Good morning, my name is Leroy

Comrie, I'm Chair of the Committee on Consumer

Affairs. Today we'll be holding the final hearing

on Proposed Resolution 1583-A, which is calling on

the Federal Communications Commission to

investigate Arbitron's Portable People Meter

system and its potential effect on the diversity

Arbitron monitors radio
listenership and provides its findings to
advertisers and broadcasters as a tool on which
advertising rates are based. In several cities
across the country, Arbitron has [off mic]
replacing their traditional data collecting system
of handwritten diaries with the Portable People
Meter system.

PPMs are electronic devices

participants wear that record and automatically

transport back to Arbitron all audible radio

stations within range of the device. The methods

by which participants are recruited by Arbitron to

wear the devices, the decision to include

demographically dissimilar counties as part of the

New York City's ratings market, and the accuracy

which with the PPM captures radio listening habits

all have potentially devastating effects on the

diversity of radio in New York.

In cities in which the PPM has already been introduced, urban and Latin radio stations have seen precipitous drops in their ratings, while the general market stations rankings have increased.

We first considered the resolution two weeks ago on Wednesday, September 10th. We've heard from a range of witnesses, including
Arbitron, minority advocacy groups, and members of the minority media. Although Arbitron's testimony was enlightening, concerns are still paramount concerning the current rate and the current state of the PPM system. I should note that this issue has caught the attention and scrutiny of the Attorney General Cuomo's office and recently the United States Congress.

For the reasons I've mentioned, I intend to vote in favor of this resolution. While I do not oppose technological advancements that

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would improve accuracy in measuring ratings, I
believe that the system must be flawless and I am
not anywhere near convinced that this is the case
yet with the Arbitron's PPM system.

I will conclude my remarks by strongly urging my fellow members to join me in voting in favor of this resolution. I'll ask anyone that would like to make a statement to say a few words.

Larry Seabrook for bringing this to our attention and Speaker Quinn and the Speaker's staff and our council and the staff here for my Consumer Affairs Committee for continuing to work on making this an issue. Clearly we want to ensure that the listenership is a true listenership that is not just diverse, but accurate, and clearly Arbitron has not done enough to ensure accuracy.

With that I'll see--Council Member Koppell?

COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Yeah, just briefly, I'm convinced that, given the importance of this issue, that it should get a full airing by those perhaps more capable of evaluating it than
