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2	CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Sergeant,
3	we're ready? Okay, okay. Good afternoon. Good
4	afternoon, and welcome. I'm Councilman Jim
5	Gennaro, Chair of the City Council's Committee on
6	Environmental Protection. Today we're holding a
7	vote on Proposed Resolution 1850-A. I and members
8	of this Committee have long been concerned about
9	the possibility of horizontal drilling and
LO	hydraulic fracturing in the quest for natural gas
11	within the New York City watershed. And we held
12	hearings on this subject in September and October
13	of 2008. Those hearings reinforced my belief that
L4	this type of natural gas drilling should by no
L5	means be allowed to take place in the New York
L6	City watershed, an area that provides clean,
L7	unfiltered drinking water for millions of people.
L8	When the New York State Department of
L9	Environmental Conservation released its Draft
20	Supplemental Generic Environmental Impact
21	Statement, relating to hydraulic fracturing in
22	September of this year, I immediately scheduled a
23	hearing to explore the extent to which the

document addressed my concerns and the concerns of

the many witnesses who attended our earlier

2	hearings. Along with the New York City DEP, the
3	US Geological Survey, and many environmental
4	advocates and concerned citizens, I found the
5	permitting procedures and regulations in the
6	DSGEIS to be woefully poor in the protection of
7	drinking water supplies. This City's watershed
8	lands and infrastructure were developed and
9	nurtured by New York City, and supported by recent
10	land purchases that I fought for. Our land
11	acquisition programs and watershed rules have
12	allowed us to continue to drink high quality,
13	unfiltered drinking water, and to avoid spending
14	billions of dollars on a filter plant. The
15	combined totalthe combined total of City owned
16	land and land under City purchase easements in the
17	Catskill Delaware Watershed, is more than 144,000
18	acres. That comes to more than twelve percent of
19	the land in the watershed. In total, New York
20	City has spent more than \$2 billion to protect its
21	watershed. Nothing should be allowed to
22	jeopardize and unfiltered and pure drinking water
23	source for half the state. Today we will vote on
24	Proposed Resolution 1850-A, which calls on all
25	parties who share responsibility for the enduring

2	safety of New York City's drinking water supply,
3	to take action to protect it from natural gas
4	drilling operations. We first call on the US
5	Congress to pass House Resolution 2776, which
6	would restore the authority of the Environmental
7	Protection Agency to regulate hydraulic fracturing
8	operations, with respect to drinking water safety.
9	We believe that an activity as complex and
10	potentially dangerous as fracking should be
11	monitored by the EPA. Just as a sideline, that
12	was, this was done in 2005, to take awaysilence
13	my phone here, thought I just shut it off, okay
14	EPA's oversight through the Safe Drinking Water
15	Act of fracking was taken away in 2005, in a bad
16	move by Congress, and the oversight of fracking by
17	EPA should be restored. So that's what that bill
18	does, Resolution 2776. Second, we call upon the
19	EPA to reassess its 2004 study of the dangers of
20	fracking and apply stringent regulations to
21	fracking operations, should it receive that
22	authority from Congress. The 2004 study found no
23	threat to drinking water supplies, but an agency
24	whistleblower later revealed that evidence to the
25	contrary had been suppressed. We need an accurate

assessment of the dangers of fracking and 2 appropriate regulations that minimize them. 3 Third, we call on New York State Department of 4 5 Health, who's been very silent in this process, to assess the risks of fracking to public health and 6 the preservation of our filtration avoidance determination, or FAD. As the agency that is 9 primarily responsible for oversight of the FAD, DOH must take an active role in assessing and 10 11 acting on the dangers of fracking. Fourth, we 12 call upon New York State legislature to pass a law 13 prohibiting drilling for natural gas within the New York City watershed. We also call on Governor 14 15 Patterson to promote and sign such a law, and on 16 DEC to prohibit the issuance of permits within the 17 watershed. The risk to this enormous drinking water supply from any drilling is simply too 18 19 great. Finally, we call upon DEP to extend its 20 public comment period on the DSGEIS to February 21 The public needs a sufficient amount of 28, 2010. 22 time within which to analyze and comment on this 23 lengthy document, and we want to allow enough time 24 for high quality public participation in this 25 review process. I urge all members to vote yes on

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2	this Resolution. I want to recognize the members
3	that are here. We have Council Member Dr. Eugene,
4	a pleasure to have you here. Council Member
5	Ulrich, Council Member Recchia, Council Member
6	Vallone. And I want to thank the staff who put
7	together this great Resolution. We have the
8	Counsel to the Committee, Samara Swanson and
9	Siobhan Watson. My own staff member, William
10	Murray, I have Brad Groznik, he was also very
11	active on doing a lot of PR and getting the word
12	out on this very important issue. With that said,
13	I wouldOh, do we have the clerk here? Is the
14	clerk here? [off mic comment] Yeah. In order to
15	take a vote, we're going to need a vote taker.
16	ISRAEL MARTINEZ: Crowley's here
17	now.
18	CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: Joined by
19	ISRAEL MARTINEZ: Now we can call
20	CHAIRPERSON GENNARO: We're joined
