CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Good morning, good

afternoon, good night. Are we ready?

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Everything was brought under this. (sic)

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Wonderful.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: I got it.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Thank you. Okay. [gavel] Good afternoon. I am Council Member Eric Ulrich, Chair of the New York City Council Veterans Committee. Today, we are looking forward to honoring the men and women who have served our country. week on Veterans Day there will be parades and commemorations around the city. I know that many of my colleagues and I are looking forward to marching in Wednesday's parade here in Manhattan. Committee will take its first step today in securing a historic victory for New York City's veterans and their families. Today, we are going to pass legislation that was introduced last spring by myself, along with the prime co-sponsor of the bill Council Member Paul Vallone. We heard from veterans across the city, and various American Legion posts and VFW halls, and VBA meetings, and IAVA functions,

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and here at 250 Broadway that the creation of a veterans agency was a top priority. We were first hand at a hearing for this bill last September, and during the 14 months since from veterans from all service areas: Vietnam veterans; Iraq and Afghanistan veterans; World War II and Korean War veterans; War veterans; war time and peace time veterans, all of whom have joined together to support this legislation.

With the committee's vote today and the full committee's vote tomorrow, we reaffirm our commitment to the men and women who proudly and selflessly served our nation by establishing a New York City Department of Veterans Services. This is a landmark piece of legislation that will make New York City the country's largest municipality to establish an agent—an agency specifically dedicated to serving our military veterans and their families. It will allow us to better deliver the resources necessary, and also to assist the Commissioner and her staff to carry out their mission in the most effective way possible. And it signals to those service men and women returning from active duty that New York City is a veteran friendly place. And it is a place that

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not only welcomes members of the military and their families to live here, but that we stand with them and behind me, and that we give them our full support and any assistance they need to better their lives.

Whether it is allowing their dream of a college education, helping them get access to affordable housing, finding good paying jobs or getting comprehend—access to comprehensive medical care, the Department of Veteran Services will be there for our veterans like never before.

I would like to thank many people, the first of which is our Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito for her steadfast support of this legislation.

Without her support, we would not be here today or voting on this bill tomorrow. I would like to thank our Public Advocate Tish James for being a champion of veterans issues and for being an early supporter of this bill. I'd like to thank my colleagues in the City Council specifically the members of this committee, Paul Vallone, Fernando Cabrera, Andy Cohen and Alan Maisel for their support for this bill, their vocal support and for standing by me throughout this very long and tedious process and journey. I'd like to thank the staff here at the City Council both

past and present who have help shepherd this bill
along from the very beginning starting with Eric
Bernstein, our Committee Counsel; our new Policy
Analyst Michael Kurtz; our former Policy Analyst,
Redmond Haskins, who really was critical in drafting
this legislation, and coming up with the language and
doing a lot of the research for this legislation. He
is no longer working with the Council, but was a big
part of this bill. Kevin Ryan as well, and John
Russell, Finance Analyst; Laura Popa, who I think I
drove crazy probably more crazy than anybody else in
the seven years that I've been here, but I appreciate
that. And Ramon Martinez, as well as Charlie
Aidinoff from the Mayor's Office. So we want to
thank the work that they've done on behalf of the
committee and helping this legislation's passage
today.

Finally, to our city's veterans and the advocates. The advocates have really been essential throughout this process, and I know that we're going to see many of the tomorrow at the rally at 11:00--at 11:00 a.m. and also at the fully vote of the Council tomorrow at 1:00, but this really came from the advocates as an exam--it's a fine example of council

members and legislative staff here working with the 2 advocates in the community drafting legislation, 3 4 fighting for its passage, and then finally see it happen tomorrow. It truly is historic, and I would be remiss if I didn't thank several in particular, 6 which I'll thank again tomorrow but Paul Rykoff from 8 Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America. He has been the most tenacious supporter of this bill, and actually, a lot of the language for this bill came 10 11 from a policy paper that they put out about two years 12 ago. We really appreciate that. Jason Hansman who 13 no longer works for IAVA. He works for the Administration now, but he was also a critical part 14 15 of what we're about to do today. John Rowan from Vietnam Veterans of America, a terrific guy 16 17 representing so many Vietnam veterans throughout the 18 city, and a long upstanding member of the Veterans 19 Advisory Board. Also Joe Bello, just a great guy and 20 a great friend, someone who's been, you know, a big 21 part of this. Kristin Rouse just -- these are just a 2.2 I'm just naming them off the top of my head. 2.3 know I'm forgetting a bunch tomorrow and maybe the rest of them. But I want to go on the record to say 24 25 how much I appreciate and this committee appreciates

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everything that they have done to advance this piece of legislation. If it was not for them, we would not be here today to pass this bill. And to all our city's veterans for everything that they've done for our city and for our country, for their advocacy on behalf of their fellow service members. service and their sacrifice is not forgotten. making history with today's vote. It is the first step. It is not the last step in our journey to help veterans. I'm urging my colleagues to vote yes to ensure that our military service members, our veterans, their family members to over 235,000 of them who live in New York City that they know, that the City Council has their back. And that once again, New York City will lead the way in supporting our veterans. Thank you. I'll ask if any of my colleagues want to make any comments before we call the vote? We'll start with Vallone to my right. Council Member Vallone.

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Chair Ulrich, I think it's very important that we thank you in this matter. I think this Veterans Committee has reached new heights on this bill and what's going to happen today and tomorrow. And, creating this agency is now

going to be a legacy that we can all finally be proud
of. I chose to be on this committee envisioning a
day like today where being a prime co-sponsor has
never felt as special as today. And I want to thank
you for never backing down, and many of those that
tried in different ways to make sure that we didn't
get to this vote today we stood strong together our
committee as we always do. And now, we're going to
be able to tell our 200,000 veterans that they have
an agency they can all their own, and that we as
council members and elected officials have stood for
this fight together with them to make sure they have
this day. So I proudly vote yes on this.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Okay. Why don't we call the roll and then you can make comments during the--during your vote. Billy Martin, the Committee Clerk.
