5	welcome to the New York City Council vote on the
6	Committee on Public Safety. At this time please do

9	CHAIRPERSON SALAAM: [GAVEL] Good morning, I'm
10	Council Member Yusef Salaam, Chair of the Committee
11	on Public Safety. Today I am joined by Council Member
12	De La Rosa
13	COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: Aye.
14	CHAIRPERSON SALAAM: No, no, not yet.
15	(LAUGHTER)
16	CHAIRPERSON SALAAM: Council Member De La Rosa,
17	Council Member Ossé, Council Member Stevens, Council
18	Member Ayala, Council Member Farías, Council Member
19	Holden, Council Member Ariola, and Council Member
20	Marte.
21	Today the Committee will be voting on Proposed
22	Introduction Numbers 168-A, sponsored by Majority
23	Leader Farías; Proposed Introduction Number 233-A,
24	sponsored by Council Member Hudson, and Proposed
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Introduction Number 480-A, sponsored by Council
Member Won.

In 2020 the Council enacted The Public Oversight 4 5 of Surveillance Technologies Act more commonly known as the POST Act. The POST Act aimed to improve 6 7 transparency regarding the NYPD's acquisition and use of surveillance technologies by requiring the 8 9 publishing of surveillance impact and use policies (IUPs) for each surveillance technology used by the 10 11 Department. For each IUP, the NYPD documents the 12 capabilities of the surveillance technology, the rules for access and use of such surveillance, and 13 14 polices related to the retention, access, and use of 15 data collection by such technologies. Further, the 16 POST Act tasked the Department of Investigations, 17 (DOI) with conducting annual audits of the NYPD's 18 IUPs.

Proposed Introduction Number 168-A, sponsored by Majority Leader Farías, would strengthen the DOI's capacity to conduct audits of the NYPD's published IUPs by requiring the NYPD to provide DOI with semiannual updates on all newly acquired or discontinued surveillance technologies and updates to any data access and retention policies established in

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recently executed contracts for surveillance
technologies.

Proposed Introduction Number 480-A, sponsored by 4 5 Council Member Won, would clarify language in the POST Act to ensure increased transparency in IUPs 6 7 published by the NYPD ensuring that IUPs are published for each distinct surveillance technology 8 9 used by the Department; that such IUPs fully identify each entity that receives data gathered from such 10 11 technology; that such IUPs report on specific 12 safeguards in place to prevent unauthorized dissemination of surveillance data; and that such 13 14 IUPs disclose evaluation of potential disparate 15 impacts on protected groups arising from the NYPD's 16 use of such technologies. Additionally, NYPD would be 17 required to develop policies regarding the 18 circumstances under which data collected by the 19 surveillance technology may be shared with external 20 entities and develop an internal tracking system to monitor access of data granted to such entities. 21 2.2 Proposed Introduction Number 233-A, sponsored by 23 Council Member Hudson, would require the New York City Police Department (NYPD) to publish on its 24

website a written policy that establishes procedures

2	and regulations for its use of facial recognition
3	technologies. The legislation would also require that
4	the NYPD conduct annual audits of the Department's
5	use of facial recognition technology, share the
6	findings of such audits with the Department of
7	Investigation, and post such findings on the
8	Department's website.
9	I urge my colleagues to support these bills that
10	aim to increase transparency and oversight of the
11	NYPD to protect the civil liberties of all New
12	Yorkers.
13	(PAUSE)
14	CHAIRPERSON SALAAM: I will now pass it to
15	Council Member Farías.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER FARÍAS: Thank you, Chair Salaam.
17	I am Council Majority Leader Amanda Farías, the prime
18	sponsor of Introduction 168, critical legislation to
19	strengthen the POST Act and bring real oversight to
20	NYPD surveillance practices.
21	The Council passed the original POST Act in 2020
22	to increase transparency around the NYPD's use of
23	surveillance tools. While that was an important first
24	step, it has become clear that additional measures
25	are needed to strengthen oversight.

1 THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SAFETY 7 2 Information gaps have limited the Department of 3 Investigation's ability to complete a full audit, 4 highlighting the need for improved access and 5 accountability. That's why I introduced Intro 168 to 6 close those gaps and build real accountability into 7 the law.

This bill gives the Department of Investigation 8 9 the power to request and receive a detailed, itemized 10 list of every surveillance technology in use - what 11 each tool does, what data it collects, and who 12 controls that data. It also requires the NYPD to share their data access and retention policies 13 14 including what's in vendor contracts and to provide 15 updates every six months.

This is about more than just oversight, it's about restoring public trust especially for Black, Latino and brown New Yorkers who have been historically over policed and over surveilled. It is critical that we deliver transparency and civilian control over these powerful technologies.

Introduction 168 ensures that oversight of surveillance is continuous, enforceable, and external. It is a common sense safeguard for our

2	civil liberties and a necessary update to a law that
3	our communities demand and deserve.
4	Thank you to Speaker Adams for her continued
5	leadership and to my colleagues, Council Members
6	Hudson and Won, for their partnership in the broader
7	POST Act expansion. And thank you to Chair Salaam for
8	holding the hearing and vote today.
9	And another thanks to NYPD and DOI, the Admin
10	for working together on this package, and to all the
11	advocates who continue pushing us towards a more
12	transparent accountable New York City.
