CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Alright, good morning everyone. I want to welcome all my colleagues to today's hearing. My name is Rafael Salamanca, Jr. and I am the Chair of the Land Use Committee. I would like to welcome my esteemed colleagues who are present today, Council Members Gibson, Barron, Constantinides, Chair Kallos, Koo, Reynoso, Richards, Torres, Grodenchik, Chair Adams, Chair—and Chair Moya, and Council Member Rivera. want to thank Chair Moya for, Chair Adams and Chair Kallos for their work on our Land Use Subcommittees. Today, we will be voting on items referred out of our three subcommittees. From our Zoning Subcommittees, we will be voting to approve LUs 188, 189, the 55-63 Summit Street Rezoning in Council Member Lander's district in Brooklyn. Applicant PHD Summit LLC seeks to rezone the property from M1-1 to R6B and apply MIH Options 1 and 2. The rezoning will facilitate the development of approximately 14 apartments in a community facility with four to five of the apartments being affordable units depending upon the MIH Option chosen. We will be voting to approve with modifications LUs 190 and 191 and the 205 Park Avenue

2 property is located in the Speaker's District. will be voting to approve LUs 152 the Landmarks 3 4 Preservation Commission designation of the firehouse 5 for Engine Companies 264 and 328 and Ladder Company 134 located at 16-15 Central Avenue in Rockaway, 6 7 Queens as a historic landmark. The landmark is in Council Member Richards' district. We'll-we will 8 also be voting to approve LU 153 the Landmark 9 Preservation Commission's designation as a historic 10 landmark of 53rd now 101st Precinct Police Station 11 12 located at 16-12 Mott-Mont Avenue also in Far 13 Rockaway, Queens in Council member Richards' 14 district. From our Planning Subcommittees we will 15 voting to approve LUs 177 and 178, 179, 180, 181 and 16 182 related to Round 10 of the city's Third Party 17 Transfer Program, the LUs 177, 179, and 181 are all 18 applications for the tax exemption pursuant to Article XI of the Private Housing Finance Law for 19 20 unimproved properties in Queens, Brooklyn and the Bronx. LUs 178, 180 and 182 Applications for the 21 2.2 Urban Development Action Area Project Approval Waiver 23 of the area designation, UDAAP tax exemption and 24 Article XI Tax Exemption for improved property in 25 Queens, Brooklyn and the Bronx. The properties

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affected by these applications are all subject final judgement of foreclosure for failure to pay taxes to the city. The Third Party Transfer Program was created in 1996 as an alternative to the city owning and managing foreclosed properties. Instead, ownership can be transferred directly to a not-forprofit organization designated by the Commission of Finance. Neighborhood Restore is the name of the not-for-profit organization, which will work with qualified non-profits and for-profit developers to stabilize, manage and plan for the rehabilitation and future ownership of these properties. Each of the Council Members representing districts with affected properties is supportive of the transfer, and each is also supportive of the tax exemptions we are about to vote on. We will also be voting to approve LUs 183, the Triple HDFC Tax Exemption Application in relation to properties in Council Member Ayala's district in Manhattan. This application is for the termination of the prior tax exemption, and for the approval of a new tax exemption pursuant to Article XI of the Private Housing Finance Law for three fully occupied buildings totaling 68 rental units, and one superintendent unit in the East Harlem neighborhood

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of Manhattan. We will also be voting to approve LUs 186, the Nueva Era Apartments application for property at 287-289 Auburn Avenue in Council Member Rodriguez's district in Manhattan. This application is for the termination of the prior Article V Tax Exemption and dissolution of the redevelopment company, which owns the site, and for the approval of the Article XI Tax Exemption under the Private Housing Finance Law for the fully occupied 34-unit residential building. We will also vote to approve LUs 187, the Deshler Apartments Application for properties located in Council Member Perkins' This application is for the district in Manhattan. termination of the prior Article V Tax Exemption and dissolution of the redevelopment company, which owns the site, and for approval of a new Article XI tax exemption under the Private Housing Finance Law. The subject property consists of two fully occupied 7-

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story multiple dwelling buildings containing a total
of 60 rental units. Are there any questions or

CHAIRPERSON KALLOS: Thank you Chair This city has gone out of the-has stopped Salamanca. the business of managing property, and we now have a program called Third Party Transfer. We have properties that are essentially abandoned by their landlords, can be moved to non-profits and for-profit affordable housing developers to take them over and support those tenants in affordable housing moving forward. Well call that that Third Party Transfer Program. Under the terms of the program, these units that are often in low-income communities of color were allowed to be offered for vacancies at 150% of AMI, which is well over \$80,000 a year and well over the incomes, and rental rates for those communities in response to questions that HPD received on this, and I am happy to state that they've actually lowered the term sheet as of August 14th of the his year, and changed the term sheet so that the highest AMI in any of these Third Party Transfer units will be 120% of It's still moderate. I would love to see it be

100% low-income. They have testified that 90% of the
units previously were at 80% and lower. We will be
continuing to do oversight, and ensuring that we
reach the deepest levels of affordability possible on
this, but I think that the lowering from 150% to 120%
is a big victory, and I think the other piece that I
just wanted to make sure was on the record is we did
notice that based on the projects that they put
forward before they withdrew several, the for-profit
affordable housing developers on average were getting
larger buildings than the non-profit affordable
housing developers, which is another item that will
continue on. That being said, this is 1,200 units of
affordable housing that will be preserved. Existing
tenants will be protected. They will have enhanced
Section 8 vouchers so that they are paying 30%no
more that 30% of their income and they'll be able to
stay in these units for the rest of their lives, and
as the units become vacant that's what we're talking
about the 100% of AMI cap, and urge my colleagues to
vote yes and thank the Land Use staff and our Land
Use Chair for his partnership on all of this.

CHAIRPERSON SALAMANCA: Thank you, Chair Kallos. I want to recognize that we've been joined

colleague, Chair Kallos regarding the Third Party

2 Transfer. There is a property included in Land Use Item 180, which is, in fact, a part of this vote that 3 4 we're taking today, and I urge all my colleagues to 5 support it. It's a development of a six-story 6 building in my community, which is, in fact, actually 7 an HDFC, and what we were able to work out was that if the shareholders of that property were able to 8 satisfy the requirements of HPD that they themselves, 9 in fact, could continue to have the share that they 10 presently have, which means that they would not lose 11 12 the equity that they had gained, which would have been the fact had they gone through with the Third 13 14 Party Transfer. So, they were able to satisfy all of 15 those requirements. They are in the final stages of 16 getting a loan that they need to satisfy the 17 commercial part of the debt because they did qualify 18 for an Article XI. So, the residential was satisfied. So, I do want to thank all of those who 19 were working to make this a reality, and I've meeting 20 with those residents and shareholders. We met with 2.1 2.2 them this week, and they understand how important it 23 is to make sure that they maintain their 24 responsibilities, but at this point, we're able to 25 maintain I think it's 34 apartments, 1-bedroom

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apartments with persons paying \$440 for a 1-bedroom
apartment, and we certainly want to make sure that we
don't displace people in that-in that income range.
So I vote aye on all with the exception of Land Use
Item 190, 191, which, in my opinion, does not offer
enough low-income apartments in that development. I
grew up in that neighborhood. I live about a block
away. I live about a block away from where that is,
and certainly that's a low-income neighbor-
neighborhood, and I think this is an effort or an
action that will increase gentrification and
displacement. Thank you.

I'll do that again. Land Use No. 180, Third Party Transfer, there is a property at 142 Central Avenue that I'm extremely concerned about. It was sold to a constituent of mine through the Sheriff's Office about a month and a half ago, and it stood in the Third Party Transfer list, and it didn't allow him ample time to try to pay off the taxes and the liens, and but this property in a position where it could be successful, and I really want to start having a conversation about the Sheriff's Office auctioning properties that are—are going to stay on the Third Party Transfer List, and are going to be lost by a property owner or potential property owner. So this person bought the property, and is now losing it in less than a month and a half, and I really think that there's something to be said there about procedure or systems that don't protect these buyers. So, it's-I'm concerned about it. So, for this Land

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- Use Committee, I want to vote age on all with the
 exception of Land Use No. 180. I just want to have
 further conversations before we go to the full
 committee.
