2	CHAIRPERSON WILLIAMS: Good afternoon
3	everyone. My name is Jamonte [phonetic] Williams.
4	chair the Committee on Housing and Buildings. I'm
5	joined today by Council members Rosenthal, Torres,
6	Cornegy, Ulrich, Salomonca and Cordenchik. The first
7	Bill proposed Intro number 934A sponsored by Council
8	member Levin is part of the Stand for Tenant's Safety
9	Package of legislation which this Council passed over
10	the summer and would create a real time enforcement
11	unit in the Department of Buildings to monitor work
12	in occupied multiple dwellings. The next Bill is
13	Intro number 1359A sponsored by Council member Levin
14	and proposed Intro number 1366A sponsored by myself
15	will require the Department of Housing, Preservation
16	and Development to audit buildings receiving 421A
17	benefits for compliance with all applicable
18	affordability and rent registration requirements.
19	Everybody who has been following the 421A and the new
20	debacle that the Governor pushed forward knows how
21	important it is that we make sure that those who are
22	getting that money are at least complying with the
23	minimal amount of affordability that they are
24	required. The last Bill before you today, proposal
25	Intro number 1447 is sponsored by myself and Council

comments because I know there is a lot of

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consternation and angst about this particular Bill. I know there's been some confusion. I will say that we are not going to be taking public testimony before we do the vote so I want to explain more fully what is in the Bill so my commitment when we pass the Bill was that this would create a minimum number of hours that most people felt was needed and I will make sure that this is not a Bill that creates any part of the industry to be union only and that there will be a pathway for union and non-union folks. I think we have, I know we have achieved those goals that I set forward. Not in any generic way, in a very, very real way. We listened to all of the feedback that we've gotten from all of the stakeholders and all of the voices and this Bill is very much different than the original Bill. I said at the beginning the original Bill and even the B would not be passed without further changes so this is some of the areas that we worked on and I want to make sure this is the ones I'm hearing the most so in terms of access to put input in, everybody had access. Some people used the access more. Some people used it less but there were no meetings that people didn't know about. met and spoke to people individually, people who gave

That is important and the last third, oh by the way.

We wanted to make sure that capacity wasn't an issue

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so if for that second time period, DOB does an assessment and there's an official assessment that says there's not capacity, they could extend that time period another six months which can be another year. The third one is going to be decided by the task force and they're going to decide between 10 and 25 hours additional. We are not the experts so we took what everybody said about OSHA. We concretized that and we decided to put the experts to work to decide on what the next 10 to 25 should be. task will be made up of all the voices that we heard from, day laborers, unaffiliated workers, union, nonunion, MWBE, all of those voices will be on that task force to make those decisions and that third timeline we've allowed DOB again to say if there's not capacity to achieve that third timeline, we can extend it again it's either another six to nine months which gets us to 2020. Also for capacity, we are creating, we are saying OSHA 10, OSHA 30, OSHA 10, OSHA equivalent. The equivalent is important because we know that OSHA only allows 40 people in the classroom. DOB is gonna be allowing for OSHA equivalent which for intents and purposes will be the same except we'll allow more than 40 people in a

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classroom and anybody who is giving OSHA training now will have the ability to give the OSHA equivalent classes so there is no more loopholes, showing no more hurdles that people have to go through. We have tried very hard to address everything that everyone spoke about. I think that we really have. also will be a mandated separate training facility, sorry, not facility, separate training that will be created by the City that has to be created by March 18th to help provide trainings for people at free or low cost. The last piece of the capacity for me had to do with funding and I had said and made clear that even if this Bill is A, I would pull the Bill, not vote on the Bill if there wasn't a very real commitment to make sure this is not [INAUDIBLE] mandate so I'm happy now that very shortly we will be announcing a commitment of \$5 million to be given to, some to the City, but a large portion to community groups who calmly right now provide the type of trainings that we're talking about to the people we are most worried about for free and low cost. \$5 million will be between the Council and the Mayor to make sure it gets not just to big organizations like Shume[phonetic] but to local groups who are

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Gimo Potino [phonetic], Counsel to the Committee Hosea Conde, policy analyst Sarah Gaslim[phonetic], the Committee of Finance analyst. I want to give a special shout to Megan Chen who took the brunt of many people's choice words and when trying to communicate what they thought. I want to also thank Jeff Baker and Laura Popper[phonetic] and a big shout out to Ed Atkin[phonetic] who really helped drive this thing home. I'm gonna remain after because I know that some people still have questions. to make sure to answer those questions. I said this to my colleagues at DIM[phonetic] conference but if there's an issue that's brought up that's somehow we hadn't thought about or isn't otherwise a big issue that we missed, I'm not adverse, and I spoke to Council member Menchaca to pulling this Bill but we not gonna just keep going on and on for no reason. We want every issue that was brought to me, I made sure was addressed in a very real way. If there are other issues I sincerely want to hear them but they have to be real. I know a lot of people are worried and concerned as people usually are with this Bill and I want to validate that and I want to make it real but you have to be able to point out in the Bill

minority workers. However, I believe that we can

we lift up all of the construction workers both union

and non-union who lost their lives in this City and

it's important that we keep them lifted because this

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was the impetus of the Bill and since we started
hearing this Bill and I believe it was upwards of 40
people who have died. I don't believe that there are
any other industries that that would have happened
and we would have taken so long to get something like
this done. I understand the difficulties of it but
that really was the impetus and there was a lot of
people who did not want to address this, who ran the
other way. I'm proud that this Council did their
best not to do that. As someone mentioned, we were
juggling fire and knives at the same time but for me
it was extremely important because people should not
just be dying while political machinations are going
on so I just want to say thank you again. I am going
to remain for anybody that has additional questions
about the Bill, I'm happy to answer them and again,
(we can), and again if there is something that we
have not thought about, I am not averse to pulling
the Bill but it has to be real because we really took
painstaking efforts to address all of the concerns
that we had. I'm gonna leave the roll open for 3:30
for any additional votes. Thank you.
