To the Honorable Speaker Christine Quinn,

As a long time resident of 48th Street between 17th and 18th Ave. in **Boro Park**, I am totally opposed to the proposed commercial development on the corner of 18th Ave. and 48th Street.

I highlight BORO PARK because this neighborhood is synonymous with children.

I would like to quote from Wikipedia (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Borough_Park,_Brooklyn) regarding the community and families in Boro Park.

⁶⁶ Borough Park is home to one of the largest Orthodox Jewish communities outside of Israel, with one of the largest concentrations of Jews in the United States and Orthodox traditions rivaling many insular communities.^[1] Since the average number of children in Hasidic and Hareidi families is 6.72, Borough Park is experiencing sharp growth.^[2]

Population growth

In a 2000 Census study, it was reported that an estimated 76,600 Jews lived in Borough Park.[5] Since that time, Borough Park has grown significantly, and has earned the title of "baby boom capital" of New York City because of its high birth rate. The neighborhood recorded 4,523 births in 2004,[6] the highest in the city."

Hasidic families often require larger homes, and this has fueled construction and renovation projects across the neighborhood. The vast majority of these projects involve larger bedrooms and kitchens. Since 1990, the Building Department has issued more permits for private construction projects - new homes and additions - in the Borough Park area than in any other residential neighborhood in Brooklyn."[3] These construction projects were aided with a new law in 1992, which established Borough Park as a special zoning district where residents could build on 65% of their lot. This reduced the size of setbacks and backyards tremendously.

Education

Virtually all the large population of school-children born into Borough Park's Hasidic families attend local yeshivas for boys and Beis Yaakov-type schools for girls. This has diminished the student population of local schools, such as Montauk Intermediate School. The New York City Department of Education hoped to take advantage of the empty space and construct a small school, called the Kingsborough Early College School, inside Montauk. [8] The Hasidic community was not pleased by the prospect of a new public school because it would bring "a bad element" (scantily clad girls) and protested the decision. The Community Educational Council heard these complaints and decided against expanding its public school system.

As you can tell from the above article the community is all about large families with children playing in the street. Also being a Hasidic community there special needs and apprehensions that are always of great concern to us.

Another bank is not necessary in a neighborhood already over flowing with banks. As you can see from following article from Crain's New York Business:

The bank branch-building boom is long over in most parts of the city—but not in Borough Park, Brooklyn, one of New York's largest Orthodox Jewish communities.

Just as people in Manhattan find a Starbucks almost every few steps, so those on Borough Park's main strip—10 blocks of 13th Avenue starting at 45th Street—encounter no fewer than 14 banks.

But some longtime neighborhood businesses complain that the expansion is pricing them out of their retail spaces. Rents on 13th Avenue currently range from \$75 to \$175 a square foot, according to Tim King, principal at CPEX Real Estate.

Though Cheskel Goldstein, owner of Lane Cards and Gift Shop, had three years left on his lease at 4701 13th Ave., he chose to take his landlord's offer of a payment to move. He would not disclose the exact sum.

"Banks can pay more rent," says Mr. Goldstein, who moved to a smaller space two blocks down the avenue. Lane's former location, which the business occupied for more than two decades, will become a Bank of America branch.

Many residents and business owners question the need for more branches in Borough Park. The neighborhood's median household income is \$38,023, according to New York University's Furman Center for Real Estate and Urban Policy. **

The above articles prove that what is desperately needed in our neighborhood is increased housing and parks. We have a severe housing shortage here. A bank is not needed or wanted by the residents of this block and the neighborhood at large.
