Whereas, bills have been introduced in the New York State Legislature by Senators Dilan and Stavisky, S. 3750, and Assembly Member Silver, A. 7328, “AN ACT to amend the vehicle and traffic law and the administrative code of the city of New York, in relation to certain traffic-control indications; to amend chapter 746 of the laws of 1988 amending the vehicle and traffic law, the general municipal law and the public officers law, relating to the civil liability of vehicle owners for traffic control signal
