CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS-COPELAND: Good afternoon and welcome to today's Finance Committee hearing we--where we will be adopting Fiscal 2017's budget. I am Council Member Julissa Ferreras-Copeland and I am the Chair of the committee.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: [interposing] Quiet please.

CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS-COPELAND: been joined by Council Majority Leader Van Bramer, Council Members Cornegy, Rosenthal, Cumbo, Levine and Miller. Today the Finance Committee will take the necessary actions to allow the City Council to adopt the Fiscal 2017 Budget, which totals approximately \$82.1 billion. In total, this committee will vote on 12 budget related items. In addition, we will also be voting on eight land use item, but before we get started, there is a long list of people that need to be thanked for getting us here today. First and foremost, I need to thank the Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito for her stewardship of this body throughout the budget negotiating process. The Speaker is a true leader. She listened to the voices of the council members and the public, and then with that

information in hand, she approached the negotiations
with tenacity, vision and purpose. As this yearand
this year it's certainly paid off. With the Speaker
at the helm, the Council achieved some amazing
victories, and that is why today we can pass a budget
that canthat we can all be proud of. Of course, I
also want to thank the Speaker's Chief of Staff,
Ramon Martinez for all that he does for the Council
and each one of us and probably keeps us in check
more often than we need. Thank you to my fellow
Finance Committee members for once again being active
and engaged in the budget process. Together at the
Executive Budget hearings we spent nearly 80 hours
listening to testimony from dozens of agencies about
how the budget proposed by the Mayor affected their
ability to perform their core services. On the last
day of Executive Budget hearings we also heard from
over 70 members of the public about how the Executive
Budget affected them. We shared that we learned
through thewe shared that we learned through the
through the budget hearings with our colleagues and
B&T and delegations and with other, and worked
together to have our voices heard. So thank you
Finance Committee members for being partners with me

your excellent work.

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during this budget cycle. I also want to thank our
talented and dedicated Finance staff. Under the
leadership of the Finance Director Latonia McKinney
with a third budget under her belt as the leader of
the Finance Division, Latonia is a seasoned,
effective and skilled negotiator, and we could not
have done this without her. Thank you, Latonia, for

CHAIRPERSON FERRERAS-COPELAND: Let's give Latonia a round of applause. [cheers/applause] I also want to thank the staff of the Finance Division individually. Everyone plays an important role and I thank you for all the hours you worked around the clock on weekends and the evening and the crack of dawn. Some of you probably never even made it home. Being--for being responsive to council members' questions and requests for information and guiding us through delegations and BMT, I'd like to thank Deputy Director and Chief Economist Dr. Ray Majewski; Deputy Director Regina Poreda Ryan; Deputy Director Nathan Toth; Deputy Director Paul Scimone; Assistant Director Emre Edev; Committee Counsel Rebecca Chasan; unit heads Ayisha Wright, Chima

[cheers/applause] Now, with 20 all that said, let's adopt the budget that is early 21 and timewise early in June. Some of us I don't know 2.2 what you're going to do with these two extra weeks in 2.3 June. This Fiscal--this Fiscal Adopted Budget includes many significant wins for the Council. 24

These wins will benefit both the New Yorkers who will

the services we fought to have included as well as 2 3 the city as a whole due to the long-term budget 4 stability measures we have put into place. When the Executive Budget was released, and so few of the 5 Council priorities were included, there were many who 6 7 were uncertain about how influential the Council 8 would have been this year during this Adopted Budget. However, after very--after a very successful negotiating with more than half of the Council's 10 11 Budget Response now included, it is absolutely clear 12 that the Adopted Budget reflects the Council's great 13 impact and our emphasis on addressing inequality 14 through responsible budgeting. This year we building 15 off last year's efforts to enhance transparency and 16 foster equitable growth. We negotiated a budget that 17 includes the Council's signature priorities much 18 needed capital funding, significant investments in 19 the City's reserved, and the revamped Council 20 initiative process that eliminated consolidated and 21 re-prioritized the Council's spending. First and 2.2 foremost, I must highlight that \$100 million--let me 2.3 repeat -- \$100 million investment that we're making at our city's youth. This includes 3 point--\$38.5 24 million to support 60,000 jobs in Summer Youth 25

Employment Program; \$17.5 million for SONYC Summer 2 3 School for 26,000 children; \$16.8 million for COMPASS 4 and \$16 million for the Council's year-round job 5 programs Work, Learn and Grow. In addition, this budget includes investments in our city's immigrants 6 7 with \$12 million for adult literacy programming, 8 \$12.--\$2.7 million for the Immigrant Opportunities Initiative to take on more complete legal cases, and \$2.5 million for legal services for unaccompanied 10 11 minors; \$21.9 million for five district attorney's offices including funding for groundbreaking efforts 12 13 by the Bronx District Attorney to investigate and 14 prosecute crimes on Rikers Island, and by Staten 15 Island District Attorney to address the opioid drug crisis. \$43 million for three library systems to 16 17 continue to offer six-day service in a baseline, an 18 additional \$40--\$40--I'm sorry. An additional \$4.9 19 million for Emergency Food Assistance Program to 20 support the increased demand on over \$450 food 21 pantries across the city. They're incredible 2.2 victories, but throughout the negotiations we were 2.3 not only focused on where spending could most significantly have a positive impact for New Yorkers 24 lives and address inequalities for a program's 25

opportunities and access. An important part of the
Council's position was that the City must be better
prepared for any economic downturn that may come in
the future. Therefore, we also focused on ensuring
that the Administrations increase its savings plan,
and further shored up our reserves. The initial
citywide savings program presented \$1.3 million
billion dollars in savings for Fiscal 2016, and \$997
million in savings for Fiscal 2017. Given the
Administration's addition of nearly twoaddition of
nearly \$2 billion in new needs in Fiscal 17 alone,
the Council insisted that additional savings be found
to further offset the new spending. As a result, the
Citywide savings program will now include \$311
million more in savings from Fiscal 2016 and \$135
\$134 million more in savings for Fiscal 2017 for a
combined total across the two years of \$2.7 billion
saved.

Looking forward to Fiscal 2018, the

Council will continue to press the Administration to

find savings that are true agency efficiencies rather

than just an array of accruals, re-estimates and

other non-recurring savings. At the Council's

urging, the Administration will also be putting aside

an additional \$250 million into the Retiree Health 2 3 Benefits Trust Fund bringing the total investment in the fund for Fiscal 2017 to \$500 million. With these 4 5 victories in hand, the Council engaged in deep focused internal process to determine which public 6 7 services and populations needed additional support, 8 and to develop new initiatives and strategies to meet those needs. This year we tightened the focus of our initiatives to align them more closely with the 10 11 vision and priorities of the Council. From a list of 12 190 initiatives in 24 program areas, the Council 13 created a package of \$140 initiatives in 25 program 14 areas. Programs and services with complementary and 15 overlapping scopes were combined, and initiatives 16 that did not align with current priorities were 17 eliminated. This year after engaging in that 18 process, the Council's discretionary spending will 19 funding incredibly worthwhile initiatives such as \$5 20 million to launch the Young Women's Initiative, which 21 will offer leadership development and violence 2.2 prevention and response; reproductive health support 2.3 and other services to young women and girls. Enhancements to cultural initiatives like CASA, which 24 will grow from eight to eleven sites in each Council 25

district for a total of 561 after-school cultural
programs citywide. A 46% increase in funding to
combat domestic violence through DOVE, the DOVE
Initiative, and \$1.3 million for the Veterans
Initiative to address issues such a veterans mental
health, unemployment and homelessness. \$2.5 million
to support community programs in smaller neighborhood
parks and the work of existing park and garden
volunteer groups citywide. \$9.6 million to our Parks
Department to retain 150 park and maintenance
workers, and \$2 million for stabilizing NYPD to
support legal and organizing resources into a
citywide fund against predatory equity. This
meaningful balanced package of spending and budget
stability measures is attributed to the dedication of
this Council and to the people of New York, and we
should all be proud of what we've accomplished for
Fiscal 2017.

Before we move on, I'd like to
acknowledge that none of this would have been
possible without the Administration's willingness to
come to the table to hear us out, and the ultimately—
and ultimately agree to provide the vital services
and budget stability measures demanded by the

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Through the partnership and collaboration, Council. we are today able to pass this city's earliest budget in 15 years. Now, with all that good news laid out, let's discuss the items that the Finance Committee will vote on today, which actually make these great things a reality. And everybody will see it in their envelopes, and you will be tested on everything I just said. [laughter] Finance Committee members should have a budget packet that contains all budget related legislation that must be voted on by the committee and again by the full council at the State Meeting. The packet also includes supporting schedules that are not voted on, but filed with the committee as well as other non-budget related items that are being voted on today. I wanted to strongly emphasize that the Finance Committee members will be getting only one budget packet. So after you vote on the packet items, you must bring the packet and all of its contents to the Stated Meeting vote again. Council members who are not in the Finance Committee will be given their budget packets at the Stated meeting a description of all the items written to you by my Counsel Rebecca Chasan. So I will simply list

The second item is Reso B Capital Budget, which is the Capital Budget as amended by Reso A.

The third item is the resolution adopting the Contract Budget.

The fourth item is a resolution adopting the expense and revenue budgets.

The fifth item is the resolution to approve the amendment to the Five-Year Education Capital Plan.

The sixth item is the resolution approving the 43rd year of the Community Development Program and the 42nd year of reallocations.

The seventh, eight and ninth items are three property tax resolutions.

The tenth item is a resolution approving an expense budget modification.

The eleventh item is the resolution approving a revenue budget modification

And the twelfth item is a partridge in a pear tree. Nobody is listening. [laugher] I see. The twelfth item is a transparency resolution.

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2 And the thirteenth through the twentieth 3 item are LU items for today.

The other documents in your package, which do not require a separate vote are listed terms and conditions adopted in Fiscal 2017, Schedule C and the borough president's proposed changes. reminder to member's, Schedule C is a schedule of the expense revenue and contract budget, and the appropriations for the organizations listed in Schedule C and the Expense Revenue and Contract Budget. We do not vote on Schedule C separately. Council members will have to sign a disclosure form indicating whether or not conflicts exist with any of the groups in Schedule C or Reso A. If any council member has a potential conflict of interest of any organization included, he or she has the opportunity to disclose the conflict at the time of their vote. If you have not yet signed those disclosure forms, staff from the General Counsel's Office will are here to guide you through the process so please see one of them before we vote. As a further reminder, please disclose any conflict you may have with proposed subcontractors that are used by any of the organizations sponsored. These disclosures must be

2	made before the subcontractor can be approved. As I
3	mentioned the staff from the General Counsel's Office
4	are here to assist you with any questions or

5 concerns.

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I will now speak briefly about the eight Land Use items and the Transparency Resolution. All eight Land Use items are received—will receive property tax exemptions to preserve or construct affordable housing units to the city HDFC program. They are as follows:

81 Madison Street in Council Member
Chin's District, which will receive a fully 40-year
exemption to preserve 20 units.

257 West 29th Street and 424 West 55th Street both in Council Member Johnson's district, which will receive a full 40-year exemption to construction 37 and 17 units respectively.

100 Madison Avenue in Council Member
Garodnick's district, which will receive a full 40year exemption to construction 18 units.

305 East 171st Street within Council
Member's Gibson's district, which will receive a full
30-year exemption to preserve 9 units.

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Minford Gardens in Council Member

Salamanca's district, which will receive a partial

40-year exemption to preserve 77 units.

Marine Terrace Apartments in Council

Member Constantinides' district, which will receive a

partial 32-year exemption to preserve 444 units.

Clarkson and Winthrop Gardens in Council
Member Mealy's district, which will receive a partial
40-year exemption to preserve 101 units.

Representatives from HPD are here to answer any questions you may have on the Land Use items. Next, we will have the Transparency Resolution. This resolution sets for new changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving local, aging and youth discretionary funding as well as new changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the budget. Organizations appearing in the resolutions that have not yet completed the prequalification process conducted by the Mayor's Office of Contract—our Contract Services, the Council and other entity are identified in the attached chart with an asterisk. As with all transparency resolutions, council members will have
