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much; thank you very much, Madame Chair for the opportunity to make a guest appearance at your very important hearing today to speak very quickly on this application.

Socrates Sculpture Park is an incredibly important institution, not only for my district and all of Queens, but in fact, the City of New York and for the last 30 years or so it has been presenting world-class, world-class art, sculpture, exhibits; educational programs on a tiny but very important patch of land in Long Island City, and John Hatfield and Katie Denny Horowitz are here and they're gonna speak a little bit more to this. But what this essentially is going to do is create a unified and complete Socrates Sculpture Park and ensure its continued viability as a city park by making some very slight but important changes to the map of the City of New York and also making sure that we acquire in perpetuity a small portion of the park which is currently privately owned, but we need that space very much so that the park can grow and have a permanent administrative and educational presence, with a future building that we would like to see and

SUBCOMMITTEE ON PLANNING, DISPOSITIONS AND CONCESSIONS will see built there, so this is gonna be great for Socrates Sculpture Park but even better for the people of Queens and the City of New York and I just wanted to come by to urge all of you on the committee to approve it and then to come to Socrates Sculpture Park if you haven't already been, 'cause it is an amazing, amazing place to both see the waterfront and to look at incredible, incredible works of art that John and Katie make sure are available for everybody, and we thank the Parks Department for their work in this very important action as well; they're incredibly important partners in this endeavor and again, Socrates has been around for 30 or so years; we wanna make sure it's around for the next 300 years as a City of New York institution. So with that, thank you very much, Madame Chair.

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     Chair Council Member and Council Members; my name is
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     Jose Lopez; I'm the Deputy Director of the Parklands
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     and Real Estate Unit of the Parks Department and I'm
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    very glad and happy to present to you an application
     today by the Department of Parks and Recreation that
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    has been long in the making to establish this park
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     formally on the City Map.
                Before you today you have an amendment to
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the City Map tying [sic] both, the establishment of

SUBCOMMITTEE ON PLANNING, DISPOSITIONS AND CONCECCTONC Socrates Sculpture Park, the elimination of two cityowned [inaudible] streets and the establishment of public place in the Long Island City neighborhood of Queens community [inaudible]. The prior [sic] site -- and by the way, you have the same aerial included; I will circulate it to so you can follow, but the prior site is located along the East River waterfront and is bound by Vernon Boulevard to the east and the Costco retail commercial development to the south and the East River to the west; there's some vacant commercial waterfront that is situated to the north of the site. Additionally, the prior site is bisected by a privately owned construction yard site that divides the northern and south portion of the park, so there's a vacant site that you see there in the middle.

The prior site includes approximately over 276,000 sq. ft., includes Block 501, Lots 1, 16, 31, 60, 101, 112 and Block 499, Lot 51, which is located to the north.

R6; the area within an approximate 600-foot radius of the prior site includes predominantly land uses that

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DPR has supported the establishment of Socrates Sculpture Park since the mid 1980s; the park was conceived by a local artist who worked with community members to clear the abandoned and illegal dumping on the site, and you have before and after shots of the park in your briefing there, so you can see how it looked before and how it looks currently.

The intent was to create an outdoor working and civic space for artists and to provide waterfront open space for the community and the city at large.

In 1986, DCAS granted a five-year lease for the use of the park to a local artist; in 1993 DCAS transferred management of the site to DPR.

Consecutively, in 1998 and in 2003, the main portion of the park was assigned from DCAS to the Parks

Department, which is that larger area that you see in the middle.

So the proposed amendment to the City Map before you today will establish the entirety of Socrates Sculpture Park on the City Map, which will comprise of 6.35 acres.

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Additionally, the application also includes the elimination of two portions of cityowned street [inaudible], so basically those areas are the ones that you see on the aerial map highlighted in blue, which includes the Broadway extension from Vernon Boulevard, all the way to the East River and then also the street end of 31st Avenue.

In connection with this mapping application, the City has entered into an agreement to acquire the privately owned Lot 31 in exchange for the development rights attributable to the mapped public place located in the southern half of the Broadway extension. So basically, Lot 31 is the one that you see in the entrance -- I'm pointing to the [inaudible] of the presentation so everyone is clear on it. And Lot 31 will also serve for Socrates Sculpture Park Organization to develop an education and administrative building on it.

I would also like to mention that as part of the ULURP review process the Community Board, the Borough President and the City Planning Commission have issued a favorable approval to this application. So I'd just like to put to the site. So this is Lot

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Park and I want to thank the committee for taking up this ULURP action and considering it. This has been a decade-long conversation and process to secure the future of the park and the Parks Department has been an incredible partner in this endeavor, with great perseverance. And I'd also like to thank Council Member Van Bramer, who's been an enormous advocate

for the park ever since he took office and continues

to be so. So we are so grateful to be here.

I just wanted to give a little bit of context for those of you who may or may not be familiar with the park, but it is a national and international model of arts taking over and looking at abandoned sites and culturally programming them and acting as an agent of change and a catalyst of change. I'm invited to speak to various municipalities, from Detroit, Nashville; Oakland, about this successful model of Socrates.

What we're here today to propose and do is secure its future; there are some anomalies and interesting things about how the City Map is drawn for this park and one of the most important parts is the acquisition of a private parcel of land that in fact for the 30 years that the park has been in

SUBCOMMITTEE ON PLANNING, DISPOSITIONS AND CONCESSIONS acted and looked and operated like a existence has acted and looked and operated like a park within its borders but in fact is in private hands. The park is having its 30th year anniversary, so the timing of this couldn't be better, and the most significant part of mapping the park; it allows to deepen our relationship with the Parks Department in furthering the master planning of the park and to begin to make plans for shoreline restoration; other

capital improvements that are much needed.

Today the park enjoys about 150,000
people; 40,000 of those directly interface and
participate in our programs; 10,000 kids are part of
our arts education programming and creative
experiences; we have an international film festival;
large-scale community events, so you know at any time
the park may enjoy upwards of 3,000 people for an
event or an activity; it's a highly, highly used
public park and we're here to secure its future.

CHAIRPERSON DICKENS: Thank you. Now before I open it up for questions; I was looking at this map and there's part of this that I see on here and there where it's going to be... it looks to be in the river.
