CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Good morning, 3 ladies and gentlemen, my name is Joel Rivera, I 4 5 Chair the Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections. Before we begin, let me introduce my 6 colleagues who are here with us today. To my left, we have Council Member Inez Dickens, and we 9 have Council Member Jimmy Oddo, Council Member 10 Diana Reyna is joining us, and we have Council 11 Member Karen Koslowitz; to my right we have 12 Council Member Robert Jackson, Council Member 13 Jimmy Vacca, Council Member Darlene Mealy's 14 joining us, as well; we have Council Member Lew 15 Fidler and Council Member Gale Brewer is here with 16 us, also. I would also like to introduce new to 17 the Committee is Amatula Booth [phonetic] who is 18 going to be my right hand person and making sure 19 that I know exactly what I'm saying. So, 20 everyone, welcome Amatula to the Committee. 21 [applause, background comments] So, before us 22 today we have one candidate for review. Her name 23 is Erika Larsen, she is a resident of Staten 24 Island. She is being recommended by the Council 25 to, by the Council to the Mayor for appointment as

2	a member of the Youth Board. If appointed, Ms.
3	Larsen will serve for an undefined term. First
4	let me briefly describe the functions of the Youth
5	Board. The Youth Board serves as an advisory body
6	to the Commissioner of the Department of Youth and
7	Community Development, with the respect to the
8	development of programs and policies relating to
9	the youth in New York City. The Board consists of
10	28 members appointed by the Mayor, 14 of whom are
11	appointed upon recommendations by the Council.
12	The Board must be represented, representative of
13	the community and include person representing the
14	areas of social services, healthcare, education,
15	business, industry and labor. The Board meets
16	quarterly and members serve without compensation.
17	Welcome, Ms. Larsen, will you please raise your
18	right hand to be sworn in?
19	FEMALE VOICE: Do you swear or
20	affirm to tell the truth, the whole truth, nothing
21	but the truth, so help you?
22	ERIKA LARSEN: [response inaudible]
23	CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Great. Before
24	we have you state your testimony, we've been

joined by Council Member Al Vann, as well. Do you

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have any testimony you'd like to provide.

ERIKA LARSEN: [off mic] Yes.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Perfect. Just state your name for the record and you may begin.

ERIKA LARSEN: _Erika Larsen. First

I would like to thank Chair Rivera and the

Committee for considering my appointment. And I

would like to thank Council Member Gale Brewer for

suggesting that I apply for this position, for all of your support. I would also like to thank

Council Member Oddo for his support and it was a

pleasure to meet you at Monsignor Farrell High

School on Staten Island a few weeks ago. Oh,

thanks. I'm so grateful to be here today and to

have this opportunity. I learned about this

opportunity through an internship with Council

18 Member Gale Brewer, and she suggested that I apply

for the position. And since then, I've reviewed

20 the minutes of previous board meetings, looked at

21 the budgets of the DYCD, and some of the many

youth programs offered by New York City. And one

of the major reasons that I'm so drawn to the

Youth Board is that I feel that the Board does

25 incredible things to promote the success and

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wellbeing of New York City's youth. And I would really welcome the opportunity to bring a youth's perspective to the Board. I believe I can lend a unique perspective as I'm actively engaged with young people every day. And I'm currently a student in the CUNY system at the MacAulay Honors College at Hunter, —and many of my classmates grew up participating in DYCD programs. So, I would look forward to discussing ideas with my classmates, as well as my professors at CUNY. I've had many experiences leading youth run organizations on Staten Island, so I've served as the Vice President of the Youth Board for the Staten Island Heart Society, I led a New York State championship winning marching band, and I was also part of running the Muscular Dystrophy Association Super Dance, which was the largest student led fundraiser for MDA, and it raised over \$200,000 in nine months. I've enjoyed opportunities working with my peers and I have valued the experiences gained from determining how we can we improve organizations and ensure that they're run as efficiently as possible. And I'm really concerned about the extraordinary

challenges that today's youth face. So, issues such as homelessness and prostitution, cyber-bullying and just a general lack of awareness about the risks of unsafe sexual activity; and just real, a lack of good role models. And I would really embrace the opportunity to be a part of a board that is dedicated to resolving these issues in New York City.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Great, thank you very much. We've also been joined by Council Member Vincent Gentile. I'm going to first call on Council Member Gale Brewer to make some statements.

very much, Mr. Chair. It is an honor to be here with Erika Larsen, who was an intern in our office. As I think many of you know, we have many, many interns, and very few take the opportunity to go for a position like this, even though it's offered. I think that the Youth Board, if she's confirmed, will be very fortunate. In our office, Erika has stood out, obviously as students who both Hunter and Macaulay are ones, are ones that have been selected because of their

academic achievements, and to a certain extent
their outside efforts. But you can be a Macaulay
Hunter student and still not rise to the level of
importance that Erika Larsen has risen to in our
office. She is an extraordinary writer, she's
somebody who is a leader among other staff and
interns, and she's somebody who does that extra
mile that I think so many individuals perhaps want
to but don't actually accomplish. So, I am beyond
delighted, a) that she's working in our office, b)
that she could be on the Youth Board, and c) that
she lives in Council Member Jimmy Oddo's district.
Thank you very much.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: With that being said, we'll turn it over to our Minority Leader, Council Member Jimmy Oddo.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: Thank you,
Mr. Chairman, welcome, Erika. How did you find
out about the internship? How did you end up
interning for Council Member Brewer.

ERIKA LARSEN: So [laughs] so I

actually found out through the Macaulay Honors

College, but so my advisor for the Macaulay Honors

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College really encouraged me to apply because I'm very interested in law, but I had never really looked into City government before this past fall. So it's been a really wonderful opportunity.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: Well, you should really take a moment and find that advisor and thank him or her.

ERIKA LARSEN: Yes.

COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: Because you could not have chosen a better public servant than Council Member Brewer. And I want to tell a quick story. I took a ride just to clear my head, and my girlfriend and I took a ride, and we ended up in some little restaurant on a Saturday afternoon in Middletown, New York. And there was a couple of senior citizens at the other table, and I couldn't help but overhear a story and they were talking about a democratic club in the 1970s, and they were talking about Governor Kerry and this woman's name. And how one was supporting one over the other. And I came back to City Hall, and I said the one person who might know about this person is Council Member Brewer. Not only did she recognize the name right away, she ended up

just wanted to give you one piece of advice, which
I tell a lot of people: no matter what
organization or group that you're going to belong
