CHAIRPERSON DIANA REYNA: Good
morning and welcome to the Committee on Rules,
Privileges and Elections. My name is Diana Reyna
and I am Chair to this committee. Before we being
I'd like to introduce the other members to this
committee who are present here today. I have
Council Member Lewis Fidler, Council Member Leroy
Comrie, Council Member Inez Dickens, Council
Member Maria Baez, Council Member Joel Rivera,
Council Member Erik Dilan and Council Member Jimmy
Vacca, who is just here present supporting.

Today the Rules Committee will be considering the following matter, the designation of Bishop Mitchell G. Taylor to the Civilian Complaint Review Board. Bishop Taylor, a resident of Queens, is being considered for designation by the Council to the Civilian Complaint Review Board. I'd like to ask for silence in the chambers.

If designated by the Council and subsequently appointed by the Mayor, he will replace Syngee Lee Lamb and serve for the remainder of a three year term expiring on July 4, 2011. First I will briefly describe the functions of the Civilian Complaint Review Board.

is independent from the City's police department and charged with the duty to investigate complaints of misconduct by police officers towards the public. Board members are required to reflect the city's diversity. The board consists of 13 members, 5 designated by the Council, 5 appointed by the Mayor and 3 designated by the Police Commissioner, which are the only members who have law enforcement experience.

CCRB has a civilian staff
responsible for conducting investigations of
complaints received by the board. CCRB
jurisdiction is limited to complaints claiming
excessive force, abuse of authority, discourtesy
or use of offensive language. The board operates
in panels of at least three members. All CCRB
members are eligible for compensation on a per

2	diem basis. The current per diem rate is \$291.
3	Welcome Bishop Taylor. Will you please raise your
4	right hand and be sworn in by Council?
5	FEMALE VOICE: Do you swear or
6	affirm to tell the truth, the whole truth and
7	nothing but the truth?
8	BISHOP MITCHELL J. TAYLOR: I do.
9	CHAIRPERSON REYNA: And if you have
10	an opening statement, now is the time to do so to
11	share.
12	BISHOP TAYLOR: Thank you. Madam
13	Chair Reyna, majority whip, Leroy Comrie, Council
14	Member Inez Dickens, Council Member Lou Fidler and
15	to all the distinguished members of this
16	particular committee. I'm grateful to be here to
17	address you on today.
18	I am Bishop Mitchell Taylor, senior
19	pastor of the Center of Hope International and the
20	founder of the East River Development Alliance,
21	organizations that are dedicated to providing
22	residents of public housing, the tools and
23	resources for self sufficiency. And the latter is
24	necessary to gain economic mobility.

I extremely grateful to be

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2	considered today for service on the Civilian
3	Complaint Review Board. As a lifelong resident of
4	New York City, specifically Queens, the most
5	ethnically diverse borough in the city, I've had
6	the distinct opportunity to interact with people
7	from many walks of life. I have great admiration
8	and respect for the New York City Police
9	Department. But as a pastor and an advocate and a
10	native New Yorker I also understand the
11	complexities that are congruent with that day to
12	day operation.

So I'm honored to be considered for the noble and important task as serving as a member of the CCRB. I know that my experiences and my interactions vast throughout the city will enable me to be fair and objective addition to the board. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON REYNA: Thank you

Bishop Taylor. I understand Council Member Inez

Dickens must be excused. I'd like to call upon

her.

COUNCIL MEMBER INEZ DICKENS: Thank you so much Madam Chair. And I am requesting permission to be excused and to vote at this time.

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2	Affirmative, if I may, for Bishop Taylor whom I've
3	known over the years. I strongly support his
4	appointment. I feel he will be an asset
5	representative of not only his community but of
6	all residents of the City of New York. May I have
7	permission please Madam Chair.
8	CHAIRPERSON REYNA: Yes.
9	MS. DICKENS: I vote yes. Thank
10	you.
11	CHAIRPERSON REYNA: Thank you
12	Council Member Dickens. Council Member Leroy
13	Comrie.
14	COUNCIL MEMBER LEROY G. COMRIE,
15	JR.: Thank you Madam Chair. Today' I'd just like
16	to speak in the affirmative for and thank Bishop
17	Taylor for wanting to serve as a member of the
18	CCRB. Which is a body that truly needs to have
19	someone of his caliber, his character and his
20	compassion.
21	A person that has truly worked in
22	Long Island City, throughout Queens and the city
23	to empower the rights of the underprivileged to
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give people a leg up that wouldn't have an

opportunity before. Who has definitely created

economic empowerment for the people around his church and through urder [phonetic], has definitely lifted up the ability of people to do better in life for themselves, creating programs and working with city agencies to do food pantries, to do outreach, to do improvements for their social services.

But even more critically, working with people on the Earned Income Tax Credit program, making sure that the program that he's gotten over \$20 million, at least. I think that number is low probably now, of income back into the community by people filling out their tax forms and applying for the Earned Income Tax Credit has really infused a lot of money into Long Island City. He was part of the effort to bring the first bank back to Long Island City. And is actually working to start a credit union projects in Long Island City.

He's just done so much for the community. He's such a great person and a humble individual. I'm glad that he has decided to take on this task to be part of the CCRB. On behalf of the Queens delegation I'm happy that he has

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undertaken this desire. That he's following
through with it and he'll be a great addition to
the CCRB. I hope that they Mayor's Office
processes his appointment and does everything to
ensure that he is made a member as soon as
possible. Thank you Madam Chair. I urge all of
the members to vote in affirmative for Bishop
Taylor.

CHAIRPERSON REYNA: Thank you Council Member Comrie. Council Member David Weprin.

COUNCIL MEMBER DAVID WEPRIN: Thank you Madam Chair. I, too, want to echo the support of the Queens delegation. I have personal knowledge of Bishop Taylor since I've been in the City Council and the work that he's done. Not only in Queens but really throughout the entire city; he really is a leader in the faith based community and the advocacy community. The community concerned about food and hunger and social services for those in need. I think he will be an outstanding appointee to the Civilian Complaint Review Board and I strongly endorse his confirmation.

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Council Member Weprin. If there are no other council member, we will call a vote and before I do so, we have called upon Speaker Christine Quinn. So while she's on her way up, I'd like to just comment on Bishop Taylor, who I have known and worked with when I was Chair of the subcommittee on Public Housing. His intelligence, leadership in the public housing arena is remarkable. And what you have done is put your money where your mouth is as far as self sufficiency for families in the trenches of poverty and uplifting communities out of poverty.

You have fought the war against poverty and we have seen the results of that.

Your humility, like Council Member Comrie has mentioned is outstanding. And part of that humility, I'd like to just for the record, express to my colleagues if they didn't see Black in America the series. The organization East River Development Alliance was featured and you had case studies of success. And so I congratulate you, your organization, your staff. I'd like to make sure that we're not overwhelming you with this
