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3 CHAIRPERSON CONSTANTINIDES: Alright, 4 good afternoon. I am Costa Constantinides, Chair of 5 the Environmental Protection Committee, and today the 6 committee will hear a vote-hear and vote on Intro 7 1465-A, a bill amending the Administrative Code in 8 relation to the use of fossil fuels in New York City, 9 and intro 1300-A, a bill amending the Administrative 10 Code in relation to noise mitigation plans. 11 1465 shortens the time that power plants can burn the 12 dirtiest fuels. Currently, power plants can burn Fuel Oil number grade-Fuel Oil Grade No. 6 until 13 14 2020, and Fuel Oil Grade No. 4 until 2030. Under 15 this bill, power plants would have the option of either: (1) continuing to burn fuel oil Grade No. 6 16 17 until 2021, but switching immediately thereafter to Fuel Oil Grade No. 2, or secondly, switching from 18 19 Fuel Oil Grade No. 4 to Fuel Oil Grade No. 2 by 2025 20 instead of 2030. According to one report, No. 4 Oil 21 is-that is used in the city is typically a mix of No. 2.2 6 and No. 2 Oil in 50/50 proportion. Like 6 and 2 23 Oils, No. 4 is defined by physical and performance 24 specifications that it meets. No. 6 and No. 4 Oil are used in large stationary engines, power plants 25

COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION and large building boilers, and can contain sulfur, nickel, and other impurities. Combustion of these fuels emit unburned-unburned fuels in the form of soot, which spews out of exhaust stacks and chimneys, or which coats boiler and combustion equipment. Because of their sulfur content burning No. 6 and No. 4 Oils also releases significant qualities or particulate matter into the air. Switching from No. 4 to No. 2 eliminates the emission of harmful nickel. Currently in New York's area-in New York City area is still in violation or non-attainment of the Clean Air Act Ozone standard. Low ozone levels is produced at low-low-low-level ozone is produced in part from nitrous oxides emitted by various sources including from boilers burning fuel oil. With Intro 1465-A, the city could see a significant drop in nitrous oxides from power plants. This legislation will also save lives being lost to asthma, and prevent hospital room visits due to asthma, heart and lung disease. As someone who represents a community that is surrounded by power plants and see that the western most portion of my district zip codes No. 101, 102 and 106 have asthma rates, ER admissions and

hospitalizations that are above the borough average

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COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION of Queens, and they're situated next to these power plants seeing the-the lessening of the burning of these fossil fuel oils will be a great victory for our community and for all communities, and we need to-I'm-I'm glad to be able to do this today. 1300-A amends the Noise Code to require that each contract post a noise mitigation plan for the construction project on site. Noise mitigation plans must provide in detail the noise mitigation strategies, methods, procedures, and technology that will be used to limit sound from a variety of construction equipment and activities. Both laws seek to reduce the unnecessary air and noise pollution while equitably protecting all New Yorkers. I recommend a yes vote on both pieces of legislation. I do want to thank Ritchie Torres who is the lead sponsor on 1465 for helping us get this over thehelping us get this done. Obviously, again as I said, a big win for our communities that are adjacent to power plants who too often are Environmental Justice communities, and are impacted significantly in the form of asthma by these fuel oils being burned.
