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CHAIRPERSON DAVID G. GREENFIELD: Good afternoon; my name is David Greenfield. the council member from 44<sup>th</sup> council member District Brooklyn, public chair service and chair of the land use committee. I want welcome my esteemed colleagues and members of the committee joining us today. I want folks to try to whisper, if they can or take conversation outsides. Council member council member Gentile, council member Palma, council member Rose, council member Dickens, council member Garodnick, council member Koo, council member Lander, council member Williams, council member Richards, council member Barron, council member Cohen, council member Reynoso, council member Torres, council member Treyger, and we have been joined superstar of the day council member Raphael Espinal. Give him a round of the applause, should give here and nice hair color, like you have Ritchie Torres.

Before we began to consider the modification to the East new York rezoning, I first will call on a vote to add the items to the agenda, because we were not able to distribute a regular

CHAIRPERSON DAVID GREENFIELD: Thank you Mr. Clerk. Before we move on to the formal portion of the proceeding, I just want to recognize that today really is an extraordinary day in the work that we do here in the New York City Council. Our voting today to approve with modification a plan for East New York that is quite literally the best community affordable housing plan ever in the history of New York. Off course, it is complementary to the plan that we passed just a couple of week ago. mandatory inclusion the housing plan, and this is the first of 15 such plans but just to put this. But just to put this in perspective, council member Espinal and I am not exaggerating when I say this, literally over the last few weeks spent 20 out of 24 hours a day. I can tell you that spoke to him at 2 am and then I spoke him at 6 am. So, that's how I can actually know. I presume that among those 4 hours, he slept, might be he went jogging, but he spent 20 out of 24 hours a day negotiating the best possible

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deal for his constituents and in fact and this is really not an exaggeration that I am actually calling this the "Unicorn Deal" and the reason, I am calling this the "Unicorn Deal" is because quite frankly, you never going to see a deal like this. Again, this is the new standard that is being set in the city that quite frankly everybody else will chase but rest assure that I can tell you as chairman of the land use committee they are not going to capture it, but that's okay, because East New York is in fact an iconic part of New York city and council member Espinal for tooth-to-nail to get the best possible deal.

Just to give you some highlights, a guarantee within the next two years of 1300 brand new units of affordable housing in East New York that alone is unprecedented. A guarantee that in the public sites, 50% of the units will be below 50% AMI. Just to be clear they are going to be 100% affordable but 50% will be below 50% AMI. In the private units, 40% below 50% AMI and the City has made a commitment that they will not finance any private units unless they are using the lowest AMI level financing, which is called the ALA term sheet plus that those units

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have to be a 100% affordable, means the put this in perspective a single mom, who works 40 hours a week, who makes 11 dollars an hour, who has two kids will be able to rent a brand new two bedroom apartment for 600 dollars a month, that's astonishing. That really is astonishing but what's more council member Espinal did interest to see this as an opportunity to create affordable housing, he used this rare opportunity, literally a once in a life time opportunity as an elected official to revitalize all of the East New York with 267 million dollars and promised capital in infrastructure improvements.

I am going to say the number again because rest assure you never going to see this number again, ever again, so that's how important this is; 267 million dollars committed, committed, my friends from city planning, just want us to note in writing, thank you very much. In writing 267 million dollars committed to improvement in East New York.

We are talking about a brand new public school. We are talking about new parks, new streets, senior centers facilities, really on a scale that no one can even imagine. This is really something that is extraordinary and I tip my hat to council member

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2 Espinal and I can tell you folks. I am	n not
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3 exaggerating, one week ago today, we did not have a

4 deal and the nature of the way, we do things is, we

5 do not leak the reporters can watch for us, we did

6 call say them and say that we do not have a deal. We

7 | simply went to City Hall and said listen, it's not

8 good enough. It is not good enough. This is too

9 important, not to get everything that this community

10 need a council member Espinal asked for and a week

11 | later, we have a deal because every major issue that

12 he fought for, he was successful.

So, I am now going to turn over for a remarks to council member Espinal. I will remind you all that today is the day, today is a unique day Thursday April 14, 2016, the day that we will have voted through the "Unicorn Deal" for East New York. I will turn over to council member Espinal and then we will proceed with the formalities. Council member Espinal.

COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: Thank you so much Chair Greenfield and I really want thanks also Richards for the opportunity to speak today and for your support that is in entire process, you both have truly played a really significant role and making

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sure that East New York gets that 260+ million dollars. So, thank you for all the work, he has done on behalf of my constituents. I thank my community including CB5 and 16, the collation of community of advancement and many individual constituents, who have through their value input help make this plan the best possible plan, we can produce for this district.

I will like to thank the Board President Erik Adams for his support and for his many helpful suggestions. I also want to thank my colleagues and Inez Barron, who has fought tirelessly just to make sure we get as many as affordable apartments as we I want to thank my colleagues in this committee I also extend a very special thanks to the as well. staff the council of land use division, especially Rajuman and James Lloyd, who have worked tirelessly on this proposal as well as my staff Courtney Peterson and Lloyd Lesperance for their many, many hours of work on this project.

I finally want to thank the administration for working with me over the last two years and for Green to many request to DCP put in many hours on this project. HPD created a separate a

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housing plan for East New York and EDC created its own plan for the industrial business zone to make this a comprehensive plan. This has been a very long process with extensive public input to remind everyone here, this area has been under study for years with fairly funded sustainable communities plan coming before the actual East New York plan.

We carefully read the recommendations from the community board, the board president and the city planning commission reports and we listen to 8 hours of public testimony in council chambers, which we carefully considered as a part of this process. From the start, I told my community that I would fight for a better plan, one that was not just about housing but about rebuilding a neighbourhood that has been neglected for decades and that takes more than just affordable housing. It takes investments in our infrastructure, our parks, our schools, creating supports for our small home owners in our local businesses and making sure that we created environment, where new jobs are able to flourish in the neighbourhood, so those who are unemployed can have an opportunity to have a good paying job.

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I fought for a better plan and I am proud that we voting on today is vastly better than one census by the City Planning Commission. First and foremost, I fought hard for additional affordability and as result the plan now includes more units for families making below 38,000 dollars a year on public sites. Over a 100 more units of affordable housing at public land identified on Christopher Street and Glenmore Avenue, meaning that we are guaranteed over 1300 units of affordable housing in the first year of the plan. We are also getting 500 link voucher to help 500 homeless families, who lives in the East New York community, get out of the shelters and it's affordable housing. We will be converting homeless shelters and two clusters sites into permanent affordable housing and MIH deep affordability option, so that more residents of extremely low income can get affordable housing.

The preservation of affordable housing is just as important. Now only HPD committed to be known regularity agreements for the 1100 units that would expire next five years. They are also launching the Community Retro Fair New York City campaign to boost participation in the green housing

preservation program, which targets small buildings.

Tenant harassment is a major concern of mine and I

fought to extend free housing legal services from two
years to five years.

I fought hard for improvements to our schools, parks, streets, IBZ and the plan now includes a recorded billion dollar in capital improvement to the neighbourhood up from 150 million dollars and those improvements would come to help to build a community center, help to rebuild our schools, help to build a brand new school, help revitalize all of my parks, create a safer Atlantic Avenue, create a fund for home owners and also create an economic development plan in the IBZ, which also will bring in a Work Force 1center to connect the local residents with good paying jobs.

I spent hours on the zoning with my staff and as a result we have changed the proposed zoning to preserve industrial jobs, providing buffer for IBZ, reduce height in ocean hill and on the Fulton street to reflect the character of the local buildings, adjust the zoning a part of landscape for needed medical center. I removed Arlington Village from the rezoning.

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I am confident that this plan is the best that we have ever seen in the city and I probably ask my colleagues to vote yes.

CHAIRPERSON DAVID G. GREENFIELD: you council member Espinal and congratulations once again really an amazing and historic deal. I want to point out just because it's something that we have never done before ever in the history of rezoning Not only, there are going to be a guaranteed 1300 new units of affordable housing but is also a quarantee that council member negotiated that folks who lives in the East New York, who are already displaced and who unfortunately now homeless and that we have never done this before in the history of rezoning in the City of the New York that they will be 500 link vouchers that will be utilize to bring these folks back into East New York and find them apartments paid for by the City of the New York.

Really it's unprecedented and that's something that quite frankly, I do not even think, we imagine when we first went down this path. I really is only thanks to your perseverance and to your hard work and to your vision for what you want to future of East New York. I salute you council member

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2 Raphael Espinal. Now to the formal part of the proceedings.

The iconic rezoning plan is a major victory for the residents of the East New York. East New York is first of its neighbourhood that is said to be rezone and this plan truly sets standard for affordable housing. This plan will apply the mandatory inclusionary housing for the first time and HPD has committed to expedite in the construction of over 1300 units of deeply affordable housing over the next two years. In addition, the administration has pledged 267 million dollars in capital improvement for East New York.

So, I will thanks for council member
Espinal and I just want to thank our speaker Malissa
Margareta for her unwavering leadership. I want to
thank her right hand on Ramon Martinez for working
hard with us day and night to get this done as well.
I also want to acknowledged chair Richards for his
work. He was an excellent partner in this process
and really incredibly grateful for his leadership as
well.

The improvement of this plan required countless hours of work. We thank everyone here in

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the council at the mayor's office DCP and HPD and
particularly, I want to give special thanks shutout
to our outstanding land use staff Rajuman is our
director and assistance Amy Leviatan, General Council
Julie Labuan, Deputy General Council Dillon Cassey
and project manager James Lloyd. We also want to
thank from council member Esipnal staff Courtney
Paterson and Lloyd Lesperance. I want to thank also
my chief staff Denny Presley and my council Alina
Strava, who spent many hours working on this as well.

The modification of zoning tax amendment

Land Use No. 344 includes making the deep

affordability option available in OMIH proposed areas
in the rezoning. This option would require 20% of
the floor area in the development to be reserved for
families making an average 40% of the AMI. That's

31,080 dollars for a family of three, paying 775
dollars rent on a two bedroom apartment.

Measures to avoid displacement of the existing East New York residents is a key concern of this council. The modification attributes to the protection of this community in this regard. I want to stress this is actually very important point.

When we passed MIH QA, we had always said that the

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MIH was going to be the floor not the sealing. So, the technical legal floor is 20% at 40% AMI but with the agreement that what we have with administration is actually going to be 50% of the units are going to be affordable overall and in fact as we said before on private site is going to be 40% below 50% AMI and public site to be 50% at 50 AMI, which proves our thesis that the MIH was simply a floor, not a sealing. Today, quite frankly, you see in the sealing.

HPD is making deeper subsidy commandments ever before pledging to subsidize new affordable housing and now choosing extremely low and low income program known ALA throughout the entire neighbourhood including all private sites that opt to accept cities subsidies. The City will also dedicate 500 link vouchers as we discussed to take folks of out of homeless shelters and bring them back into the community and affordable housing.

Subcommittee has recommended the modification of pro-zoning map amended Land Use No.

341 to cut back some of the zoning changes in order to protect the neighbourhood character in some area providing more coherent framework in others and

called by areas showed distinctive from the surrounding. This changes reflects concerns to the community and include removing all intervention from rezoning and removing a portion of Shepherd Avenue from rezoning, provide a buffer for the industrial business zone. We are hearing intense industrial activities are allowed. While we are not proposing to modify Land Use No. 342 with 343 the urban renewal plan amendment and disposition, these items we referred to the city planning commission that it is related to the modified items in accordance with a charter in the City Council rules.

Finally, the Deputy Mayor has been a number of commitments for city investment into East

New York and those commitments are actually reflected in a letter that we have here to council member

Espinal from the deputy mayor Alicia Glen dated April 14, 2016 and so we will submit the letter into record and refer to you that letter.

Once again, I want to congratulate council member Espinal. I want to thank him for his leadership, I want enthusiastically recommend to my colleagues to show support for this and with that I

I do have some concerns 8 about what ALA is not chosen and goes to MIH but because of council member Espinal is a believer in 10 11 having much as low income as you can, he choose two 12 options that will make sure that they are some low 13 income units there. want to commend my colleague Raphael Espinal, we are neighbours and he has 99% the loin share of this district of this rezoning plan. I know that he works diligently. I know he work courageously. I know that the has fought to get a deeper, deeper and deeper and broader in terms of what it is this plan represents. So, once again, I commend him, he stood forth while in that regard and I admire that, however, I am not able to vote in the affirmative one Land Use 344, I am voting in the affirmative on the others, but I do feel that when we look at the community, we are 25% of the residents on the less than 15,000 dollars that they still does not go deep

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enough, when the federal government conducted the sustainability studies, they said in their document that this does result in gentrification because people will displaced, not specifically this plan but this type of plan over all. So, we know that there are lot of issues in East New York and we know that this plan addresses some of that and goes down to I believe 23,000 but there are still people, who out went burden they are not going to be eligible to benefit from this plan and there is no requirement that developers in fact do the ALA. I have heard, it has been explained to me that most probably they will because they will be beneficial to them and I understand that will impact on the increased affordability in the East New York but I still feel that the city has an obligation to try to make sure that all of its residents have the benefit of decent housing and that in accord or in conjunction with the housing available to people at even the lower income levels, there is got to be sustained economic development plan. So, the people can afford to live and work in a communities and have that, so with that I vote, aye on all except for Land Use No. 344. Once again, I do commend my colleague. I am voting, no.

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COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: Permission to explain my vote. I just want to congratulate council member Espinal. I think that this is one of the best plans I have seen. One of the key pieces that of huge importance is that he is protected the life in air in his district for the foreseeable future with this, every single rezoning, every single up zoning includes context, which means no super scrappers, no building shadowing out the new parks that they are getting no forcing children to play in the shadow of a huge tall building. Everything will be contractual, everything will have a light in air and will protect his residence. I think that for one reason that is huge model. The next piece is selecting the deeper affordability and deepest affordability options with 20% of new housing to be set-aside for household making less than making 40% of the area meet an income and also including option 1. Last but certainly not least is, we do not have enough school seats in the City. His district is already overburdened and over and over again, we see the City rezoning without providing adequate seats

and his district will be getting several thousand new

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2 seats and so for all those reasons, I vote, Aye and 3 say that this is a model for future rezoning.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: Permission to explain my vote.

CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Council member Reynoso to explain his vote.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: I just want to say a quarter billion dollars 267 million DCP HPD just want to make sure that you guys heard that on the record and I do not believe in Unicorn and I think the Unicorn is not going to come next standard. The next standard is what we are trying to achieve here. We should not give preferential treatment because he was the first but I do want to say, looking at this plan, I have never seen anything closed, where there is one project that is city owned that's going to be 80% and 60% or below or 50% of that project or 50% or below, which is significant. I have never seen that, so I want to just commend council member Raphael Espinal. I also want to say that I had three items or two items of extreme concern to members of East New York when they met with me and one of them was reduction in the overall units to this whole rezoning, which was achieved and

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also the increase in M zones of the removal of MX zones and again there is slither alongside off of the Pennsylvania Avenue and Shepherd Avenue, which we are now letting that say as M1-1, which is going to work as buffer to allow for M3-2 right next where to drive and not worry about speculation and we will two sites of Wyona, Bradford and Liberty Avenue that also going to stay manufacturing, so we are able to increase the amount of manufacturing and economic development, decreased the overall units and actually add affordability and overall affordable housing units.

Again, council member Raphael Espial, very, very good job and thank for setting the bar at 267 million. A lot of council members are going to thank for that.

COUNCIL MEMBER TORRES: Permission to my explain vote.

CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Council member Torres to explain his vote.

COUNCIL MEMBER TORRES: Yes, I just want to just take a moment to express admiration for how council member Espinal conducted himself, even though you under extraordinary pressure from various forces, you stood firm in your independence. You shutout the

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noise, you did what you thought. You and your heart were best for district. You got a level investment that you are community is not seen in decades that's public service at its finest. You should be proud but my admiration is accompanied by envy. Envy is that the Unicorn is going to your district rather than mine but with that said I happily vote, aye.

COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: Permission to explain my vote.

CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Council member Treyger to explain his vote.

COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: So, I want to

join my colleagues in commending council member
Espinal, I thank for, really I think being a
testament for enduring a firestorm of criticism from
all directions but I think at the same time
understanding that the status quo in his community
was not acceptable and making sure that he does
everything possible to make that this plan is not
just a plan about affordable housing but actually
remembering that there is a neighbourhood at stake.
So, I truly appreciate the fact that there are
significant investments and I have to tell my
colleagues that I know we count these things as

2	victories but quite frankly that's governments job
3	that's the government job to invest in schools, in
4	roads and parks, so commend council member Espinal
5	for making sure that government does its job because
6	I represent a community that in 2009 was promised the
7	whole host of things as well in Coney Island and that
8	plan has not been fully actualized yet. I appreciate
9	the fact the council member Espinal has put into
10	place yearly measurements to make sure that things
11	will be monitored and securitized rightfully, So I
12	also appreciate the fact that in this plan, I just
13	read that there will be HPD assistance to provide
14	home ownership opportunities for families because if
15	not enough to say that New York should be affordable
16	for all, everyone should be able to give a chance to
17	own a piece of New York, that mean is an affective
18	answer to gentrification because you own a piece of
19	the neighbour, no one could force you out. So, I
20	commend my colleagues commend Chair Greenfield, Chair
21	Richards for all of their support and all the Land
22	Use staff and with that I vote Aye on all
23	COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: I vote, aye.

We will be looking at how the administration, the local council member in this case, council member Espinal is able not to going to have these conversation and these negotiation. You know what we have in front of us is a big responsibility. We are building housing for those that had lived in our communities for so many decades, when we were effective by jobs and crimes and a lot of people left and at the same time, can we also built, no for the new coming. that with this plan nothing is perfect thing like, neither we are but I believe that this plan is close to whatever we can deliver that can guarantee the 40-50 year for now, we can say that the working class and middle class who live in this community that can say we are living here in the area where we are

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sharing spaces and resource with the more wealthy

3 sector of society but without pushing our people out.

4 So with that I congratulation, council member

CHAIRPERSON GREENFIELD: Thank you. want to just make a three final points before the clerk will call the final roll. The first point is both council member Espial, myself and council member Richards were actually in conversations with the nonprofit affordable housing developers, just to put this in context, they actually told us that it was simply not possible to go any lower, so that just speaks to us literally hitting the ceiling, we have maximized that level of affordability.

The second important thing to note which each one of these items is noteworthy on its own, is that the administration has reached on an agreement with council member Espinal that they will work to convert three homeless shelters in the district and turn that into three permanent affordable housing, which is sounding as well and then finally something that I mentioned as well but it is also incredible that administration is committing 12 million dollars to work on a pilot program to legalize basements. This has been a conversation in the city for decades,

2	literally, this is the first time and we are giving
3	to <b>shout out</b> to council member Lander, who has been
4	working on this issue for years as well. This is the
5	first time in the City that The City has agreed to do
6	this and actually put money aside to do this as well
7	. Finally, you know I think my team but really the
8	hardest working people for years on this have been
