3	either Council Member Comrie or Williams, please,
4	so we could start the ceremonials. [background
5	noise] Now the first ceremonial, let me give the

mic over to Council Member Williams, and ask Mr.

7 Wilson to get in the middle.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you very much, and here are some other Council Members coming. It is a great honor for me to present this Proclamation to Dr. Joe Wilson. Even long before they had a BMI, Black Male Initiative, at CUNY, there was people like Dr. Joe Wilson seeking out young black males to make sure that they receive educations they may have otherwise not gotten. And some of those people that he's helped, myself, went through the program and received a master's, also my legislative director, Kay Bang [phonetic], went through the program and received a master's, and there's a slew of young black males in this City who he has sought out to come through the program and make sure they received an education that they may have otherwise not received. And I think the City needs people like that to reach out to those that may not be

thinking about a direction to go, and do that.
Before it was popular, before it was funded, there
was Dr. Joe Wilson at Brooklyn College [applause]
and the master's program, send Thank you so
much. Like to say a couple?

SPEAKER QUINN: [on mic] --read the proclamation.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Oh, can you read, Clerk, can you read the Proclamation, please.

OLERK: Certainly. Council, City of New York Proclamation. Whereas, the Council of the City of New York is proud to celebrate the month of October as Diversity Awareness Month, as we honor Joseph Wilson for his outstanding commitment and contributions to fostering greater appreciation for diversity at Brooklyn College and beyond. And whereas, Mr. Wilson has been a widely respected professor in the Political Science Department of Brooklyn College for 24 years, and the Director of its Graduate Center for Worker Education for the last 13 years. And whereas, since 1995, Mr. Wilson has been the founding Director of Brooklyn College for Diversity and

Multicultural Studies. Under his visionary
leadership, the Center has promoted a dynamic,
multicultural, academic environment, through
policy initiatives, public forums, curriculum and
faculty development, student empowerment and
community based internships. And whereas, Mr.
Wilson, an active member of the Affirmative Action
Committee for the City University of New York has
also been an eloquent champion for CUNY's Black
Male Initiative, intended to increase, encourage
and support the inclusion and educational success
of underrepresented groups in higher education, in
particular black males. And whereas, recognizing
Brooklyn College as a true microcosm of society at
large, we commend Mr. Wilson for fostering
welcoming, inclusive campus environment for both
learning and teaching. Now therefore be it known
that the Council of the City of New York most
gratefully honors Joseph Wilson for his promoting
greater appreciation for diversity and inclusivity
in New York City. Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for
the Entire Council, Jumaane D. Williams, Council
Member, 45th District Brooklyn, and many other
members of the City Council. [break in audio]

SPEAKER QUINN: Just before we hand
the mic over to Mr. Wilson, I just wanted to say 1
need your number so I can get little stories on
Jumaane later, and you know. [laughter] But in
all seriousness, I just want to thank you very
much for your service and your hard work in
creating a model that so many others are now
following, it's a real example of leadership. So
thank you, and let me ask you to say a few words.
[off mig] Till hold that for you

Speaker, and Chairman, I mean Council Member
Williams, and all of my dear friends and
colleagues. Deeply moved and honored. I just
want to make one very brief point: there is a
tremendous mantra today about the power of the
market, as being able to correct everything. My
big concern now is that the market is
reintroducing hatred against various ethnic,
religious groups, people with various sexual
orientations. So, I think we need to remember
that the market brought us the damnation of women,
brought us chattel slavery, the market brought us
colonialism. So we need to be careful to think

twice about the market solving all of our
problems, and most important as New Yorkers and
citizens of the world, we need to stay together
regardless of race, ethnicity, sexual orientation
religion, we got to stay together, 'cause times
are going to get real hard going forward. Thank
you all, love everybody. [applause]

much. Congratulations, thank you. [background noise] All right, thank you very much. Okay. [background noise] If we, oh here he is, the next ceremonial is going to be led by our Deputy Majority Leader, Leroy Comrie and it's going to be Andrew Eller, the former Director of Legislative Services of the Department of Consumer Affairs, who has retired after 23 years. So if he and his friends and family could come up and let me give the mic to Leroy.

COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Actually, I didn't think I was leading it, I thought our current Chair of the Consumer Affairs Committee,

Also Fran Friedman, the Assistant Commissioner,

Director for the Department of Consumer Affairs
over a course of a long career, and I'm just happy
that I had an opportunity to work with him, to
argue with him, to have many discussions with him.
They were all about bettering the quality of life
for consumers in the City. And with that, I'm
going to turn it over to our current Chair of the
Consumer Affairs Committee, Council Member Karen
Koslowitz. [applause]

COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: Thank

you, Leroy. I just want to say, Andy, we're going

to miss you. I worked with Andy from 1993 to

2001, and anything you wanted to know about dock

towing, you spoke to Andy. You didn't always

agree with him, but he knew everything, and many

times we had arguments at our meetings, but we

always came to terms and I'm going to miss that.

And unfortunately, I'm the Chair of the Consumer

Affairs, and we're not going to have the

opportunity to argue [laughter] and you know,

2	fight on issues, but eventually you agree on
3	issues and pass legislation. So, Andy, I wish you

17	Leroy and all of our colleagues, wish you the best
18	of happiness and a lot of fun in retirement. And
19	if we could ask the Clerk to read the

23	retiring after 23 years with the Department of
24	Consumer Affairs, where he began as an intern, and

behind a record of superb research on important legislation affecting state, city and federal governments. He became the legislator's best friend in the fight against fraud, deception and rip-offs in the marketplace. And whereas, Andrew Eiler as Chief Legislative Analyst and Director of Legislative Affairs for New York City's Department of Consumer Affairs, he has worked closely with three Chairs of the City Council's Committee on Consumer Affairs: the present Chair, Council Member Karen Koslowitz, Council Member Leroy Comrie, and the late Council Member Philip Reed. And because of his keen analysis and understanding of the practical implications of proposed legislation, he has been instrumental in creating important protections for all of the citizens of our City. And whereas, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Andrew Eiler worked for the United Auto Workers, undertaking important legislative responsibilities. He later planned a landmark conference on the dangers of lead poisoning to children. He is the esteemed author of the Pre-Google Guide for Consumers, the 650 page consumer protection handbook, which became

2	the resource of choice for those who wanted to
3	learn their rights as purchasers. Now therefore
4	be it known that the Council of the City of New
5	York most gratefully honors Andrew Eiler for his
6	outstanding career with New York City's Department
7	of Consumer Affairs, commends him for many
8	services to our city, state and nation, and wishes

privilege to have had the chance to work with the
Department of Consumer Affairs for 23 years, to
advocate on behalf of consumers for two
administrations before the City Council

like it was on a hot seat when I was sitting
there, 'cause you just made it, you know, really
tough questions and all the rest of that stuff.
But it was always for the common purpose of
advancing consumer protection for the citizens of
New York. And I think we did a whole lot and
accomplished, looking back on it, I even ended up
coming around full circle [laughter] because when
I first worked as a volunteer for the Department,
I did a study or looking into process server sewer
service. And I found, and as a result of that, we
found 65 fraudulent signatures that resulted in
the default judgments being overturned, process
servers being prosecuted, and everywhen I was
doing this work, hundreds of hours spent in
Municipal Court, I said, "You know what we really
need for this is computerized records," and people
said, "No, Andy, that's never going to happen."

2	Well, guess what? Chair Koslowitz, Council Member
3	Garodnick, the Consumer Affairs Committee and the
4	Council made it happen. The impossible happened
5	because we got a bill now, a law, it's a landmark
6	that not only requires consumer records, but GPS
7	devices to document service. So, that [applause]
8	you know, that was a terrific achievement, first
9	of its kind in the country, that's going to clean
10	up sewer service. So, you know what, I thought
11	given that that's happened, there's nothing more I
12	can do [laughter] to top it all off, except you
13	all did with this Proclamation. And so I'll
14	always remember fondly what I, what all went
15	before. So thank you very much. [applause]
16	SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, and feel
17	free to send us good ideas from retirement.
18	ANDREW EILER: [off mic] You may
19	hear from me.
20	SPEAKER QUINN: That would be
21	wonderful, thank you. Congratulations, take care.
22	Thank you very much. Yeah, as Karen said, leave

COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO:

Okay, so, so violence, October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, and we wanted to take a moment to recognize the Brides March, which is coming out of the New York Latinas Against Domestic Violence. We have three of the cofounders of the Brides March here, the names that I mentioned: Maria Lisardo, Maria Cruz and Grace Perez. People are not aware, this Brides March is in commemoration of Gladys Ricart, who was killed on the day, murdered, on the day of her wedding day, in her wedding gown, by an exboyfriend, who killed her. So this is in recognition, this march, of her, it came, comes out of a lot of, you know, advocacy and love, in terms of wanting to raise awareness and stop violence in our community, an break the cycle of violence. So, we really wanted to thank you all

for your efforts. Thank you for keeping the memory of Gladys Ricart alive, reminding us that this is a scourge that we need to continue to speak up against, and to continue to allocate resources to really prevent violence in our communities, and to educate our communities. And this Council, as we are all well aware, under the leadership of our Speaker, has continued to dedicate moneys to our vital organizations, some which we will be recognizing shortly, for the work that they do to break the cycle of violence. So with that, we'd like to ask the Clerk to read the Proclamation for the Bride's March.

CLERK 2: Council, City of New York Proclamation. Whereas, the Council of the City of New York is proud to honor the members of the New York Latinas Against Domestic Violence on the occasion of their 10th Annual Gladys Ricart and Victims of Domestic Violence Memorial Walk, also known as the Brides March. And whereas, the Brides March serves to memorialize Gladys Ricart who was shot and killed in 1999 by her abusive exboyfriend on the day she was to marry her fiancé. The murderer was sentenced to 30 years in prison.

To remember Gladys Ricart, her tragic murder on what meant, what was meant to be one of the happiest days of her life, women who take part in the Brides March are encouraged to wear wedding dresses or to dress all in white. Men are asked wear black in mourning of Gladys, and all victims and survivors of domestic violence. And whereas the 210, the 2010 Brides March held on Sunday, September 6th, 26th, in Upper Manhattan, Central Harlem, East Harlem and parts of The Bronx, drew hundreds of women, men and children from across the City, to denounce domestic violence, and to mourn and memorialize those who have fallen victim to these vicious acts. The March also serves as an important opportunity to distribute information on domestic violence, and serves, and the services available to survivors. And whereas, we commend the New York Latinas Against Domestic Violence for its annual Brides March, as well as its many other efforts to end domestic violence, and its devastating effects on families and communities. And be it known that the Council of the City of New York most gratefully honors the New York Latinas Against Domestic Violence on the occasion

of the 10th Anniversary of the Brides March.

I just wanted to thank all, Melissa, for bringing everyone together to we could celebrate your 10th Anniversary, and note it with you. I want to thank all of you for doing this for ten years. The March has grown to be so enormous now, and actually include multiple boroughs--I know Julissa had Queens involved this year--and just wanted to thank you. It was, I was

able to be with you for part of the 10th
Anniversary, and it was really an incredibly
inspiring and uplifting event that really, I know
moved me, and everyone who was there to commit
ourselves even more deeply to making sure that
families are safe from violence in our City. So
thank you all very much, and I think you're going
to say a few words Okay great

FEMALE SPEAKER: Yes, on behalf of the members of the New York City Latinas Against Domestic Violence, we accept this Proclamation and we thank you, all the women of the New York City Council, the Speaker, Melissa, which we know has been very supportive, and we appreciate it so much. supported this March from the very first march,
Robert Jackson has been there with us; Adriano
Espaillat, an Assembly Member; and our newest male
supporter, Ydanis Rodriguez. [background noise]

In recent past years, we saw a lot of development pressures in the Village in attempts to inappropriately over develop Greenwich Village, and this rezoning will help protect the low rise, historic nature of Greenwich Village. We're also today fulfilling a promise that was made four or five, or six in some cases, years ago that when we rezoned the Hudson Yards and West Chelsea neighborhoods, that we would extend the anti-demolition and antiharassment provisions that were put in place in Hell's Kitchen Clinton to the Hudson Yards area and to West Chelsea. We'll do that today and add extra tenant protections to 1,500 buildings throughout this area, making sure tenants there are not displaced by any new development. And I want to thank everyone who worked for a number of

Want to congratulate Council Member Lander for his on the Culver El rezoning, as well. We are voting on two important pieces of legislation today, Intro 373-A and a Preconsidered

Resolution. I want to thank Matt Gewolb, Alex 2 Pustilnik and Damien Butvick for their work on 3 these two bills. They were introduced by Council 4 5 Member Melissa Mark-Viverito, and moved through the Government Operations Committee by Council 6 Member Brewer. And quite simply, these two bills, one will require that a much greater statistics 9 about domestic violence are made available in a 10 transparent way, through my neighborhood 11 statistics, as part of NYC.gov, and that all of 12 the domestic violence statistics are now in one 13 place. And we'll also have hate crimes statistics 14 on the same place that can be accessed on the 15 internet. In doing so, if we could get a little 16 quiet, we'll make sure that New Yorkers can know 17 exactly what's happening in their neighborhoods, as it relates to domestic violence and hate 18 19 crimes. In doing so, hopefully we can all be 20 aware of when these crimes are increasing, as they 21 now are. That'll help us in government be guided 22 on how and when we should be increasing our 23 efforts. This represents a very important step forward of transparency and accountability in these statistics, but clearly we still have a lot of work to do. For example, I've been fighting since the last term to get--

these bills forward, so I thank her for that. As
mentioned earlier, October is Domestic Violence
Awareness Month. Also, just this month we
witnessed some of the most disturbing hate attacks
against the LGBT Community, therefore bringing
these bills to the floor today is quite timely and
really add to the body of work that this Council
has engaged in to address both DV and hate crimes.
So, obviously I hope all my colleagues, I urge
them to join me in voting in favor of these two
bills. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, Council Member. Chair Brewer?

very much. Thank you, Madam Speaker, Council

Member Mark-Viverito. These two bills meld issues
that I care about, one of which is a public
policy, in terms of making sure that we do
everything we can to stop domestic violence and
hate crimes. But at the same time using
technology for what technology is best used for,
which is bringing issues to light. And the fact
of the matter is, the "My Neighborhood" site is a

good site, but actually it does not have the kinds
of information that we are going to be putting on
it. More people will go to it, more people will
see the challenges, they'll see the breakdowns of
domestic violence and hate crimes, and hopefully
it's one more step in trying to get rid of both of

enforcement takes place, whether that's from the
Department of Transportation, the Department of
Buildings, or the Police Department. And so I
look forward to continuing to work the Auburndale
area, particularly the Station Road area, which
was not included in the Zoning Plan, it was pulled
out because consensus could not be reached. And I
thank very much Peter Koo, my coordinate
Councilman, who also had a large piece of zoning
done and his willingness to work with us to find
solutions, I'm very appreciative. Thank you.
PRESIDENT RIVERA: Next we have
Council Member Lander.
COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thanks very
much, I also want to thank my colleagues and the
Speaker. I'm very enthusiastic that today the
City Council will be passing the Culver El
Rezoning. This will create 68 units of affordable

housing in the northern section of Borough Park

and rezone seven blocks with a low and mid-rise

mixed use contextual zoning. I'm very pleased
that working together we were able to even improve
this rezoning even more. The affordability period
for this home ownership project has been
lengthened from 15 to 30 years, I think the first
time that's been done in the New Foundations
program, and the affordability deepened. We
pulled some key sites out to preserve jobs, and
are taking good steps forward on addressing open
space issues and school overcrowding issues in the
area. Getting all that done requires a lot of
thanks yous, so I'll try to move through them
quickly. I want to thank the Speaker, Chair Comrie
and Chair Weprin for all their help. The Land Use
staff were great on this, Gail Benjamin, Carol
Shine and Amy Levitan. Great support from the
Department of City Planning, especially David
Parish, Winston Von Engle, Caroline Grossman and
Pernima Kapour [phonetic]. Mike Casitano
[phonetic] from the Mayor's Office, and Mike
Friendmanschnop my Policy Director. The Borough
President, particularly Richard Barack [phonetic]
in his office was very helpful here. Community
Board 12 was an extremely active participant from

the beginning, and I want to especially thank
Eruchem Silber [phonetic] who worked extensively
on this project, both as a staffer for my
predecessor in the Council, and then as Land Use
Vice Chair at Community Board 12. This project
was five plus years in the making, and our
predecessors in the Council helped get it moving
forward, and thanks go to them, to Deputy
Comptroller Simcha Felder and Public Advocate Bill

Assembly, a bill which would cap rent payments for
HIV/AIDS service administration clients at 30
percent of their income. That is what all social
services recipients pay as it relates to rent: 30
percent of their income. That is what HIV/AIDS
service administration clients who are in
scattered site or supportive housing pay. But an
anomaly in the system, if you are a HASA client
who lives in a private apartment you found on your
own, there is no capped amount even though you are
living on public assistance and not able to work
and have AIDS, there is no cap on how much of your
own income you have to pay for rent. How do you
end up in that position versus the other in HASA?
It relates merely to which line you were directed
to in the HRA office the first day you went to
become an HIV service administration client.
There is no other rhyme or reason to it. Some of
these individuals that we're working with at the
end of the month have \$11 left. There's \$11 to
buy all the food and whatever else you need to
deal with your life, and to deal with your HIV and
AIDS. The State Legislature passed a bill that

2	would have capped it at 30 percent; unfortunately,
3	Governor Patterson vetoed that bill. We're moving
4	this Resolution today because there will be a
5	special session in Albany on November 15th and we
6	want to urge the State Legislature to override the
7	Governor's veto and override the Mayor's
8	opposition to this important, lifesaving piece of
9	legislation, and I urge my colleagues to vote yes.
10	I want to thank Council Member, Chairperson Palma,
11	who has been a real leader on the issue of getting
12	the rent cap bill passed [applause]. I want to
13	thank her and thank this Council for its support
14	of people with HIV and AIDs in the City. Thank
