| 6  | morning to the hearing on these two bills. The      |
| 7  | bill we are holding the second on is now a proposal |
| 8  | of Introduction Number 1-A, a Local Law to amend    |
| 9  | New York City charter and administrative code of    |
| 10 | the New York City and in relation to the provision  |
| 11 | of sick time earned by employees and Section 7 of   |
| 12 | Local Law Number 46 for the year 2013, relating to  |
| 13 | such sick time in relation to effective of such law |
| 14 | and repeals Section 6 of Local Law Number 46 for    |
| 15 | the year 2013, relating to determination of the     |
| 16 | Independent Budget Office. As we discussed at the   |
| 17 | hearing the week before last, the law substantially |
| 18 | expands the scope of Earned Sick Time Act, which    |
| 19 | was passed by this council last May, and Local 46   |
| 20 | of 2013 and that requires businesses with 15 or     |
| 21 | more employees to provide five earned sick days.    |
| 22 | Today, however, we will be discussing a bill that   |
| 23 | will substantially expand paid sick time by         |
|    |   |

or more employees covering hundreds of thousands

The bill will also allow the Mayor to designate a different agency to enforce the law allowing the enforcement to initiate investigations and issue violations of its own volition, and it removes an exemption from manufacturers. It also repeals a complicated schedule for enactment, making it very simple. The law will go into effect for everyone on April 1st of this year. Finally, after the hearing, a grace period has been added to the bill for employers who were not expecting to be covered by this law on April 1st. Businesses with 19 or fewer employees and manufacturers will have six months within... they will not receive fines or violations for this law. As I said at the other hearing, what this bill understands, however, is that without the means severe to serve our sick, our families can never be healthy; that a loved one or family should not be confused with disinterested labor and that a healthy family makes a strong workforce and a strong family. Our challenge today is to strike a fair balance between interests of working families and businesses who employ them. Often I have found, as in the case here, those interests can go hand in hand.

COUNCIL MEMBER CHIN: Thank you, Chair Good morning, I am Margaret Chin, the Miller. prime sponsor of Intro 1-A to expand Paid Sick Leave. First, I want to thank all the advocates who have worked for years to see this bill passed and I want to thank Borough President Gayle Brewer, Speaker Mark-Viverito and Mayor de Blasio for their vision and leadership in seeing this done and I also wanted to thank all the small business and advocates for coming to the last hearing. glad that we were able to make some amendments since the last hearing to address some of the concerns of small businesses, including requiring retention of paperwork for only three years, same as the federal requirement and allowing filing for two years. We also extended the cure period to six months so that newly affected businesses will have the opportunity to correct any violations without I know that we will need to do more in the coming term to address the small business environment in New York City and I have pledged to

Working 4 5 families should not have to choose between their health and their job. We should not live in a 6 society where a cook comes into a restaurant sick and risk the health of everyone he serves or works 8 with because he fears losing a paycheck, so I hope 9 10 that my colleagues here will vote in support of this bill. I appreciate the opportunity to testify here today in favor of the passage of this Pre-considered Introduction regarding the provision of health benefits to the family of Aron J. Thomas. This bill would amend the administrative code to provide health care benefits to the surviving spouse and children of employees of the Bureau of Water Supply of DEP who died on or after February 2nd, 2014 and before February 4th, 2014 as a natural and proximate result of an accident or injury sustained while in the performance of duty. The bill was drafted to address the type of tragic incident that can befall city employees, this one resulting in the untimely death of Aron Thomas, who was slain at his desk at DEP's Kingston offices by a fellow employee. Thomas was 33 years old and resided in Olivebridge, New York. He had been a DEP employee for almost nine years working as a watershed maintainer whose job was to monitor the roads and woods near reservoirs to protect the purity of our drinking water. Mr. Thomas was a 2002 graduate of the State University of New York at Cobleskill and he and his

COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR wife, the former Susan Ruff, have a son not quite two years old and a daughter born only six weeks before this tragic incident. He was a dedicated volunteer firefighter and emergency medical technician in his hometown. In fact, Aron was such a good EMT that he delivered his baby daughter in the parking lot outside the local hospital because there wasn't enough time to make it inside. He was also an avid outdoorsman. Aron was recently licensed as a certified outdoor guide by the state and previously worked for the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation as a ranger. He was pursuing a future in law enforcement, possibly as a game warden or environmental officer. He was also very proud of his Native American heritage. This Pre-considered Introduction recognizes the sacrifice made by this employee and helps to ease the financial burden of his young family by providing them with survivor health benefits. It also shows the city's appreciation for the years of dedicated service that Mr. Thomas gave to DEP as a watershed maintainer and it recognizes the ultimate sacrifice he made by giving his life and service to the city.

Thank you again for this opportunity to testify in favor of this piece of legislation that is of tremendous significance to our agency and its employees.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you so much, Mr. Bruno, for testifying on behalf of your agency, DEP and the city of New York recognizing the work of Mr. Thomas and his contribution to the city of New York, and clearly this committee values working people and their families and we think that that is the only just and right thing to be done; to extend these benefits to the surviving spouse and dependents. Does anyone have any questions for Mr. Bruno? Council Member Crowley.

COUNCIL MEMBER CROWLEY: Thank you,

Chairman Miller. Good morning. I've never seen a

bill like this, so it's unusual, but is it that

nobody's died under working for the DEP before?

Like why isn't this just policy?

ASSISTANT COMMISSIONER BRUNO: Well, this is policy under I guess the Civil Service laws or rules and unfortunately because of the circumstances in which he died he wasn't able to... his family would not have been given survivor

COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR 11 benefits, so this amends I think the law so that in this particular case they can get the benefits just because it was a tragic and... a sudden and tragic event.

COUNCIL MEMBER CROWLEY: But if I am an employee of DEP and I die or get killed while working for DEP in New York City am I... survivor benefits given to my children or my spouse?

ASSISTANT COMMISSIONER BRUNO: I just want to invite my colleague, Rick Muller, to answer that question.

Member. Rick Muller, Director of Legislative
Affairs for DEP. What this does is these are
benefits that are available to police officers and
firefighters and also I believe emergency medical
technicians because of the inherent danger in their
jobs, but there are certain circumstances under
which an employee; a city employee who is not you
know, under one of those titles is killed because
of in the line of duty and so... and this has been
done I'd say three or four times in the last 10
years for particular city employees. There was a
traffic enforcement agent just recently who

COMMITTEE ON CIVIL SERVICE AND LABOR became... his family became the beneficiary of this bill or of this type of bill because he was hit by a truck in the line of duty. In 2009, a Gennaro Montello, a sewage treatment worker for DEP, who was helping with you know rigging up a conveyor belt and the conveyor belt collapsed and he was crushed in the line of duty and so this legislation was also done for his family. So these are exceptions that go into the administrative code and there might be a way to actually amend the code such that this would happen automatically, but it doesn't at this point and so additional language has to be put into the code for each employee and as you see, the constraints are for this type of employee who died on this particular date and that way the family gets the protections that the family of a firefighter or a policeman would get.
