gentlemen. Welcome to City Hall, I am Council Member
Vanessa Gibson of the 16 th district in the Bronx and
I am proud to Chair the City Council Committee on
Public Safety. I'd like to thank all of my
colleagues who are here, members of the Public Safety
Committee and my colleagues and certainly want to
thank the prime sponsor of today's legislation,
Council Member David Greenfield for being here and
for sponsoring today's legislation on the agenda.
Certainly I'd like to recognize my Public Safety
staff who are here, Legislative Counsel Deepa Ambekar
and Legislative Council Beth Golub, Laurie Wen, Ellen
Eng, Regina Pereto-Ryan (sp), Rachel Coderro (sp).
I'd like to welcome the finance team our newest
staffer who will be handling education matter, Ms.
Elizabeth Hoffman and my staff Dana Wax, thank you
all for your work in bringing today's hearing to the
for front.

CHAIR GIBSON: Good afternoon ladies and

Today we are voting on Intr. 65-A, which will amend the administrative code in relations to a program to reimburse non-public schools for the cost of security guard services. We previously heard and earlier version of this bill, this Committee on April

14, 2015 at a joint hearing of the Committee on 2 3 Public Safety, Education and Subcommittee on Non-Public Schools. The earlier version of this bill 4 required the NYPD to assign school safety agents to both public and non-public schools upon the request 6 of such school. The NYPD was required to assign at 8 least one school safety agent within 10 days of that request or as many SSAs as the NYPD thought necessary. The current version of the bill today on 10 11 the agenda does not require the placement of school 12 safety agents, instead this bill will authorize 13 reimbursement to non-public schools for expenses 14 related to hiring unarmed security guards. 15 Qualifying non-public schools include; nonprofit 16 schools with 300 or more students enrolled that are 17 not New York City public schools. To obtain 18 reimbursement the security guard must be registered by the State of New York from a qualified provider 19 20 list paid the prevailing wage, provide only security services and report criminal incidents to local law 21 enforcement. The total amount of reimbursements 2.2 authorized by the bill is a maximum of \$19.8 million 2.3 per school year. This is an important piece of 24 legislation that would assist in proving security to 25

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non-public schools. I before I turn this over to the
primes sponsor to provide opening remarks, I want to
recognize the members of the Committee who are here.
Thank you for being here colleagues on a Friday
afternoon I really appreciate it. We have Council
Member Julissa Ferraras-Copeland, Council Member
Jumaane Williams, Council Member Robert Cornegy,
Council Member Chaim Deutsch, Council Member Rafael
Espinal, Council Member Rory Lancman, Council Member
Richtie Torres, and Minority Leader Council Member
Steve Matteo. Thank you all for being here and we
also have the prime sponsor of this legislation and I
will ask him to make opening remarks. Council
Member David Greenfield.

COUNCIL MEMBER GREENFIELD: Thank you

Chair Vanessa Gibson, I want to thank you for all the

hard work that you do leading this Committee and to

set the Public Safety agenda for New York City.

More specifically I want to acknowledge Chair that

you made immense contribution of development to this

legislation, thanks to your feedback and support.

The bill that we're voting on today will bring

unarmed prevailing ways security officers to the

majority on non-public schools in the City and

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protect 70% or nearly 200,000 non-public school children from harm. The program authorize by Intr. 65-A offer security officers to schools of 300 or more students to accommodate larger schools, the program will equip schools an additional guard for every 500 students in grades pre-k thru 12. These officers will be trained to protect the unique student bodies at each of these schools and to be sensitive to the profound threats they face including from many frequent bias attacks. These security officers will be State licensed and employed by State licensed security companies. The companies will be screened and prequalified by the administrating agency.

Today we're voting to create as many as 500 prevailing wage jobs and we are giving several hundred New York City parents the peace of mind they desire when they send their children off to school each morning. I thank you Chair Gibson for making this possible. The City thanks you as well. The fundamental concept is that every child deserves to be safe while in school. I just want to thank the historic coalition that joined together to support this legislation. Foremost I want to thank my

2 honored to receive a protection from properly trained 3 security officers earing a prevailing wage and

4 excellent benefits.

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Finally, I want to thank our Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito and Mayor Bill de Blasio for recognizing the safety need of all children regardless of whether they go to public or non-public schools. The speaker met with me a ½ dozen times to give me feedback and assisting with passage of this bill. The Mayor personally negotiated the details of this bill with me. I'm grateful for their leadership. Every single public school has security officers regardless of their size, location or risk factors and as a result of a very lengthy detailed and productive negotiation with our Speaker, the Mayor and their respected staff, Intr. 65 will close the security gap for most non-public school students helping achieve our Speaker and Mayor's clear vision of a City that serves all New Yorker with dignity and respect and to my dear colleagues on the Public Safety Committee, I want to thank each and every one of you, thank you in alphabetical order; Council Member Robert Cornegy, Chaim Deutsch, Rafael Espinal, Julissa Ferreras, Vincent Gentle, Vanessa Gibson who

your support. Thank you so much.

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we mentioned of course is the Chair, Rory Lancman,
Steve Matteo, Ritchie Torres, Jimmy Vacca and Jumaane
Williams. All of you gave me support, all of you cosponsored this bill, all of you gave me advice and
all of you gave me gave me encouragement and feedback
in the last 21 months since I introduced this
legislation and I really want to thank all of you,
could not have done it without each and every one of

CHAIR GIBSON: Thank you very much Council Member Greenfield and I to want to thank you for your leadership, your commitment and certainly the Mayor of this City and the Speaker of the City Council. This was a long process and as the Chair of this Committee working hand in hand with the prime sponsor and with my colleagues, we wanted to ensure that this bill struck the necessary balance. Recognizing that children in our city deserve to be safe when they're in school regardless of what school they go to and we know that there is a national conversation around safety in our Country and certainly in our schools and it was extremely important to this body to make sure that children who got to Parochial, Muslim and Jews schools are also

given the same security services as well. So it was
a pleasure to be a part of this process though
lengthy but certainly productive and warranted for
all the right reason and the investments that were
making are going to have a significate impact and I
know on behalf of the residence in my district,
district 16 in the Bronx, many students who are in
Muslim and Catholic schools, I know that they are
excited at what lies ahead because they truly deserve
to be safe just like any other student across this
City. So thank you Council Member for never giving
up, for being not only consistent but persistent as
well in making sure that this issue always remain at
the forefront and certainly all of my colleagues on
the Public Safety Committee, thank you for your
leadership, thank you for your work and it's truly
been a pleasure working with all of you as well, so
thank you so much. And now does any of my
colleagues, does anyone have any questions about the
bill that's before you today? Before we call the
Clerk for a vote? Ok great. So now I'll have Billy
Martin call the roll.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: May I please explain my vote? Thank you. First I quess I must say as my colleague has worked on this for quite some time. As a colleagues I say congratulations to see a project to completion. I don't want to suspenseful so I am voting I but I do want to register some concerns that I have. There aren't too many bills that I've had this many concerns about and that I voted I anyway. But I'm going to do so but I am concerned that you maybe opening a path that maybe troubling, that we have to watch for of where we're spending public funds. I know that a church is across the country, our concerns about security at well, how we may have to deal with when churches come and ask for security based on very real risks, particularly black churches across the country that

are going on, but given that these same schools mandate to be provided busing, nurses, books, it's really hard to mount an argument of why not security, but there is a question of when, where is the line and when we will have to stop doing this so I want to make sure that we can consider that as we go forward. I do have some constituency that very much wanted me to support this both Shibia and Catholic schools so again congratulations Council Member Greenfield and I

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: I'd like to explain my vote please.

CHAIR GIBSON: Yes.

COUNICL MEMBER CORNEGY: I want to congratulate my colleague on being diligent about this and just say that me who's a father of six children, my children safety is a primary concern to mine and I imagine that all parent across the City and State of New York feel the same way, so thank you for taking those parents into consideration especially at this very sensitive time in this country.

COUNCIL MEMBER DEUTSCH: Ok. Since I created community safety patrol over 25 years ago. The security of our children in our community has been a top priority for not just me, for all of us. We in the Council are mindful that now more than ever we have to focus on the safety of all our children and this is very, very extremely vital. As chairman of the Non-Public School Subcommittee and member of the Public Safety Committee I have been intimately involved with improving the safe and security of our schools and been involved in our community and knowing firsthand how vulnerably our children are in non-public schools. Today is really a great day, today is a special day and I thank my colleague Councilman David Greenfield for his persistence, his dedication and (inaudible) and amendment of this vital bill and I thank you, I thank you on behalf of all the children in my district and non-public

- 20 the passage of this vote bill was anything but
- 21 | inevitable. It was obviously the result of probably
- 22 | the most impressive grassroots campaign I've even
- 23 seen in my two years in the City Council. So I'm a
- 24 great admirer of your organizing skill David. I do
- 25 want to address some severe criticism that I've

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receive. I have dear friends of mine in the LGBT community who are deeply disappointed with me and with my vote but I just see it very differently.

Even though I find the content that might be taught in some or many of these schools to be offense and deeply contrary to what I believe and who I am, that does not mean that the children who go to those schools are not entitled to some basic standard of some school safety. I think every school to the existent possible should have at least one dedicated person who's monitoring the flow of traffic in buildings. Who preventing trespassing. So ultimately I do not see this as a matter of LGBT concern, I see it as a matter of universal school safety so with that I vote I.

COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: I just briefly just want to state that what we're doing here collectively is ensuring that the safety of our children is paramount and with that I want to thank David Greenfield for his leadership, persistence, and
