COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you gentlemen for joining us.

SPEAKER QUINN: If I could just for a moment before we start the vote, ask my colleagues to rise. We just got notification a few minutes before the Stated meeting began that Dennis De Leon, who I believe many of you known and have served with in different parts of government passed away. Dennis has been battling and fighting HIV and AIDS for a very, very, very long time; continued, even when he was not feeling well, continued to serve as the Manhattan delegation's appointee to the Civilian Complaint Review Board as the Executive Director of the Latino Commission on AIDS. I think we all also remember he was Mayor David Dinkins' Human Rights Commissioner. He had been Borough President Dinkins' Deputy Borough President, and a long list of other positions serving the City of New York, the Latino community and the LGBT HIV/AIDS

community. I have a lot of memories of Dennis,
but one of the ones that I can remember most
clearly is being in the Humans Rights Commission
Office in the early '90s when I was working for
the then Council Member Tom Duane, and Dennis was
trying, you know, just so hard to negotiate an
agreement between the Irish Lesbian and Gay
Organization and the Ancient Order of Hibernians.
And although that obviously never happened, Dennis
was just with his heart and soul and every, you
know, belief he had in the goodness of people
struggling to find a resolution. And it was that
heart and soul and you know, tremendous optimism
that he brought to all of the work that he did in
behalf of New Yorkers. And he and his partner and
their family will be in our thoughts and prayers
over this holiday season. We'll notify you as
soon as we get information about the memorial.
But let me in a second call on the chair of the
Manhattan Delegation. But let me just say after a
long and valiant and hard fought struggle, may
Dennis De Leon rest in peace. Gale?
COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you
very much. On behalf of the Manhattan Delegation

I want to say that yes, he was an incredible	
representative to the CCRB, and I think I speak	
for my colleagues to state that when he came and	
gave us a presentation, it was the most thought	
out, the most concise, had the most heart and he	
had what very few of us had, a real list of what	
needed to get done, and it came after years and	
years and years of experience. And I think it's	
something that Council Member Garodnick followed	
up on in terms of legislation. So I want to say	,
he was an attorney. I knew him from the Dinkins	
administration when we worked together; at that	
point the Human Rights Commission was not an easy	Ţ
place to be; it was a lot of challenges, you	
mentioned one, there were many, many others.	
Those of us who were part of that administration	
may not want to remember them all. But the fact	
of the matter is he was always upbeat, even when	
he was seriously challenged in terms of his	
illness, and he treated people with such respect	•
I think that's what I take away from Dennis, no	
matter whom he talked to or when he talked to	
them, it was with the same intellectual ability	
and the same regarding for everyone to have great	ī

Communication from the Speaker.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very I think as most folks know, after extensive much. negotiations with the Bloomberg Administration and with the Related Corporation, we are disappointed that we have been unable to reach an agreement on a number of concerns with the proposed redevelopment plan for the Kingsbridge Armory. Because of that, many issues remain unresolved with this project, and as a result of that I'm urging all of my colleagues to vote to disapprove the plan today. The Bronx community surrounding the Armory is an area with significant traffic and health problems, and the impact this project will have cannot be underestimated. Even after numerous and lengthy discussions, there continues to be a significantly negative traffic and public health impact. I note these as two of the land use related issues that were unresolved, but there is too long a list to list all of them, but suffice it to say, these are just two examples of the issues we did not come to resolution on. cannot approve a project that will among other things bring more people to an already overcrowded

area and cause further strain on a community
without a true plan to deal with that additional
traffic congestion. Now of course there were a
number of other issues that arose throughout this
rigorous debate on this plan, including some that
are separate and apart from the Charter's land use
process. We were unable, unfortunately, to reach
a resolution on these matters as well. They are
important and significant, even though they are
not part of the Land Use matters we are voting on
today. I think I speak for all of my colleagues
in the Bronx delegation when I say we are
committed to making the best decisions for this
community and its residents. We want to see a
development in this area that is both responsible
and vibrant. However, and unfortunately, the
current plan for the Kingsbridge Armory is simply
not the right proposal for local residents of this
community at this time. Let me just close by
thanking all the members of the Bronx delegation
for their hard, hard work on trying to come to a
resolution and an agreement. I in particularly
want to thank the chair of the delegation, Annabel
Palma, who did a terrific job in these

negotiations in leading the delegation. I also
want to thank the land use staff, Gail Benjamin,
the fact that we couldn't come to resolution does
not in any way speak to the fact that our staff
worked incredibly hard with Annabel and her staff
and the staff of the delegation to try to come to
a resolution. I also want to thank my First
Deputy Chief of Staff, Ramon Martinez, who has
worked night and day for the past few weeks to try
to come to a resolution. I also want to thank the
other elected officials from the Bronx and the
area, Assembly Member Rivera and also the Bronx
Borough President, Ruben Diaz, who has been
working on this project probably since before he
became Borough President, but certainly since the
day he became Borough President. And I think I
speak for the Borough President and the Assembly
Member also when I say all of us in the Council
and in government stand at the ready to continue
to have discussions around the Kingsbridge Armory
in the hope that there will be a proposal that all
of us can support, which would mean compromise
from all of the parties involved. Thank you very
much, Mr. Public Advocate, and I urge all of my
