This was a mandate for New Yorkers to get big money out and reform the system now. I want to thank Speaker Johnson for endorsing question one on the ballot, recognizing this mandate of the voters and his leadership. However, despite voters clearly making-- knowing this reform is what they wanted, the changes did not take effect until 2021. Introduction 1288 extends the newly adopted Campaign finance system to the February 2019 Special Election, September 2019 Primary Election, and November 2019 General Election for Public Advocate, and the cascade of elections that will follow. This legislation will allow ballot question one to lower contribution limits from \$2,550 citywide to \$1,000 increased public matching. Every small dollar contribution
