SPEAKER JOHNSON: Good afternoon. Happy
New Year everyone. I want to thank you all for being
here with us on this Wednesday at our first full
meeting of 2019, our Charter Meeting. We have a busy
agenda ahead of us, but we are beginning today on a
sad note. On Sunday night, Probationary Firefighter
Steven Pollard died while responding to a car
accident in Brooklyn. He fell trying to help two

2 injured drivers while cross the Belt Parkway's Mill Basin Bridge. He was only 30 years old, and he had 3 4 just cleared his FDNY probationary period. This is a 5 tragedy for his family and for our city. We lost a 6 good man at the start of his career. I just want to 7 acknowledge the loss of NYPD Detective Thomas Lyons another 9/11 First Responder who died from Pancreatic 8 Cancer that he developed at Ground Zero. Detective 9 10 Lyons was 51 years old. In recent days we lost Luis Garden Acosta, the President and Founder of El 11 12 Luis was a champion for the Latino and 13 African-American communities and a pioneer in human rights activism. I'm proud of his work and the work 14 15 of El Puente, and I can-I think I speak for all of us 16 when I say he will be greatly missed. He made the 17 lives better for so many people, and we a richer city 18 and nation because of his efforts. Two dedicated public servants also passed since our last full 19 20 William Thompson, Sr. the first African-American State Senator from Brooklyn died at 94 years 21 2.2 old in December. Mr. Thompson was a life long 23 dedicated public servant who first served in the U.S. 24 Army during World War II before serving as a State Senator and a member of this body, the City Council 25

2 and a long time judge. He was trailblazer who left his mark on our city. To his son and many of our 3 4 friends Bill, (sic) his daughter Gail and all of his loved ones I send my deepest condolences and best 5 6 wishes. We also lost Judge Seymour Boyers who passed 7 away at 92 years old this past weekend. Sy served as a Council Member a large representing the borough of 8 Queens in the 1960s. He lived a live devoted to 9 advocacy and education, and he'll be missed. To his 10 wife, his four children, and his 11 grandchildren, I 11 12 send my best wishes, condolences and my gratitude for 13 his service. I'd like to ask everyone to here to please and take a moment of silence in memory of 14 15 Detective Lyons, Firefighter Pollard, Luis Garden 16 Acosta, the Honorable William Thompson, Sr. and the 17 Honorable Seymour Boyers. [moment of silence] Thank 18 you. Before we jump into our docket today, we have one more New Yorker who deserves some extra 19 20 recognition because it falls on our Stated today. Today is the birthday of our amazing friend and 21 2.2 Council Member from Corona the cat saver himself, a 23 champion for students, immigrants and New Yorker 24 Francisco Moya. Happy birthday. [cheers/applause] 25 Don't shave. You look a lot younger. Now, diving

2 into today's agenda, the Council will vote on the following Finance items: Introduction 1226, which 3 will establish the Throggs Neck Business Improvement 4 District in Council Member Mark Gjonaj's District in the Bronx. Introduction 1127, which will expand the 6 7 Hudson Square Business Improvement District in my district in Manhattan. I want to thank the staff who 8 worked on this: Stephanie Ruiz and Noah Brick. 9 Moving on, the Council will vote on the following 10 pieces of legislation: Introduction 1299 sponsored 11 12 by Council Member Jumaane Williams would clarify for 13 the purposes of enforcing prohibitions against 14 unauthorized commuter van services, the definition of 15 for-hire vehicles and commuter van do not include a 16 public bus service operating pursuant to a contract 17 with any state or local government. I want to thank 18 the staff who worked on this James DeGiovanni, and Elliott Linn. Next, we're going to vote on 19 20 Introduction 828 sponsored by our Government Operations Chair Fernando Cabrera, which would 21 2.2 require the Department of Records and Information 23 Services, DORIS to list all of its reports required by Local Law on it's website including relevant 24 information such as their frequency, the law to which 25

2 they are being responsive to, and the agency or agencies responsive. We will also provide users with 3 4 access to every past report of that type received by 5 DORIS, and if an agency fails to submit a required report on time, DORIS would request the report from 6 7 an agency and post that request in lieu of the report on its website until the agency transmits the report. 8 Finally, this legislation will require that reports 9 be sent to DORIS electronically rather than by hand. 10 This sounds very geeky, wonky, technical. 11 12 actually very, very important because so much of the 13 work we do here at the Council are reporting bills, and many of us wonder if those bills go into a black 14 15 hold somewhere and never see the light of day. 16 our Chair's bill is going to require that they post these reports on their website so the public can see 17 18 it, so that we can see it, the press can see it, and if they don't produce the report they are required to 19 20 produce, then they need to post the request that was made of them, which would be embarrassing for that 21 2.2 agency if they weren't responsive. So, I want to 23 thank you Fernando for getting this done. It's very important for the work we do, and I want to thank the 24 25 staff who's worked on this, Brad Reed, Elizabeth

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2 Cronk, Emily Forgione and Zach Harris. The Council will vote on Introduction 728 sponsored by Council 3 Member Rafael Espinal, which would require a 4 temporary program for the resolution of outstanding 5 judgments resulting from awning sign violations. 6 7 would also establish a 2-year moratorium on the issuance of additional awning sign violations as well 8 as an interagency task force to explore issues 9 related to awning signs and education related to 10 bring existing awning signs into compliance. 11 12 bill would also require the Department of Buildings 13 to provide a report to the City Council containing information about awning sign violations and 14 15 establish a waiver of work without a permit penalties 16 issued in connection with awning signs since December 28, 2017 and going forward. This is of great concern 17 18 for business owners across the city. So, I'm glad that this bill is being voted on today. This is an 19 20 example of us being responsive to community needs and giving a helping hand to businesses that are the life 21 2.2 blood of our city. I want to thank the staff who 23 worked on this, specifically Austin Branford. Finally, we're going to vote on the Student 24

Transportation Oversight Package, the STOP package.

When parents put their children on a school bus, we are the guardians of that child, and we have an obligation to take care of them. This past fall we had a lot of problems that caused a lot of stress to

12 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Keep it down, please.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: This is related to the storm we in November, and I'm sorry that that happened, and that parents were scared and could not find their children. This package is an attempt to make sure it doesn't happen again. The primary goal of this package is to keep our children safe, to provide a level of transparency for parents and children, and I'm proud to support it. I specifically want to thank our Education Chair who h as worked on this tirelessly and vocally and is verybeen very smart on how to handle this package. I want to thank you Mark Treyger, the Chair of our Education Committee for his incredible work on this.

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First, in the package is Introduction 89 sponsored by Council Member Andy King, which would require the Department of Education report on the average length of time schedule for school bus routes in each community school district. The bill will also require that the DOE share actual school bus transportation times as recorded by GPS trackers with the City Council. That information would need to be Introduction 451 sponsored by Council Member shared. Danny Dromm would require the DOE to distribute a school bus ridership guide and hard copy and electronically to all students and parents. This guide would include a description of eligibility for school bus services, what the service entail, information for parents and students living in temporary housing and students in foster care and the responsibility of student and parents using DOE school bus services. I want to thank Danny our Finance Chair and former Education Chair. Introduction 926, which I sponsored, would require the Department of Education to share with parents and post on its website how parents can file a complaint about a school bus employee, the process by which the department investigates such a complaint and the

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possible results of such an investigation. This bill also require that DOE share the protocols for school bus services in inclement weather emergencies. Introduction 929 sponsored by Council Member Joe Borelli would require the Department of Education to report on the calls and complaints received from parents and quardians about school bus services, the investigations DOE opened into school bus employees and the number of those investigations that were substantiated, and a description of outcomes taken by DOE in the event of a substantiated investigation. We'll also vote on two pieces of legislation, two very important pieces of legislation as part of this package sponsored by Council Member Ben Kallos. Introduction 1099 would require every school bus to be equipped with a GPS tracking device, and require that the DOE give authorized parents and guardians access to the real time location of their child's school bus. This bill would also require each bus to be equipped with a two-way communication device for allowing communications with the bus operator. his second bill Introduction 1148 would require the Department of Education report on how school bus routes are determined, goals for time limits for bus

2 routes and any other goals related to school bus services. This bill would require that the 3 Department of Education share school bus routes with 4 5 parents and guardians at least 15 days before the start of the school year, and report a list of school 6 7 bus vendors who have completed a dry run of their route as required by their contract, and those bus 8 vendors who ware not in compliance with their 9 contractual obligations to complete dry runs of those 10 routes before the school year starts. The bill will 11 12 require the Department of Education let parents know 13 daily if their child's bus is late arriving or 14 departing school so parents have some sense when 15 their child is going to get home. Finally, 16 Introduction 1173, sponsored by our Education Chair again, Council Member Mark Treyger, would require the 17 18 Department of Education report on the department's school bus services including the vendors providing 19 20 school bus transportation to students, the number of vehicles and employees used by such vendors, the 21 2.2 number of bus routes and transportation sites in use, 23 the number of students using school bus 24 transportation including the types of students, and the categories of students who are eligible for DOE 25

transportation services. This bill would also
require DOE to report on school bus delays and no
shows and subcontractors are included in this as
well. I want to thank the incredible staff that has
worked on this package for a very long time in a very
meticulous way: Beth Golub, James Sabutti (sp?),
Alla Masawi (sp?) Smita Deshmukh, Andrea Vasquez and
Jeff Baker. That is it for today's agenda. Usually

We began putting together this integral piece of legislation when businesses in my district suddenly found themselves with \$6,000 fines for signs they had up on their businesses for years. Since November 2017, there have been over 2,000 sign violations reported to 311 across the five boroughs. The fine combined with the price tag of a new sign can be devastating to a business' bottom line. As the sudden uptick in violations came to the awareness

of my colleagues, we quickly worked together to enter
into a two-year moratorium on any sign violations.
Businesses will not have to feel the burden of these
unjust fines while we work on the comprehensive
reforms to end this unjust practice. In addition to
this moratorium, any small business that has yet to
pay these fines will be given complete financial
relief. There will be reduced permit fees for
hanging new signs, and a task force with small
business owners, city agencies and chambers of
commerce to investigate any predatory practices that
might be going on, and compile strategic reform to
prevent this injustice from ever happening again.
With that said, I also want to thank all of the
advocates who have been part of this effort and all
the business owners who stood with us day by day on
the steps of City Hall, in City Hall to have these
conversations and make this bill happen. So thank you

I'd also like to thank the Cosponsor of Introduction 1099, Council Member Chaim Deutsch. He started working on this back 2000 as a staffer to then Council Member Mike Nelson. Every school year starts with nightmares of children stuck

on buses for hours leaving parents worrying where are
their children. The annual bus nightmares reach
crisis levels in November when winter storm Avery
left young children who receive special education, on
a bus in the snow for more than 10 hours. As a new
parent, when Jennifer Reynoso called me and told me
that she didn't know where her child was at 9:30, I
saw my daughter on that bus, and we worked with City
Hall, the Mayor's Office. We had to call the Police,
the NYPD to rescue that child and that's a huge

from cities like Boston where parents get bus routes
weeks ahead of the school year in time to challenge

Since late 2018, hundreds of businesses in New York City mostly small and mostly immigrant owned have received violations for improper signage. The violations come attached with a civil penalty of \$6,000, which is incredibly exorbitant and must be paid even if the violation is resolved. For small businesses that can barely afford to make rent month-to-month, the violations are doing more than taking down signs, they are closing up shops. All across my district and those of my colleagues who co-sponsored this bill, small businesses are taking down their signs in fear of receiving the violations, which is not only creating whole avenues of what feels like and constituents have called around blighted streets, but setting them up for further violations for not having the signage or other violations should they put up new signs without being licensed by the hangers or without licensed hangers. So, we to put a stop to this bleeding by halting the DOB from issuing more

2	violations or collecting these penalties. Intro 728-
3	B does that with a two-year moratorium. This will

Resolution calling upon the New York State Education Department to require, implement and enforce more extensive training and tracking of the training of school bus drivers and attendants who transport students with disabilities. COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: Thank you. Construction related injuries and deaths continue to rise for the fifth straight year to 744 injuries and 16 deaths in the Fiscal Year 2018, approximately triple the 212 injuries and six deaths in Fiscal Year 2014 according to the Mayor's Management Report as reported by City and State. Under Proposed Introduction 1322, Co-Prime sponsored by Civil Service and Labor Chair I. Daneek Miller, affordable housing and economic development projects receiving city subsidies would be required to pay workers a prevailing wage, provide training in the classroom and on the job through apprenticeship coupled with transparency. Proposed Introduction 1323 forces developers to disclose ownership interests. The revolving door with the city violations, MWBE status and the planned workforce to the City Council prying

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- to-prior to seeking permission to build on city land
  or obtain millions in city subsidies. This
  information is already provided to HPD and their 37page compliance package and there's no reason why we
  shouldn't have it. I ask my colleagues to please
- sponsor these important pieces of legislation. Thank

Greetings to all my colleagues. Happy New Year. I just want to call attention to the passing of a dear friend and someone was very vocal in the fight against police brutality, and that's Nicholas Heyward, Senior. He passed on New Year's Eve and he became known for his work fighting against police

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immorality, police corruption and police criminal activity particularly as it relates to killing of unarmed civilians. His son Nicholas Heyward, Jr. was only 13 when he was shot. He was unarmed and he was shot by an NYPD officer and that officer was never brought to justice. So, I just wanted to put into the record that he has passed and that while he was here he was a great fighter. He was a great advocate, not only for his son, but for all of those families who have been subjected to a loss of a loved one due to the criminal activity, criminal actions of NYPD with unarmed children in particular. So, I just wanted that to be noted. Thank you .

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you,

Council Member Barron. We'll now have Council Member

Reynoso followed by Council Member Menchaca.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: I want to take the time to thank Speaker Corey Johnson for acknowledging the passing of Luis Garden Acosta who was my mentor, and did amazing work in our Southside District related to environmental justice, and empowering of young people. I was fortunate enough to be one of those young people that he took under his wing, and I'm grateful for everything that he's

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taught me, and he will always be remembered. So,
again, just want to thank Corey for acknowledging
that. I'm also introducing a bill related to the
corrupt practice present-present in our commercial
sanitation industry. We have an issue related to sham
union or fake unions, and we have a bill that we are
introducing today that will employer BIC to go after
unions that have bosses or executive level members
that are-either have been indicted or criminal
charges related to the private sanitation industry.
I'm looking forward to everyone's support, and I
close my statement here.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you. Council Member Menchaca.

council Member Menchaca: Thank you. So something we pride ourselves in the city that—that we live in is that we take care of our immigrants and give everyone the dignity of being heard, and understood no matter your preferred language. In the interest of making that true, every New Yorker's with city agencies we passed Local Law 30 in 2017 to guarantee language access for all New Yorkers making it a requirement for city agencies to provide their services in 10 of the city's most commonly spoken

languages. However, back in October, I held a
hearing on this language access requirement to review
whether city agencies were living up to it. What we
discovered was that many service providers on the
ground reported clients who are not attended to by
the city agencies with proper language access. Yet,
the city claimed it had not received complaints on
this issues. A review of the city's 311 data makes
it almost impossible to confirm this claim since 311
personnel are not required to ask first what language
a person needs before logging a complaint LS8859
would change that making such and ask standard
procedure and then requiring 311 to track how many
times a call is dropped when the question is asked.
We need to have a means of holding the city
accountable to provide language access. This is that
first and critical step and I urge you all to join me
by signing on as prime sponsors. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much, Council Member Carlos Menchaca, and as we close out today's meeting, I would be remiss if I also did not add to the remarks Speaker Corey Johnson in regards to Judge William C. Thompson, who was my predecessor. He passed away again on December 24,

2 2018 at the age of 19-at the age of 94. He was a New York State Senator and Justice of the New York 3 4 Supreme Court Appellate Division and father to New York City Controller Brill Thompson. He was on the 5 City Council from 1969 to 1973, elected to the 6 7 Supreme Court in 1974 and named Assistant Administrative Judge of the Supreme Court in Brooklyn 8 and Staten Island in 1978. In 1980, he was the first 9 black Associate Justice appointed to the Appellate 10 Division of the Second Judicial Department of 11 12 Brooklyn. Mr. Thompson was a founder with Robert F. 13 Kennedy of the Bedford-Stuyvesant Restoration 14 Corporation of which he was also Director and the New 15 York City Regional Director of the NAACP. 16 when black residents accounted for about one-fourth 17 of Brooklyn's population, Mr. Thompson became a 18 leader of the party in the borough when he was elected Chairman of the Kings County Democratic 19 20 Committee. He is a leader and has been responsible for so many of the candidates across the city of New 21 2.2 York and particularly Brooklyn being elected. 23 counsel to me many times during my election and my campaigns. He will be greatly missed. He has been 24 25 an icon in Brooklyn politics and the development of

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader. My colleagues, I'm introducing three pieces of legislation today, one Introduction 1325, which would amend the Administrative Code to allow for the authorization to create legal defense trusts in New York City. This is for public officials. If you recall, last year the Conflicts of Interest Board came out with quidelines that said that-that contributions to legal defense trusts were prohibited over 50 which essentially renders moot any legal defense trust in New York City and so this bill would allow for the creation of legal defense trusts in the unlikely and unfortunate event of anybody finding themselves a public official under and investigation whether they did something wrong or not, but allowing for the opportunity for them to defend themselves. There's a long history in many jurisdictions that allow of legal defense trusts and New York City should-should follow that lead, and this bill creates a responsible, transparent and-andand separate and apart distinct framework from any other funds, any campaign funds or other funds,

2 public funds to allow for a legal defense. addition, I have introduced Resolution 715 with 3 Council Member Barry Grodenchik to pass legislative-a 4 resolution to call on Congress to pass legislation in 5 6 response to reducing poverty in America by promoting 7 opportunities and economic mobility, Executive Order, which was signed by the President in April of 2018, 8 which was very detrimental, and it's important that 9 10 we stand up strong and say in New York City that we support our social safety net. In addition, with 11 12 colleagues Treyger, Cumbo, Levine, Rivera, Ampry-13 Samuel, Chin and Ayala creating a kind (sic) of 14 Department of Education to implement the 15 recommendations to the Mayor's Sexual Health 16 Education Task Force, and lastly, I just want to say 17 a quick word about my friend Nicholas Heyward, Senior 18 who passed away last week Nicholas Heyward lost son Nicholas Naquam Heyward, Jr. to police violence in 19 20 1994. Nick Heyward has been a leader in our communities for over 20 years calling attention to-to 21 2.2 police violence and the devastating consequences of 23 police violence and-but he always was a-such a-a 24 remarkably dignified and kind and gentle person who spoke truth to power from a-from a position of deep 25
