SERGEANT AT ARMS: Good morning, good morning,
welcome to the New York City Council vote on the
Committee on Public Safety. At this time please do
not approach the dais and silence all electronics.

Chair, you may begin.

CHAIRPERSON SALAAM: [GAVEL] Good morning, I'm
Council Member Yusef Salaam, Chair of the Committee
on Public Safety. Today I am joined by Council Member
De La Rosa...

COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: Aye.

CHAIRPERSON SALAAM: No, no, not yet.

(LAUGHTER)

CHAIRPERSON SALAAM: Council Member De La Rosa,
Council Member Ossé, Council Member Stevens, Council
Member Ayala, Council Member Farías, Council Member
Holden, Council Member Ariola, and Council Member
Marte.

Today the Committee will be voting on Proposed
Introduction Numbers 168-A, sponsored by Majority
Leader Farías; Proposed Introduction Number 233-A,
sponsored by Council Member Hudson, and Proposed

Introduction Number 480-A, sponsored by Council Member Won.

In 2020 the Council enacted *The Public Oversight of Surveillance Technologies Act* more commonly known as the POST Act. The POST Act aimed to improve transparency regarding the NYPD's acquisition and use of surveillance technologies by requiring the publishing of surveillance impact and use policies (IUPs) for each surveillance technology used by the Department. For each IUP, the NYPD documents the capabilities of the surveillance technology, the rules for access and use of such surveillance, and policies related to the retention, access, and use of data collection by such technologies. Further, the POST Act tasked the Department of Investigations, (DOI) with conducting annual audits of the NYPD's IUPs.

Proposed Introduction Number 168-A, sponsored by Majority Leader Farías, would strengthen the DOI's capacity to conduct audits of the NYPD's published IUPs by requiring the NYPD to provide DOI with semiannual updates on all newly acquired or discontinued surveillance technologies and updates to any data access and retention policies established in

recently executed contracts for surveillance technologies.

Proposed Introduction Number 480-A, sponsored by Council Member Won, would clarify language in the POST Act to ensure increased transparency in IUPs published by the NYPD ensuring that IUPs are published for each distinct surveillance technology used by the Department; that such IUPs fully identify each entity that receives data gathered from such technology; that such IUPs report on specific safeguards in place to prevent unauthorized dissemination of surveillance data; and that such IUPs disclose evaluation of potential disparate impacts on protected groups arising from the NYPD's use of such technologies. Additionally, NYPD would be required to develop policies regarding the circumstances under which data collected by the surveillance technology may be shared with external entities and develop an internal tracking system to monitor access of data granted to such entities.

Proposed Introduction Number 233-A, sponsored by Council Member Hudson, would require the New York City Police Department (NYPD) to publish on its website a written policy that establishes procedures

and regulations for its use of facial recognition technologies. The legislation would also require that the NYPD conduct annual audits of the Department's use of facial recognition technology, share the findings of such audits with the Department of Investigation, and post such findings on the Department's website.

I urge my colleagues to support these bills that aim to increase transparency and oversight of the NYPD to protect the civil liberties of all New Yorkers.

CHAIRPERSON SALAAM: I will now pass it to Council Member Farías.

COUNCIL MEMBER FARÍAS: Thank you, Chair Salaam. I am Council Majority Leader Amanda Farías, the prime sponsor of Introduction 168, critical legislation to strengthen the POST Act and bring real oversight to NYPD surveillance practices.

The Council passed the original POST Act in 2020 to increase transparency around the NYPD's use of surveillance tools. While that was an important first step, it has become clear that additional measures are needed to strengthen oversight.

Information gaps have limited the Department of Investigation's ability to complete a full audit, highlighting the need for improved access and accountability. That's why I introduced Intro 168 to close those gaps and build real accountability into the law.

This bill gives the Department of Investigation the power to request and receive a detailed, itemized list of every surveillance technology in use — what each tool does, what data it collects, and who controls that data. It also requires the NYPD to share their data access and retention policies including what's in vendor contracts and to provide updates every six months.

This is about more than just oversight, it's about restoring public trust especially for Black, Latino and brown New Yorkers who have been historically over policed and over surveilled. It is critical that we deliver transparency and civilian control over these powerful technologies.

Introduction 168 ensures that oversight of surveillance is continuous, enforceable, and external. It is a common sense safeguard for our

civil liberties and a necessary update to a law that our communities demand and deserve.

Thank you to Speaker Adams for her continued leadership and to my colleagues, Council Members Hudson and Won, for their partnership in the broader POST Act expansion. And thank you to Chair Salaam for holding the hearing and vote today.

And another thanks to NYPD and DOI, the Admin for working together on this package, and to all the advocates who continue pushing us towards a more transparent accountable New York City.

Committee with a vote of 10 in the affirmative, 0 in
the negative, and no abstentions. And Proposed
Introduction Number 480-A, has been adopted by the

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Committee with 8 in the affirmative, 2 in the negative, and no abstentions.
