocate. I want to first start by saying that the district, district 38, especially Red Hook stands with the work that Debbie Rose is doing out of Staten Island. Eric Garner's family also resides in Red Hook and so we stand with you in solidarity. I want to speak about Intro 423 the worker co-op, introduction that I'm with Arroyo and Rosenthal. You know the budget we just adopted shows the resounding success of worker co-ops. We've learned that in Sunset Park where Center for Family Life which resides in, in, in Sunset Park has been doing this with immigrant communities for such a long time. They have been empowering families and communities for such a long time. I'm glad we're going to be doing this. This bill looks hard at

2	city procurement process that examines how worker
3	cooperatives could be integrated into city
4	contracts. The city can use its purchasing power to
5	change the lives of communities which has
6	historically been disconnected from government. We
7	want to make that happen. Intro 409 on the bins, on
8	these illegal clothing bins, the vane of so many of
9	our existences, this bill is a celebration of local
10	advocacy at its best. A special thank you to Renee
11	Giordano [sp?] at the 5 <sup>th</sup> Avenue BID and really the
12	entire BID association for, for bringing daylight
13	to the troubling situation in our communities. A
14	special thank you to the speaker of the city
15	council and the staff for taking a hard look at
16	this issue and pushing forward a bill that
17	aggressively addresses a problem widespread
18	throughout our city and we're looking forward to
19	uh, Council Member Reynoso's leadership with
20	sanitation on this, in his committee. Our sidewalks
21	are for public enjoyment and we cannot have bad
22	actors taking away our precious sidewalk space.
23	These clothing bins have been negatively impacting
24	our commercial corridors for some time now. And in
25	some cases misleading the public about where

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2	they're	donated	goods	are	going.	With	this	bill	Ι
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3 fully trust that we will be making this a success.

4 And a special shout out to our summer intern

5 Michael Noac [sp?] who's here as well. Thank you so

6 much.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you Madam Public Advocate. First I want to congratulate Council Member Robert Cornegy on, on the passage of Intro number 131 and, and say to the family of Avonte Oquendo that uh, I hope that this measure brings your family some solace and some comfort in knowing that the city is, is acting and acting strongly to honor the memory of your son. In addition I want to acknowledge the, the good work of Council Member Debbie Rose and to the family of Eric Garner I would like them to know that the entire city is standing with your family and that we will make sure that we do everything that we can to ensure that your family receives some measure, not a full measure but some measure of justice. In addition I want to encourage my colleagues to sign onto Intro number 419 sponsored by myself and our

incomparable cultural affairs chair and Majority
Leader Jimmy Van Bramer. This would establish a
cultural plan in New York City. We have in New
York City our arts and our culture is a major part
of our city, is the backbone of our city, is a
major part of our economy. And it gives New York
City a great part of its identity for many
centuries. A cultural plan would identify the
current levels of service for cultural groups in
each neighborhood, detail the feedback from
community outreach, establish a strategy to meet
the specific needs of each community, quantify the
economic impact of arts and culture in New York
City and ultimately put forward a targeted approach
to increase cultural activity citywide, increase
the economic impact to the arts and culture, and
provide support to individuals and emerging artists
throughout New York City. So I encourage my
colleagues to sign onto intro 419. Thank you very
much Madam Public Advocate.

COUNCIL MEMBER GREENFIELD: I thought you forgot about me there for a second so I

our last speaker Council Member Greenfield.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you. And

appreciate. Thank you Madam Public Advocate. You
know first I just want to say that, how, how proud
I am of my colleagues for standing up and speaking
out. I think it speaks to the integrity and the
importance of the body and the work that we saw
this week especially led by Council Member Debbie
Rose and Chair Vanessa Gibson and our speaker and
our public advocate who made a very very clear and
impassioned statement. And I think it's pretty
clear what we need to have happen over here. We
need to get to the bottom of this hold those
people who are responsible accountable. Need to
make sure that it never happens again. And that's
the role that we play in the city council and
that's what we will continue to do and I want to
thank my colleagues for their leadership and for
advocating on behalf of all New Yorkers because
we're all behind you. On, on a another note just
specifically to talk about a piece of legislation
that I've introduced, just want folks to be aware
of introduce a piece of legislation into a number
413. This is a reintroduction of a common sense
piece of legislation. Basically it would require
restaurants to disclose on the final credit card

2	slip whether or not gratuities, tips are included.
3	I don't know if it's happened to you but it's
4	happened to me, you go to a restaurant you look at
5	the bill and you say didn't they already put in the
6	20 percent tip. So that's what we're trying to do
7	over here. I will just add two other final notes.
8	The first is I'm counting down the days until it's
9	Mayor Tish James. And speaking of former and future
10	mayors I just want to add that I've never done this
11	before but I do specifically want to give a shout
12	out and a thanks to former Mayor Michael Bloomberg
13	for traveling to Israel the other night. He sent a
14	very clear message that it was important to reopen
15	Ben Gurion Airport to the international airlines
16	and that Israel is in fact safe and that while
17	they're engaged in the war of terror we need to
18	support them. So thank you former Mayor Bloomberg
19	and thank you future Mayor Letitia James.
20	PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Thank you
21	[applause]
22	PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Quiet in the
23	chambers. Council Member Richards.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Oh, just wanted to acknowledge my intern Johnathan Harris
