2	CHAIRPERSON REYNA: Good morning			
3	and welcome to the Committee on Rules, Privileges			
4	and Elections. My name is Diana Reyna, and I am			
5	Chair of this Committee. Before we begin, I'd			
6	like to introduce my colleagues of this Committee			
7	who are present here today. Council Member Daniel			
8	Garodnick, Council Member Erik Martin Dilan,			
9	Council Member Joel Rivera, Council Member Robert			
10	Jackson, Council Member David Weprin, Council			
11	Member Maria Baez, Council Member Lewis Fidler,			
12	Council Member Michael McMahon, Council Member			
13	Maria del Carmen Arroyo, Council Member Oliver			
14	Koppell, Council Member Melinda Katz, Council

16	Palma. We have a full house here today. Let			
17	Stated begin. It speaks to the unification here			
18	of this particular nominee for the Board of			
19	Elections. Today the rules committee will be			
20	considering the following two matters, the			
21	appointment of Naomi Silie to the Board of			
22	Elections, and a resolution adding a rule to the			
23	Rules of the Council in relation to the			
24	qualifications of Council Members. First, the			
25	appointment Mg Silie is being considered for			

appointment as the Democratic Commissioner from 2 3 Bronx County. Her appointment is for a four-year term that begins on January 1st, 2009 and ends December 31st, 2012. For the record, her 5 certificate for Part recommendation was properly 6 formatted and submitted. I will briefly describe 7 8 the functions of the Board of Elections. Board of Elections consists of ten commissioners; 9 10 two form each of the City's five counties, who are directly appointed by the New York City Council. 11 Not more than two commissioners shall be 12 registered voters of the same County. Each 13 Commissioner serves a term of four years, or until 14 15 a success or is appointed. Commissioners shall be registered voters from each of the major parties 16 17 in the County for which they are appointed. Board and its Commissioners are responsible for 18 19 the maintenance and administration of voting 20 records and elections. The Board also exercises 21 quasi-judicial powers by conducting hearings to 22 validate nominating petitions and candidates for 23 nomination to elected office. The Board is 24 required to make an annual report of its affairs 25 and proceedings to the New York City Council once

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every 12 months and no later than the last day of January in any year. Commissioners receive a \$300 per Diem for each day's attendance at meetings of the Board or any of its committees with a maximum of \$30,000 a year. Welcome, Ms. Silie. Will you please raise your right hand and be sworn in by Counsel?

NAOMI C. SILIE: I'd like to take the opportunity to thank everyone. I feel honored to be here and honored to be given this opportunity to take part in, I believe, a wonderful opportunity to join in the new ventures that are going on in New York City, specifically

dealing with the voting machines and everything
that's going on with that. So I thank you and if
anyone has any questions for me, I'm free and

Board of Elections has been subject to some criticism recently. Part of it is because it's a challenge, being an entity which gets funded by the City but has responsibilities also to the State of New York. But I'm encouraged by your background and what appears to be a true openness to taking a fresh look at the way we deal with elections and try to improve training and additional personnel within the sites, according to your answers in the questions here. One thing I wanted to ask you about was on the subject of

NAOMI C. SILIE: Yes.

state level, the idea that New York, New Yorkers
being among the busiest people in the world, could
surely benefit in my view from having an
opportunity to cast an early vote and not
necessarily show up on Election Day, if that's a
point of some inconvenience, or even having
absentee ballots, which you could cast without any
fault or reason. Do you want to share any opinion

NAOMI C. SILIE: I'll speak to something I experienced this past November, actually. I was torn between voting at my polling site or voting a week before so that I could spend a week in Pennsylvania to canvass for President Elect Obama. And having the option to go to the Board of Elections and submit and absentee ballot in person was advantageous, but I would have loved to have had the option to just pull that lever. So, just to answer your question, I think, you know, it was advantageous for many states to have that in advance. It eased the lines on the day of. And so, to answer your question on point, I think it would be a phenomenal idea. New Yorkers, we have a lot of people here. So why not ease the

I also am curious to get your thought on the absentee ballot process altogether. 6 7 mean, even if you were-- let's say for example 8 instead of being in Pennsylvania as you were, you were occupied with political activity in New York. 9 10 I mean we all know the polls are 6:00 to 9:00, but if you're a campaign worker or somebody who is 11 12 involved, you might be there 5:30 in the morning

until 10:00 at night.

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NAOMI C. SILIE: Right.

COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: Under the current rules, unless you are -- fit into a few different categories or are going to be outside of the jurisdiction, you're not truly entitled to an absentee ballot. Do you think people should be able to, without any of these expressions of fault or need or whatever, just because they may have other responsibilities during the course of an election day, or for any reason or no reason, do you think they should be able to cast an absentee ballot?

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NAOMI C. SILIE: I guess to the best of my knowledge thus far, and in terms of the intricacies of the absentee ballot process, I'm not as well versed, as I should at this point. What I will say is that for me, I was nervous with the notion of absentee ballots, for myself. You know, I've heard many stories, not necessarily particular to New York, but the notion that, you know, if you mail your ballot in, will it really get counted. So there's something to be said with nervousness that comes with not actually pulling that lever. And so for me, the way I dealt with that issue was physically going into the office to submit my form. So I don't know if that would create more problems if we open it to a wide array of, you know, reasons why absentee ballots would be acceptable.

COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: Okay. I think you raise an absolutely fair point and one that is worthy of some careful consideration. And I look forward to talking to you further about that. And the truth is, in order to do that we would— it would be something that is beyond the authority as a Commissioner, it's beyond the

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authority of this local City Council. In fact it would be something which would have to be determined at a state level, perhaps even at a state constitutional level. So these are issues that are beyond us, but I just wanted to put it on your radar screen. Also, in answer to some of the questions on the questionnaire, you talked about reaching out to minorities, young people, non-English speaking sectors of the City and find volunteers and employees that these folks can relate to, to get them registered to vote and to get them connected with government. I also wanted to just get your thoughts on using those same means to bring in new people who could serve as poll workers as well. I know frequently there are drop offs from the folks who are trained or registered to be poll workers on a given day. it puts the Board of Elections in a very difficult situation. And the idea of reaching out much more broadly as the Board of Elections to constituencies that have not previously been reached out to, to serve as poll workers seems to me to be a very sensible way to ensure that we're not short staffed on election day. How do you

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2 feel about that?

NAOMI C. SILIE: That makes perfect I would imagine that the reason we don't have more people lining up is because many people don't know of the steps that they need to take to actually get there. I know plenty of people that would jump at the opportunity. So I think if we use some of those same techniques it would be, again, it can only help us on Election Day, any Election Day. Because again, the ability for poll workers to be able to go take lunch or say, okay, I'm only going to be here for six hours versus the entire 12 hours, for example. Those are all things that the more people we have, the better the situation will be, because people will be more excited about what they have to do on that particular day.

COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK:

Absolutely. I totally agree with that. And the only thing I will say in conclusion, this isn't really a question; I wouldn't expect you to have a detailed answer to this question as that you're mot a member of the Board yet. But I would say that there have been some other criticism of the

Board of Elections, that there's been a lack of			
openness, either in sharing information about how			
exactly dollars are spent so that we as the people			
who allocate dollars in the budget can make			
determinations as to what the true need is, or			
meeting with advocates, or making ballot machines			
available in advance so that advocacy groups can			
share them with their constituencies, they can see			
what they're like for the like the ballot			
marking device and other things. So what I would			
just ask of you is an openness to openness, and to			
really try to bring a fresh approach and encourage			
more contact by the Board with the public and			
certainly openness when it comes to the budgetary			
process. I would encourage you to consider that.			

NAOMI C. SILIE: Absolutely.

COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: Thank

you. I am very enthusiastic about your candidacy.

Thank you for indulging me on the questions, and I look forward to voting yes, and I look forward to working with you in the future.
