I didn't know any other person to call but Dr. Patel. And when I asked the doctor, I said, Dr. Patel, we've got a crisis. I don't have a dime. I said she's got about \$60. She

needs a \$500 machine and the medicine costs \$200.

He said just send her over. He did not take the money from her.

MS. FREEMAN: And I think a person like this should be recognized. And I'm thinking I'm going to solicit right here. I know I might get locked up but you should go to 379 West 125th Street in the Village of Harlem.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. Thank you very much. Thank you very much doctor. Take care. And Inez I don't know if you want to go in the back there [off mic]. And let me next, while we're--as Dr. Patel is exiting, let me call up our Minority Leader Jimmy Oddo.

MINORITY LEADER ODDO: If Council
Member Rose, now the other speaker just said it
best, not everyone who deserves to be honored gets
honored here. And I've been up here for a long
time and I haven't done many of these ceremonials
other than the obligatory, you know, league
championships, but a couple of months ago I was in
Lee's Tavern having a... Ssh.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Quiet please.

MINORITY LEADER ODDO: I was in a local establishment in my District, some of the best pizza in New York City, Lee's Tavern, and I sat next to a Buddy Murnane. And this is a phenomenal New York story. record jackets, when dramatic changes in the

market required new endeavors they persevered.

the New York State Supreme Court.

Today the Brooklyn Botanic Gardens continues in the tradition of excellence through their continuation of research programming. In addition it's committed to educational outreach, creating BASE, Brooklyn Academy for Sciences and the Environment. A significant number of the constituents in the great Borough of Brooklyn attend that great school.

In addition to that BASE is operated by a partnership between the Brooklyn Botanic Gardens, Prospect Park Alliance, and the New York City Department of Education. The Center for Urban Restoration Ecology collaboration between the Garden and Rutgers University seeks to understand patterns of urban biodiversity and to use this information to create protocols for successful restoration of degraded urban environments.

I have confidence that under the new Chairperson David Yassky, there will be reform. But we in this body have a continued obligation as the Speaker indicated. My Committee will be considering further legislation to assist in this agency collecting fines and to make sure that fines are increased where appropriate and

domestic violence continues to plague our City
even while violent crimes as a whole has decreased
generally. One particularly heinous form of
domestic violence is choking or strangulation.
Choking is statistically a predictor of further
battery. In fact 2/3's of DV victims report
having been choked by their partner. 10% of
violent deaths in the US are due to
strangulations. Female victims outnumber males by
a number of 6. These statistics demonstrate both
that strangulation is a major component of
domestic violence and a major crime in itself.

I urge you to vote yes on the Resolution before you now which urges Albany to pass these bills immediately. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: you very much. I want to thank the Speaker and Rob Newman and Damian Butvick for their work on this Resolution. In particular I'd like to thank Chair Rose and Chair Eugene for hearing this important Resolution yesterday. The policy known as Don't Ask, Don't Tell is a miserable failure by any standard and is an affront to the civil rights of gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgendered folks, prohibiting them from serving openly in the military. And since its implementation over 14,000 brave men and women have been forcibly removed from the military and from service to their country simply because they were gay or lesbian.

That policy has cost the military over \$550 million which could have been spent to protect our country further. And this should be an affront to all people. I want to mention that yesterday we heard testimony from none other than my partner of 11 years, Dan Henrick [phonetic] who served in the US Navy and was a Russian linguist,

Don't Ask, Don't Tell is a failed
and discriminatory policy. And after 16 years
there's been nothing positive to show for it
except for the fact that 14,000 soldiers have been
discharged based on their sexual orientation. And
4,000 soldiers had to voluntarily leave the armed
forces. This bill was discriminatory whereas war
does not discriminate. And I'm glad that we were
able to pass this Resolution. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Thank you very much. Next we will hear from Council Member Nelson.

In reference to Don't Ask, Don't Tell. I heard many decent citizens and former military members who appeared before the Civil Rights Committee when I was on it. And I was really saddened by their stories. I wish everybody in this room would have heard their stories. Good, decent people were forced out of the military. Something that they wanted to be in, defending our country because they told or whatever, they got caught.

Now I'm a veteran and somewhat conservative but this issue transcends all this

buildings have taken the rooms, they are often rooms with kitchens and bathrooms down the hall, sometimes some combination, and made them hotel rooms. So in one case I know an older woman lived there for 40 years and all of a sudden with all due respect a young couple with backpacks just throwing up because they'd been out drinking all night and they think it's a hotel. That's the short version.

After 100 meetings with something close to 60 City and State agencies, when I say 100 meetings, that's probably a low number, certainly Council Member Garodnick and Lappin and all of us have been to these meetings. And the fact of the matter is we have determined, thanks to the great staff of the City Council, corporation counsel and many others, that this issue of illegal hotels is not a City matter. We are preempted and it must go to the State legislature. Again, that's the short version.

And so this Resolution is in support of legislation on the State level that would then prohibit this kind of illegal use.

Needless to say the Fire Department, the Buildings

2	Department, anybody who's concerned about safety,	
3	the Mayor's Office of Special Enforcement, have	
4	been trying for five years to deal with it. And	
5	we're in such a grey area, lawsuits are also in	
6	the middle of this discussion, and so we do not	
7	have a resolution unless Albany acts.

Osvaldo Rios to represent us. And I want to thank all the colleagues, my Latina colleagues that signed on to the statement that we put out,

Assemblywoman Arroyo as well. So Diana and Rosie

and Julissa and Annabel and Maria that signed the strong statement that we put out and the pressure really is a strong statement on behalf of survivors of domestic violence in response. And on behalf of our community to know that these individuals that abuse women and have a record are not people that we want to emulate in our community. It's a very strong statement. I think it's a great victory for our community. So thank you all and thank you to the Speaker for really being supportive of our stand and our position and thank you for the flowers.

I also just wanted to take a moment to say that I'm extremely disturbed by comments that were made by Borough President of Staten

Island Molinaro today when he was referring to President of Mexico, Felipe Calderone as a despotic idiot and talking about putting him on a one-way ticket back to his banana republic. It's unbelievable that in this day and age we are still hearing this kind of language that is extremely pejorative, that is very divisive and that is not accepted in this City. We stand strong on behalf of immigrants. We stand strong on the rights of

2	our immigrant communities. And this kind of
3	language is extremely troubling. So there will be
4	a letter that me and some colleagues will be
5	sending to the Borough President to again indicate
6	our real concern. So I just wanted to say that.
7	It came out in the press today and it should

So I really truly thank you. And I just wanted to say that. Thank you.

I just want to take the opportunity to congratulate Council Member Viverito for everything that she did to make sure that domestic violence issues are kept forefront. To make sure that anyone who is involved in a public event is following the mores

Vacca, Jimmy Van Bramer, Eric Ulrich, so many
others who expressed support for this already. So
thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Thank you very much. Next we have Council Member Sanders followed by Council Member Nelson.

COUNCIL MEMBER SANDERS: Of course this City and the Empire State Building should honor Mother Theresa. Seemingly that's a nobrainer. It seems that we need some brains, may they do it.
