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CHAIRPERSON WILLIAMS: Good morning everyone. Thank you for coming. My name is Council Member Jumaane Williams, Chair of the Housing -of the Council's Committee on Housing and Buildings. joined here by Council Members Rosenthal, Rodriguez, and Levine and Mendez, Torres, and I think I saw Grodenchik, [off mic] and who wants to get started. (sic) [on mic] We're here today to conduct our vote on three bills that would expand bicycle access to buildings, proposed Intro No. 405-A as well as Intro No. 695-A and proposed Intro 795-A. These bills would encourage individuals to commute to and from work via bike in order to help the city reach its goal of 80% reduction in carbon emissions by 2050. The first bill Intro No. 405 sponsored by Council Member Rosenthal by the request of the Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer would require office buildings to allow foldable bikes to be brought into passenger elevators. The second bill Intro No. 695 sponsored by Council Member Rodriguez would require owners of residential buildings to allow tenants or subtenants to use passenger elevators to transport

apartments. The third bill, Intro No. 795 jointly
sponsored by myself and Council Member Lander would
expand bike access by allowing office building
tenants to use a designed—a designated passenger

(sic) Thank you so much for giving me this opportunity to speak, and thank you, Chair Williams, for shepherding through some bills that will improve the lives of New Yorkers who want to bike in New York City. It makes it easier for them. My bill in particular has—would require office buildings to provide a foldable—a foldable bike access in their passenger elevators. Presumably, if a person can fit in an elevator, so their foldable bike. I want to thank the speaker for—for her shepherding this along as well, and actually I see

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Ben Smith here, who worked so hard on this, and who
is now at the Department of Transportation. Also,

CHAIRPERSON WILLIAMS: Council Member Rodriguez.

COUNCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, Mr. I want to thank the Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito and the whole staff that worked on this bill especially former Chief of Staff and now New York Assemblywoman Carmen de la Rosa, my new-my new Chief of Staff Rosa Murphy for all the work that they do. The Chair and the staff worked very hard on this bill, but it's-some of this is discrimination, and discrimination against bike owners. I'm so glad to see the city becoming more bike friendly each day. Yesterday we heard about the city hires every-total numbers of protected bike lane complete in here. Department of Transportation also announced they're doing the L-Train closure. In a couple of years cycling will likely be a prime option for commuting within investments in new infrastructure. doing our part to make active transportation more attractive to more New Yorkers and tourists. With

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this bill, it will ease the lives of many of our residents who have been unable to take their bikes up the easy way in their apartment building using the elevator. This is a commonsense mode for the city that needs to see more people on bikes and fewer-and fewer in cars and subways. As any New Yorker will tell you, our streets are clogged, our subways are packed ,and our buses need help. We can't afford to rely so heavily on this option to get around any more. In this growing city, bikes present a nimble option that are efficient, and do not crowd a street. It is imperative we begin to look closely to our transportation policies and incentivize more transit that makes sense. This bill is part of that effort, but we have a way to go. It is lost on no one that we have more cyclists that in this point in 2016 than we had in all of 2015. This uptick is alarming and It means that if we are going means we must do more. to incentivize cycling, we must continue to do what the DOT is doing with bike lane installations, but at an even more aggressive pace. It means that NYPD must step up and be a stronger enforcement of traffic laws while collaborating closely with the DA to pursue these cases in earnest. We're doing what we

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2	came-what we came here at the Council and we will
3	continue to do our part to ensure cyclists can be at
4	ease—at ease on our streets. Thank you.
