CHAIRPERSON LANDER: [gavel] Good morning, my name is... good morning. Thank you, Council Member Rose. [laughter] My name is Brad Lander and I am the chair of the New York City Council Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections and I'm very pleased this morning to call us to order. This is a proud day for the New York City Council where we take a real significant step forward for good government and for a more transparent, inclusive and fair City Council and I want to thank everyone for being a part of the process. Let me first introduce the members who are present. We're joined this morning by the Speaker, by Council Members Garodnick, Chin, Rose, Dickens, Levine, Williams and Espinal. Thanks and good morning to all of you. I'd like to acknowledge the Committee's attorney, Amatullah

As members know, we're here this morning to consider proposed Resolution 184-A, which proposes to change various sections of the Council Rules. This is our third hearing on rules reform, so I think people are familiar, generally, with where we are so far, but pursuant to Section

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 3 46 of the Charter, the Council adopts rules that govern our practices, our meetings, our committee meetings, our stated meetings, our hearings, how bills are developed and considered and a wide range of procedures and practices. We are required by the Charter to adopt rules at the beginning of every session, which we did on January the 8th, but at that meeting, Speaker Mark-Viverito charged this committee with the responsibility of undertaking a comprehensive reform of those rules to make the body more transparent, more effective, more This committee then held inclusive and more fair. an initial hearing on February 24th, 2014; took extensive testimony from members of the public, the government groups, a wide range of organizations; set up a website to invite additional testimony. Staff then took all of that; did research looking at additional rules from other legislatures around the country, and I want to especially thank and call out David Seitzer, counsel to the Government Ops Committee, Michael Freedman-Schnapp and Ivan Luevanos, as well as Amatullah Booth for their work in developing it. We then brought forward a proposal for rules reform, which the Speaker

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COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS announced and we heard at our hearing on May 7th. That was Intro 184 and the highlights of that, as folks know, are a rules reform that takes the politics out of members by distributing discretionary funding equally with a boost for lower income districts and requiring additional disclosure; ensuring fairer consideration of legislation; empowering committee chairs for stronger oversight; providing more transparency and open government in a whole range of ways; establishing a grievance procedure and taking another... a number of other steps like requiring a plain language summary of bills so it's easier for people to understand what the Council's doing. had an additional hearing on May the 7th next door, where we heard additional testimony and had very good discussion about possible additional changes. Following that hearing, a few relatively modest changes have been made to strengthen the package based on that feedback and I'm not going to go through them all because the vast majority of them are technical changes, but I will point people to pages three and four of the Committee Report, which go in detail through the additional changes that

Two changes I'll just mention... one change and one change we didn't make that I'll mention that were discussed at that hearing. you don't have the Committee Report, we'll make sure you get copies of the Committee Report and you have there the full bill, but pages three and four speak specifically to the changes from the original 184 to 184-A as a result of the hearing that we had. Two changes that were discussed in a little more detail at that hearing: one was the question of whether to allow amendments to be proposed for consideration in a committee hearing on a bill and that change is being proposed. Members, if they put a bill or an amendment in writing 24 hours in advance of the committee meeting, we'll have the opportunity to move it. We also had extensive discussion about the what we call Super Majority Bill Sponsorship, 34 co-sponsors requiring... if a bill has 34 co-sponsors, requiring that the committee to which its referred have a vote on whether to have a hearing on that bill or not. And that provision, which people discussed both the pros and cons of at the hearing, does stand in the proposed rules reform 184-A. Otherwise, it stands

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as before and the overwhelming majority of
significant changes that we discussed and developed
are in proposed Resolution 184-A, as proposed.

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As I've said a few times, I really think you know, in addition to thanking all the staff that worked on this and thanking the Speaker for her leadership in making this possible, in my opinion, this is a day where we are really very significantly advancing good government. It's not simple for a body to take a thorough look at its It's not simple for a legislative leader to say let's do things that enable all the members to contribute. It's not easy for a body that has existed for you know, over a century to say let's open ourselves up to a little more scrutiny from the media and the government groups and more fully engage the people in the city to be our partners in government, but I believe today that we're doing all those things and I'm thankful to everyone who's contributed to that process.

Without further ado, let me... I apologize. I thank you. The Introduction was on April 29th of Intro 184. The date I said, May 7th, was the hearing that we had on the bill. We've

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2 COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: This is my 3 opportunity, Mr. Chairman. Thank you. Well, I'm pleased to vote aye on the package and I want to 4 5 thank you and the Speaker for what is a really 6 comprehensive and thoughtful package of reforms and I think that it will help to democratize the Council and also add some best practices for all of 8 us and I think that that is a tremendous 9 10 improvement. The only one I wanted to flag is the one which I have flagged before, and that is 7.110, 11 12 the Super Majority Bill Sponsorship trigger. 13 member of this committee know, I disagree with this 14 rule change because I generally think that triggers in the rules an invitation for us to run afoul of 15 our own rules. One example that was cited, even at 16 the hearing, was the absence of Robert's Rules of 17 Order provided to individual members, something 18 19 that was required by the Rules, but generally was not offered to members; not that it was mission 20 21 critical, but it was a rule that was not being 22 followed, so my general feeling is we should stay away from those. I also think we should maintain 23 24 some flexibility in the legislative process so that

if a bill reaches 34 sponsors, it by all means,

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 9 probably even at a lower threshold, should be entitled to a hearing, but let us use the existing rules to be able to make that happen, such as sponsors privilege, which allows a sponsor to be able to insist upon a hearing and a vote of a bill in which they are the prime sponsor. Lastly, the prime rationale it seems to me for this rule change was a concern that council members were perhaps a little too liberal in adding their names as cosponsors to bills. I think that that is something we all should be focused on. It's something that we should be more restrained about, but I think we can do that culturally within the Council and certainly by having a clear understanding that these rules are to be followed and that they are to be used; that at any moment a bill could move and therefore, you should be restrained in adding your I think that the existing rules do that. Now, with that said, I think this is a small issue relative to this very, very big insignificant package. It does not in any way impact my support of this package of reforms, which I think are very, very good, but I did want to just note that and we will see how it goes and certainly if it creates

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2 any challenges for us, I hope that this committee

3 | will be open to revisiting it and with that, I vote

This took us months and months of working on it in such a collaborative effort to make it happen and I think this is really a new day for all of us in the City of New York and this package of rule reform also will be able to empower each and every single council member to better serve their constituents and I'm looking forward to working with everyone on implementing these reforms and I vote aye. Thank you.

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explain my vote. I want to start by congratulating Chair Lander and Speaker Mark-Viverito for their leadership and often patience for the process and the time and effort that it took to go through crafting a group of rules that will bring significant change and enhance transparency to the operations of this body. It was an incredibly open and collaborative process and I think that all of our districts and the process that we evoke in the City Council will be better for this process.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: And I vote aye.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Oh. First, again, congratulations to the Chair and of course, to the Speaker, who not only welcomed this discussion, but also encouraged it. I think it's a great package of rules reforms and enforcing cultural changes, which I think are great. I, too, did have some specific things that are of concern.

One of them was the 34 trigger. I'm not sure if I

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS was against it per se, but I did have some concerns and so I'd like to just make sure we pay attention to how it affects the body administratively and our ability to do the work as we move forward, but the fact that it was only that and some other minor things I think is a testament to the discussion that was open and everybody got to submit what they thought about it and I think it's a testament to how good the package actually is, that there was a minimal amount of discussion over it and I think that deserves a huge congratulations to the people who pushed this conversation forward, and I proudly

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vote aye.

COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: I also would like to congratulate the Speaker and congratulate the Chair on including the City Council in this process. These are common sense reforms; reforms that I think that this body should've seen many years ago and I look forward to seeing them implemented as soon as possible and I think it's a testament to show that the Speaker is working to further unify our body and I look forward to seeing these things implemented, and I vote aye.

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COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Thank you.

Permission to explain my vote? Okay, I also want to congratulate the Speaker and the Chair for this extraordinary victory, the fruit of much labor and I want to stick up for what has probably been the most criticized component of this package, which is member items. The fact is, this is a town where large, well-funded non-profits have the means and the vehicle to secure funding from the City, whether it's through political connections, use of lobbyists. They are going to be funded by the City no matter what we do in this rules package, but for smaller non-profits; the garden groups, the youth programs, sports leagues, soup kitchens, they don't have the money to hire lobbyists and they don't have the sophistication to access government in the way the large non-profits do. They rely almost exclusively on the member items for their funding and it's critical for a small non-profit, and council members are on the ground in the districts. We understand the needs of the community and who's doing the best job at meeting them and member items have been a way of meeting that need for funding.

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There was a desperate need for reform of the member item process to make it more transparent, more open and most importantly more equitable to remove the politics from the member item process, which had been used as a tool for enforcing discipline in the Council in often unsavory ways and we've done that in this package. We've opened them up to a clear understanding of how much every member will get based on two components. One, equality of resources in every district and second, an additional amount based on the number of low-income residents in the district. I think this is a wonderful way to retain the benefits of member items and to do away with some of the more unsavory aspects of how they've been awarded in the past and one of the reasons why I'm proud to support this package. Thank you.

much. Mr. Chairman, if I may very briefly explain my vote. You know, it takes a lot or I should say let me flip it. It's actually very easy to say we should have reform and we should change the structure of the Council and we should dilute the

power of the Speaker when you're speaking from not the position that you aspired to be in and it's a whole different story when you're in the seat of power in this institution and you're willing to divest some of that power and empower the members. And that's what this Speaker did and in fairness, people like me, we're concerned about diluting the power of the Speaker so much that she wouldn't be an effective check on the Mayor. I think we reached a good balance here of ensuring that we have a Speaker that could lead the body and have the position she or he is supposed to have because we're talking about the institution, not about any one person, and we also empowered to a greater extent the Mayor... the members of this body while not allowing for and doing away with the punitive nature of people's dissent. In the past, if you

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wanted it, there was a concern that you would...

[off mic] I almost hit this off. There's a concern that you would anger the Speaker and then that would be taken out in essence, against your constituents because it'd be taken out on you in various different ways; your ability to function

disagreed with a Land Use issue and the Speaker

What this rule reform has done, and thanks to the Chairman and thanks to the Speaker, is removed that punitive nature and said no, we respect the voice of dissent. We might not agree with it; we might even like it, but we're going to respect it. We're going to allow it to be heard and I think there's a citywide story here that's not being picked up: that this will last for generations. The impact on people's lives and what we're doing here today is vast because the representatives; the representatives of the people will be empowered to speak for and fight for their district in a way that we haven't seen before and I wanted to thank my friend, the Speaker and thank the Chairman, who's done a great job of really engaging members. This was an open process to every member and if you had a legitimate issue you could raise it with them. I'm not going to say I agree with everything in the package, but I don't think anybody... well, maybe except for Brad and the Speaker, agree with everything in the package, [laughter] but that

being said, this is a vast step towards democracy

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: I want to thank all the staff that worked extremely hard and throughout this process, I really want to thank all the members that were highly engaged and giving feedback and I want to thank the Chair as well. think just in essence, we've talked about this issue a lot, but its impact is very substantial and I have to say that I've always stood behind, even prior to January, I've always stood behind the issue of reforming our rules because it really just models what I believe in and it is inclusive leadership and that it is not about admonishing and it's not about being retaliatory; that there's ways of reaching consensus through collaboration and there's other ways of arriving at that point. I'm really excited that we've been able to

COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS accomplish this. It is a pretty big deal for this institution and I want to really thank everybody for their effort and I proudly vote aye.
