**TESTIMONY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY AND
TELECOMMUNICATIONS
BEFORE THE CITY COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON TECHNOLOGY
SEPTEMBER 20, 2017**

Thank you, James, and good afternoon, Chair Vacca and members of the City Council Committee on Technology. My name is Albert Webber, and I am the Director of Open Data for the Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications, also known as DoITT. On behalf of the Administration, I'd like to extend gratitude to this committee, under the leadership of Chair Vacca, for the attention and care shown to Open Data over the past several years, and for the opportunity to testify today.

We all share a steadfast commitment to Open Data as an instrument of transparency and a bridge to connect New Yorkers with their city. That is why DoITT works closely with MODA to make Open Data as accessible as possible. This year's annual Open Data report was issued on July 14, 2017, and details some of the extraordinary steps we have taken to connect New Yorkers with the data we publish, and support them as they use it to tackle issues in their neighborhoods. In fact, one of our important user groups is the City Council, which is why we've collaborated with you to offer several Open Data trainings for Council Members and their staff over the next few weeks.

I'm happy to report that these sustained efforts have yielded real results. As you heard, we are experiencing unprecedented engagement with our datasets, which now number over 1700-- including 170 added in the last year. We have also worked with agencies to automate 38 datasets, ensuring that they are as up-to-date as possible, with some automatically updating as frequently as every 5 minutes, such as DOT's Real-Time Traffic dataset.

The Open Data team continues to make great progress every year, but the expiration of the Open Data Law (Local Law 11 of 2012) at the end of next year gives all of us the opportunity to codify some helpful technical changes. **Introduction 1707** addresses many of these useful fixes, as the result of a productive and collaborative effort between Chair Vacca, Borough President Brewer, BetaNYC, Reinvent Albany, MODA, and DoITT. This proposed bill would:

1. **Codify a bi-annual review of the Technical Standards Manual (TSM).** The TSM is the guiding document on how agencies manage and present their data. These standards are designed

to make Open Data more usable to the maximum number of users. We see the TSM as a living document, meant to keep up with advances in technology, data availability, and the passage of local laws that impact data disclosure. An official periodic review of this document would ensure that Open Data disclosure stays up-to-date, relevant, and true to the most current practices.

2. **Extend the Open Data Law another three years.** Current law requires agencies to publish and prioritize for release their datasets by December 31, 2018. We want to ensure that agencies continue to schedule new releases beyond that date. While simply extending the sunset is helpful, we would like to discuss how to improve the language to ensure that submissions meant to be disclosed by December 31, 2018 will still be held to that deadline.
3. **Change the deadline for the annual compliance plan from July to September.** The Open Data team has learned a lot about the process of collecting information from Open Data coordinators as the July 15 deadline approaches. We have found that this timing bumps up against budget season, and request that it be changed to provide sufficient time in each new fiscal year to gather and report information. Additionally, the annual Mayor's Management Report (MMR) is published in September. Shifting the deadline to September will allow us to align these two reporting exercises and efficiently deliver a unified report representing our progress.
4. **Codify the requirement for each agency to designate an Open Data coordinator.** While Open Data coordinators are currently required under the Technical Standards Manual, codifying this requirement would underscore agencies' commitment to Open Data in perpetuity.
5. **Require web portal site analytics in perpetuity.** Since we already publish web analytics, we support the idea of ensuring that future administrations do the same.

In addition to these improvements, we suggest amending the license provision of Local Law 11 of 2012 to best serve the goals of Open Data for All. Currently, § 23-502 (d) states that "all public data sets on the portal shall be made available without any license requirement or restriction on their use other than attribution and description of the modifications made to the data set." We have interpreted this to mean that DoITT cannot make the data available under *any* license, including permissive licenses. However, our mission to encourage public engagement with open data in the long term makes the ability to license very important. Structured properly, licenses could allow us to formally make the City's datasets free and open for public use in perpetuity, codifying our existing practice and ensuring that New Yorkers have access to open data for the long haul. We look forward to a productive dialogue about this provision.

Introduction 1528 would amend Local Law 7 of 2016, which currently requires agencies to review Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) requests containing data to determine whether they contained new public datasets that could be published on Open Data. Local Law 7 requires agencies to disclose *metrics* on FOIL responses. Introduction 1528 would require agencies to take the extra step in *naming* the datasets relating to FOIL responses. This legislation furthers the administration's transparency objectives.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify today. Open Data remains a priority of this administration, shining a bright light on our government and our city for all New Yorkers to see, and providing the tools to solve thorny civic problems in creative ways. We thank our partners in the City Council and in the civic technology community for their continued advocacy. This concludes our prepared testimony, and we look forward to answering your questions.


Acknowledgments

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Open data didn't become reality in New York City just because it's a best practice. The program thrives today, five years after the Open Data law, because New Yorkers like you are engaging openly with your government and the wealth of data it creates.



Dear New Yorkers,

Every time you call 311, register for a construction permit, or see your streets cleaned, you're seeing your government at work. You're also seeing the creation of public data.

Your right to access government information has long been a cornerstone of modern civics, even before that information was stored in databases. Access to government data allows you to understand what your public institutions do for you and how your tax dollars are spent.

New York City is a global leader in the public availability of government data. In 1993, when the World Wide Web was still in its infancy, the NYC Commission on Public Information and Communication published the first-of-its-kind "Public Data Directory." Two decades later, the City implemented its pioneering 2012 "Open Data Law," which requires all City agencies to publish every public dataset they maintain on the Open Data Portal.

This report provides an update on the City's work to make that vision a reality. In it, you'll find specific examples from some of the 90 City agencies that are becoming more transparent than ever by publishing new datasets.

But the real promise of Open Data is not about what the City does: It's about New Yorkers like you. Our data is not truly "open" unless it is accessible and useful for everyone. Over the past two years, our Open Data for All strategy has helped realize the promise of open information by putting data into the hands of New Yorkers — land use advocates, small businesses, community boards, CUNY students, researchers, inter-faith organizers, and people from all five boroughs who are using open data to make a difference in their communities. We hope their stories, featured in this report, will inspire you to think about how open data can make positive change in your community.

Most importantly, this report is not a one-way street: We want to hear from you. Request a dataset for release. [Leave a comment](#) on the Open Data Portal. Find problems in your community and solve them with Open Data — or let us know how we can. NYC Open Data is about creating a dialogue between you and your City. Five years after open data became law, the program thrives because New Yorkers like you are engaging openly with their government and the wealth of data it creates.

We hope you'll join us in our continued efforts to make Open Data for All.

Open Data Values

At the fourth International Open Data Conference in Madrid, Spain in October 2016, New York City’s Chief Analytics Officer debuted the Open Data team’s six “Open Data Values.” Each of these values is presented here, along with a specific step the administration has taken to ensure that every new open data initiative reflects the Open Data for All vision: that every New Yorker can benefit from Open Data, and that Open Data can benefit from every New Yorker.



Start with users.

The first step in opening data is focusing on demand. This spring, the Open Data team partnered with **Reboot**, a social impact firm dedicated to inclusive development and accountable governance, to better understand current and potential users of Open Data. Reboot’s work built on past research partnerships between **MODA** and local academic institutions, and is part of the Open Data team’s efforts to continue to understand the new ways New Yorkers can deliver value to their communities through City data. Reboot’s research leveraged applied urban ethnography and design research to build user personas and a set of actionable recommendations for engaging new users. Reboot publicly presented the research at **Civic Hall** in May and published it on the Open Data website. This research contributes to the body of evidence the Open Data team continues to collect to be tactical about engaging users where they are at and spurring demand in communities less familiar with Open Data.



Encourage purposeful and easy engagement.

Open Data is a platform that should be used as a tool for feedback. The initiative succeeds through the participation and oversight of community stakeholders — old and new. After user research indicated that the digital interface of the Open Data catalog was confusing and intimidating to new users, the Open Data team committed to building a new, more accessible website through collaborative engagement with users. In partnership with the **DoITT NYC Gov Lab** and **Studio UX team**, the Open Data team leveraged human-centered design (HCD) methodology in designing the website, engaging high-frequency users in a design charrette and community groups in user testing sessions. The revamped Portal includes a new **Open Data Help Desk**, powered by the Screendoor application that streamlines several feedback channels. In the four months since the Help Desk launched, the team has received more than 400 new comments and inquiries. The new system not only enables the team to better respond to user needs, but to also collect data on inquiry types. This valuable source of information helps ensure that technology updates and new tutorials are based on known user needs. Substantive engagement must be standard for Open Data.



Treat the publication of the dataset as the first step of opening data.

In New York City, “open” data should be “useful” data. A practical expression of this Open Data value is MODA’s commitment to Open Source Analytics, an understanding of “analytics” as a process that can be replicated elsewhere. In addition to partnering with **DoITT** on Open Data, **MODA** works with City agencies on advanced data analytics projects to make services better, faster, and more equitable. Simply handing over a finished set of metrics at the end of an analytics project limits civil servants’ insight into how the analysis was done, and stifles further improvements on the models. The individual steps taken – including what type of analysis was selected and why, insights gained from subject matter experts, and disclaimers on source data – is just as important as the results. Data analysts working in government should be held to a higher standard of transparency about goals, process, and results. “Open sourcing” analytics efforts not only increases visibility into the way City agencies use data and develop algorithms. It also helps spread awareness of the power of Open Data and data science in municipal service delivery. To this end, this fall MODA will release an online project library and documentation on its *Open Source Analytics* implementation framework.



Empower agencies.

By empowering champions in every agency and office, the City narrows the gap between data experts and Open Data users, improving its ability to be a good data steward. This spring, the Open Data team surveyed all **Open Data Coordinators (ODCs)**, the appointed staff within individual agencies who manage data publishing, to better understand their needs. That survey showed that some Coordinators lacked clarity on their role, and what was required of them. The Open Data team responded by convening ODCs more regularly and implementing a new, simpler data inventory process. Additionally, the team brought on new ODCs for the smaller offices that make up the “Office of the Mayor,” which were previously served by a single Coordinator. MODA partnered with the **Mayor’s Office of Operations** this spring to recruit 40 new ODCs from individual mayor’s offices, who in turn identified six new datasets, which appear on this year’s compliance plan. New data publishers include the **Mayor’s Office of Climate Policy and Programs** and the **Mayor’s Office of Criminal Justice**.



Integrate Open Data into citywide processes.

Open Data is a tool to engage subject matter experts and interested novices in the information their City produces, and give them a voice in the decisions their government makes. As Open Data becomes routine across NYC government, we will look for opportunities to make small changes in existing processes and embed Open Data components into more City initiatives. Last November, the **Mayor’s Office of Technology and Innovation** hosted a “Broadband Data Dig” at the **Brooklyn Public Library**. Policy experts, civic technologists, and data scientists together analyzed and developed recommendations for New York City’s broadband strategy. The data included a block-level look at broadband availability in New York City (from federal data), as well as development-by-development information about broadband at the **New York City Housing Authority**. Participants used the datasets to help the City develop solutions to address broadband inequities and design broadband data collection and maintenance policies.




Learn, test, standardize— and learn again.

We must test our assumptions and try new ideas, collect information on our efforts, and analyze our performance seeking opportunities for improvement. Open Data lies at the intersection of participatory government, open information, and pioneering government technology. Like these forward-thinking fields, Open Data is not static, and the City’s Open Data work should continue to adapt to the changing data ecosystem. This spring, the Open Data team added four new full-time staff to its ranks. MODA hired a Director of Civic Engagement and a Special Advisor to ensure that the program remains at the vanguard of the field, while responding to user needs (and needs of the Open Data Coordinators). DoITT hired two new data coordinators, adding to the team’s capacity to publish and maintain datasets. In addition, more agencies than ever are investing resources in their data publishing efforts as the business case and civic imperative for Open Data becomes clearer.



Open Data for All New Yorkers

NYC Civic Innovation Fellowship

New York City's 59 Community Boards play an important role in local oversight of municipal service delivery. However, because each one is run by an average of just two full-time employees, along with volunteer representatives, many Community Boards struggle to engage effectively with the demands of the digital landscape. Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer, a longtime champion of both Community Boards and Open Data, wants that to change. Her office partners with [BetaNYC](#), [CUNY Service Corps](#), [the Fund for the City of New York](#), and [Data & Society](#), with support from the [Sloan Foundation](#), to operate the "[NYC Civic Innovation Fellowship](#)." Each year, the program educates a select cohort of CUNY students in media theory, local history, and open data analysis while giving students hands-on experience developing civic technology for community board clients.

Shalom Joseph, who now works professionally as a data analyst, was a Fellow in the 2015-16 school year while a student at John Jay College of Criminal Justice. Lester Barrett, a rising junior at Medgar Evers College, was a Fellow the following year. Both studied computer science in college. Looking for professional experience in a technology field, they applied to the selective CUNY Service Corp Fellows, where they were accepted and found matches with Borough President Brewer's NYC Civic Innovation Fellowship. For Lester and Shalom, it was their first exposure to data analytics through Open Data.

The fellowship curriculum, developed by BetaNYC, relies on Open Data to teach students data skills — a model of citizenship for a digital age. The curriculum is a crash course in the data created by City

government operations. The two took part in 12-week boot camps, where they learned an array of data cleaning, analysis, and public speaking skills; the goal was to develop the skills for manipulating data in conjunction with the skills for communicating it. Telling stories by visualizing data was "an eye-opening experience," Shalom explains. "It taught me that what we're diving into is way bigger than just what we're being taught right now." By the end of the boot camp, both Lester and Shalom put their new skillsets to use, presenting "data stories" to community leaders based on City data, drawing especially from the records created by New Yorkers each day in the [311 Service Requests from 2010 to Present](#) dataset.

Each cohort of the Civic Innovation Fellowship — which has now trained 25 undergraduates and has released seven hours of video and 100 pages of instructional material on how to use Open Data — builds on the work of the previous group. Currently, two prototypes for civic engagement technology are being deployed in Manhattan Community Boards.

Both Lester and Shalom found that NYC Open Data was critical to the Civic Innovation Fellowship, in both the skills they gained and their understanding of why those skills were relevant. "Without Open Data, we wouldn't have had anything to do," Shalom says. "We wouldn't have had examples, we wouldn't have had anything to go from, we wouldn't have really had an understanding of why what we're learning is important. The stories that are behind Open Data, everything that went into it, the people that were involved — it motivated me to really understand that as a New Yorker, this is something that I should pay attention to."

When Engagement Works: Beyond the TreesCount! 2015 Data Jam

In June 2016, the NYC Department of Parks and Recreation teamed up with [BetaNYC](#), MODA, and the [Mayor's Office of Technology and Innovation](#) to host the “[TreesCount! Data Jam](#),” where the community groups that collected [TreesCount! data](#) joined civic hackers to collaborate and use the 2015 street tree census data to solve problems. One of the challenges NYC Parks posed to attendees was: “How can we use Street Tree Census Data to better engage with and target the efforts of community stewardship volunteers to improve the health of the urban forest?” Participants Rob Elliott and Nandan Shetty were members of “When Engagement Works,” the grand prize-winning team for that challenge.

Nandan is a doctoral student in engineering who also works part-time at NYC Parks’ Forestry, Horticulture & Natural Resources division. Rob, an Earth Institute Postdoctoral Fellow at Columbia University, wrote his PhD dissertation on green infrastructure, and has spent much of his academic career thinking about municipal greenery. Of the Data Jam, Rob says, “It was really cool to see what people who didn’t have their heads buried in street trees for a year had to offer. They brought a very new perspective to it, and lots of cool ideas came out.”

“We built a hydrologic model that could turn the Tree Census data into a model of water retention,” Nandan says. In other words, the team’s data analysis demonstrated how healthy trees in New York City contribute to better stormwater management. The results showed that installing more tree guards improved both tree health and the cost effectiveness of stormwater management — and that only 14 percent of NYC’s 666,000 street trees had useful treeguards — signs of community stewardship of those trees.

In a traditional hackathon, participants come together to work on a problem and then submit the results to the organizers at the end of the day-long event. Rob and

Nandan’s experience was different, in that their work continued long after the Data Jam. NYC Parks supported them in honing their research pitch, and invited them to present their results to Parks officials, following a model for deeper engagement that prioritizes ongoing rather than one-off collaboration. In July 2016, Rob and Nandan presented their project to the First Deputy Commissioner and Forestry Directors at NYC Parks; in that presentation, they showed that their work could justify more funding to implement tree guards, although more research was needed.

Recently, NYC Parks has sought potential funding for further research on this project through cooperation with the [NYC Department of Environmental Protection](#) and the [United States Geological Survey](#). Nandan and Rob used the results from their original model to calculate cost-benefit analyses that justified continued research and involvement. The City and Federal departments are now developing study designs and parameters for multiple quantitative studies utilizing data from Nandan and Rob’s Data Jam project.

These results were made possible by the high level of data accuracy in the TreesCount! street tree census. TreesCount! 2015 used an innovative approach that combined site surveying with geospatial technology to derive accurate tree locations. This allowed more than 2,200 volunteers to help NYC create a comprehensive and reliable map of the urban forest.

The TreesCount! 2015 project — and Rob and Nandan’s engagement with it — represents the full cycle of Open Data’s impact. TreesCount! 2015 engaged volunteers to help NYC manage the City’s urban forest — from data collection, to analysis, to operational impact — showing how Open Data is more than a momentary step; it’s an ongoing and deeper-level engagement between residents and government.

In the Northwest Bronx, Open Data has played a major role in the efforts of [University Neighborhood Housing Program](#) (UNHP) to draw attention to multifamily residences that are physically or financially distressed. As the Program’s VaNessa LaNier explains, Open Data is “a great resource to address a specific problem, and a great research tool to enforce the work that we do and make it stronger.” By retrieving data from the Open Data Portal and other municipal sources, VaNessa and her team have created a database of distressed properties that are in need of care. Known as the Building Indicator Project, the database compiles various indicators of stress, such as building code violations ([Department of Building Violations](#)), real property data (from the Automated City Register Information System’s Real Property [Legals](#), [Parties](#), and [Masters sets](#)), and emergency repair data from 311 complaints ([311 Service Requests from 2010 to Present](#)). Based on these wide-ranging indicators, the organization creates individual scores for each multifamily residence, rating their state of distress. By harnessing the various datasets available through Open Data, VaNessa and the UNHP are helping to highlight possible areas for change towards greater equity in housing for New Yorkers.

NYC Open Data has helped content creators connect their personal experiences with City data to create interesting and informative publications. One of these creators is Shane Leese, a data scientist at real estate platform [RentHop](#). Using Open Data, RentHop models [311 Service Requests from 2010 to Present](#) and [Neighborhood Tabulation Areas](#) to create informative maps and articles that help people understand their neighborhoods. As Shane explains, NYC Open Data is helpful because he likes “using the open data to get a feel for what’s going on in different cities, and New York’s got a lot of datasets to choose from.” For Shane, everyday experiences have inspired dozens of data visualizations and studies on life in the city. For example, in one [project](#), Shane tied together data on parks ([Open Space](#)), bike paths ([Bike Routes](#)), bike stations ([CitiBike System Data](#)), and sidewalk cafes ([Legally Operating Businesses](#)) to determine which was the best neighborhood for “summer fun.” RentHop, a minority-owned startup that came out of Y Combinator in 2009, has invested in Open Data as a form of business development. By using Open Data to tell compelling, relatable stories, RentHop is expanding its brand in both New York City and other cities.

“It’s a great resource to address a specific problem, and a great research tool to enforce the work that we do, and make it stronger.”

“The importance of data in the work that I do—it’s everything, it’s the foundation.”



NYC Open Data has been a crucial component of Mary Tobin’s work addressing homelessness by increasing the incomes of at-risk individuals and families in her Brooklyn neighborhood. Mary graduated from West Point and served in Baghdad as a Communications Officer for the U.S. Army, and later worked for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. In January 2017, she was named the Director of [The Brownsville Partnership](#), a project of Community Solutions that works to change the conditions that make residents of the Brownsville neighborhood in Brooklyn vulnerable to homelessness. She came in with a bold objective: “I decided to put my flag in the ground around dramatically impacting the unemployment rate in Brownsville,” she says.

Mary describes herself as a “data person” drawing on analytical communication skills she attributes to her time in Iraq. “Open Data has given me access to information on crucial cohorts,” she says, referring to youth ages 16 through 24, single mothers, and those formerly incarcerated individuals. Data from Administration for Children’s Services on childcare issues, Department of Education data on school performance, and Department of Probation data on juvenile offenders, along with demographic data from the federal census, help Mary focus resources most effectively on the populations she targets.

The Brownsville Partnership convenes stakeholders from local workforce agencies, healthcare institutions, and social service organizations to work as a team to open opportunities and improve the quality of life for Brownsville residents. Without data, understanding issues at the hyperlocal-level relied on piecemeal and anecdotal information. Open Data supplied “critical data pieces” to build a more holistic picture. For instance,

geographically-specific data from the NYPD show that most major crimes in Brownsville have gone down significantly over the last two to three years; however, domestic violence in South Brownsville has gone up. Open Data helps tell local, evidence-based stories about the community, which has proven essential to calling community members and organizations to collective action and to raising funds for their community efforts.

Working with [VizAlytics](#), Mary built an initial data dashboard which is becoming the centerpiece of what she refers to as the “data command center.” This will be a physical space with data visualizations to inform residents and community partners about what is happening in Brownsville, using regularly refreshed neighborhood indicators based on Open Data. The geographic information software provider Esri is now lending its help as well. Mary says that community partners appreciate the centralization of up-to-date indicators on the dashboard, which serves an important communication function: the conversations that happen over the data visualizations help partners collaborate to move the needle on issues of common concern, and the community feedback prompted by the data helps Mary fine-tune what is included on the dashboard. On the importance of Open Data in this feedback loop, Mary says, “It’s everything, it’s the foundation.”

Mary is also a partner in the Mayor’s Neighborhood Innovation Lab (NIL), an initiative to build a community ideas lab addressing neighborhood concerns through cutting-edge technology. A founding member of the NIL’s Brownsville Community Technology Advisory Board, Mary and other partners will use Open Data, along with other data sources, to evaluate the effectiveness of the pilots. Open Data-savvy advisors like Mary are critical to the process.

For the [Participatory Budgeting Project \(PBP\)](#), NYC Open Data has proven useful to informing and maintaining the democratic process of Participatory Budgeting. Hadassah Damien, PBP’s Manager of Engagement Technology explains, “There’s two ways I use Open Data in my work — I push others to provide more open data, and I pull by looking at open data that exists and seeing how it can be applied to my work.” In both ways, Open Data has been pivotal to the efforts of PBP to bring direct democracy to New Yorkers. Hadassah’s team at PBP has contributed to data publishing on Open Data by supporting the New York City Council staff and IT team to [release information](#) about community projects funded through participatory budgeting. This helps community members keep track of the implementation status of projects that they and their communities voted to fund. According to Hadassah, “One thing that’s great about the open datasets that are available is that they help people learn about their neighborhoods. Community members can use specific datasets that are on the Open Data website to look up the specific metrics about their neighborhood.” Hadassah has also worked to leverage Open Data from the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to index indicators for public health by county to inform future participatory budgeting efforts to improve community health.

Harpreet Singh Wahan was among the community members who participated in an NYC Parks Open Data for All Workshop, based on a curriculum developed by BetaNYC. Harpreet, a Community Board Member in Queens, says Open Data is crucial for leaders who want to make a difference in their communities. “Thankfully, the Mayor has opened up this great information, which can be leveraged to optimize and make great policy decisions, whether it’s through analyzing tree populations or ethnographic data. Community leaders should be identified and trained, and they can in turn bring these learnings back to their communities,” he says. The president and founder of the [Flushing Interfaith Council](#), Harpreet has high hopes for using Open Data to bring people and communities together in the future, especially those of different faiths. For Harpreet, “Open Data can help bridge the gaps between faiths and bridge our cultures.” He works with the Columbia Journalism School in a partnership to bring budding journalists to different houses of worship and introduce them to different religious faiths. In an effort to promote greater understanding of the diversity of religions in New York City and the world; Open Data has helped the partnership find previously unknown houses of worship.

Improving Policy, Enforcing Compliance

The original Open Data Law required City agencies to self-submit compliance plans laying out a timeline for publishing public datasets. Last year, this requirement was updated after a package of amendments to the Open Data Law was passed; agency compliance plans now include additional legal mandates regarding Freedom of Information Law requests, response time for data requests, and update schedules (which ensure data doesn't go stale). Together, these statutory measures form a framework for locating data that is eligible for publication on the Open Data Portal by the end of 2018, as required by the Open Data Law.

In addition to strengthening New York City's already globally leading open data policy, the updated legislation requires that data from all agencies — not just select high performers — is accessible, understandable, and usable for everyone. Ensuring the City's compliance with the Open Data laws and policy is the foundation of a strong and just Open Data for All. The following legal mandates comprise this framework.

Data Retention and Archiving

Local Law 106 of 2015 mandates the preservation of the New York City historical record as represented by the City’s official data, meaning that no records may be permanently removed from the Portal. This requirement helps ensure that while data is kept up-to-date, historical information is properly retained and archived for analysis at a later date. For example, the [Department of Sanitation’s](#) PlowNYC map allows New Yorkers to see where and when their streets are cleared during a snowstorm, in close to real-time (data is updated every 15 minutes during storms). The web map, however, is only active during snow events; when a winter storm ends, the web display is cleared of information. Since last November, all [PlowNYC Data](#) has been captured on the Open Data Portal. Now, all records are retained, meaning that users can analyze plow data long after the snow has melted.

FOIL Responses and New Data Releases

Local Law 7 of 2016 requires agencies to review Freedom of Information Law requests containing data to determine whether they contained new public datasets that could be published on Open Data. This is part of a broader effort to tie the way agencies respond to these requests more closely to the way they publish datasets. To this end, this year the Open Data team required that Open Data Coordinators work directly with their agency records officers and general counsels to assemble their dataset inventories and compliance reports. Open Data is successful only when it becomes a common language at an agency—from its analytics teams to its legal division to its commissioner’s office.

Keeping Fresh

Local Law 110 of 2015 requires all data published on agency websites to be included and kept up-to-date on the Open Data Portal. This ensures that all published data is centrally discoverable and can be analyzed. Earlier this month, the [Department of Transportation](#) (DOT) published its [real-time traffic speed dataset](#), which contains records on traffic speed collected from the DOT’s traffic speed detectors. While these records were previously available in XML data format on the DOT website, they are newly available in an easy-to-use tabular format and viewable on the Open Data Portal. This automated dataset is updated every five minutes — making it the Open Data team’s closest to real-time updates.

Public requests for data

Local Law 109 of 2015 guarantees timely and thorough responses to all public requests for new datasets. This means that when users make requests for new data, Open Data Coordinators at the relevant City agencies assess those requests to determine whether the data can be made available to the public. The Department of Buildings (DOB) is one of the most popular data publishers in the City: DOB’s [Job Applications Filings](#) dataset is the most accessed on Open Data. Many users have requested access to DOB’s [Certificate of Occupancy](#) dataset, which details the legal use and occupancy of new buildings. The Agency made the release of this dataset a priority, and it was published earlier this summer. Additionally, through DOB NOW – the Agency’s new digital system that modernizes its paper-based processes – DOB continues to be responsive to the public’s demand for data by publishing eligible datasets on the [Open Data Portal](#). Across this and all City agencies, the status of new dataset requests can also be tracked on the Open Data website.

Geospatial Standards

Local Law 108 of 2015 requires that every dataset containing street addresses follow a standard format containing geospatial coordinates and political boundaries. These new standards ensure that every agency is writing addresses in the same way, making it easier for users to make maps with City data. In September, the Open Data team invited the public to contribute ideas for these address standards; guided by this feedback, the new standards require agencies to include geospatial fields most frequently captured by City agencies, information that is in highest demand from public users, as well as attributes that will have the biggest impact on citywide operations once they are standardized. This spring, the City Council published its [Participatory Budgeting Dataset](#), which fully meets the standards and is easily indexed with other geospatial datasets. This dataset includes details on all projects funded through Participatory Budgeting, a democratic process in which Council Members choose to allocate at least \$1 million from their budget through an open, community-wide decision-making process; residents propose projects, and then vote on which to fund. The Participatory Budgeting Dataset helps New Yorkers track those projects as they are implemented. Additionally, the Open Data team also released a [tracker to check](#) whether eligible datasets have been “geocoded” — the technical process of matching coordinates to addresses — to meet the standards.

Examinations and Verifications

Local Law 8 of 2016 requires MODA to examine three mayoral agencies each year to verify that all public datasets have been disclosed in their publishing plans. Last year, MODA conducted the process with [Department of Sanitation](#), [Department of Correction](#), and [Department of Housing Preservation and Development](#). MODA found all three agencies to be fully compliant with the requirements laid out by the Open Data Law, and also issued recommendations on how to improve citywide compliance with the Open Data Law. These included the recommendation that agencies proactively look for ways to publish newly collected data (that is not subject to privacy restrictions) as Open Data. For instance, the contract procuring CitiBike’s data infrastructure included a provision for making the data collected public; because this Open Data requirement was built into the technology itself, the [ride data published by CitiBike](#) is easy to access, easy to use, and in high demand. The process is being improved for this year’s examination and verification of the [Department of Buildings](#), the [Department of Environmental Protection](#), and the [Fire Department](#).

Metadata Standards

Many datasets released on the Open Data Portal are raw data, and may never have surfaced outside of an agency. Local Law 107 of 2015 requires every dataset to have a “data dictionary,” written in accessible language. Data dictionaries help define the different columns of data and describe how the data was collected. In December, the Open Data team hosted a session with Reinvent Albany and a group of high-frequency Open Data users to collaborate on a new data dictionary template, which agencies can use to provide the most useful contextual information. Many agencies are now using this template, including the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, which recently published [neighborhood air quality data](#) from the New York City Community Air Survey. In addition, thanks to a product-wide update from the City’s vendor Socrata, each dataset now has a “primer,” a unique landing page with information imported from data dictionaries to guide users before they dive into the data.

Participating Agencies

Each City agency’s data publishing effort is led by a dedicated Open Data Coordinator. This year, 45 smaller offices appointed new Open Data Coordinators bringing the total to 96 participating agencies, listed here.

Local Law 108 of 2015: Geospatial and Street Address Standards

Local Law 108 of 2015 requires that every public data set containing address information utilize a standard field layout, and include corresponding community district and geospatial reference data. It also requires that any agency that cannot utilize the standard field layout report to “the department” (DoITT) and the Council the reasons why it cannot in this report.

For any dataset on the NYC Open Data Portal that includes row-level address fields, agencies must meet the following standard, as specified in the §4.1.1.2 of the Technical Standards Manual. These attributes should appear on the Portal according to a standard column naming convention. Whenever possible, agencies should separate core address information into five standard column fields: “NUMBER,” “STREET,” “UNIT,” “POSTCODE,” and “BOROUGH.”

Agencies are also required, with technical guidance from the Open Data team, to include eight standard column fields of core geospatial reference information: “LATITUDE,” “LONGITUDE,” “COMMUNITY BOARD,” “COUNCIL DISTRICT,” “CENSUS TRACT,” “BIN” (Building Identification Number), “BBL” (Borough-Block-Lot), and “NTA” (Neighborhood Tabulation Area).

The Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications and the Mayor’s Office of Data Analytics continue to partner with agencies to ensure all data sets meet this standard. For years, agencies have captured information in a number of address formats, maintained in a number of different systems, using a number of technologies. DoITT underestimated the time needed to execute on this task and are behind schedule in meeting this mandate. As a technology service provider for NYC agencies, DoITT will be doing the majority of this work.

Because a large number of agencies will rely on DoITT to fulfill this requirement, this report does not individually specify the reasons agencies are not able to provide core reference data, nor the date in which the agency expects to do so. Even though every dataset that requires core geospatial reference data does not currently have it, DoITT is aggressively exploring all options to make sure this work is completed by November 30, 2017, one year after the effective date of Local Law 108 of 2015.

The following dataset serves as a record of known data sets eligible under this standard, along with the progress that has been made toward standard addresses across all Open Data datasets.

In prioritizing our work to ensure standardized addresses, the team will take into consideration the following criteria:

- » **Public feedback**—We value the thoughts and suggestions of our users, and invite everyone to let us know the data sets they would most quickly like to see include the fields required by this law and technical standard.
- » **Data set popularity**—We will look at metrics including downloads, views, searches, and others in determining the most popular data sets on the portal, which will be prioritized accordingly.
- » **Resource availability**—The Open Data Team and City agencies have varying resource availability throughout the year. We will prioritize work to ensure efficiency on all ends.
- » **Agency needs**—As more agencies turn to Open Data for data publishing and reporting, we will accordingly prioritize work to help them reach their goals.

updated on the single web portal within one day of any such automated update.” In addition “If there is a public data set for which such update schedule regularly cannot be met, the agency that maintains such public data set shall report to the department the reasons why it cannot meet such update schedule and the date by which the agency expects that it will be able to meet such schedule.”

OVERSIGHT ON ANNUAL OPEN DATA PLAN AND 2017 AMENDMENTS TO OPEN DATA LAW

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 20, 2017

Good afternoon. My name is James Perazzo, Deputy Director for Strategic Management at the Mayor's Office of Operations and Acting Director of the Mayor's Office of Data Analytics, also known as MODA. I'm joined by Albert Webber, Director of Open Data at the Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications. We are here today to speak about the way MODA and DoITT have worked together over the last year to fulfill the requirements of the City's Open Data Law and implement the Administration's *Open Data for All* vision. On behalf of the Administration, I'd like to extend gratitude to this committee, under the leadership of Chair Vacca, for the attention and care shown to Open Data over the past several years.

I'd like to begin by describing the structure of the City's Open Data program. MODA is the City's hub for advanced data analytics and advocates for the use of Open Data in citywide projects and in communities. DoITT manages the technical operations of data publishing with City agencies and our vendor partner, Socrata. Over 90 City agencies have a designated Open Data Coordinator, who serves as the primary point of contact with MODA and DoITT and works with their agencies' data owners to publish eligible datasets. These three entities, along with our partners in City Council and the civic tech community, work together to make City data open and accessible to New Yorkers.

2016-2017 HIGHLIGHTS

Since its announcement of *Open Data for All* in July 2015, the Administration has been unrelenting in its efforts to put data in the hands of more New Yorkers. We strive to make the Open Data Portal a more user-friendly and accessible tool for anyone interested in using City data. Consider a few highlights since last year's hearing:

- The Open Data Portal received over 3 million hits in Fiscal Year 2017, with approximately 140,000 average monthly users.
- The Open Data Portal now has a new website, designed in partnership with the Open Data community through a human-centered design process.
- The Park's Computer Resource Centers piloted a data literacy effort to teach New Yorkers how to analyze and map the City's street tree census data.
- We celebrated the five-year anniversary of the original, pioneering NYC Open Data Law in March with the City's first "Open Data Week," produced collaboratively with the civic tech community.
- In a partnership with the City's Commission on Human Rights, MODA used several datasets from the Open Data Portal to optimize where inspectors search for landlords who are illegally discriminating against potential tenants.

In addition, dozens of agencies continued to release high-value datasets, bringing the total number of datasets on the Open Data Portal to more than 1,700. We published EMS incident dispatch numbers from the Fire Department and detailed NYPD complaint data.

We also published the City Council's dataset on Participatory Budgeting (PB), which is an open, community decision-making process that allows constituents to choose how to spend public dollars. Each record in this dataset represents a project a New Yorker nominated and got funded through the PB process. The dataset includes a plain-language data dictionary and is easily mapped against other datasets through its standardized geospatial coordinates and political districts, fully complying with the 2015 amendments to the Open Data Law.

MODA is currently partnering with PBNYC to give this year's cohort of participants educational resources on NYC Open Data, helping them better understand how datasets from, for example, NYCHA, NYPD, the Department of Education, and other agencies can give context and add specificity to their PBNYC proposals.

FOCUS ON USERS

We highlighted this and other examples of the full Open Data impact cycle in the *2017 Open Data for All Report*, which MODA and DoITT submitted to City Council and the public in July. Readers were also invited to submit their feedback on a digital, open-source version of the report, which received more than 12,000 hits in the two months since it went live. The highlight of the report was the stories of the land use advocates, local start-ups, community boards, CUNY students, and inter-faith organizers – New Yorkers from all five boroughs – who are using Open Data to improve their communities. Our approach to the report reflects our belief that showing the faces behind City data is how we spur even greater use.

The Report highlights green-infrastructure researchers who used their analysis of open data to start a conversation with NYC Parks and the Department of Environmental Protection about how a new model could improve storm water collection in the City. It describes an automated dashboard of neighborhood indicators, used by community partners to combat joblessness in Brownsville, Brooklyn.

These stories and the others in the Report make up just a handful of the 140,000 New Yorkers who visit the Open Data Portal each month, about 60,000 of whom are new to the platform. In order to ensure we are not only increasing the number of users, but also optimizing their experience, we have undertaken significant efforts in the past year to better understand their needs.

When results from a graduate capstone MODA facilitated with Columbia researchers indicated that new users didn't know how to get started with Open Data, MODA and DoITT worked with high-frequency community users to design for their needs. This resulted in a new look for the Open Data Portal this spring, as well as a new customer service application that allows the team to better respond to users' requests while collecting for help and collect data on inquiry types – a new process that is resulting in continuous improvement to the Open Data platform.

PROPOSED NEW LEGISLATION

The existing Open Data Law requires that data from all agencies — not only select high performers — be published in a way that is accessible, understandable, and usable for everyone. Ensuring the City's compliance with the Open Data laws and policies is the foundation of strong and just *Open Data for All*. For this reason, we support the goals of Introductions 1707 and 1528.

In particular, the extension of the Open Data mandate will allow our program to accommodate new datasets that are created by City agencies. In this year's Open Data compliance plan, for example, City agencies identified over one hundred new datasets that had not previously been disclosed. This was not due to any delinquency on the part of the agency's Open Data Coordinator, but because new data systems are constantly coming online, and data that may not have previously qualified as a "public dataset" is now eligible for publication. Extending the legal mandate to publish datasets past December 2018 is a key priority for the Administration.

Formalizing the role of Open Data Coordinators and disclosing the names of datasets used to respond to FOIL requests will further enhance our goal of forming communities of practice around Open Data City agencies. For example, while the Office of the Mayor had previously been serviced by a single Open Data Coordinator, MODA worked with the Mayor's Office of Operations this spring to recruit Open Data Coordinators for all forty of the smaller offices that make up the "office of the mayor." Additionally, this year the Open Data team required that Open Data Coordinators work directly with their agency records officers and general counsels to assemble their dataset inventories and compliance reports. We found this to be an effective way to ensure that data publishers were interacting with their legal counsel, and as a result, we received a 100% reporting rate from eligible City agencies.

CONCLUSION

From street furniture to road quality, and from taxi trips to parking meters to small businesses, New Yorkers interact with their City government every day. Because we have a good Open Data Law, this information is available, for free, online. The extension of the law will allow us to continue to ensure that, as the City becomes more data-driven, it also becomes more open and transparent.

We are excited to continue to partner with the City Council to extend the law and optimize technical standards to allow Open Data to continue to thrive through changing technological environments. I would like to thank the Committee on Technology for the opportunity to testify today and for its ongoing support of Open Data. I'd also like to thank BetaNYC, BureauBlank, Carto, and Reboot, and all of our many community collaborators whose support makes this work possible. At this point, I'd like to turn it over to Albert Webber, who will discuss the administration's perspective on the proposed legislation in more detail.

Testimony before the New York City Council Committee on Technology

Oversight: Annual Open Data Plan

My name is Gale Brewer, and I am the Manhattan Borough President. I want to thank Chairman Vacca and the members of the Committee on Technology for holding this hearing. As you may know, I was the primary sponsor of Local Law 11 of 2012, the Open Data Law, as a member of the City Council. As Borough President, I am working closely with the Administration to ensure its adequate implementation and am pleased to be partnering with Chair Vacca and civic tech organizations on the future of open data in New York City.

Implementing the Open Data Law continues to be a major undertaking, and I would like to thank Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications (DoITT) Commissioner Anne M. Roest and Chief Technology Officer Miguel Gamiño for their efforts. The excellent work of DoITT, the Mayor's Office of Data Analytics (MODA), and the Mayor's Office of Technology and Innovation make me confident that New York City will continue to lead the nation in municipal data initiatives.

It became the leader as soon as then-Mayor Bloomberg signed my bill into law, establishing the first large-scale municipal open data portal that was not a regulation or ordinance. This is an important point to make as we are seeing first-hand how quickly and quietly government transparency can be eliminated by fiat. Immediately after the inauguration on January 20th, 2017, the federal government began removing information from its websites that had been published in the name of public access and shared knowledge. There is no federal law to protect public information from an administration that does not believe in facts or transparency.

By contrast, we are assembled here today to discuss making our transparency laws stronger and more effective. I support Intro 1528, sponsored by Chair Vacca. Reporting the names of public datasets that are requested under the Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) is within the spirit of both FOIL and the Open Data law. I also support amending Intro 1528 to allow DOITT to consider which license would make the City's data sets free and open for public use in perpetuity.

Together, Chair Vacca and I recently introduced Intro 1707, to further integrate open data reporting into the workflows and culture of our civil servants, while giving advocates of transparency more tools to analyze and respond to the City's open data methodology. Intro 1707 would also support the work of the Mayor's office with the open data coordinators who guide their agencies towards compliance, by making the position a required one for every agency. Along with open data advocates like Reinvent Albany and BetaNYC, the open data coordinators are the unsung heroes who make New York City the leader in open data that we are today. Congratulations to you all. The new requirements in this bill for the collection, analysis, and public reporting of Open Data Portal analytics will support your efforts and strengthen your legacy.

All legislation needs some tweaking to enhance its potential and this bill is no different. For example, the text creates some confusion about the 2021 deadline for agency compliance. I believe that the language should be clarified to state the original 2018 compliance deadline is still in effect, and that the Intro 1707 is extending the law itself to 2021. The open data coordinators of each agency are working very hard to meet that 2018 deadline and give New Yorkers a full selection of their city government's publishable data.

One final element that I would like to see added to the bill is a safeguard to this system that we have all worked so hard to build and improve. Were New Yorkers to one day elect a mayor like the current leader of our federal executive, open data would be endangered. We know now that our democracy is only as strong as the institutions that serve as its pillars and the laws and advocates who support them. I believe that we must provide a private right-of-action to protect the New York City municipal open data apparatus from a future administration that does not wish to operate it in good faith as the current and previous administrations have done.

In my testimony last year I described my then-future plans to work with Noel Hidalgo from BetaNYC and the CUNY Service Fellows to build new tools making open data more useful to the unique needs of Manhattan's 12 community boards. This year I am happy to report that their work was successful. This Saturday we will be announcing a 311 data visualization tool that was built from the ground up for community boards. I would especially like to thank Mary McCormick from the Fund for the City of New York and the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation for making the program and its success possible.

Thank you giving me the opportunity to testify today.

Open Data Oversight and Int 1707-2017, Int 1528-2017

Good afternoon Chair Vacca and members of the Technology Committee. I am John Kaehny, Executive Director of Reinvent Albany and co-chair of the NYC Transparency Working Group.

Thank you, Chairman Vacca, for your energetic advocacy for open data. This is probably your last open data hearing, and, on behalf of the Transparency Working Group, I want to thank your great work and hope we can send you off in style.

This hearing is both an oversight hearing of ongoing Open Data Law mandates and a chance to comment on two bills, Int 1707-2017, Int 1528-2017.

Oversight

First, oversight --- what's working and not working. The good news is that New York City has an open data culture, a public expectation that government data will be online

in a usable form. In 2012, New York City passed the first Open Data Law in the world, and thankfully, the Mayor and Council support this and fund a smart Open Data Team. City Council cares and does effective oversight. City agencies have published about 1,600 datasets, including 200 automated datasets. Let me flag that. We think automating data sets is the single most important thing that the Open Data Team can do to make Open Data sustainable. (“Automated” datasets automatically update on the Open Data Portal from a City computer.) Every dataset that can be automated should be, and the Open Data Team should have an automation plan and public targets.

Another key to open data is getting City agencies to use it and understand how it makes their work easier. Most experts believe that ultimately, by far the biggest consumer of government open data will be government. We expect City agencies to save tens of millions a year from open data as agency staff spend less time looking for information for their own everyday use and responding to Freedom of Information requests.

We are seeing the insights and information provided by Open Data in everyday public life. Data sets like 311, NYPD crime data and DOT’s traffic crash data are a regular feature of neighborhood and community board meetings, City Council meetings and news articles. Digital businesses are using Department of Building data to instantly inform building owners of violations, and transportation planners are using TLC trip data sets to map neighborhood activity. Just yesterday, the national blog, Five Thirty Eight, ran a great story about the lingering effects of Hurricane Sandy based on calls to 311 pulled from the Open Data Portal.

Specific Oversight Issues

Last year, the Council passed seven amendments to the Open Data Law. To track whether a dataset is complying with these mandates, one has to look at four separate spreadsheets. We have not merged the spreadsheets or done detailed analysis, but we find this form of reporting extremely cumbersome and time consuming. We strongly recommend that information about all public datasets, whether they are published or unpublished, be listed in a single dataset and all information about the status of that dataset be included data fields. Otherwise, monitoring agency compliance is impractical.

Compliance Data

- **Data Dictionaries:** 1648 listed. 615 data sets have data dictionaries, 1033 do not.
- **Address / geospatial Standardization:** 350 listed. 206 have standardized.

Publishing

The core of the 2012 Open Data Law is a requirement that agencies publish all of their “public datasets” by the end of 2018. The agencies are supposed to propose an annual publishing schedule and then report on their progress. Unfortunately, the City’s reporting is very confusing. The public can see what is actually on the portal, but it is hugely time consuming to try and track whether agencies are meeting their publishing targets. We looked at six datasets that agencies said they would publish in 2014. Parks Department *Street Tree* (two data sets), FDNY *Fire Incident Information*, School Construction Authority *Funded Capacity Seats* and HRA *Cash Assistance Engagement*.

Four of those appeared in later publishing plans, but then never appeared in the Open Data Portal. What happened to this data?

Agency Procrastination

It is fairly obvious that many agencies are procrastinating and delaying the scheduled publication of their public data in the hope that day will never arrive. Agencies have a whopping 102 data sets scheduled for publication in the second half of 2018, including 70 scheduled for December 2018. This is baloney. It's like a highschool kid saying they will turn in all of their homework on the last of school.

Intro 1528-2017 (Open Data/FOIL) and Intro 1707-2017 (Open Data Update)

Intro 1528-2017

We strongly support Intro 1528-2017 which amends Local Law 7 of 2016 to add the name of the public dataset agencies use when they reply to a Freedom of Information Law request for tabular data.

Intro 1528-2017

We have extensive comments on Intro 1528-2017, some of which we conveyed to Chair Vacca and the administration prior to this hearing. We believe this legislation should have three main goals:

1. Clarify that the Open Data Law will continue past 2018.
2. Strengthen the mandate for agencies to continue to publish public data sets.

3. Foster a sustainable open data process by promoting the automation of data sets.

There is universal interest in ensuring that the Open Data Law continues past the December 2018 publishing deadline. The 2012 Open Data Law established a six-year publishing schedule that has helped to prod agencies. While it made sense initially, we believe that a three year extension of the publishing schedule to 2021 will give an excuse for agencies to procrastinate on publishing their public data even more than they already have. We suggest the following:

Recommendations:

- Keep 2018 deadline. Delete any mention of 2021 extension.
- Draft new bill language that makes it clear that the 2018 deadline is still in place and that public data sets created after that time must be published within twelve months* of their creation. (*Twelve months seems reasonable, but this would best be determined in consultation with the administration.)
- Require an annual update / compliance plan that summarizes status of published, scheduled to be published and delayed public data sets, including compliance with mandates created by the Open Data Law amendments.

Strengthen existing mandate to publish data sets by requiring a new “Status of All Public Data Sets” dataset on the Open Data Portal:

Because there is no public right of action in the Open Data Law, the public relies on Council oversight and the “naming and shaming” of laggard agencies to get public data

sets published. Unfortunately, there is no single dataset of public data sets that lists all agency data sets and their publishing status or compliance with open data mandates. (Data dictionaries, geospatial etc.) There is no complete list, or easy way to track datasets that have been delayed for multiple years. This lack of transparency, reduces accountability and reduces pressure on agencies to comply with the Open Data Law.

Recommendations re: new “Status of All Public Data Sets” dataset:

- Add bill language that mandates the creation of a single, *Status of All Public Data Sets*, dataset. This Status dataset should include all datasets that have been classified as public datasets and data fields that include all information about that dataset. There should NOT be multiple datasets tracking compliance with the Open Data Law Amendments and Annual Plans. This one dataset should list all information about publishing status and mandate compliance for every dataset as fields in a master list. The *Status* dataset should include all information about all public datasets including the following fields for each dataset:
 1. Original scheduled publication.
 2. Current scheduled publication.
 3. Publication date (if published).
 4. Current status of dataset if delayed and reason for delay.
 5. Reason for unpublishing from portal (if unpublished.)
 6. Compliance with mandates established under the Open Data Law Amendments including data dictionaries, geospatial data etc.

Foster sustainability of Open Data Initiative by automating datasets

We believe it is hugely important to automate as many data sets as possible.

Recommendation: Add bill language that requires the following fields in the *Status of All Datasets* dataset:

1. Whether dataset is automated.
2. Whether dataset can be automated.
3. When dataset is scheduled for automation (if it can be.)
4. Reason for not automating if dataset can be automated.

Comments on other items included in the bill

We support --- review of Technical Standards Manual every two years

We oppose --- extending publishing deadline to 2021 (see above).

We support --- change of compliance plan deadline from July to September.

We support --- Designating agency open data coordinator.

We support --- publishing web portal site analytics

Public Right of Action

Reinvent Albany and our colleagues in the NYC Transparency Working Group strongly support as private right of action be included in the Open Data Law. When the Open Data Law was originally proposed in 2011/2012 it included a private right of action, which was removed after adamant opposition from the Law Department. We again note that the Open Data Law is one of a small handful of NYC laws that does include a private right of action.

To the NYC Committee on Technology & Chairperson Vacca,

Introduction to Testimony:

Thank you for this opportunity to throw our support for Intro 1707-2017 and 1528-2017. As a community representative, I want to briefly agnolish the great work of those who have come before us and paved a path for us to follow. BetaNYC would not be here if it wasn't for the pioneering work of GISMO, Fund for the City of New York, NYPIRG, Transportation Alternatives, and others who have helped shaped our community's understanding.

This committee's present and previous leadership has made NYC the most robust open data city in the world. From my travels, the world looks to NYC for its open data leadership. Today, I will share how we can stay ahead.

NYC School of Data

To celebrate the 5th anniversary of the city's open data law, inaugurate NYC's open data week, and celebrate international open data day, over 350 people attended NYC School of Data. In its second year, we've ironed out a platform that empowers community and government to collaborate. This year's conference helped community based organizations learn how to use the city's data, helped individuals level up their analytic skills, and build stronger collaborations across the city.

Data Jams

In the last 15 months, we've hosted two agency related data jams and on the eve of our third. As highlighted in the City's own open data report, we're helping agencies explore their data questions and derive new operational insights. We believe in a structure formula that combines civic engagement with government stakeholders to address operational questions. In the coming year, we look forward to working with other agencies to hone this model.

To continue our event programs, NYC School of Data and Data Jams, we would love to have municipal support and help cover operational costs. We make sure our events are open and accessible by providing classes, healthy food options, and free onsite childcare. We could use city support ensuring that these programs are accessible to all who want to attend.

Civic Innovation Fellows

We are embarking on our third collaborative year with the Manhattan Borough President Gale A Brewer. In that time, we've exposed 25 CUNY undergraduates to the City's municipal infrastructure and educated them on the value of open data.

In the last two years, we've moved beyond open data and mapped out community board district office technical needs. This past year, we've build BoardStat, a tool that simplifies Community Board access to NYC 311 service request data. In collaboration with the Manhattan Borough President's office, we will launch this tool at this weekend's NYC 311 Data Jam.

Additionally, we have outlined how boards can digitize their attendance tracking and an ideal future of community board websites. Our hope is to get the city's 59 community boards to use and produce structured data. If we ever want to ask siri or alexa, "when is my next community board meeting?" we will need this data structure.

In the next year, we hope to have funds and document how community boards self organize their information flows. We will use this research to outline new open data trainings and build new dashboards.

To continue our civic innovation programs, we would love to have municipal support and help cover operational costs. Our goal is to affect community boards citywide, but can only afford to raise funds to support the Borough of Manhattan. We could use city support ensuring this program scales to all five Boroughs.

Future of NYC's open data program

Five years in we still seem to have significant open data inequality. Though our research we continue to find agencies confused about open data, data standards, and machine readability.

Primary example is NYC DOT and their East River Bicycle counts. Every day, I go over an East River bridge and activate a sensor recording my ride. When I go to the DOT's website, I can't access this data. Instead, I get a PDF or a [link to the City's open data portal](#).

When I visit the portal, I get a button to download a compressed file with five formatted excel spreadsheets. These files are formatted for human legibility not machine readability. If this was truly a smart city, we would have long embraced a gamification, made this sensor data accessible to the public, and celebrated healthy public transport.

Where open data can be automated, we want it.

We are excited to see language around a two year review of the technical standards manual. We hope this bi-annual review helps educate agencies and gets them to comply with the law.

We are a bit concerned that the current language in intro 1707-2017. The current working seems to pushes the 2018 deadline to 2021. Ideally, we like to keep the existing deadline, and have language that continues the city's open data mandate.

Compliance with existing open data laws

In preparation of these remarks, I was going to point back to the DOT and highlight that they haven't made their street closures data machine readable. When you visit the DOT's website, you will not find a link to the DOT's Street Closures due to construction activities by block dataset. Yet, there it is on the open data portal! It appears that someone went through the process to automate this database. Frustratingly, this dataset doesn't seem subject to local law 108 of 2015, the law pertaining to geospatial data standards.

As a cyclist, I've been asking for this dataset for the last two years. Why? I prefer to ride in bike lanes. When lanes literally disappear from underneath my tires, I am subject to extreme danger with very little warning. (Sidenote, rarely does DOT put up signs to warn cyclists that streets will be milled.)

This summer, a one mile long bike lane was torn up for two months. Every day, I would have to go out of my way to see how far the DOT milled. Then, wait till they would start resurfacing the road, and wait some more for them to completely surface the road. Having this dataset incorporated into a transit app would be another step toward a smarter city.

Today, I'm happy to see we are one step closer, but this is one of 1550 data sets that isn't geocode in a way that complies with the Geospatial Open Data Standards.

A dataset of datasets

As part of the Local Law 108 of 2015, the city produces a dataset of datasets that reports out which datasets conform to the law and which one will conform to the law.

Nowhere do we get a list of datasets that give other granular data. For example, I want to know which datasets are coded for council districts, community district, or have some other mappable points. In the same way we would love to see greater sensor frequency,

We would love to have greater data on the city's data. To that end, we would love to see a data set that shows which datasets are subject to which open data laws, are they in compliance, and, if not, how close are they to that compliance.

As we are discussing 1528-2017, it would be good to know which FOIL requests lead to open data sets and which data sets came from FOIL requests.

We are concerned about intro 1707-2017's vague language around "web portal analytics." We believe that the language should be phrased to protect individual and location privacy.

Private right of action

Also, it is clear that NYC's open data law needs some form a private protection. Sooner or later, we will get a Mayor who refuses to understand the benefits of transparency and accountability. As open data users, we need the ability to protect this access.

As your last mark on five great years, cement your open data legacy by giving us a private right of action.

Thank you for four great years of turning our open data advocacy into action. We strongly support intro 1707-2017 and 1528-2017.

Good afternoon,

My name is Mary Tobin and I have the honor of serving the community of Brownsville Brooklyn as the Director of the Brownsville Partnership, an initiative of the nonprofit Community Solutions. At Community Solutions we work very hard to end homelessness and the conditions of poverty that create it, and at the core of everything we do is data. The Brownsville Partnership strategic plan focuses on engages residents and partner organizations from many sectors in measurably improving the health, safety and economic prosperity of the Brownsville, which simply means we want to see people find jobs, live in a safer environment, and obtain a higher quality of life. How does data help us do that? We take existing neighborhood data on everything from health, to crime, to education, and unemployment. We then analyze that data to highlight any inefficiencies and gaps in existing systems that serve the neighborhood we work in. We then use those insights to direct problem-solving efforts where they need to be applied. For example, in our Brownsville Employment Pathways Initiative, where we work on ways to increase the overall number of people from Brownsville gain employment, our early analysis of the Brownsville data has revealed that there are 3 critical cohorts within the general populace of Brownsville, who are facing the most difficulty obtaining employment. Given the unique barriers to employment these three cohorts face, the Brownsville Partnership strategy has been to more actively engage with the employers who work to employ with these specific cohorts. This strategy has resulted in meaningful conversations with public agencies and other nonprofits around how to improve employment outcomes. This strategy also allows organizations like mine with limited money, personnel, and time, to direct our resources to the areas and the people that need them the most. We won't stop there, as we are currently in partnership with key organizations, using data to improve outcomes for our most vulnerable population, children ages 0-3.

Because of the foresight of the leaders in this room and the work of the NYC Open Data Team, organizations like mine are able to begin to pinpoint the most critical issues in neighborhoods like Brownsville, as we work together with the residents and community based organizations to pool our own resources, test our own strategies, and solve our own challenges. We truly do believe that we can begin to move the needle on poverty, but we aren't there yet, which is why continuing to leverage programs like these is critical to our work. For the work that my team does every day in a neighborhood I have come to love as my own, data is not just spreadsheets and charts – it represents a life that deserves the opportunity to thrive in conditions that other Americans enjoy every single day. Thank you for your time and consideration. Hope is truly inside of Brownsville.
