Today, the committee will vote on five pieces of legislation: Intro 1061-A; Intro 1062-A, which I'm the lead sponsor of; Intro 1082, sponsored by Council Member Wills; Intro 1074, sponsored by Council Member Richards; and Intro 218-A, sponsored by Council Member Koppell. package of bills will reduce emissions for vehicles in New York City. On January 30, 2013, this committee held an oversight hearing on the city's Fleet Emissions Reduction Laws that were passed back in 2005. Those are local laws 38, 39, 40, 41 and 42 of 2005. These laws pertain to reducing emissions to various vehicle fleets within the city, and they have significantly improved air quality over all these years. It certainly makes sense to go back from time to time and make updates to these bills which is what today's legislation is about. Going back to my statement in order to build upon and continue these air quality

2 | improvements, this committee is voting on these

3 | bills today which will increase the use of

4 biodiesel in city-owned vehicles and will require

5 city vehicles to retrofit their engines with the

6 best available emissions control technology.

These bills will also increase the minimum average fuel economy of light-duty vehicles purchased by the city, will require a calculation and reporting of the use base fuel economy of light-duty and medium-duty vehicles and will prohibit the issuance of waivers by the Commissioner of DEP for diesel powered vehicles that are unable to adopt the best available retrofit technology previously in previous versions of these bills. We had the commissioner was given the ability to write waivers but that was a practice that went on too long. We thought it was appropriate to put an end to that practice.

Finally, Intro 218-A will improve air quality by creating a pilot project for city ambulances that will reduce idling through the use of an idle reduction technology that is verified by the USEPA. That's the bill that's sponsored by

Through these bills we will move closer to achieving the goals set forth by Plan YC and closer to realizing the economic and public health benefits that are associated with them.

And before I call this for a vote, I want to make an apology for the delay. We had some paperwork that had to do with an environmental assessment that is necessary for one of the bills that we're voting on today, so I should state for the record that along with the bills that we'll be voting, we'll be voting on a Preconsidered Reso which adopts the environmental assessment that was put together for Intro 1061-A. And with that said, I would like to give the prime sponsor of Intro 218-A, Council Member Koppell, an opportunity to speak on this bill and also after that give an opportunity for Council Member Richards to speak on his bill. And with that said, I call upon Oliver to make a statement on this bill. I thank him for all the work he did on this, and he personally did the research on this and brought it forward and here we are today, and I'm grateful to Oliver for

COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Thank you. I'll be very brief. I'm speaking mainly to a mention of my colleagues who will continue to serve here after this year that they should watch this. It's been a frustration for me for many years to have seen these ambulances, you know, the city ambulances don't get dispatched from garages. sit on street corners all over the city, about 300 ambulances, and they, generally speaking, run their engines 24 hours a day creating emissions, and they do that because they want to keep the vehicle cool for the driver, they want to keep certain medicines refrigerated because they have to be refrigerated to be maintained, and so it's cooling for the people in the summer and for the medicines all year around and then heating for the people in the winter, that is the attendants.

I've said that there must be a better way than running these engines 24 hours a day.

I've toyed with a number of ideas. There are some companies that have been working on different kinds of technology. The fire department which runs the

1 COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION 2 ambulances was against my program until someone in the fire department came up with a similar idea and 3 he got an award for it. So then the commissioner 4 5 said, well, since someone got an award for the idea I support your bill. So now we have the bill on 6 7 the agenda, and the reason I'm speaking is that I want those who are continuing to monitor this and 8 mandate that at some point in the near future all 9 ambulances either have batteries in them that will 10 11 run the heating and cooling system or as a possible 12 alternative that I just want to put in people's 13 minds, they could be attached to an external power 14 We have power sources in street lamps all source. 15 over the city, and you could work a device that 16 could automatically detach when the ambulance has 17 to go. So that's another idea if the batteries 18 don't work. What they want to try is some sort of battery in the car or in the van, maybe that will 19 20 work. If that doesn't work I commend the other to your attention. So I'm delighted we're finally 21 2.2 doing this. I've been talking about this for years 23 and years. Mr. Chairman, I also would like to be added as a cosponsor in those others of the bills 24

we're hearing today where I'm not yet a cosponsor.

CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Thank you for and duly noted. I would ask staff to put all of it down as a cosponsor on the other bills and I hope that the award that was given to that person in the fire department was the Koppell award, which is what it should be called.

COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: It's a city program, Mr. Chairman, which rewards city employees for coming up with good ideas, and this got the award and Commissioner Kosano then had to admit that maybe it was a good idea.

CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Yes, that was...

figured out a way to get to yes and that is great,
and thank you for your personal and, you know, long
term efforts, you know, to bring this bill forward.

It isn't always that way the way bills come forward
but I think you willed this bill into existence and
we're here today and happy to be passing it. And
with that, I call upon Council Member Richards to
say a few words about his good bill.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Well, thank you, Chairman, and first I want to say it's an honor. This will be my first bill that actually passes through a committee so...

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: I want to give Jim Gennaro an award for helping me progress. on a more serious note, Intro 1074 basically says that it's going to require the next mayor to report to the council and the speaker of the city council on how they are dealing with this issue of emissions, and whoever that will be I'm grateful that we will have some checks and balances so we will hold their feet a little bit more to the fire to ensure that they're continuing to make sure we deal with this issue. Now as a Council Member in southeast Queens who has the airport in my district, at least temporarily or I don't know how the lines went now, but probably not in my district, we're still going to have planes flying over and we're dealing with some of the highest asthma rates in this city and we're still reeling from Hurricane Sandy and Lord knows what the air quality is that we're still dealing with in the Rockaways and in Roseville, so this bill is just a common sense bill. I think we need to really take this and meet this issue head on, and this is what this bill does so I commend everyone who has

COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION cosponsored a bill and sponsored a bill here on this issue, and this is going to surely lead to better air quality in New York City, so may we

continue to fight this battle. Thank you.
