Executive Budget Summary

- **Expense Budget:** The Department of Transportation's (DOT or the Department) Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget totals \$874.7 million.
- **Expense Budget Overview:** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget is \$42.9 million more than DOT's Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget of \$831.8 million.
 - Approximately \$532.7 million or 60.9 percent of DOT's Fiscal 2016 budget is City tax-levy (CTL) funding; \$181.5 million, or 20.7 percent is Capital-IFA funding; \$91.2 million, or 10.4 percent is State; \$65.1 million, or 7.4 percent is federal; and \$2.8 million, or less than one percent is Intra-City funding.
 - DOT's total headcount for Fiscal 2016 is 5,153 positions, consisting of 4,854 full-time positions and 299 full-time equivalent positions, for a net increase of 294 positions when compared to the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget.
 - The Budget includes \$169.9 million for the resurfacing of 1,200 lane miles of streets and the repair of approximately 314,000 potholes and \$8.5 million for the design of nine new Select Bus Service (SBS) routes.
- **New Needs and Other Adjustments:** The Department's Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget includes \$20 million in new needs for Fiscal 2016 (all City-funds) and \$14.5 million in other adjustments including:
 - \$4.9 million in baseline funding for increase ferry service on the Staten Island Ferry;
 - \$5.2 million in baseline funding for the Vision Zero program;
 - \$2.1 million in baseline funding for the expansion of the Street Improvement Program (SIP); and
 - \$1.4 million in baseline funding to support the plaza maintenance program.

- **Citywide Savings Program:** The Department's Executive Budget includes \$32.6 million in CTL savings in Fiscal 2015, including \$1.7 million in assessed liquidated damages against CEMUSA and \$33.4 million in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears. The projected savings includes additional projected revenue of \$29.8 million in Fiscal 2015 and \$22.4 million in Fiscal 2016, of which the majority is from revised speed, bus lane and red light cameras revenue.
- **Major Agency Issue:** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget does not include the additional \$2.5 million for Vision Zero education campaign as recommended by the Council in its response to the Mayor's Fiscal 2016 Preliminary Budget. Rather, the Executive Budget includes baseline funding of \$5.2 million, but only \$330,000 is earmarked for Vision Zero education. The remaining \$4.7 million is for other safety related work, including intersection improvement and roadway markings.
- **Ten-Year Capital Strategy:** The Department's Ten-Year Capital Strategy for Fiscal 2016-2025 totals approximately \$12.6 billion, of which \$10.1 billion is funded through City General Obligation Bonds. Projects associated with bridges and highways will receive the majority of the funding, totaling \$11.4 billion.
- **Capital Budget:** The Department's Fiscal 2016 Capital Budget totals approximately \$2 billion and includes \$133.2 million for waterway bridges, \$712.8 million for highway bridges, \$840 million for highways, \$71.8 million for ferries, \$36.3 million for equipment, and \$169.5 million for traffic.

DOT Overview

This report presents a review of DOT's Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget. The section below presents an overview of the agency's budget and how it has changed during the course of Fiscal 2015, followed by a review of the significant budget actions introduced in the Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget. Major issues related to the Department's budget are then discussed. Analysis of the Department's Ten-Year Capital Strategy and highlights of the Capital Commitment Plan for the Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget follow the discussion of the expense budget. Appendices 1 and 2 report the changes made to the Fiscal 2015 and Fiscal 2016 Budgets since Adoption of the Fiscal 2015 Budget. 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The City's Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget totals \$78.3 billion, \$3.3 billion more than the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget of \$75 billion. City funds (City tax-levy and non-tax revenues) total \$56.8 billion, when compared to the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget amount of \$54.8 billion. For the Department of Transportation, the Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget totals \$874.7 million (including City and non-City funds). This represents approximately 1.1 percent of the City's total budget.

The Department's Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget of \$874.7 million is \$42.9 million more than its Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget of \$831.8 million. The \$42.9 million increase is due to growth in the Personal Services (PS) budget of \$42 million and in the Other Than Personal Services (OTPS) budget of \$874,000. The majority of the increase is associated with increased funding for ferry service, the Vision Zero program, the expansion of the street improvement program, plaza maintenance, IFA adjustments associated with capital project staffing, and labor settlements. The proposed budget is \$34.5 million more than the Department's Fiscal 2016 Preliminary Budget.

At the time of Adoption for Fiscal 2015, DOT's projected Fiscal 2016 Budget of \$822.3 million was \$9.5 million less than the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget of \$831.8 million. DOT's projected headcount of 4,841 for Fiscal 2016 was also 18 less than the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget headcount of 4,859. This decrease in headcount is due, in part, to State and federal funding recognized in Fiscal 2015 and not in Fiscal 2016. The headcount will be recognized when additional funds are received.

Since the adoption of the Fiscal 2015 budget, several initiatives have impacted both the agency's budget and headcount for Fiscal 2015 and Fiscal 2016. For Fiscal 2015 these include \$10 million in new needs, \$116.3 million in other adjustments, and a headcount change of 369 positions. For Fiscal 2016 these include \$26.9 million in new needs, \$25.4 million in other adjustments, and a headcount change of 294 positions. Combined, these changes reconcile the agency to its current budget of \$958.1 million for Fiscal 2015 and \$874.7 million for Fiscal 2016. Headcount changes are reconciled to 5,228 positions in Fiscal 2015 and 5,153 in Fiscal 2016. (See Appendix 2 for a list of all budget actions since adoption.)

The Department's Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget reflects a \$42.9 million increase from Fiscal 2015 to 2016, but an \$83.4 million decrease when compared to the current Fiscal 2015 budget. The decrease is, in part, because the City's fiscal year and the State and federal fiscal years do not coincide, so the Department reports only baseline funding and grants that it anticipates from private and other government sources at the beginning of each fiscal year and makes adjustments throughout the fiscal year as additional funds are received. For that reason, it is likely that the Fiscal 2016 budgeted amount will grow during the course of the fiscal year. For Fiscal 2015, the changes introduced in the Executive Budget include \$32.6 million in savings from the Citywide Savings Program, including \$1.7 million in assessed liquidated damages against CEMUSA due to failure to comply with contractual maintenance requirements, \$104,000 in new needs for ferry service, \$2.6 million in other adjustments, and no headcount change. For Fiscal 2016, the changes include \$33.4 million in savings from the Citywide Savings Program, \$20 million in new needs, \$22.7 million in other adjustments, and a headcount change of 114 positions. The agency's overall headcount reflects an increase of 294 positions from Fiscal 2015 to 2016. (See Appendix 1 for a list of all Executive Budget changes.)

- **City Tax-Levy Increase.** The Fiscal 2016 City-funded portion of the budget shows an increase of \$38.8 million when compared to the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget, and the modified budget for Fiscal 2015 shows growth of \$32.8 million.
- **Non-City Funding.** For Fiscal 2016 non-city revenue increases by a net of \$4.1 million when compared to the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget, and the current modified budget for Fiscal 2015 shows growth of approximately \$93.5 million.
- **Headcount Changes.** The agency's overall headcount increased by 294 positions from Fiscal 2015 to 2016, with an increase of 201 full-time and 93 full-time equivalent positions. The current modified budget for Fiscal 2015 increased by 369 positions, with an increase of 265 full-time and 104 full-time equivalent positions.

Since the Fiscal 2015 budget was adopted last June, below is a summary of key funding changes by program area impacting DOT's Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget.

- **Roadway Repair, Maintenance & Inspection.** The Department's Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget includes \$224.2 million for the roadway repair, maintenance and inspection program area, \$30.9 million more than the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget of \$193.3 million. The majority of this increase in spending is for street and roadway resurfacing work (\$23.8 million). In addition, funding for plaza maintenance (\$1.4 million), median maintenance for Vision Zero/Great Streets (\$270,000), and additional Vision Zero funding (\$5 million) also contribute to the increase.
- **DOT Vehicles & Facilities Mgmt. & Maintenance.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget includes \$46.7 million for DOT's vehicles and facilities management and maintenance

program area, which is \$9.3 million more than the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget of \$41.6 million. The majority of the increase is associated with additional spending for the replacement of damaged expansion joint fillers (\$2.1 million), real time passenger information maintenance (\$786,000), increased facilities headcount of three positions (\$260,106) and the Bike Share program (\$724,088).

- **Bridge Maintenance, Repair & Operations.** For Fiscal 2016, the bridge maintenance, repair and operations program area will receive funding of \$69.7 million, an increase of \$4.3 million when compared to the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget of \$65.5 million. The majority of this increase is attributable to new baseline funding of \$1.7 million for 18 positions and related OTPS costs for bridge inspection and load rating, and \$1.8 million for bridge inspection and data collection.
- **Roadway Construction Coordination & Admin.** For Fiscal 2016, the roadway construction coordination and administration program area will receive funding of \$15.9 million, an increase of \$2.9 million when compared to the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget of \$13 million. The increase is primarily due to new baseline funding of \$2.1 million, which includes seven positions for the expansion of the Department's street improvement program.
- **Bridge Engineering and Administration.** For Fiscal 2016, the bridge engineering and administration program area will receive funding of \$33.4 million, an increase of \$5.5 million when compared to the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget of \$27.9 million. The majority of this increase is attributable to new baseline funding of \$3.8 million for costs associated with the bridge division staff salary recalibration.

New in the Executive Budget

The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan for the DOT reflects an increase of \$42.9 million when compared to the Fiscal 2015 Adopted Budget. The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes \$20 million in new needs in Fiscal 2016 and \$20.3 million in Fiscal 2017, growing to \$21.4 million in Fiscal 2018 and in the outyears with funding for increased ferry service, Vision Zero, expansion of street improvement program, and replacement of expansion joint fillers accounting for the majority of the increases. The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan also includes efficiency measures proposed by DOT that total \$32.6 million in Fiscal 2015 and \$33.4 million in Fiscal 2016.

- **24/7 Ferry Service.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes \$104,000 in Fiscal 2015 and \$4.9 million and 25 positions in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears for costs associated with providing increased ferry services. The funding will allow DOT to provide full 24-hour, half-hour ferry service with the existing fleet. This action is in line with the mandate of a local law passed by the Council in Fiscal 2014 that requires DOT to provide continuous ferry service every half hour, seven days per week, year round.
- **Bike Share Program.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes baseline funding of \$724,000 beginning in Fiscal 2016 for costs associated with the bike share program offered by CitiBike. The funding will provide 13 positions, of which 10 are already hired to provide contract management, site selection, and station inspections.
- **DOT Vision Zero.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes \$5.2 million in Fiscal 2016 and \$4.7 million in Fiscal 2017 and in the outyears for 62 positions for DOT Vision Zero 2.0 program. The funding will provide for the annual replacement of an additional 15 million

linear feet of lane markings, annual installation of at least 50 speed humps near schools, capacity to develop and install eight neighborhood slow zones each year, signal retiming and new signal construction, corridor and intersection redesign, in addition to media outreach campaigns and safety education associated with Vision Zero.

- **Expansion of Street Improvement Program.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes baseline funding of \$2.1 million and seven positions in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears earmarked for DOT's Street Improvement Program (SIP), a component of the Vision Zero program.
- **Guiderail Crews.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes funding of \$716,000 and seven positions in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears for guiderail inspection and maintenance. This action allows DOT, for the first time, to have a dedicated crew to address all guiderail related issues citywide.
- **Increase Sidewalk Inspection Management.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes baseline funding of \$761,000 in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears for increased sidewalk inspection management. The additional funding will provide for 22 additional positions, allowing DOT to increase the number of sidewalk inspections conducted while increasing the number of violations issued. This action increases the total number of inspectors from 17 to 39 positions.
- **Increased Facilities Headcount.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes \$260,000 in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears for three additional positions in DOT's facilities management division. The division manages the Department's 70 facilities citywide.
- **Median Maintenance for Great Streets.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes \$270,000 in in Fiscal 2017, and funding that increases to \$600,000 in Fiscal 2019 and in the outyears for the maintenance of Vision Zero Great Streets, including landscaping in order to keep the medians greener and attractive. The funding provides for five positions in Fiscal 2017 through Fiscal 2018 and 14 positions in Fiscal 2019 and in the outyears.
- **Plaza Maintenance Program.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes baseline funding of \$1.4 million in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears for plaza maintenance. Currently, Business Improvement Districts (BIDs) or volunteer groups maintain plazas once built, leaving lower income areas of the City that do not have BIDs without the benefit. This funding will allow DOT to bridge that gap by providing for the maintenance of plazas in areas of the City where there are no added services, as part of the City's OneNYC Fairness and Healthy Communities' initiative. DOT currently has 71 plazas in various phases of planning, design, construction, or complete.
- **Real Time Passenger Information Maintenance.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes \$786,000 in Fiscal 2016, \$2.4 million in Fiscal 2017, and \$3.1 million in Fiscal 2018 and in the outyears for real time passenger information management and costs associated with bus-time clock maintenance.
- **Replacement of Damaged Expansion Joint Fillers.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes baseline funding of \$2.1 million beginning in Fiscal 2016 for the replacement of damaged expansion joint fillers citywide. This action will help to prolong the life of the City's bridges, resulting in long-term Capital costs savings.

- **Studies for OneNYC.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan includes \$1.1 million in Fiscal 2016 only for the DOT to conduct studies, including freight and resiliency in relation to the City's OneNYC initiative.
- **Citywide Savings Program.** Along with the Fiscal 2016 Executive Plan, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) released a Citywide Savings Program that outlines plans to reduce City spending by \$589 million in Fiscal 2015 and \$465.5 million in Fiscal 2016. To develop the program, OMB asked all agencies to identify efficiencies, alternative funding sources and programmatic changes that would yield budgetary savings without reducing service levels. DOT has proposed savings totaling \$32.3 million in Fiscal 2015 and \$33.4 million in Fiscal 2106. DOT's savings plan include:
 - **Staten Island Ferry Contracting Efficiencies.** Beginning in Fiscal 2016, DOT anticipates annual savings of \$1 million from renegotiated security contracts associated with the Staten Island Ferry.
 - **OTPS Savings.** This action recognizes anticipated annual savings of \$1.2 million beginning in Fiscal 2016 from data analysis and administrative efficiencies.
 - **Voice-Over-IP (VoIP) Conversion.** The Department anticipates savings of \$26,000 in Fiscal 2015 and \$260,000 in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears by converting Verizon landline services at two of its facilities, 34-02 Queens Boulevard and 28-11 Queens Plaza North and various remote sites, to Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP).
 - **Citywide LED Conversion.** Beginning in Fiscal 2015, DOT anticipates savings of \$1.6 million in Fiscal 2015, \$4.2 million in Fiscal 2016, \$6.1 million in Fiscal 2017 and \$6.6 million in Fiscal 2018 and in the outyears by replacing cobra head and teardrop luminaires (light bulbs) with LED luminaires citywide.
 - **Lease Savings.** DOT's proposed citywide savings includes \$67,000 in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears from a terminated lease.
 - **Increase RAP 10 Percent at Hamilton.** DOT's Roadway Repair and Maintenance unit will increase the use of Recycled Asphalt Product (RAP) from 40 percent to 50 percent resulting in expense savings of \$123,000 in Fiscal 2015 and \$246,000 in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears.
 - **Reorganize Traffic Operations and Traffic Planning and Management Staffing.** DOT will achieve operational efficiencies by consolidating its traffic operations and transportation planning and management staff associated parking garages with the parking unit for a savings of \$790,000 and the elimination of six positions in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears. The reduction in headcount will be achieved through attrition.
 - **Signal Maintenance Contract.** Due to a contract re-bid, DOT will realize savings of \$992,000 in Fiscal 2015 from the Staten Island signal maintenance contract.
 - **Queensboro Hall Garage Savings.** Due to the closing of the Queens Borough Hall garage, DOT will realize savings of \$533,000 in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears from required payment for garage management.
 - **Revised Speed Camera Revenue.** Due to the deployment of additional speed cameras, DOT will realize additional fine revenue of \$9.4 million in Fiscal 2015,

- \$16.5 million in Fiscal 2016, \$13.2 million in Fiscal 2017, \$10.6 million in Fiscal 2018, and \$8.5 million in Fiscal 2019.
- **Revised Bus Lane Camera Revenue.** DOT will realize additional fine revenue of \$11.7 million in Fiscal 2015, \$5.8 million in Fiscal 2016, \$4.7 million in Fiscal 2017, \$3.7 million in Fiscal 2018, and \$2.9 million in Fiscal 2019 due to the deployment of additional bus lane cameras.
 - **Assessment of Liquidated Damages against CEMUSA.** DOT's proposed citywide savings includes \$1.7 million in Fiscal 2015 from damages it assessed against CEMUSA for failure to comply with contractual maintenance requirements and the delay in bus stop shelter installations.
 - **Revised Red Light Camera Revenue.** DOT anticipates additional red light camera revenue of \$7 million in Fiscal 2015 from the upgrade of current red light cameras.
 - **Federal Funding Switch for Bridge Data Collection.** DOT will use federal funding of \$1.8 million in place of City funds for 34 bridge inspector positions that can be funded by a federal grant in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears.
 - **State Funding Switch for Speed Humps.** DOT will use dedicated State funds instead of City funds for 12 positions associated with speed hump crews in Fiscal 2016 and in the outyears.

DOT Budget Issues

Preliminary Budget Response

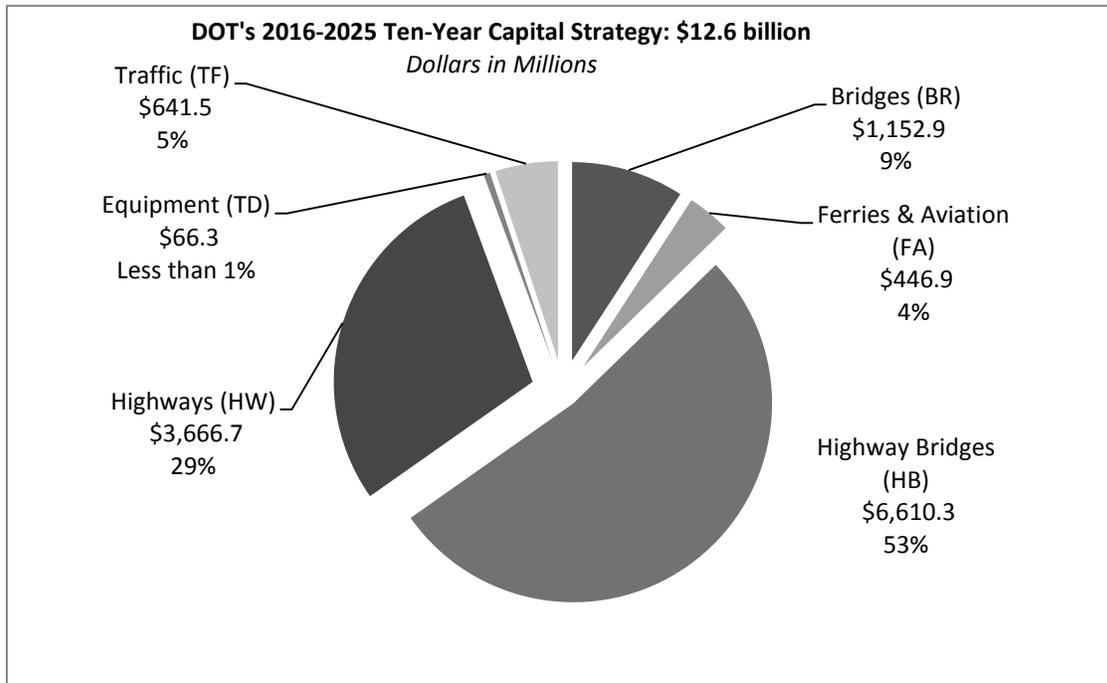
The Council's response to the Mayor's Fiscal 2016 Preliminary Budget included several recommendations for the Department of Transportation. The recommendations called on the Administration to increase baseline funding for street resurfacing citywide (\$103.4 million), to increase Vision Zero funding for public education campaign (\$2.5 million), and to increase capital funding for Vision Zero Great Streets (\$250 million). Of the three recommendations, citywide street resurfacing was funded as proposed and the Vision Zero education campaign was partially funded in the Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget.

- **Increase Baseline Funding for Street Resurfacing.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget includes additional funding of \$242 million over two years for street resurfacing. The additional funding will allow DOT to repave an additional 200 lane miles for a total of 1,200 lane miles in Fiscal 2016, and an additional 300 lane miles for a total of 1,300 lane miles in Fiscal 2017. Thereafter, the Department is only budgeted to repave a total of approximately 700 lane miles beginning in Fiscal 2018.
- **Increase Vision Zero Funding.** To support the Department's efforts to reduce traffic fatalities citywide, the Council's response called for additional funding of \$2.5 million in the Executive Budget for a Vision Zero Education campaign. The Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget includes additional funding of \$5 million for DOT Vision Zero program. However, of the added funding, only \$330,000 is earmarked for Vision Zero education, nearly \$2.2 million less than the recommended amount.

DOT Capital Program

Ten-Year Capital Strategy

The Ten-Year Capital Strategy (the Strategy) is created every other year, as prescribed by the City’s Charter, and represents the Administration’s priorities for maintaining the City’s core infrastructure, moving the City’s infrastructure towards a state of good repair and meeting legal mandates. The Strategy is broken out into unique Ten-Year Plan Categories for each City agency which describe the different types of work being done. The Strategy also plays a key role in establishing the planned capital commitments for the City’s five-year Executive Capital Commitment Plan, which is a subset of this long term strategic document.



The Ten-Year Capital Strategy released by the Mayor on May 7, 2015 totals \$83.8 billion (all funds) an increase of \$16.1 billion or 23.8 percent from the Preliminary Ten-Year Capital Strategy total of \$67.7 billion. DOT’s Ten-Year Capital Strategy for Fiscal 2016-2025 totals approximately \$12.6 billion, of which \$10.1 billion is City funds. The majority of the planned commitments totaling approximately \$11.4 billion are earmarked for the Bridges and the Highways categories.

DOT is responsible for the safe and efficient movement of people and goods in New York City. In line with this mission, the Ten-Year Capital Strategy includes \$1.7 billion for the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway’s (BQE) Triple Cantilever Bridge. The funding will allow DOT to begin to

address the issue of replacement surrounding the bridge structure, which has lingered for years. As proposed, the structure will be replaced in the current alignment. The Strategy also includes \$739.6 million in the Department of Parks and Recreation's (DPR) capital budget for the rehabilitation of various Parks bridges. Details relating to DOT's Ten-Year Capital Strategy are provided below.

Bridges. Under the Ten-Year Strategy, the Department will invest \$7.8 billion in the Bridge Program, including \$1.2 billion in waterway bridges, to reconstruct and upgrade the City's bridge system. The Strategy includes funding for reconstruction work on the four East River Bridges and 78 other bridge structures, including \$4 billion for the reconstruction of 49 bridge structures currently rated "fair" or "good", of which \$1.7 billion is for the Triple Cantilever Bridge and \$357.1 million is for the Shore Road Bridge. In addition, under the Bridge Program, \$2.5 billion is for bridge life extension work including rehabilitative work on 29 bridge structures currently rated "fair" or "good" that require an update to their current conditions; \$332.4 million is for protective coating on five bridges, including \$15.9 million for the Hutchinson Parkway Bridge and \$9.5 million for the Belt Parkway Bridge; and \$26 million is for bridge facilities, equipment and vehicle purchase. Of the \$7.8 billion in bridge funding, \$6.6 billion is City funds, while \$1.2 billion and \$14.8 million are federal and State funds respectively.

Highways. The Ten-Year Capital Strategy provides for an investment of \$3.7 billion for the rehabilitation of approximately 7,931 lane miles of City streets. The investment includes \$1.6 billion for street resurfacing; \$1.4 billion for street reconstruction of 407 lane miles including \$298.8 million for Vision Zero Great Streets projects; \$413.4 for sidewalk and ramp reconstruction covering approximately 41.3 million square feet of sidewalks and 11,028 pedestrian ramps citywide; \$141.7 million for facility reconstruction; and \$7.1 million for retaining walls reconstruction. To fund the highways, the City will provide \$3.1 billion, the federal government will provide \$371.7 million, the State will provide \$45.7 million, and private funds will comprise \$171.9 million.

Traffic. The Ten-Year Capital Strategy includes funding of \$641.5 million for various traffic programs including \$235.1 million for signal installation and computerization; \$180.4 million for the installation of lamp posts and luminaries; \$121.9 million for the installation of signals, streetlights, and lane markings associated with the Department's Highway Reconstruction and Bridge Programs; \$44.1 million for the installation of nearly 81 million linear feet of thermoplastic reflectorized pavement markings; \$41.1 million to replace traffic-related electrical distribution systems on City's roadways and park lighting systems citywide; and \$18.9 million for off-street parking facilities.

Ferries. The agency's Ten-Year Capital Strategy will invest \$446.9 million towards the reconstruction, construction and improvement of various ferry vessels and facilities. Of the amount, \$311.8 million is for various agency projects associated with the reconstruction and construction of ferry boats including \$199.1 million provided for the construction of three next-generation Molinari Class ferries; \$121.1 million for the rehabilitation and renovation of ferry terminal buildings, slips and racks; and \$14 million for general construction work at ferry maintenance facilities. To fund this category, the City will provide \$178.8 million, the federal government will provide \$259.8 million, and the State will provide \$8.3 million.

Equipment. The Ten-Year Capital Strategy provides \$66.3 million, of which \$59.9 million is City funds, for vehicles and equipment purchases for DOT, including computers for office automation, data processing and engineering support.

Capital Commitment Plan

The Fiscal 2016 Executive Budget Capital Commitment Plan includes approximately \$8.2 billion in Fiscal 2015-2019 for the Department of Transportation (including City and Non-City funds). This represents approximately 14.3 percent of the City's total \$57.4 billion Executive Plan for Fiscal 2015-2019. The agency's Executive Commitment Plan for Fiscal 2015-2019 is 15 percent greater than the \$7.1 billion scheduled in the Preliminary Commitment Plan, an increase of \$1.1 billion.

The majority of capital projects span multiple fiscal years, and it is, therefore common practice for an agency to roll unspent capital funds into future fiscal years. In Fiscal 2014, DOT committed \$837 million or 62 percent of its annual capital plan of \$1.4 billion. Therefore, it is assumed that a significant portion of the agency's Fiscal 2015 Capital Plan will be rolled into Fiscal 2016, increasing the size of the Fiscal 2015-2019 Capital Plan as reflected in the chart below.

Executive Budget Highlights

The Department's Fiscal 2016 Executive Capital Commitment Plan reflects a decrease of more than \$126 million, or six percent when compared to the agency's Fiscal 2016 Preliminary Capital Commitment Plan. The majority of the decrease can be attributed to the realignment of projects to more accurately project a feasible timeline committed to by the Administration.

Some of the major capital projects included in the Executive Capital Plan for Fiscal 2015-2019 include:

- **Bridges Rated "Fair" or "Good".** The Fiscal 2016 Capital Commitment Plan includes planned commitments totaling \$1.6 billion for 2016 to 2019 for the complete reconstruction or rehabilitation of 49 bridge structures that are rated "fair" or "good." These would include the Brooklyn- Queens Expressway (BQE) Triple Cantilever Bridge and the Shore Road Bridge.
- **East River Bridges.** The Fiscal 2016 Capital Commitment Plan includes of \$644.6 million for 2016 to 2019 for the continued reconstruction of the East River Bridges. The planned investments include \$322.5 million for the Brooklyn Bridge and \$300 million for the Williamsburg Bridge.

- **Street Reconstruction.** Over the Plan, the Department plans to invest \$1.2 billion for street reconstruction, including \$68.7 million for the reconstruction of Worth Street, Hudson Street to East Broadway and \$298.8 million for Vision Zero Great Streets projects.
- **Reconstruction and Replacement of Ferry Boats.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Capital Budget Capital Commitment Plan includes \$311.8 million, of which \$292.7 million is for Fiscal 2016 to 2019 for the reconstruction and replacement of ferry boats. Of the planned commitments, \$210.4 million is for the construction of new ferry boats.
- **Street Rehabilitation.** The Fiscal 2016 Executive Capital Budget includes \$422.6 million for the reconstruction of 126 lane miles of City streets. The planned investments include \$39.5 million for the reconstruction of West 33rd Street, \$30 million for the reconstruction of South Beach Area Phase II, \$13.4 million for the reconstruction of Owl's Head - Brooklyn Greenway, and \$13.2 million in Sandy-related costs for the reconstruction of Rockaway Beach.

Below are some of the key investments included in the capital commitment plan for Fiscal 2016:

- Planned commitments totaling \$296.2 million for the resurfacing of 1,200 lane miles of arterial and local highway streets.
- Planned commitments totaling \$93.9 million in Fiscal 2016 for the reconstruction of sidewalks and pedestrian ramps.
- Planned commitments of \$5 million for the reconstruction of ferry maintenance facility seawall and sinkhole in Staten Island.
- Planned commitments of \$10 million for the reconstruction of the Queens Borough Hall Municipal Parking Garage in Fiscal 2016.
- Planned commitments totaling \$14 million for upgrading Central Park street lighting infrastructure.
- Planned commitments of \$52.9 million for the rehabilitation of the Macombs Dam Bridge in Fiscal 2016.
- Planned commitments totaling \$28.4 million in Fiscal 2016 for the rehabilitation of Park Avenue tunnel from East 34th Street to East 39th Street.
- Planned commitments of \$30.5 million in Fiscal 2016 for the rehabilitation of Brooklyn-Queens Expressway (I-278) from Sands Street to Atlantic Avenue.
- Planned commitments totaling \$33.6 million in Fiscal 2016 for the reconstruction of City Island road over Eastchester Bay in the Bronx.
- Planned commitments totaling \$46.3 million for the reconstruction of Prior Notice sidewalks in Fiscal 2016.
