SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. If I could, ask my colleagues to please rise for a moment. I just want to note with sadness that on May 20th, 2010, Nelly James, who was 90-years-old, the mother of our colleague Council Member Tish James, passed away after a long illness. Born in Martinsville, Virginia is 1919, Ms. James lived in Brooklyn for quite some time and for 25 years worked for AT&T. Nelly James was a member of Calvary Baptist Church in Council Member Comrie's district. A private funeral and burial were held yesterday. I know Tish, and her family, have been and will remain in all of our thoughts and prayers.

I also want to ask everyone on the Council to keep Alison Cordero in their thoughts and prayers. I know many of you know Alison. She has been a long time organizer at St. Nicks in Diana's district in Brooklyn. She's somebody who's worked on too long a list of housing and tenant issues to mention. She recently suffered a

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stroke and is beginning to make progress.	So if
people could, please keep Alison in their	thoughts
and prayers, Diana and I would appreciate	it.
Thank you.	

Today, we are voting on a number of different pieces of legislation, and one very implement Land Use action and that is a rezoning of 238 blocks in Astoria Queens. I want to thank Gail Benjamin and everyone on the Land Use staff who worked very long and hard on this complicated rezoning. I want to thank and congratulate Council Member Peter Vallone, Jr., who represents Astoria. I want to thank the chair of our Land Use Committee, Chairperson Leroy Comrie and the chair of the Zoning Subcommittee, Mark Weprin.

This is a very large rezoning, a rezoning that is designed to protect and preserve the neighborhood character of Astoria Queens.

Anyone who has spent any time in Astoria can easily appreciate why this is a neighborhood that so many people have moved to and then stayed in for their entire lives to raise their families.

But if you've been to Astoria recently, you've seen the neighborhood begin to be

dotted with inappropriately tall buildings,
buildings that are out of character with the rest
of the low rise, largely residential character of
Astoria. This 238-block rezoning seeks to
preserve the integrity of Astoria and prevent any
more inappropriate rezoning.

It also, within those 238 blocks, doesn't apply one uniform rezoning, but it uniquely recognizes the distinct nature of the different parts of Astoria, creating in this zoning about 12-14 different unique neighborhood within neighborhood rezoning actions to preserve the unique character of blocks which in and of themselves make many neighborhoods.

Also, an inclusionary zoning overlay, this rezoning will help facilitate the creation of more affordable housing in this part of Queens. It is a rezoning which everyone who has anything to do with it should be enormously proud. Let me first call on the Council Member who has worked long and hard on this, Council Member Peter Vallone, and then our Chairs Leroy Comrie and then Mark Weprin.

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Thank you,

Madame Speaker. This is the first major rezoning
of Astoria since 1961. As the Speaker said, now
as we speak, there are essentially two zones in
Astoria, R-5 and R-6. But in a few minutes, we'll
have many, many spot zones in Astoria, contextual
zones appropriate for the areas where people live.
This zoning will allow for responsible development
while stopping the out of character development
we've seen sprout up in my neighborhood and so
many other neighborhoods.

I want to thank Amanda Burden and City Planning; Council Members Comrie and Weprin as the chairs; Council staff, especially Gail Benjamin; my chief of staff Kathleen Sims; and staffers Alexis Confer and Jonathan Chung; the people of Astoria, especially those from Norwood Gardens, many of whom are up in our balcony today with us for this occasion; the Speaker and the entire City Council for helping to keep Astoria the great community that it is. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much. Chairperson Comrie? He's not here. Chairperson Weprin?

COUNCIL MEMBER WEPRIN: Thank you,

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Madame Speaker. I just want to follow Council	
Member Vallone by complimenting him on all the	
hard work he put in, along with City Planning.	
The people in City Planning went block by block	
throughout Astoria, 238 blocks and did spot zoning	
throughout the area and really did an amazing job	
of trying to deal with the community, work with	
the neighborhood groups to put it all together in	
order to protect the character of Astoria which is	
such a wonderful diverse ethnically and finally	
and everything else community where people get	
together and live there. It's made up of lots of	
small neighborhoods.	

It's such a valuable gem in Queens
County and for the City of New York. It really
was a terrific job that City Planning and Council
Member Vallone did by really putting this all
together and putting all the puzzle pieces in
place. Thank you very much.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Chairperson Weprin. I also want to make note of a couple of pieces of legislation coming out of the Health Committee and I want to thank Terzah Nasser and Adira Siman for their work on

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it. We're voting on Intro 206 and Intro 207, both of which seek to repeal regulations and permit requirements that are on the books, part of the Department of Health's Administration Code but have not ever been utilized, permits that have never been granted.

We want to in a kind of spring cleaning, if you will, go into the Administration Code of the Department of Health and take out requirements that are out of date and not being utilized to make sure that the administration code and the laws of the City of New York are in fact accurate and reflect what is needed and what is being used, not out of date requirements that are no longer part of the everyday life of the City of New York.

In addition to thanking the staff who worked on this and did this cleaning, I want to thank the Chair of the Health Committee,

Council Member Maria del Carmen Arroyo for her work on these two pieces of legislation.

I also want to make note of Intro

226-A which also comes out of the Health Committee

and thank Chair Arroyo again for her work. This

is a piece of legislation that will renew a law		
which was passed after a seven-month-old child		
died in childcare. This piece of legislation		
historically has required a great deal of		
reporting from the Department of Health to the		
Council and the public about different childcare		
related issues.		

In the act we take today in 226-A, we not only renew that law, but we expand the reporting requirements that have been required, both reporting requirements to the public and to the Council to make sure we really are monitoring the situation out there in childcare in New York City to make sure that those facilities are as safe as they possibly can be.

I want to also thank and call on her to speak, the sponsor of the bill, Council Member Annabel Palma.

COUNCIL MEMBER PALMA: Thank you,

Madame Speaker. I want to thank Speaker Quinn,

Adira Siman, Joe Mancino, the chair of the Health

Committee, my colleague Council Member Maria del

Carmen Arroyo for the work that they did on this

bill. The Speaker highlighted the importance of

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this bill. It is extremely important that we keep our children safe.

Regular inspections of and reporting by childcare facilities and programs are a crucial step in protecting children's physical and wellbeing. This bill will definitely do that. It provides an opportunity to expand and strengthen these vital safety measures. I am extremely happy that we are able to pass this bill today. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Lastly, I want to thank Chairperson Dilan and Council Member Crowley for their work on Intro 68-A which increases penalties for work done by unlicensed plumbers in the City of New York. I want to thank Baaba Halm, Jeff Haberman and Ben Goodman for their work on this as well. That concludes Communications from the Speaker.

Basically, it's mirrored after the old former Chancellor's District. This is an opportunity to help our struggling schools, before a decision is made, to turn them around. So I've given you the particular item and I ask you to support it when we vote on it this afternoon. Thank you.

afternoon. I urge my colleagues to vote on
Resolution 207, calling upon the United States
Congress to pass House Resolution 4224, the
Together We Care Act. This act would establish a
pilot program to train public housing residents as
home health aides and as home based health service
providers. It would enable these trained
residents to provide Medicaid eligible health
services to elderly and disabled residents of
public housing and federally assisted rental
housing.

The bill would create desperately needed jobs for low income people while simultaneously providing vital home based health services in our city. House Resolution 4224 was introduced in the United States House of Representatives by Congresswoman Nydia Velazquez, which has been a strong advocate for both public housing and public health services throughout her career.

This bill is estimated to create

2	6,000 jobs nationwide within a population that is
3	severely under employed. I'd like to thank my
4	colleagues, co-sponsors Council Members Mark-
5	Viverito, Mendez, and Chin. Thank you to my
6	colleagues.

COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL:

Colleagues, we have on the introduction agenda
today Intro 251 which I'm the prime sponsor with
Annabel Palma. Many of you are already co-
sponsors of the bill. It provides that where we
provide public subsidy to projects, those who
benefit from those projects should pay what is
called a living wage. Many communities, many
municipalities around the country have enacted
living wage legislation.

This is a commonsense measure that says that where we give public subsidy, we should expect that projects will support the wages of people at least to a minimum level. \$10 an hour is hardly enough really to support a family. It comes out to \$18,000 a year. But at the very least, where we subsidize a project, people should earn that kind of money.

I say to the mayor and others that we're willing to negotiate on this, but the principle should in fact be established in law. I hope that all of my colleagues will support this initiative. I think it's a very important one that I think sets up a principle and also a reality in this city that should exist and that is

2	when we support projects, those projects have to
3	be to the benefit of those who benefit from them.
4	So again, 251, I hope you'll fill
5	in the sheet today and indicate you'll be a co-
6	sponsor. We already have over 20 co-sponsors.
7	We're hopeful, as I say, that all of us will
8	ultimately be a sponsor and we're certainly
9	willing to negotiate with the administration on
10	this measure.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you
