CHAIRPERSON GENNARO:

Okay, so

3

we're going to, we're going to get started. Good afternoon, I'm New York City Councilman Jim Gennaro, Chair of the Committee on Environmental Protection. And we're here to hold two votes to move forward, Proposed Intro 21-A. Let me identify the members that are here. Council Members Koppell, Council Member Eugene, Council Member Crowley, Council Member Ulrich, Council Member Vallone; we'll be joined hopefully by other members of the committee. Yesterday, we had a hearing on Intro 21-A, which would establish the City's own brownfields remediation and redevelopment program. Currently we would be subject to the State program for brownfields redevelopment. There are some deficiencies with the State program as to how New York City is treated. Part of the vision of PlaNYC is for the City to have their own program. This will help to bring redress to some of the issues that have confronted people that want to do brownfield development in New York City. Many of the, of the 7,000 plus acres of brownfields areas in New York City would not qualify for the State program, with

regard to the fill that has been used there. This would, that's a complicated subject matter, but suffice it to say that this will, you know, open doors for people that want to do brownfield development in New York City. It also creates an Office of Environmental Remediation. I see we have Dan Walsh in the audience, he came and testified yesterday, he's the head of that office. So they're doing education, they're doing outreach. And this is going to be a very, very good program. I urge all of my colleagues to strongly support this. In order to move this forward, we have to vote on two matters. Of course there is the bill itself. But before we do that, there is a matter of voting a Resolution, and this Resolution is basically a finding that the, that when we enact proposed Intro 21-A, it will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment, and it is completely consistent with the State Environmental Quality Review Act. So we have to pass that Resolution first. Once that Resolution is passed, that will pave the way for the vote on the bill. The Chair recommends a yes vote on both items; happy to take any comments

from anyone who wants to make a comment at this time. I recognize Council Member Koppell.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Mr.

Chairman, I expressed some concern at the hearing yesterday, and several people who testified, I understand, expressed a concern, too, that there might be some ability to undermine or, or not comply with State standards with respect to the clean up of the Brownfield sites. And we were assured by the administration that that was not the intent. There is language in the bill that says that the provisions, the regulations would be consistent with State environmental law.

CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Yes.

asked whether consistent was essentially synonymous with comply with, and was assured that that was the intent. I've requested that Counsel insert that intent in the Committee report. While I might have preferred to change the language, I think that inserting in the Committee report, which would undoubtedly be looked at if this becomes a contested matter, is a good substitute for that. I also would like to just say that, or

ask that you indicate that that's the intent of you as sponsor and of the Committee, that, that the regulations be, comply with, that the standards comply with the State standards for clean up of the brownfields.

CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Certainly, I'd be more than, more than happy to do that. I, I remember your comments yesterday and your issue. I asked Counsel's staff what was done with regard to that, and they indicated to me the issue, the matter of putting it in the, in the report, which is, I'm glad that you brought that up, I'm glad that that's in the report, and as the prime sponsor of the bill, happy to say, on the record, that it is my intent as the sponsor of this bill, to make sure that everything we do is, you know, completely consistent and upholds the, all of the, all of the State standards. During the, during the Committee hearing yesterday, the Counsel to the Office of Environmental Remediation, Mr. McIntyre [phonetic], made the point that that, you know, particular language was in there to make sure that, that as, as State standards change or, you know, perhaps get better, that we would sort

a trained, qualified workforce to do this type of

work. And I think that we have to get on that as

fast as possible, especially for those

CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Certainly.

And certainly. And I was happy that you made that point yesterday at the hearing. With regard to the City funds that'll be allocated for these types of projects, these'd be sums in the amount of, you know, \$30,000-40,000, something like that, that wouldn't actually be used for people doing the physical work, it's more for like the site study and title searches and outreach and organizing of the community. Kind of like, it would be kind of like, the money we'd be paying for brainwaves basically, and not hard labor. Fortunately, most of the really big remediations that take place in the City are done by companies that, that employ union labor and pay prevailing wages. But this will open the door to, you know, much smaller, you know, smaller scale projects in the outer borough and, and your comments are duly noted. They're greatly appreciated, and I think this is part of the ongoing oversight that we have to see, as this plays out, because once we, you know, do something, we don't just go fishing, we, we see, make sure how it works, and if there are refinements that have to be made, we will

2	certainly be in a position to make them. It is my
3	hope that you'll be part of this Council and part
4	of this Committee for a long time, and so we will,
5	we will have the ability to, you know, visit that
6	issue and make sure that we, you know, do the
7	needful, if it's appropriate. And so, thank you.
8	Thank you, Council Member Crowley. Anyone else
9	wishing to make a comment or statement at this
10	time? And so, with that said, I'll call for a
11	vote on the, on the proposed Resolution.
12	I had it in front of me. So, this is a
13	preconsidered Resolution number that doesn't
14	actually have a number, but it is a Resolution
15	that finds, "That the enactment of proposed Intro
16	21-A does not have a significant adverse impact on
17	the environment and is consistent with the State
18	Environmental Quality Review Act. So, I would
19	call for a vote on this preconsidered Resolution.
20	And then, after that vote, we'll have a vote on
21	Intro 21-A, the Chair recommends a yes vote. And
22	with that I ask the clerk to call the role.
