SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: This is a mic check on Economic Development. Today's date is March 7, 2024, in the Committee Room, recorded by Walter Lewis.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Good morning and welcome to the New York City Council's vote on Economic Development.

At this time, we ask that you silence all electronic devices.

At no time is anyone to approach the dais.

Chair, we're ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON FARÍAS: [GAVEL] Good morning and welcome to this Committee vote by the New York City Council's Committee on Economic Development. My name is Amanda Farías, and I have the privilege of Chairing this Committee.

We are here today to consider a Proposed Introduction number 4-A sponsored by Council Member Alexa Avilés, which represents a significant step forward in our City's efforts to promote cleaner air, healthier neighborhoods, and a more sustainable future for all New Yorkers. As Chair of the Committee on Economic Development, I'm proud to support this bill, which will require cruise ships docking at our

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city's terminals to plug into shore power, reducing harmful diesel emissions and improving air quality for the communities that have long borne the brunt of pollution from the cruise industry. This legislation is a product of tireless advocacy from the residents of Red Hook who have raised their voices for years to demand action on this issue. It is also a testament to the hard work and dedication of Council Member Avilés who has been a champion for her constituents and a driving force behind this bill from the very beginning.

Proposed Intro. number 4-A makes several critical improvements to the original legislation, which will ensure its effectiveness and its impact. First and foremost, it streamlines compliance and enforcement mechanisms by placing the onus squarely on the Economic Development Corporation to hold terminal operators accountable for meeting our shore power goals. This means that the EDC will be responsible for monitoring shore power usage and imposing penalties for noncompliance, creating a powerful incentive for operators to prioritize sustainable practices. Moreover, this bill makes a major step forward in terms of community engagement.

It requires EDC to work hand-in-hand with impacted		
neighborhoods to develop comprehensive traffic		
mitigation plans that address the specific needs and		
concerns of each community. This collaborative		
approach will ensure that the voices of those most		
affected by cruise ship traffic are heard and that		
the solutions implemented are tailored to the unique		
challenges facing each neighborhood. Perhaps most		
importantly, Proposed Intro. number 4-A elevates		
shore power requirements from a voluntary port policy		
to a legally binding mandate. By codifying these		
standards into law, we are sending a clear message		
that reducing emissions and improving air quality		
around our city's cruise terminals is not just a		
suggestion but a non-negotiable priority. This will		
have a profound impact on the health and well-being		
of our communities surrounding the Brooklyn Cruise		
Terminal in Red Hook and the Manhattan Cruise		
Terminal on the West Side, which have long suffered		
from the negative effects of cruise ship emissions.		

With these enhancements, Proposed Intro.

number 4-A represents a comprehensive and effective

approach to the tackling of the environmental and

congestion challenges posed by cruise ships. Make no

first and foremost, I want to thank you, Majority

Leader, for helping shepherd this legislation

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through, for the hearing, and for being a champion alongside me. I also want to thank Council Member Bottcher who has been with us every step of the way, who is also deeply impacted by this legislation, but most importantly, I have to thank the community members of Red Hook who long before my time as Council Member championed getting shore power in Red Hook, the first on the East Coast. That was directly evolved from their work as advocates so we are at our best as legislators when bills we write reflect the residents' wants and desires and needs, and so while this measure is far from perfect, it does begin to address an environmental impact and traffic mitigation concerns that long have gone unaddressed. As you mentioned, this is a climate justice win for our communities but for our city. As people know, idling cruise ship emissions are equal to 34,000 tractor trailer idling trucks and, in a more recent study, a million idling cars. This will have a huge impact so I just want to thank everyone. I urge my Colleagues to vote aye and look forward to continuing to decarbonize our city, prioritize the health and wellness of our residents, and make sure that we are

COUNCIL MEMBER BOTTCHER: I really want to thank Council Member Alexa Avilés for her leadership on behalf of not just her constituents at Red Hook but our constituents on the West Side of Manhattan. This is such a great example of government being responsive to what's going on out there in the world, and it's an example of the laws catching up with what's happening out there in the world. It's the same kind of thing we're seeing with lithium-ion batteries. Policies that were behind the curve catching up to get a handle on that problem. Here we have the laws catching up to get a handle on the problem of cruise ship emissions at port. Each cruise ship at port emits the same kind of emissions as 34,000 diesel trucks per day. That has been ignored for too long by government. This bill by turning the electrification at port from a voluntary program to a legally binding one will have incredible benefits for our constituents for decades to come. I want to thank everyone who is part of this. I vote aye.
