3 CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Good morning, 4 ladies and gentlemen, my name is Joel Rivera, I am 5 the Chair of the Committee in Rules, Privileges, and Elections. Before we begin, let me introduce 6 the members who are here with us today. We have 7 8 to my left Council Member Erik Dilan, Council Member Vincent Gentile, Council Member Jimmy 9 10 Vacca, Council Member Elizabeth Crowley is to my right, and Council Member Inez Dickens. In front 11 12 of us we have Council Member Leroy Comrie and 13 Council Member Lew Fidler. Have I missed anyone?

Today we have before us one candidate for our review, she is Victoria

Sammartino, a resident of the Bronx is being recommended by the Council to the Mayor for appointment as a member of the Youth Board. If appointed, Ms. Sammartino will serve for an undefined term.

First I will briefly describe the functions of the Youth Board. The Youth Board serves as an advisory body to the Commissioner of the Department of Youth and Community Development

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resident of the Bronx, an alumni of the New York
City public school system, and a product of many
DYCD funded programs, including summer youth
employment which offered me my first job 19 years
ago this summer.

In short, New York City raised me well and when I left to attend Bennington College in Vermont, I took a New York City train map, a long distance phone card, and a desire to return home as an asset to my community.

While I was still in college I began a poetry workshop at the high school for adolescent girls on Rikers Island, it was called Rosewood High School at the time and has since merged with Island Academy High School. That workshop was a success and I was offered a full time teaching position, which I enthusiastically accepted. I had known from my very first visit to Rikers Island that I was meant to work with the adolescent girls there who reminded me of myself, of the girls I had grown up with, and of my younger sister who was their age at the time. And when I realized that I was not meant to be a full time educator, it was in part because I knew that

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I had to go out into our beautiful, complicated city and figure out what had gone wrong for my students to be in jail in the first place and what services were available to them when they got out.

I often heard myself say there's hope and I knew that I needed something more tangible than that to offer.

As I was resigning my teaching position, I asked if I could continue to come to teach a poetry workshop once a week and the principal at the time agreed. That weekly workshop would continue non-stop for the next nine years, during which I would found Voices Unbroken, a Bronx-based non-profit organization that is dedicated to providing underheard members of the community, primarily youth ages 14 to 21, with the tools and opportunity for creative self-Through high quality creative writing expression. workshops and group homes, residential treatment facilities, jails, juvenile detention centers, and various other alternative and transitional settings, Voices Unbroken nurtures the inherent need in all people to tell their stories and be heard. It is our belief that this telling of

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stories and sharing of dreams leads to individual and community growth.

Voices Unbroken began as a small grassroots organization based in my studio apartment and I was fortunate enough to work for a variety of youth-serving organizations and agencies, many of them supported by DYCD, until we had the funding to hire me as a full time executive director. During those early years I had the privilege to work as a substitute teacher in various alternative high schools in the Bronx, a community organizer, a poet in residence in high schools and junior high schools for students with severe behavioral and learning disorders, an academic counselor for women coming out of prison, and a youth worker. I returned to the organizations that served me as a teenager and was hired to do a range of things, including curriculum development and facilitation of youth development groups.

In preparation for today's hearing,

I have been reflecting on the experiences of

Voices Unbroken's participants and on my own

experience as a teenager and I remembered reciting

work we do is actually on Rikers Island, some of

the young people will be convicted and will wind

up doing state time, so it's difficult for us and

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we don't have the capacity right now to track young people when they come home. But we do the workshops, many workshops we do on Rikers but we do also partner with youth serving organizations in the communities, some of which serve young people who are court-mandated to those programs, so we do sometimes stay in touch with young people that way. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON RIVERA: Thank you very much. Any other questions? Council Member Lew Fidler.

COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: More of a comment than a question, as Chair of the Youth Services Committee, I certainly want to applaud your record and your willingness to serve on the Youth Board, we obviously need some more people and more people like you on the Youth Board. I did read your answers regarding runaway and homeless youth which is a particular interest of mine and just to invite you to participate in the informal task force that we have here at the Council on RHY, I think you would have a perspective to add to it and I think you'd also learn some as well that might serve you well on
