4 CHAIRPERSON VACCA: Good morning 5 everyone. My name is James Vacca, and I'm Chair of 6 the New York City Council Committee on Technology, 7 and I'd like to welcome everyone here today for our 8 vote. I'd like to indicate we've been joined by my 9 colleagues Council Member Annabel Palma, Joe Borelli, 10 and Barry Grodenchik. We're here to vote on Intro 11 1696-A, which I have proposed. The legislation will 12 establish a task force that examines city agencies' 13 usage of automated decision systems namely algorithms 14 and predicative analytics. This legislation requires 15 the Mayor or his designee to convene this task force 16 and for the task force to issue a public report, which will include specific recommendations on city 17 18 agencies can be transparent and accountable when they 19 deploy automated systems to make or assist in making 20 decision-making rules, policies or actions that 21 impact the public. Increasingly, these tools are deployed throughout city agencies to evaluate 2.2 23 communities, and individuals and to make 24 determinations about services and penalties. While 25 they can provide immense benefits, algorithmic tools

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2 are not without issue. They seem to offer objectivity, but we must be cognizant of the fact 3 4 that algorithms are simply a way of encoding assumptions, that they're designed to be biased, and 5 that the very data they process can be flawed. Yet, 6 despite their importance to government operations and 7 8 their potential problems algorithmic tools have 9 remained hidden from the public view. The task for established from this legislation will begin to 10 11 addresses these issues. It will examine and report 12 on ways to make information about these systems 13 publicly available and understandable. It will 14 develop mechanisms to determine if automated decision 15 systems disproportionately impact individuals based 16 on protected classes, and recommend procedures to 17 address instances in which a person is harmed by such 18 systems. There are a number of potential ways to 19 ensure algorithmic accountability and to my knowledge 20 we are the first city and the first legislative body 21 of any size in this country to take this issue on. I'm confident this task force will make 2.2 23 recommendations that lead to greater accountability and transparency, and as with so many other things, 24 I'm hoping New York can set an example for cities 25
