MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you. I would now ask Council Member Susan Zhang to spread the Invitation on the Record.

COUNCIL MEMBER ZHUANG: Thank you Majority Leader.

I would like to thank Pastor Luis Lamb from Brooklyn

Alliance Church for being here today. I want to thank

him for his dedicated work with the Chinese

Bensonhurst community organizing local events,

including food drives, after school programming, and

summer day camps. These programs have been

fundamental to so many members in our community. I

Good afternoon everyone. Before we begin, I do want to express my condolences to our colleague,

Council Member Shaun Abreu, on the passing of his beloved Abuela, Francisca (phonetic) Gonzalez. Our hearts are with you and your family during this time. Your Abuela will be missed by her family, friends, and her beloved community.

Our city is also mourning the loss of 33-year-old Juan Tamay Ganzhi, a construction worker who was killed on the job during a partial building collapse in Council Member Yeger's district earlier this month.

Just two days ago, we also lost 36-year-old Nazim Berry, a bodega worker in Council Member Hudson's district, to senseless gun violence. Our thoughts are with their loved ones.

We're also heartbroken by the death of 27-yearold journalist, Fazil Khan, whom we tragically lost
during a deadly fire in Council Member Salaam's
district last week. Fazil was known for his
generosity and kindness, and he is survived by his
five siblings, mother, and grandmother. We send them
our condolences during this difficult time.

March 1st will mark exactly 30 years since the death of 16-year-old Ari Halberstam, the beloved son of community leader, and my friend, Devorah Halberstam. Ari was devoted to his family and his community, and his death was heartbreaking. But in the three decades since losing her son to senseless violence, Devorah has worked to keep his memory alive by establishing the Jewish Children's Museum in Crown Heights in his honor. She has fought to combat gun violence and helped bridge communities together. I thank you, Devorah, for channeling your pain and grief into efforts that will continue to impact our city and create a better future for our children. We will always keep Ari and your family and our hearts.

Yesterday was Dominican Independence Day. New
York City is proud to be home to a vibrant and
dynamic Dominican community. It is critical that we
honor the many contributions of our Dominican
community to our city and beyond. Tonight the City
Council and some of our members will host a Dominican
Republican Independence Celebration, so I hope you
can join us right here in Chambers this evening for
the celebration.

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March 1st is also Independence Movement Day, an important day for our Korean American community in commemoration of the March 1st Movement for Liberation and Independence. Please join our Korean American neighbors in celebrating this important day.

And as March is almost here, that means we will be celebrating Women's History Month. I'm so proud to lead this council, which has demonstrated to the city and the world what strong women's' leadership looks like. Women are the cornerstone of society and the backbone of our families. When women are healthy, safe, and have access to opportunities, we all succeed. That's why we have advanced solutions that will create a stronger and more equitable city for all New Yorkers, and I look forward to continuing our progress together. Happy Women's History Month.

March is also Greek American Heritage Month and
Irish American Heritage Month. We look forward to
celebrating the cultures and contributions of our
Greek and Irish communities right here in New York
City and around the world.

Before I continue, I do want to wish a Happy
Belated Birthday to Council Member Salaam, whose
birthday was yesterday (APPLAUSE), and a Happy Early

staff, especially our Legislative Division and our Legislative Documents Unit, including Ruthie DeFranco and Jillian Jeffries, for their hard work in preparation for today's Stated Meeting, listen to this: over 500 bills are being introduced today, and I want to acknowledge their dedication for making today possible. (APPLAUSE)

Now, let's move onto our Stated Agenda.

First, we will vote on the following Finance items:

A Preconsidered Resolution, sponsored by Council Member Justin Brannan, authorizing a 40-year Article XII tax exemption for new construction of a 7-story rent stabilized building in Council Member Sanchez's district.

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A Preconsidered Resolution, also sponsored by

Council Member Justin Brannan, amending a previously

approved Article 5 tax exception in Council Member

Abreu's district. The amendment makes necessary

technical changes.

Today we will also vote on a set of bills sponsored by Council Member Julie Menin, related to mobile vending requirements. These bills emerged from recommendations made by the Street Vendor Advisory Board, which was established by Local Law 18 of 2021, and consists of various stakeholders, including vendor advocates and brick and mortar business representatives. Together this package of bills will streamline vending regulations while also ensuring that vending does not occur in bike lanes.

Introduction 49-A would allow mobile food vendors to display or store goods on top of their carts, and it would simplify the display requirements for general vendors. Additionally, this bill would repeal the City's bookkeeping requirements for general vendors and mobile food vendors.

Introduction 50-A would eliminate the requirement for individual employees of mobile food vending carts or trucks to each have a New York State Certificate

2 of Sales Tax Authority. This bill would also

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and Rachel Cordero.

3 eliminate the requirement that mobile food vendors

4 and general vendors obtain a Tax Clearance

5 Certificate upon renewal of a license or permit.

And Introduction 51-A would prohibit general vendors and mobile food vendors from vending in bicycle lanes. A bike lane is defined as a portion of the roadway that is marked off or separated for the preferential or exclusive use of bicycles. This bill would clarify that vendors cannot operate or leave their items in bike lanes. Thank you to our staff members Sarah Swaine, Natalie Meltzer, David Seitzer,

Next, we will vote on two bills sponsored by

Council Member Gale Brewer that aim to increase
safety related to the use of lithium ion batteries
and powered mobility devices. Over the past few
years, as e-bikes, e-scooters, and powered mobility
devices have become more prevalent, the City has
experienced a rapid increase in lithium ion battery
related fires in both residential and commercial
properties that have resulted in a dangerous uptick
in fatalities. This legislation is part of the
Council's ongoing efforts to mitigate the dangers of

2 lithium ion batteries and improve fire safety
3 citywide.

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Introduction 19-A would require all businesses that sell e-bikes, e-scooters, and other personal mobility devices powered by lithium ion batteries to post informational materials and guides about battery safety both in their physical stores and on their online retail platforms. A violation would be subject to civil penalties ranging from \$150-\$350 per violation.

And Introduction 21-A would enhance enforcement efforts for the sale in rental of uncertified powered mobility devices such as e-bikes and e-scooters. This bill would give the Fire Department enforcement authority for these laws, increase penalties for illegal device sales, and give the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection and the Fire Department sealing authority for repeat violators. We thank our staff members Sarah Swaine, Natalie Meltzer, David Seitzer, and Rachel Cordero.

Thank you very much for your attention, now I turn it back over to our majority leader.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you, Speaker Adams. We will move into Discussion of General Orders. I

would like to recognize Council Member Brewer,
followed by Council Member Menin.

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COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. I want to think the Speaker and everyone who has been working on the battery issue for quite some time. We know that just this last Friday there was a lithium ion battery fire that killed, one, a journalism student as you heard, injured 22. It's the 31st blaze caused by these batteries this year, 18 killed last year, and 200 fires.

What Local Law 19-A would do, it would basically tell retailers who have these batteries in their portfolio to post information that talks about no mixing and matching of batteries - and if you don't do it you will be fined. We still need our federal partners. I want to say that we thank Majority Leader Schumer, Senator Gillibrand, and Congressman Torres, because they have all introduced the legislation to give the Consumer Product Safety Commission a directive to create federal mandatory standards so that we have batteries that are all certified. But, that has not happened.

Introduction 21 would talk specifically also about the stores. It would mandate that both Fire

Department and Department of Consumer and Worker protection, both together, enforce what needs to be enforced at these stores. Number one, that they should have... if they have three summonses that they're given then there could perhaps be some kind of... either a fine and/or a padlocking. At the same time, they also have to keep track of some kind of an inventory of what they're selling. Again, this is not , you know, getting rid of all the online batteries; it is hopefully continuing with what this council has done in the past, which is to focus on the batteries here in the city and trying to get only certified batteries to be used by these wonderful delivery workers. We do not want any more fires. Thank you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you. Council Member Menin?

COUNCIL MEMBER MENIN: Thank you, Majority Leader.

Today I'm proud that the New York City Council will

be passing several bills related to street vending.

And I first of all want to thank the Speaker for

prioritizing these important issues for street

vendors.

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My three pieces of legislation that we are voting on today were recommendations from the Street Vending Advisory Board's Report that was released in 2022.

The first bill, Introduction 49, repeals arduous bureaucratic requirements for street vendors, just as we have done so for small businesses in the city.

Next, Introduction 50 removes the requirement that all mobile food vendor employees obtain a Certificate of Authority to collect sales tax. This duplicative requirement is quite frankly unfair and unjust. We don't require every bartender or waitress employed a restaurant to obtain a sales tax license, so why should we require every food vendor employee that is working for a food truck to do so? Under this legislation, only the licensed vendors will be required to submit proof of their certificate when applying for their permit.

Finally, Introduction 51 is common sense, it would prohibit vending either on or in a bike lane. I want to thank bill drafter, Sarah Swaine, for her work on these bills, and from my team, my Chief of Staff, Jonathan Szott and my Legislative Director, Brandon Jordan. Thank you.

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2 COUNCIL MEMBER NARCISSE: Thank you Madam Majority
3 Leader.

I speak today to sound the alarm on behalf of healthcare workers in hospitals across our city. As a council... nurse I am calling a code blue. Doctors, nurses, and hospital staff can handle most emergencies, but every now and then even healthcare heroes need a lifeline. We need all hands on deck. We are facing a critical issue. Medicaid currently pays hospital 30% less than the actual cost of care of New York. This understanding has created an urgent healthcare crisis, and it is severely impacting the more than 4 million New Yorkers who rely on Medicaid for their healthcare. We are seeing severe cuts and mental health services, longer wait times in emergency rooms, and dangerous healthcare staffing shortages. This underpayment harms low income New Yorkers, especially in the Black and Latino communities, leading to worse healthcare outcomes and shorter life expectancies. Safety net hospitals, which are a lifeline for many communities, are being pushed to the brink and even worse, some like Suny Downstate and Beth Israel Center are on the chopping block. Jobs and lives will be lost. So with that,

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there is hope; we have a solution. We need Governor Hochul to raise Medicaid reimbursement rates to cover 100% of cost of care by 2028 starting with a sizable down payment in this year's State Budget. If New York increases Medicaid reimbursement, the federal government will pay for half of the cost. Fully funded Medicaid means hospital can provide quality care and mental health services New Yorkers need. It means our seniors, children, and mothers and babies will receive the best quality care they deserve. I urge all my colleagues to send a message clear to Albany by supporting Resolution 170 when it comes up for the legislature to fully fund Medicaid. Thank you. (TIMER CHIMES)

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you, we will now move to Council Member Salaam, followed by Council Member Dinowitz, and Council Member Hanif.

The first bill I am introducing, uh, 2 3 Introduction 163, is inspired by an actual mailer from the FDNY that was sent to constituents in my 4 5 district. Everything about this mailer was inaccessible from the font size to the colors used. 6 7 8

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This bill, introduced in collaboration with Council Member Borelli and Council Member Lee, establishes

accessibility guidelines and ensures that every

public facing print document follows these

accessibility quidelines. From fire safety mailers to

public assistance applications, print documents from 12

the City should be accessible to everyone -13

14 particularly our older adults and people with

15 disabilities.

> The second bill, Introduction 162, introduced alongside Council Member Marte, is focused on increasing accessibility to alternative modes of transportation by creating bike storage for employees and visitors of City owned buildings. 2023 showed record numbers for New Yorkers biking, and by prioritizing bike parking in public buildings we are making cycling a more accessible and viable option for commuters contributing to a more environmentally friendly city.

2	And, finally, Resolution Number 75 urging the New
3	York State legislator to require all schools to
4	provide comprehensive information on post-secondary
5	financial aid opportunities, including programs like
6	FAFSA and the Dream Act to their students. The
7	numbers speak for themselves, high school seniors who
8	complete the FAFSA are 84% more likely to immediately
9	enroll in post-secondary education, and this
10	percentage increases to 127% amongst students in the
11	lowest socioeconomic quintile. I urge my colleagues
12	to support these measures as we work towards a more
13	inclusive and accessible city for all.

COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you, Majority Leader.

Today I'm re-introducing Introduction 210, which would end the Mayor's cruel and counterintuitive 30 and 60 day caps on shelter day stays for asylum seekers. I'm grateful to Council Member Restler, Council Member Gutiérrez, Council Member De La Rosa, Council Member Hudson, Council Member Sanchez, Council Member Nurse, and Council Member Won for introducing this bill alongside me, and for many more members for joining as sponsors.

In recent weeks, we've seen the devastating consequences of this policy. Street homelessness has been exacerbated and students have had their education disrupted. I urge my colleagues to meet

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this urgent moment and stand up to end shelter evictions. I'm also very excited that this bill will be heard by the Committee On General Welfare this Friday at 10 a.m. Thank you so much, Deputy Speaker Ayala; I am also holding a rally along many faithbased leaders and issue advocates immediately beforehand at 9 a.m. on the City Hall steps, and I

would love my colleagues to join there. Thank you.

I now call on Council Member Stevens, followed by Council Member Sanchez.

COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS: Good afternoon. I am proud to introduce two pieces of legislation alongside the (INAUDIBLE) caucus members Council Member Nantasha Williams and Council Member Kevin Riley. The first piece of legislation would limit social media access for young people unless waived by a parent or guardian. The second bill would require the City to conduct a report on the impact of social media on the mental health of young people.

Data from 2021 indicates that 77% of our city high schoolers spent three or more hours per day in front of a screen on average school day - not

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you, Council Member Stevens. I would like to call on Council Member Gutiérrez, and then Council Member Sanchez.

COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: Thank you Majority Leader.

I'd like to just extend my heartfelt condolences to the family of the man tragically killed yesterday in traffic violence amidst the chaos of Broadway in both mine and Council Member Restler's district.

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2 Yesterday was another difficult day for me as 3 every traffic death is just knowing how preventable 4 this loss of life was. Broadway is a designated 5 vision zero priority quarter, stands as a symbolic artery coursing through the heart of Brooklyn, but it 6 7 is notoriously unforgiving. The J-M-Z line runs above, while below is a major commercial corridor for 8 pedestrians and drivers. It's a main pathway from East New York to Williamsburg and the city on the 10 11 other side. It's a truck route, it's the fastest way 12 to travel by bike; it's used by everyone, but works 13 for no one. Band-Aid fixes, though well intentioned, 14 fail, in comparison to the holistic approach needed 15 to stop the tragedies that keep happening. To truly honor those who have fallen victim to this lack of 16 17 action, we must confront systemic challenges head on 18 acknowledging the complexity of its network, and the 19 diversity of array users it accommodates. Only 20 through a concerted effort to address its 21 multifaceted challenges can we hope to transform Broadway. I'm thankful to my colleagues Council 2.2 2.3 Member Restler, Council Member Narcisse, Council Member Ossé, and Council Member Mealy who have all 24

been engaged in this much needed action, and I

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implore DOT and this administration to work
collaboratively and urgently to save lives, thank
you.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you. I would now like to call on Council Member Sanchez on Zoom.

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: Thank you, Majority

Leader. Hi everybody, reporting live from 250 where a screaming toddler is refusing to nap, so hi everybody.

I am introducing a number of bills today as all of our colleagues are, and I want to highlight two bills in particular that I would love for the 25+ members that were on it before to jump back on.

First is going to be Introduction 431, which was formally 1270. Street vending is as old as New York City itself, and yet most vendors in New York City operate in the shadows. Estimates are that 60 to 70% of the vendors that you see out in the streets are operating without a license, without a touchpoint with government, and in ways that are not necessarily harmonious with our communities. So, Introduction 431 asks the city of New York to take a step in the direction of regulating vending in a way that allows people not to be in the shadows, that allows folks to

2 not operate in the shadows and effectively regulate

3 vending instead of placing arbitrary caps. We are the

4 only large city in the United States that places a

5 cap on vending. So, I invite everybody to rejoin 431

and also to be a part of the dialogue that we will be

7 a spearheading with advocacy organizations and groups

8 all over the city to insure that there is robust

9 conversation.

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And Introduction 435, which was formally 895, is about increasing access to rapid STI testing. The Bronx in particular suffers from the highest rates of HIV across New York State - 62 counties, including having double the rate of our sister boroughs right here in New York City. So by expanding access to testing, we can make a real difference and save lives in the city of New York. It is time to ensure that everyone has access to the services that they need. Thank you so much, Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you, Council Member Sanchez.
