them up to our State Assembly. It's important to note at some point we will need to reconvene to pass companion home rules on some of these matters to the State Senate. Some of these home rules today only have Assembly bill numbers, so it's important to note that we will need to hopefully reconvene sooner rather than later to send ones up to the Senate as well. Before I comment on some of the home rules, I want to thank the staff to the State and Federal Legislation Committee who worked very quickly on these bills, also the Finance staff who worked on these home rules, in particular Tanisha Edwards, the counsel to our Finance Division, Casinia Cobain [phonetic] who is part of our Finance Division and Scott Crowley for their work on the home rules. As I said, there are about a dozen home rules we'll be taking action on today. Let me mention a couple of them. There are a number of home rules that deal with the \$900 million revenue package that we have requested authority from Albany to implement. This tax package includes a number of things and does not include a number of other things. important to note that this package is about \$100-

\$150 million smaller than the original revenue package sent over by Mayor Bloomberg. It's also important to note that this consensus revenue package does not include \$100 million that would have been generated from a nickel per plastic bag tax in the City of New York. That is something we will not be foisting on New Yorkers through our actions today. It's also very important to note that we will not be eliminating the sales tax exemption on clothes under \$110 in the City of New York. That is \$300 million that New Yorkers will not be paying, \$300 million worth of purchase that low, moderate and middle income New Yorkers will not be taxed on. We also believe that had we eliminated that exemption, in addition to hitting New Yorkers when they're buying new school clothes for their children in September or holiday outfits in December, we also believe that that action might have cost the city as much as 1,200 to 1,500 retail jobs. So we're very happy to be able to protect those today as well. We are taking action today though to generate money for the city's budget to help make sure we can prevent unnecessary layoffs and preserve core services.

So we are asking the State Assembly to allow us to raise the city sales tax. We're also putting in place a set of business conformity taxes that we believe will make taxes fairer for businesses but also bring in needed revenue for the city and taking an important step forward and changing how we tax businesses. Presently in the City of New York, if you're a business that does business here and somewhere else, we have to tax how many profits you make in New York. We determine how to tax your profits based on your sales, the number of jobs you have here and how much capital investment headquarters you have here. Taxing all three is a great reason not to have jobs and not to have your headquarters in the City of New York. By moving to what's called the single sales factor, we will only tax business profits on That sends a message to businesses come here, bring your jobs here, bring your headquarters here. Combining that with conformity in the out years after 2013 or 2015, we will see a decrease in revenue, but right now we will see an increase in revenue but also be sending a message to businesses that New York is business friendly

and we want you to move your headquarters here. We believe this will bring us revenue and help us get out of the recession more quickly. passing two other home rules today, one that will allow us to create a biotech tax credit in the City of New York. This tax credit, when you couple it with the actions we're taking by creating the East River Science Park, by last week making the East River Science Park part of an Empire Zone, this biotech tax credit will help fill jobs and put them in that East River Science Park, put more jobs at the Brooklyn Army Terminal and we believe put thousands of New Yorkers to work in an industry where we should be the national leader and not lagging behind Boston and San Diego. We're also taking steps through these home rules to bring some justice as it relates to tax fairness for freelancers and sole proprietors. Those individuals now get taxed individually and get taxed under the unincorporated business tax. That's for some sole proprietors or freelancers anywhere from \$5,000 to \$10,000 a year they're paying as freelancers. We're going to be creating a change to the unincorporated business tax that

will exempt freelancers and sole proprietors from that tax. Think about it, at a time when people are getting laid off and they need to be freelancing, they need to be starting up their own enterprises, we're going to lighten the tax load on them just a little bit. So all of these actions together I believe will get us desperately needed revenues we need to keep the rest of our budget in order, but we're doing it in a way that is fair and balanced and gives help to those who need it to freelances, but also sends a long-term message that we're open for business, particularly for the biotech industry but also for any company that wants to open its headquarters here. would urge all of my colleagues to please vote in support of these home rules. At the end of this meeting we will stand in recess and then following the meeting we're going to have a guick leadership meeting and then a budget negotiating team meeting and then go into delegations in a timely fashion. Thank you all very much.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: You know, the sales tax is a regressive tax and I'm very concerned about it. I understand the predicament we're in. Albany is in a mess and so they may be saying no a personal income tax for those who are making about \$500,000. Albany stopped at \$250,000 for individuals, \$300,000 for couples and it went up to \$500,000, but what about those making \$5 million and \$10 million? When it comes to us we get stuck because then we say well that's dead on arrival. That's going to happen. Well what about a stock transfer tax? That's not going to happen. Well what about a commuter tax? That's not going to happen. Any taxes that tax those who can afford to pay it we're just told it's not going to happen. So if you don't pass the sales tax then were going to come back in November with a

deficit, a shortfall and have to cut programs. So
we get stuck in a bad situation. So I just wanted
to say that at some point Albany is so messed up
anything could happen. I don't know whose running
what up in Albany so we should take a chance
sometime and say let's push for a more progressive
taxation as opposed to the regressive taxation on
the people of the city and the state. We already
probably will face sub transit hikes, tolls on
bridges, CUNY and SUNY taxes and now a sales tax.
So I think at some point we have to put more
pressure on Albany, especially since it's 31 to
31. So if we get one person anywhere, we could
probably have a simple majority. I'm going to
vote no on Preconsidered Reso M1461. The people
are in enough pain. This economic crisis has
caused layoffs and more taxes on the people. It's
just not a direction we should go in. So I vote
aye on all and no on Preconsidered home rule
M1461.

I come from the same place and I find a lot of this frustrating. I know that I would prefer a high end PIT and I know the Speaker addressed that point in her State of the City address as well. In fact, I did a budget survey in my district that overwhelmingly favored that alternative to the sales tax. It becomes a very hard vote to cast. But the fact of the matter is because of the number of twilight zone moments in Albany the choice really has to be reflected in concrete If we don't authorize the sales tax, as reality. distasteful as it is, there will be layoffs and that's going to put real people out of real jobs in real important functions in the City of New Whether that be cops, firefighters, teachers, sanitation workers, day care workers, whatever, there are going to be layoffs in big numbers if we do not find this half billion dollars worth of revenue. I'd prefer we find it someplace else, but that is not the choice that we have before us today. We've improved the choice

2	tax package presented to us today makes this tax
3	package on which we are voting an overall
4	significant improvement to our city's tax system
5	as well as improvements which are more conducive
6	to business activity and growth within the city.
7	But we need to view these improvements as first
8	steps towards the goal of overall reform,
9	simplicity and improvement. Today the city will
10	need to needlessly engage in budget cutbacks, or
11	not today but this season because of loopholes
12	which need to be closed in our property tax
13	system. We need to move forward with overall
14	reform, equity and simplicity. I'm voting aye

My colleagues, when we look at the economic situation of our great city and the financial trouble that we're in, and knowing that we fund so many programs that impact our people from affordable housing to people with HIV/AIDS to legal services to child care services and even supporting small businesses and trying to help them survive, when you put that all together our city is in trouble financially and we all know that. And if you look at the financial packages that have been put together by our staff, including some of the proposals by Mayor Bloomberg to increase the sales tax of one-half of one percent that sales tax increase will bring in

2	approximately \$450 million. I ask you my
3	colleagues to think about voting yes on this
4	particular matter and do not consider about
5	thinking no. If you think about considering no,
6	think about all of the workers that will be
7	negatively impacted and laid off in fact this City
8	Council votes no. And those workers live in all
9	five boroughs, including Staten Island, Manhattan,
10	Bronx, Brooklyn, and Queens. Understand that
11	these are workers that are employed by the City of
12	New York and in fact they lose their jobs, as you
13	know, foreclosures will occur and people will be
14	falling on the city services in order to survive.
15	I ask you to consider that if you're thinking
16	about voting no on 1461. This was put forward not
17	by us but by the mayor in order to balance our
18	budget. I vote yes on all items and I ask you to
19	consider that before you vote no. Thank you.
20	MICHAEL MCSWEENEY: James?
21	COUNCIL MEMBER JAMES: I vote aye.
22	Yes.
23	MICHAEL MCSWEENEY: Katz?
24	COUNCIL MEMBER KATZ: I vote no on
25	M1461, ave on all the rest.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Request

4 permission to explain my vote.

BETSY GOTBAUM: So ordered.

COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: I would 6 7 prefer a PIT increase, although I would propose a 8 PIT surcharge across all taxpayers. But not 9 having the option to vote for that I'm reluctantly 10 willing to vote for the sales tax increase 11 although I don't like sales taxes. However, I do 12 feel constrained to comment very briefly on my 13 colleague, Councilman Barron's remarks, and that is to say that we have here in New York City and 14 15 want to preserve, even though we've seen great 16 declines in Wall Street and financial business 17 activity, we still are the financial capitol of 18 the country and perhaps to some extent the world. 19 Putting all of the burden on people who are 2.0 admittedly very successful, it sounds good but I 21 would caution you, Charles and everyone that we 22 don't want to kill for a nice meal the goose that 23 laid the golden egg. We want to keep those geese 24 laying those eggs. They're not going to keep 25 laying those eggs in New York if we expect them to

bear the entire burden. And we also should recognize that Albany in opposition quite frankly to the comments of the governor and the mayor substantially increased the taxes to those earning more than \$300,000 a year. So, Charles, one can go too far as I said, and we get one nice meal but then there won't be anything left for tomorrow. I withdraw my request and vote in the affirmative on all.

MICHAEL MCSWEENEY: Gioia?

COUNCIL MEMBER GIOIA: Thank you.

I vote yes on all with the exception of M1461 that I vote no on. Madame Public Advocate, I could explain my vote very briefly. I commend my colleagues for holding firm and keeping the sales tax free on clothing items under \$110 but I think we need to do more. This city is getting too expensive to live in. The middle class and those working to get into the middle class are being pushed out of New York City. Raising taxes on those who can least afford to live in New York is not the right thing to do. I think all too often this debate is couched in vital services versus raising taxes. And I think there's another place

BETSY GOTBAUM: So ordered.
