ARROYO: We're ready? Sergeant? Ready? Wait, my qavel is broken.

CHAIRPERSON ARROYO: I like the sound of that. Good morning. My name is Maria Del Carmen Arroyo and I chair the Committee on Health. Today the Committee is conducting a vote on a Proposed Intro 332-A, sponsored by Council Member Gale Brewer, who could not be with us this morning.

This legislation would restrict smoking in park property, including parks, beaches, marinas, boardwalks, pools, recreation centers and pedestrian plazas. Is that better? Violators of the law, this law would be subject to a \$50 fine enforced by the Department of Parks and Recreation enforcement officers. The Committee previously heard testimony on this legislation on October 14th, 2010. What we heard from advocates, medical professionals and other concerned members of the public. Despite tremendous strides, there is still nearly 1 million smokers in New York

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City, and a recent study found that an additional

2.5 million people have been exposed to a high
level of secondhand smoke that they have

measurable residue in their body. This figure is
higher than the national average, despite the fact
that our city has the lower smoking rate in the
nation.

Furthermore, several studies conducted in locations as diverse as parks, outdoor cafes, and bars, airports, college campuses, and even a cruise ship, and an amusement park have concluded that outdoor tobacco smoke levels are high where people are smoking and in some instances, may be even equal to secondhand smoke levels indoors. According to the United States Surgeon General, there is no acceptable level of secondhand smoke. Secondhand smoke has a similar level of impact on the cardiovascular system to chronic active smoking. In cases it causes heart disease and increases the risk of death from heart disease by 30%. Secondhand smoke has also been proven to cause lung cancer in nonsmokers and can exacerbate asthma in children and adults. Exposure of pregnant women to secondhand

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In voting for this measure, New York City will be joining more than 470 municipalities across 42 states that have already restricted smoking in parks, another 100 municipalities in 16 states that have restricted smoking in beaches. I would like to thank the staff of both the parks and the Health Committee for their hard work and before I ask the clerk to call the vote, I want to recognize my colleagues from the Health Committee who are joining us, from my extreme right: Peter Vallone, Council Member Vallone from Queens; Council Member Debbie Rose from Staten Island; to my extreme left, no negative connotation here, Council Member Mendez from Manhattan, Council Member Vann from Brooklyn, Council Member Ferreras from Queens, Council Member Mathieu from Brooklyn and Council Member Van Bramer from Queens. [laughter] I got that right. If you can call the vote please? Oh that's who that is sitting there. Hi.

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Thank you, Madam Chair. First let me say that I support the goals of the Mayor and the Speaker regarding this bill. They're laudable ones. I wrote the Trans Fats Bill, banning trans fats. I've supported every anti-smoking bill. I'm looking right now to get fluoride out of our water. So this is something that is-I really support the goals of the Mayor and the Speaker. However, I'm very disappointed that my compromise bill, which would have banned smoking on a vast majority of our beaches and parks, isn't the one that we're voting on today. Smoking sections indoors don't work. We tried that. We know that. It's like having a no urinating section in a pool. Don't work. outdoors, they could work. And that's why I put my compromise bill in, which had a great deal of

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2	support here at the City Council. I'd much rather
3	be voting on that bill right now, but I'm not
4	because the Speaker chose to move this bill
5	instead, so I'm going to vote yes to allow this
6	out of committee continue to gain support for my
7	compromise right up until the time of the stated
8	vote this afternoon. So, thank you Madam Chair.
9	KEVIN PIN: Vann?
10	COUNCIL MEMBER VANN: Aye.
11	KEVIN PIN: Mendez?
12	COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Permission
13	to explain my vote?
14	CHAIRPERSON ARROYO: Granted.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you,
16	Madam Chair. I think today's weather is perfect
17	to vote on this bill because today we are going
18	down a slippery slope to where is the fine line
19	and a balance of when we legislate on people's
20	personal habits. Although I firmly understand the
21	negative health consequences of secondhand smoke
22	in enclosed places and share the opinion that
23	smoking is very ill-advised, a very ill-advised

personal decision that all too many New Yorkers

have made over the years, I believe that

2	previously introduced legislation is overly broad.
3	Because outdoor spaces is effected by that
4	legislation are so public and generally very open,
5	banning smoking so comprehensively I believe
6	infringes on the civil liberties of people who
7	choose to smoke. The city is rife with both
8	public annoyances and social vices, but living in
9	New York and embracing its open culture requires
10	accommodation and compromise. It is our
11	legislative responsibility to carefully balance
12	the prohibitions we impose on a free people with
13	the social benefits that we believe would result.
14	I believe we should have taken more time with this
15	bill to work through some compromises and to allow
16	New Yorkers to be able to have non-smoking areas
17	as well as smoking areas. I vote no. Thank you.
18	KEVIN PIN: Eugene?
19	COUNCIL MEMBER EUGENE: I vote aye.
20	KEVIN PIN: Ferreras?
21	COUNCIL MEMBER FERRERAS: I vote
22	aye.
23	KEVIN PIN: Rose?
24	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Madam Chair
25	can I explain my vote?

2	CHAIRPERSON ARROYO: Yes,
3	COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: I don't
4	really want to make a separate comment, but I want
5	to second Council Member Mendez's remarks as the
6	Civil Rights chair. I wrestled with my vote for a
7	very long time up until this morning about whether
8	or not we're crossing a line in terms of people's
9	personal freedoms and the fact that you know, my
10	hope is that we eventually don't push smokers like
11	into little opium dens, where they have to smoke
12	in secret and it becomes something that's just
13	illegal and so, with that, I want to ditto Council
14	Member Mendez's remarks and I will vote aye only
15	because of the health ramifications that it has on
16	all New Yorkers. Thank you.
17	KEVIN PIN: Van Bramer?
18	COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Aye.
19	KEVIN PIN: By vote of seven in the
20	affirmative, one in the negative and zero
21	abstentions, all items have been adopted. Members
22	please sign the Committee report.
23	CHAIRPERSON ARROYO: Thank you and

we will keep the vote open given the weather and

the challenge that we're all confronting getting
