CHAIRPERSON BROOKS-POWERS: [GAVEL] Good morning, and welcome to this hearing of the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure. I am Selvena Brooks-Powers, the Chair of the Committee.

Today, we will be voting on Proposed

Number 498-A, sponsored by Majority Leader 3 4 Amanda Farías, a resolution calling on Metropolitan Transportation Authority to create a program that provides New York City's first responder agencies 6 with real-time global positioning systems, also GPS, data for all MTA buses; and Proposed Resolution 8 Number 773-A, also sponsored by Majority Leader Farías, a resolution calling on the New York State 10 11 Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign Assembly Bill 3024, which directs the MTA to establish a 12 13 student fare program for trains and buses.

I will now allow the Majority Leader to read and open a statement on her legislation.

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MAJORITY LEADER FARÍAS: Thank you, Chair Brooks-Powers, for giving me time to speak on my resolutions before this Committee.

The first on the agenda is Reso. 498, which calls on the MTA to establish a program that provides New York City's first responder agencies with real-time GPS data for all MTA buses. This resolution addresses a critical operational gap between the MTA and our emergency response agencies. Although every MTA bus is already equipped with GPS

COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE tracking, that data is not shared directly with the NYPD, FDNY, or EMS in real time. As a result, when an emergency occurs on a moving bus, first responders must rely on information relayed through the MTA Bus Command Center. That process adds unnecessary delay in situations where minutes, and sometimes just seconds, can determine whether help arrives in time. The urgency of this issue became much more clear following an incident I learned about in my District when one of my constituents from Parkchester was harassed on an MTA bus and did what anyone should in a situation like this, he called 9-1-1. Because it was raining and visibility was poor, he was unable to identify his location and instead gave the dispatcher the bus number. But despite that effort, the bus could not be located by dispatch officers. To my surprise, this was because the MTA does not currently make its real-time GPS data accessible to first responders. Under the MTA's existing protocol, even when a bus operator reports an emergency, that information must first be passed through the MTA Command Center before reaching NYPD or FDNY. Every additional step adds time and risk for both riders and transit employees. Reso. 498 calls for the MTA to

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close that gap. It calls on the MTA to develop a secure, real-time data-sharing system when the City's emergency agency is using the GPS infrastructure that already exists. We have other major transit systems, including those in Chicago and D.C., that employ similar coordination, and the results have been proven. Faster response times, stronger interagency communication, and greater public confidence.

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And we also have Resolution 773 that's calling on the MTA and the state legislature and the governor to provide free Express Bus fares for New York City students who rely on those routes to travel to and from school. The infrastructure already exists through OMNY and the student MetroCard system. What's missing is the policy alignment and the will to make it equitable. This idea actually started in our office, building on the work we've done around student discounts for ferries and OMNY access. Providing free express bus fares for students is a responsible, practical fix. It reduces cost burdens for families who are already struggling and ensures that no student's education depends on whether they can pay for the bus that gets them to school. This is what equity in transit should look like, using the
