Report on the Fiscal Year 2015 Executive Budget for the

Department of Parks and Recreation

May 28, 2014

Executive Budget Highlights

- The Department of Parks and Recreation's budget for Fiscal 2015 totals \$392.3 million, an increase of \$11.9 million when compared to the Fiscal 2014 Adopted Budget of \$380.4 million.
- The Department's Fiscal 2015 headcount, including full-time and full-time equivalent positions, totals 6,686 a net increase of 195 positions when compared to the Fiscal 2014 Adopted Budget headcount of 6,491 positions.
- The proposed budget includes \$10.9 million in new needs, mostly for personal services related costs and a net of \$33.5 million in other adjustments, including \$16.4 million for the Department's Job Training Participant program; \$11 million in PEG restorations, to restore planned cuts to seasonal workers; and more than \$4 million in baseline restorations for allocations made by the City Council in the Fiscal 2014 Adopted Budget.
- The Executive Budget does not include any additional PS funding for the Department's Capital Division or any additional funding for maintenance staff and PEP officers.
- Similar to the Preliminary Budget, the Executive Budget for Fiscal 2015 does not include any Programs to Eliminate the Gap (PEGs) for the Department of Parks.
- The Department plans to collect \$68.9 million in revenue in Fiscal 2015 from various sources, including recreational permits, marina rentals, and concessions operated on Parks property.
- The Capital Commitment Plan for the Department in Fiscal 2015 totals \$537.8 million and includes \$528.4 million in City funds.
- The Capital Commitment Plan for the Department includes \$300.6 million for the long-term reconstruction of waterfront property, beaches, parks and playgrounds damaged by Superstorm Sandy, including \$274.1 million for the reconstruction of the Rockaway boardwalk.
- In Fiscal 2015, the Department plans to commit:
 - o \$82 million for the rehabilitation of Parks-owned bridges Citywide;
 - \$53.7 million for the reconstruction of waterfront infrastructure, including boardwalks and retaining walls;
 - o \$37.4 million for planting of new street and park trees and the construction of Greenstreets Citywide:
 - o \$12 million for the reconstruction of Borough Hall Park in Brooklyn;
 - o \$2.5 million for the construction of Melrose Commons Park in the Bronx; and
 - \$2.9 million for flood control at the Willowbrook Park Lake in Staten Island.

Department of Parks and Recreation Overview

This report provides an overview of the Department of Parks and Recreation's Fiscal 2015 Budget, a review of the significant initiatives included in the Executive Budget and a summary of the Department's Capital Budget for Fiscal 2015-2018. Appendix 1 outlines actions in the Executive Plan. Appendix 2 reports the changes made to the Fiscal 2014 and Fiscal 2015 Budget since adoption of the Fiscal 2014 Budget. Appendix 3 shows DPR Miscellaneous Revenue. The Department of Parks and Recreation's Fiscal 2015 Executive Budget totals \$392.3 million, which is \$11.9 million greater than the Fiscal 2014 Adopted Budget of \$380.4 million, but \$42.8 million less than the current modified budget (FY14 as of FY15 Exec. Budget). The increase in the Fiscal 2015 budget is due in part to the additional funding for 10 positions and funding adjustments for personal services shortfalls, while the increase in the Fiscal 2014 budget is primarily due to the recognition of additional non-City (federal, other categorical, and State) funding. Since the City's fiscal year and the State and federal fiscal years do not coincide, the Department reports only anticipated baseline funding and grants from the other two branches of government at the beginning of each year and makes adjustments as additional grant funds become available.

The Department's Fiscal 2015 headcount is projected to be 6,686, a net increase of 195 positions when compared to the Fiscal 2014 Adopted Budget headcount of 6,491 but a decrease of 417 when compared to the projected year-end headcount of 7,103 for Fiscal 2014 (including both full-time and full-time equivalent positions). The majority of the decrease is associated with private and intra-City funding in the Fiscal 2014 Adopted Budget, including funding for the Hudson River Park and Battery Park PEP officers, which were not baselined and therefore not included in the Fiscal 2015 Executive Budget. The Department will make adjustments when these grants are received.

The Fiscal 2015 Executive Plan increased the Department's budget by \$7.3 million and includes no new PEGs. The increase is due to new needs totaling \$5.8 million, including \$4.4 million in baseline adjustments to cover shortfalls associated with pay differential, including overtime and shift differential pay.

New in the Executive Budget

New Needs

- **Energy Efficient Initiative.** The Fiscal 2015 Executive Budget includes a new baseline funding of approximately \$650,000 for seven positions for the Department's energy efficient initiative program. The energy initiative program is intended to provide ongoing preventive maintenance of the Department's heating and cooling systems for existing facilities leading to optimal working condition and by extension, a longer useful life for the systems.
- **Technical Adjustment.** The Fiscal 2015 Executive Budget includes \$2 million in Fiscal 2014 and \$4.4 million in Fiscal 2015 and in the outyears to cover personal services shortfall resulting from pay differentials and overtime. Because this funding was not baslined in prior years, this action would eliminate the need to fund the shortfall annually.
- **Waterfront Inspection Program.** The Fiscal 2015 Executive Budget includes baseline funding of \$760,000 in Fiscal 2015 and \$600,000 in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears for costs associated with the Department's new waterfront inspection program.

Other Adjustments

• **Fuel.** Due to re-estimates, the Department anticipates a decrease of \$282,000 in Fiscal 2014 and \$26,000 in Fiscal 2015 and in the outyears for fuel costs.

- **Gasoline.** Due to re-estimates, the Department anticipates a decrease of \$91,000 in Fiscal 2014 and \$291,000 in Fiscal 2015 and in the outvears for gasoline costs.
- **Heat, Light and Power.** Due to re-estimates, the Department anticipates an increase of \$518,000 in Fiscal 2014 and \$1 million in Fiscal 2015 and in the outyears in heat, light and power costs.
- **Lease Adjustment.** Due to re-estimates, the Department anticipates an increase of \$396,000 in Fiscal 2015 and in the outyears in lease costs.
- **NYC Service Initiative.** The Fiscal 2015 Executive Budget includes \$350,000 in Fiscal 2015 only for expenses associated with three DPR's Service Initiative programs. Of that amount, \$125,000 is for the Shape-Up NYC, \$175,000 is for the MillionTrees NYC, and \$50,000 is for the Green Thumb initiative.

Budget Highlights in DPR

The Department of Parks and Recreation's Fiscal 2015 Budget does not include any PEGs, however, there are other significant financial plan actions that are reflected in the agency's overall budget. In the Fiscal 2015 Preliminary Budget, the Administration took steps to baseline previously proposed funding reductions, including restorations made by the City Council. These actions include:

Baseline Funding for Job Training Participants (JTPs). The proposed Budget includes baseline restoration of \$16.8 million in Fiscal 2015 and in the outyears for the JTP program. Participants in the program are placed in city jobs, primarily in parks maintenance and operations, for eleven and one-half months at which time they receive training in basic skills either in forestry, security or horticulture through the JTP program. Training in soft skills such as resume writing and interview skills are also provided.

Baseline Funding for Parks Seasonal Workers. The prosed Budget includes baseline restoration of \$11 million for Parks seasonal workers. The Department's seasonal staff is, in part, responsible for park cleanliness, maintenance, security and safety. Prior to the recent proposed budget for Fiscal 2015, the Council has routinely made substantial restorations to the Department annual budget or negotiated with the Administration to help optimize the level of cleanliness for the City parks.

Restoration of Council Initiatives. The Fiscal 2014 Adopted Budget includes \$4.4 million provided by the City Council to restore cuts to DPR's budget. The restoration includes \$2 million for tree stumps removal, \$1 million for playground associates, and \$1.4 million to prevent pool closures and the shortening of the pool season. In the proposed Fiscal 2015 Budget, these cuts are fully restored and baslined.

- **Playground Associates.** The Council provided \$1 million to support 30 FTE playground associates in Fiscal 2014. These positions provide supervised recreation in local parks and playgrounds. Because the Fiscal 2014 funding is now baselined, these positions may no longer be in jeopardy in Fiscal 2015 and in the outyears.
- Close Four Pools and Shorten the Outdoor Pool Season. Since Fiscal 2011, to save \$1.4 million annually, the Department has sought to eliminate outdoor pool operating costs in the final two weeks of the pool season and close four pools for the entire season. The four pools selected for closure in Fiscal 2014 were Wagner Pool in Manhattan, Howard Pool in

Brooklyn, Fort Totten Pool in Queens, and Faber Pool in Staten Island. However, due to the Council's restoration of \$1.4 million, the planned closures were averted and the funding is now baselined.

• **Tree Stump Removal.** As part of the Fiscal 2014 Adopted Budget, the Council allocated \$2 million to the Department of Parks and Recreation for tree stumps removal in Fiscal 2014 only. Now, this funding is baselined as of the Fiscal 2014 November Plan.

Other Highlights

Delays in Capital Programing

Over the past decade, the City's capital commitment to parks has increased, with more than \$6 billion allocated citywide, in part, due to programs like PlaNYC Regional Parks and Million Trees initiative. However, DPR's Capital Division staffing has not kept pace with the increase in capital projects. In Fiscal 2013, to begin to address the staffing shortfall, 45 positions were added to the DPR's budget allowing the Department the capacity to advance a few more projects compared to the prior years. To further enhance the Capital Division staffing, early this year, the Department requested that the City's Office of Management and Budget (OMB) fund an additional 55 positions in its Capital Division to help manage the increased workload. The Fiscal 2015 Executive Budget does not include any additional funding for the Department's Capital Program Division. The estimated cost for the 55 positions is approximately \$4 million.

Funding for Parks Maintenance Workers

As the City strives to create a fairer park system for all New Yorkers, funding for additional full-time maintenance positions for the highest-need neighborhood parks becomes essential. Many of these parks would benefit from regularly scheduled routine maintenance and workers. Additional funding would allow the Department to retain some of the JTPs who currently cycle-out after six months as full-time workers. Since DPR has already invested the time and resources into these workers and they are familiar with the parks that they are assigned. The ability to retain some of them makes financial and procedural sense.

For these reasons, in its response to the Mayor's Preliminary Budget, the Council urged the Administration to provide additional funding of \$17.5 million for park maintenance. The Fiscal 2015 Executive Budget does not include the recommended increase in funding. As proposed, the funding would allow the Department to hire 10 full-time workers per borough to staff playgrounds with comfort stations and five full-time gardeners per borough to help maintain large neighborhood parks.

Disparity in Parks Enforcement Patrol Distribution

The Parks Enforcement Patrol (PEP) division was created in 1981 as a companion to the Urban Park Ranger program. Public safety in parks and playgrounds is one of their most important responsibilities. PEP officers are assigned where there is a high concentration of patrons, providing a presence where they are most needed. Because there are only 161 PEP officers available, many City parks, without privately funded PEP officers, are left without any PEP officers' presence.

As such, to begin to address the need for additional PEP officers and to ensure that more City parks receive the benefit of having PEP officers' presence, the Council, in its response to the Mayor's Preliminary Budget, urged the Administration to increase the baseline funding for PEP officers by \$10 million for 150 additional PEP officers, bringing the total number of PEPs to 311

in Fiscal 2015. No action was taken by the Administration to address this request in the Fiscal 2015 Executive Budget.

East River Esplanade Repair

Recently, the Department of Parks and Recreation released the findings of a comprehensive underwater investigation and assessment of the various shoreline structures along the East River. According to the report, to repair the East River Esplanade, DPR would need \$115 million in capital funding, including \$14.8 million for the immediate remediation of conditions that are rated poor. If the Esplanade continues to deteriorate, the estimated cost of complete seawall reconstruction is \$430 million. Additionally, the Department would need \$11 million to reconstruct the East 107th Street Pier, which is in dire need of repair due to severe deterioration.

The Council in its response to the Mayors Preliminary Budget recommended that funding for the necessary repairs to the East River Esplanade be included in the Mayor's Executive Budget. The proposed Fiscal 2015 Budget includes approximately \$35 million for the East River Esplanade repairs

Department of Parks and Recreation Capital Program

The Executive 2015 Capital Commitment Plan includes \$2.6 billion in Fiscal 2014-2018 for the Department of Parks and Recreation (including City and Non-City funds). This represents approximately 5.3 percent of the City's total \$48.9 billion Executive Plan for Fiscal 2014-2018. The agency's Executive Commitment Plan for Fiscal 2014-2018 is 3.1 percent greater than the \$2.5 billion scheduled in the Preliminary Commitment Plan, an increase of \$78.8 million.

The majority of capital projects span multiple fiscal years, and it is, therefore common practice for an agency to roll unspent capital funds into future fiscal years. In Fiscal year 2013, the Department of Parks and Recreation committed \$532.8 million or 34.6 percent of its annual capital plan. Therefore, it is assumed that a significant portion of the agency's Fiscal 2014 Capital Plan will be rolled into Fiscal 2015, increasing the size of the Fiscal 2015-2018 Capital Plan as reflected in the chart below.

Since adoption last June, the City-wide total Capital Commitment Plan for Fiscal 2014 has decreased from \$20.9 billion in the Adopted Capital Commitment Plan to \$14.2 billion in the Executive Capital Commitment Plan, a decrease of \$6.7 billion or 32.1 percent.

Major Capital Projects & Executive Budget Highlights

The Fiscal 2015 Capital Commitment Plan for the Department totals \$537.8 million, of which \$528.4 million is City funds. Because the City Council has routinely provided Capital funds for various parks improvement projects, City Council capital funding provides a large portion of DPR's annual City-funded Capital commitments. These additional funds are generally reflected

in the Adopted Budget. Funding and changes for major Department of Parks and Recreation projects in the Capital Plan for Fiscal 2014-2018 includes:

- Planned commitments totaling \$441.2 million in Fiscal 2014-2018, of which \$414.7 million is in Fiscal 2014 for projects associated with Superstorm Sandy;
- Planned commitments of \$98.8 million for the reconstruction of Parks-owned bridges Citywide;
- Planned commitments totaling \$31.7 million for the construction of a new park at Fresh kills in Staten Island;
- Planned commitments of \$55.8 million for the acquisition and development of open space along the Greenpoint and Williamsburg waterfronts in Brooklyn;
- Planned commitments totaling \$214.5 million in Fiscal 2014-2018 for Major Recreational Facilities and Facility reconstruction, including \$20.4 million for costs associated with Superstorm Sandy damage;
- Planned commitments of \$223.6 million for land acquisition and tree planting, including \$90.2 million provided as part of PlaNYC 2030 and \$15 million for Goodhue Woods Park acquisition;
- Planned commitments of \$15.5 million for the reconstruction and rehabilitation of facilities at the City's zoos, including \$4.8 million for the Queens zoo and \$1.5 million for the Prospect Park Zoo;
- Planned commitments of \$25.6 million for the reconstruction of beaches and boardwalks, of which \$9.1 million is in Fiscal 2014;
- Planned commitments of \$121.1 million for neighborhood parks and playgrounds in Fiscal 2015 including \$9.2 million for reconstruction of retaining walls; and
- Planned commitments of \$72.3 million for vehicles and equipment, of which \$20.8 million is in Fiscal 2014.
