SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning, and welcome to today's New York City Council vote for the Committee on Health. To minimize disruptions, please place all electronic devices to vibrate or silent mode. At no time is anyone to approach the dais.

Chair Schulman, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON SCHULMAN: (GAVEL SOUND) (GAVELING IN)

Thank you. Good morning, everyone, I am Council
Member Lynn Schulman, Chair of the New York City
Council Committee on Health.

Thank you all for joining us on today's vote on Proposed Introduction Number 1047-B; Proposed Resolution Number 721-A; and Preconsidered Resolution Number 722-A.

Beginning with Proposed Introduction Number 1047-B, sponsored by Council Member Shaun Abreu, this legislation would require the New York City

Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH), or another agency designated by the Mayor with the appropriate subject matter expertise, to establish a

-

3-year pilot program that provides access to sleep apnea screenings at no cost as well as access to home sleep apnea tests, if deemed appropriate. The bill would also include requirements that DOHMH publish a report on the pilot program's effectiveness, detailing whether they believe it should be made permanent. DOHMH will also be required to conduct a public education and outreach campaign on sleep apnea and the pilot program's availability.

Unfortunately, the test for determining if one suffers from sleep apnea can be prohibitively expensive, and lab tests can range from \$1,000 to \$10,000.00 depending on insurance. At-Home tests are cheaper ranging from \$150 to \$1,000, but for a person struggling to make ends meet, this can still pose too much of a financial burden. While Medicare covers 80 percent of the cost of sleep apnea tests, the test must be deemed medically necessary by a doctor, and the deductible must be met.

CHAIRPERSON SCHULMAN: This bill would help eliminate the barriers New Yorkers face when trying to get a sleep apnea tests and the potential financial burdens they may face in the process. As a proud co-sponsor of this legislation, and as Chair of the Health Committee, I am committed to ensuring that every New Yorker can receive the tests and care they need to stay healthy, happy, and be a part of our vibrant community. I want to thank Council Member Abreu for sponsoring this important legislation.

Moving on to Preconsidered Resolution Number 721-A, sponsored by myself, this Resolution calls upon the New York State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign, S.1804/A.128, legislation that would eliminate deductibles, copayment, coinsurance, or any other cost-sharing requirements for asthma inhalers.

In New York State, 1.4 million adults and 315,000 children, that is 8.9 percent of children, suffer from asthma. Nationwide, this number reaches more than 20 million adults and 4.5 million children.

Meanwhile, another respiratory disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, or COPD, is the sixth leading cause of death in the nation. Despite the

for too many of us. These inhalers can reach costs of

5 up to \$640.00 and month, add to that the troubling

trend of asthma being more likely to effect 6

7 neighborhoods in our city that are the most

8 disadvantaged, like Astoria in Queens, which is

labeled "asthma alley", and many neighborhoods in the

Bronx, where the asthma mortality rate is the highest 10

11 in the city, and it is easy to see why this State

legislation this resolution calls for is so 12

S.1804, introduced by State Senator Gustavo Rivera, and A.128, introduced by Assemblymember Jessica González-Rojas, would eliminate deductibles copayment, coinsurance, or any other cost sharing requirements. This would effectively require insurance companies to cover the cost of inhalers in full, eliminating a financial barrier to care that, as it often does, effects the most vulnerable community members.

Finally, we will move to Preconsidered Resolution Number 722-A, also sponsored by me, calling upon the United States Congress to reintroduce and pass, and

the President to sign, H.R. 2665, the Supporting Safety Net Hospitals Act, to delay Medicaid disproportionate share hospital payment reductions until Fiscal Year 2026.

Continuing the theme of insuring the most

vulnerable New Yorkers are able to receive the care they need. This resolution moves our focus towards the safety net hospitals that are vital in caring for our communities. DSH payments have been provided by the federal government since the early 1980s and they provide funding for hospitals whose patient population includes a large proportion of Individuals insured through Medicaid and individuals who are uninsured. Unfortunately, despite the ACA increasing the availability of health insurance, 95 percent of hospitals in New York State still rely on DHS allotments to stay in business. Through this, our state and our city will be among the highest impacted by these cuts. While these cuts have been successfully delayed for about a decade, they have finally begun to take effect starting January 1st of this year and continuing through Fiscal Year 2027. An estimated \$8 billion in DSH allotments will be cut annually, resulting in a total reduction of about 50

2 percent. These cuts could result in city hospitals,

3 which all already under sourced and functioning at

4 over capacity to face the real possibility of staff

5 layoffs, further service reductions, and longer wait

6 times. And make no mistake, these changes will

7 disproportionately effect the poorest and the most

vulnerable New Yorkers. These payments must not be

9 reduced.

As Chair of the Health Committee, I remain committed to defending New Yorkers right to healthcare, no matter their financial status. The legislation we are voting on today reaffirms this commitment. No New Yorker should be forced without the lifesaving care they need.

I want to conclude by thanking the Committee members for being here today. I also want to thank the committee staff for their work, Committee Counsels Christopher Pepe and Sara Sucher, Joshua Newman, Legislative Policy Analyst, and the Finance staff Danielle Heifetz and Florentine Kabore, as well as my team Jonathan Boucher, Kevin McAleer, and Avygayl Zucker.
