CHAIRPERSON LEVIN: Good afternoon,
everybody. I am Council Member Steve Levin, Chair of
the Council's Committee on General Welfare. Today,
we are going to be voting on several important piece
of legislation. I want to acknowledge my colleagues
that are here today. From Brooklyn we have Council
Member Carlos Menchaca. From the Bronx Council
Member Ritchie Torres. From Manhattan, Council
Member Corey Johnson. From Queens we have Council
Member Danny Dromm, and from the Bronx we have
Council Member Annabel Palma.

First, we'll be voting on three bills, which require the Administration for Children

Services to prepare annual reports on youth in foster care. We had a hearing late spring on these introductions, and it was a very illuminating hearing. And I would hope we'll produce increased transparency and greater cooperation with ACS and the Council, as well as the public and the advocacy community. So that we can increase the effectiveness, and the accountability for intercity's foster care system. Proposed Intro 104-A sponsored by Public Advocate Letitia James requires ACS to

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produce annual reports regarding outcomes of youth in
foster care with a focus on youth who age out of
care.

Proposed Intro 137-a by Council Member

Danny Dromm requires ACS to collect and report data

on the success of obtaining government issued

identification for foster care youth.

And finally, Proposed Intro 187-A introduced by Council Member Laurie Cumbo requires

ACS to collect and report the high school graduation rates for youth in foster care.

During the first hearing on these bill the Committee heard testimony on how essential this type of information is, and additionally how currently it is unavailable to the public. Although studies from other parts of the country have shown that youth in foster care, particularly those who age out of the system tend to have worse outcomes than their peers in the critical areas of education, employment, income security, and housing who do not have this type of information specific to New York City, which these bills will begin to provide. These bills are an essential first step in learning how to

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best help this population of young people succeed in
their transition to independence.

And just another note on testimony that we received from youth who have gone through the foster care system, and provided us with very immediately impactful testimony, very moving testimony showing these young people who have overcome great adversity. And they helped us keep in mind our objectives, and what we are here to do and so on. And so, I want to thank them for their testimony earlier this spring.

And today, we are also going to be voting on Proposed Reso 257-A by Council Member Mealy, Council Member Inez Dickens, and Council Member Andrew King. This resolution calls on the State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign legislation that would end the Work Experience Program in New York City. The Work Experience Program, also know a WEP, is a program being administered by the Human Resources Administration designed to replace public assistance recipients in work experience assignments in order to receive cash assistance and the State's mandated work engagement requirement.

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WEP has been sharply criticized by advocates for many years. Public assistance recipients and the elected officials who have seen great inequity, and unbelievably profound flaws in the WEP Program. WEP participants are not considered employees. They do not receive their paycheck, and they are not eligible for the Earned Income Tax Credit, and are not able to collect at the bargain, and cannot qualify for unemployment or Social Security benefits. Personally, I believe that WEP has no role and no place in our city, and this resolution sponsored by Council Members Mealy, Dickens, and King speak to that affirmatively.

WEP workers in New York City work alongside and are doing the same tasks as municipal and union employees for below poverty level wages. This resolution calls on the State to amend the law, to ban the WEP Program in New York City. Instead of WEP, we should focus on the type of programs that connect public assistance recipients to meaningful opportunities including education, training, and transitional jobs. We know that we can do this. We have every ability in New York to do this, and we're grateful now that we have an administration that is

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committed to doing this. And is working on new and progressive job training, and education programs so we can finally leave WEP where it belongs, which is in the past. I want to thank the Community Voices Heard, MFY, and other advocates for your strong advocacy. Over the years, it's been a long time to getting to where we are today, but it wouldn't bee here if it wasn't for the advocates. And so, we want to thank you very much. And I urge my colleagues to vote yes on these three bills and the resolution.

And now, I welcome comments by any bill sponsors. And so I'll ask Council Member Danny Dromm to provide remarks on his Intro, and then I will be reading a short statement from Council Member Mealy on the resolution.

COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Thank you,
