We will also be voting on Proposed Intro No. 1210-A, sponsored by Council Member Torres, which would require HPD to create a speculation watch list of rent-regulated buildings where tenants may be at risk of being displaced.

We will also be voting on Proposed Intro No. 152-C, sponsored by Council Member Lander, which would create a certificate of no harassment pilot program for buildings in rezoned neighborhoods and certain other buildings.

The final bill we'll be voting on is

Proposed Intro No. 1721-A, sponsored by myself, which
would expand the definition of harassment to include
acts or omissions related to certain violations of
the construction code.

I'm proud of these bills; the ones on cranes are part of our dedication to make sure that construction sites are safe for workers and for the public, and the other bills have to do with harassment, another priority of not only this committee, but the Council as a whole and I think we've taken it much further than a lot of people expected. Unfortunately, we're gonna have to keep coming back, because as we move, scrupulous landlords

get more creative -- just a warning; we're not gonna give up and we're gonna always do our best to stay one step ahead. [background comments]

So I'm gonna allow my colleagues who would like to do opening statements to do one, and I think Council Member Lander will.

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you, Chair Williams. I've been working on the certificate of no harassment I think for about 15 years; I'll take just a minute to explain why I'm excited about it and I wanna thank you for chairing the hearing today.

As you articulated, unfortunately for some unscrupulous landlords in New York City, and especially in neighborhoods where rents are rising, harassing tenants becomes just part of the business plan, because once a tenant is driven out, the landlord can make significant renovations or demolish and rebuild, enabling them to dramatically raise rents, so even while we've taken significant steps to prevent harassment through this Committee and in this Council -- through legislation, proactive enforcement; providing legal counsel -- harassment of rent-regulated tenants remains a real significant The certificate of no harassment problem.

Under the new law, covered building owners who are seeking permits for demolition or significant alteration of their building will have to prove that they have not engaged in harassment before they get their permits, and if after evidence is provided in a hearing a landlord is found to have harassed tenants; then they won't be able to pull those permits for five years unless they submit to a very significant cure requirement of 20-25 percent of the building permanently affordable at or below an average of 50% AMI, in addition to what's ever required of MIH or 421-a; they cannot satisfy those obligations with these units, and with no additional public subsidy, so a severe cure or a five-year delay if you're trying to demolish or significantly alter a building that is essentially the fruit of having harassed your tenants.

There's been a program like this in place in Hell's Kitchen since 1974 and for single-room-occupancy buildings, the effort to expand it citywide, which tenants have been advocating for for

2	a very long time, comes out of an agreement made wher
3	we adopted the Mandatory Inclusionary Housing
4	program; the de Blasio Administration, HPD and the
5	Council agreed to convene a task force which had a
6	wide range of stakeholders building owners, tenant
7	advocates, attorneys; a range of folks; we met for a
8	year and I wanna say an appreciation to Council
9	Member Williams and Council Member Rosenthal for
10	serving on the task force, along with all those
11	representatives, and we now have this proposal on the
12	table for a 36-month pilot program to expand that
13	certificate of harassment requirement to certain
14	buildings citywide I'll just be really brief about
15	this but citywide it would cover any building
16	where there's been a court finding for a New York
17	State Housing Community renewal finding of
18	harassment, any building where a full vacate order
19	has been issued or any building in the Alternative
20	Enforcement Program, and then in eleven targeted
21	community districts eight mostly low-income
22	neighborhoods where harassment has really been found
23	to be a problem, plus the three neighborhoods, the
24	three Community Boards that have been rezoned thus

far in the Administration; in those eleven Council

Members, a broader range of buildings will be

3 covered. HPD has developed a Building Distress Index

4 | that will flag factors that make a building somewhat

5 likely to be a place of harassment -- recent

6 ownership changes or poor building conditions -- and

7 | in addition, neighborhoods will be added to the

8 program as they are part of a City-sponsored

9 neighborhood rezoning.

We think it'll have a very strong impact in providing a real deterrent or reason not to engage in harassment as part of the business plan in general and a very significant consequence if a landlord is found to have done that and then wants to demolish or significantly alter their buildings.

Lots of folks worked on this over the last year, so I wanna say a big thank yous to Meagan Chen, Ed Atkin, Jeff Baker, and Jen Wilcox for lots and lots of redrafting and work on the legislation; huge thanks to my Policy Director Annie Levers, who helped co-coordinate that task force and has worked tirelessly on the legislation.

I won't name here, since I guess I'll do it on the floor, all of the HPD and administration staff, but this really was a model of partnership;
