I'd also like to thank the members of the Committee on the Women's Issues that are present;

Council Member Elizabeth Crowley, representing

Queens, as well as Council Member Ben Kallos of the

He for She Committee, representing Manhattan.

And I'd also like to thank the staff of the Committee on Women's Issues; our Counsel, Aminta Kilawan and our Policy Analyst, Joan Povolny, for their work in preparing for today's hearing.

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Finally, I want to thank all of the advocates who worked tirelessly to ensure that the barriers women and girls in our city face are broken down and pave the way for a transformative future.

I'd also like to thank Monica Abend on my staff for all of her work in making today possible.

In June of 2015, Mayor de Blasio issued

Executive Order No. 10, which established the

Commission of Gender Equity. The commission was

established to ensure that the women of the city live

with dignity and equity and to be free from violence

and discrimination based on gender.

Today we are voting on legislation that would ensure this commission exists well into the future and not just during the current administration; that is such a critical part of what's happening today. New York City is already a trailblazer when it comes to finding innovative ways to ensure gender equity becomes a reality in the future.

Since September of last year, communitybased organizations, grassroots partners and many young women themselves convened in working groups for the New York City Council's Young Women's Initiative;

2	I was very proud to be a part of the numerous
3	meetings that brought together some of the most
4	brilliant minds in our city. This was the first of
5	its kind in the nation to deeply examine and combat
6	the undeniable inequality young women and girls face
7	each day. I am proud to say that we are collectively
8	investing \$20 million to ensure that girls, young
9	women and trans youth of color are fully supported in
10	their lives. The administration responded
11	positively, participating in the Young Women's
12	Initiative and also created a Commission on Gender

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women and girls.

Even in a city as progressive and forward-thinking as ours, more needs to be done to address the inequalities that women and girls face. In New York City, among the close to 60,000 residents who experience homelessness every night, we know that most are children and families led by women. statistics are even worse for women and girls of color. In 2013, 20 percent of black and Latina women between the ages of 16 and 24 were out of school and out of work, which translates to approximately 59,000

Equity to work across city agencies to reduce gender-

based inequality and to level the playing field for

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people. Black and Latina women in the five boroughs had the highest share of new HIV diagnoses among women in New York City, at 64 percent and 27 percent respectively. The average household income of the homes that they live in is \$59,000, compared to \$87,000 for the entire population; much more needs to be done.

Women in our city deserve better, they deserve equity in all aspects of their lives, in education, healthcare, economic opportunity, and access to justice. I am glad and proud that the Mayor created the Commission on Gender Equity to work on ensuring that women and girls are given equal opportunities to reach their fullest potential and I am proud that today, by voting on Int. No. 1137 we at the Council are making sure that this conversation continues for years and years to come. certainly historical, this piece of legislation that we are going to support today.

I also would like to acknowledge at this time we have joined by the Honorable Council Member Karen Koslowitz, representing Queens and we are so happy to have you here today, and we are now going to do our roll call.
