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We will now have Communication from Speaker
Adrienne Adams.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you, Majority Leader. And good afternoon, everyone.

Before we begin, I want to take a moment to remember the lives of New Yorkers who died while on the job.

Sixty-three-year-old Bernard Gonzalez Perez, who was a supermarket worker in Council Member Abreu's district, was killed last month while sweeping the sidewalk.

Yesterday, 26-year-old police officer, Alexis
Martinez, was taken from us in the Soundview
neighborhood of the Bronx. Our hearts are heavy, and
the entire city is saddened by their losses.

We are also mourning the tragic loss of 28-yearold O'Shea Sibley, who was killed while dancing at a
gas station in Brooklyn. O'Shea and his friends were
targeted for being gay, and for joyfully and openly
expressing themselves in a public space. We cannot
detach this violence from the climate of
discriminatory and hateful rhetoric against our
LGBTQIA+ communities that has been permeating
throughout the city and this entire nation. This

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2 cannot be allowed to continue and escalate to

3 violence that makes all of us less safe. We must

4 | work to protect each other and our communities, so

5 that all of us can be safe in the expression of our

6 full identities without the fear or threat of

violence.

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We lost 44-year-old Ida Sanchez Tello, a pregnant mother of three children, who was injured in an apartment fire in Council Member Vernikov's district about a month ago. She was taken to the hospital in critical condition and passed away just days later.

We also lost 59-year-old Mildred Montesino to a house fire in Majority Whip Brooks-Powers district. Mildred was a beloved mother and grandmother who worked hard to raise her two children and six grandchildren in Brooklyn. Our hearts, once again, are with their families during this very difficult time.

Recently, we learned about the loss of John

Castic, a 27-year-old man who was found dead in the

Newtown Creek in Council Member Gutiérrez's district.

His death comes more than a month after another 27
year-old, Karl Clemente, was found in the same creek

after last seen leaving the Brooklyn Mirage. I want

2 to remind all New Yorkers to please stay vigilant and

3 keep each other safe.

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Now I want to take a moment to address the ongoing situation outside of the intake for emergency shelter at the Roosevelt Hotel. Over the past several days, dozens of people seeking asylum in our country have been forced to remain on the streets -even overnight -- waiting for shelter. We know that there continues to be a dire need for more federal support, and we will continue to advocate for what our city deserves. Yet, there are actions that we as a city must undertake by working together to address this situation and support our communities and those in need. This is about helping long-time New Yorkers, our communities, and people seeking asylum. Responding to this challenge cannot solely be focused on finding space or requesting more federal funding, it requires an all-of-the-above approach. what we face is not the result of a single issue. These interconnected issues are far more complicated and demand comprehensive solutions that can only be achieved by all of us working together.

We must come together around all of the necessary solutions for more federal funding, better

Ecuador, in case you didn't know, was the first

country to declare independence in Latin America back

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very proud to represent a diverse Trinidadian

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community in my own district, the great 28. We
recently passed legislation to create Trinidad and
Tobago Street, and I look forward to celebrating that

5 | with our community.

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Additionally, I also want to recognize August 21st, it is National Senior Citizens Day! I call -- and you should call also -- seniors the jewels of our communities. And we would not be here today without their sacrifice. Seniors, we appreciate you and everything you have done for all of us.

Women of the Council, August 26th, is not just my husband's birthday, but it is also Women's Equality Day!

(CHEERS)

SPEAKER ADAMS: Yes! (CLAPPING) which was created thanks to the advocacy of New York Congresswoman Bella Abzug. As the first women majority council, we are proud of the progress we have achieved together, and we remain committed to advancing women's equality right here and around the world.

August is also National Breastfeeding Month. And since we just gave birth to baby number six right here in the Council, this week is also World Breastfeeding Week. Accessibility includes having

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lactation room available and better workplace support for new mothers and parents. As the first women majority council, we are so proud to have made progress towards equitable maternal health care. we will continue to work to secure even more support for birthing people everywhere.

And on August 11th, we will celebrating the official 50th Anniversary of Hip Hop!

SPEAKER ADAMS: Hip Hop was born in the Boogie Down Bronx -- put those x's down. Debatable? Okay. But, it was also shaped and molded by all five boroughs of New York City. Those of us who were actually raised in Hip Hop culture understand how it has become a defining soundtrack in our lives. We are so fortunate that so many of the giants and pioneers of this global phenomenon are still here today. I am going to shoutout my homeboy, LL Cool J of Hollis Queens, who will be rocking the bells at Forest Hills Stadium on Saturday! Get your tickets, shameless plug, just sayin'.

SPEAKER ADAMS: So, please join us recognizing and celebrating Hip Hop's 50th Anniversary in your own way.

COUNCIL MEMBER OSSÉ: Around The Way Girl...

SPEAKER ADAMS: Around The Way Girl, that's right, don't tell people my stories, Chi Ossé.

On August 8th, my office will be hosting the Melanin Summit: Changing the Color of Capital, alongside the Black Institute and Department of Small Business Services. The goal of this summit is to connect MWBEs with CDFI, so that we can advance equitable lending and facilitate new business partnerships.

August, in case you didn't know, is Black
Business Month. So, I invite everyone to join us for
this historic summit next Tuesday.

Now is the moment we have all been waiting for, it's time to celebrate August birthdays right here in the Council.

In the month of August, we are celebrating the birthdays of Council Member Marjorie Velázquez on August 11th, Council Member David Carr on August 28th! Council Member Inna Vernikov on August 30th!

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Now, let's move on to our Stated Agenda.

2 First, we will vote on the following Finance 3 items:

A transparency resolution approving new designations and changes of certain organizations receiving funding in the Expense Budget.

Next, we will vote on the following Land Use items:

Ocean Crest Rezoning will rezone a site in
Majority Whip Brooks-Powers' district from an
existing R4-1 to R6-A. This approval will facilitate
a 100 percent affordable homeownership project with
up to 89 units. I want to thank Majority Whip BrooksPowers, the community builders, Governor Hochul,
Mayor Adams, Congressman Gregory Meeks, Senator James
Sanders, Assembly Member Khaleel Anderson, Deputy
Mayor Maria Torres Springer, and HPD for their
partnership and collaboration to get this project
across the finish line.

And 7120 New Utrecht Avenue Rezoning will facilitate a new mixed use eight-story building with approximately 88 housing units, including 26 affordable units under MIH in Council Member Brannan's district.

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Also, 56 William Avenue will facilitate one new two-family home in Minority Leader Borelli's district.

A new 696 seat primary school in Council Member
Lynn Schulman's district -- 1160 Flushing Avenue-will facilitate a new mixed used industrial and
commercial development in Bushwick.

The Council is modifying the rezoning area to remove additional properties along Wyckoff Avenue where there is no agreement or commitment in place to provide industrial space. In line with recommendations from Brooklyn Community Board Four and the Brooklyn Borough President in Council Member Gutiérrez's district.

We are also voting on two landmark designations:

Linden Street Historic District, a cohesive and
distinctive block of 32 rowhouses in the Bushwick
neighborhood in Brooklyn in Council Member
Gutiérrez's district.

And (Former) Colored School No. 4, a three-story midblock building in the Chelsea neighborhood of Manhattan. Built by the City's Public School Society in the late 1840's, the public schoolhouse served Black children exclusively until the public school

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2 system closed the segregated school in 1869 in
3 Council Member Bottcher's district.

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We will vote on the following resolutions:

First we will vote on Resolution 237-A, sponsored by Higher Education Committee Chair, Council Member Eric Dinowitz, calling on the New York State

Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign, the Fair College Admissions Act. This state bill would prohibit legacy admissions preference at undergraduate colleges in New York State, declaring such policies as inequitable and discriminatory.

Thank you to our staff members Chloe Rivera and Regina Paul.

We will also vote on a pair of resolutions:

Resolution 694-A, sponsored by Civil Service and Labor Committee Chair, Council Member Carmen De La Rosa and Resolution 729-A, sponsored by Chair De La Rosa and Council Member Amanda Farías, to express the Council's support for the Writers Guild of America and the SAG-AFTRA unions respectively in their fights for fair contracts. Thank you to our staff members Elizabeth Arzt and Rie Ogasawara.

There will be several pieces of legislation on today's Agenda:

Introduction 289-A, sponsored by Council Member

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Carlina Rivera, requiring the Department of
Transportation to develop and regularly update a
searchable bicycle infrastructure map with all bike
lanes in New York City. The map must contain
information about current or planned obstructions on
bike routes and feature the location of open streets,
bike parking infrastructure, micro mobility stations,
and information on how to report bike lane issues.
Thank you to our staffers Mark Chen, Samuel
Breitbart, Kevin Kotowski, and John Basile.

Introduction 689-A, sponsored by Public Advocate
Jumaane Williams, in relation to elimination of
Department of Building permit and or filing fees for
green building projects undertaken on one to three
family homes. Green building projects would include
projects or renovations that will produce, from
utilization of renewable resources, a decrease in
carbon emissions in at least half of the building's
prior admissions. Thank you to our staffer Taylor
Zelony.

Introduction 384-A, sponsored by Majority Whip Selvena Brooks-Powers, creation of an Office of The Homeowner Advocate within the Department Of Housing

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Preservation and Development to provide information, resources, and assistance to homeowners. The Office of the Homeowner Advocate would also be required to report annually on homeowner inquiries received, actions taken to address these inquiries, and make recommendations for services for homeowners that are not currently available. Thank you once again to staff member Taylor Zelony.

In continuation of the Council's efforts to legislate against the harms of lead-based paint, we will vote on several bills, sponsored by Deputy Speaker Diana Ayala, to increase inspection, remediation, and enforcement against these hazards:

Introduction 5-A would require building owners to produce records of lead-based hazard inspections, investigations, and remediation work including x-ray fluorescents testing after August 2025.

Introduction 6-A would expand the remediation requirements for lead-based hazards for turned over units to include remediation prior to turnover where a child under six years old resides.

Introduction 750-A would shift the City's inspection process to be more proactive by requiring HPD and DOHMH to annually identify and inspect

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buildings where children live, and where there might be a risk of exposure to lead-based hazards given a building's violation history. Thank you again, Taylor Zelony.

Finally, the Council will vote on Introduction 31-C, sponsored by Consumer and Worker Protection Committee Chair, Council Member Marjorie Velázquez, which will establish a permanent outdoor dining program. After an extensive process of engagement, with many thoughtful conversations with the various stakeholders, we are voting to create a newly revised permanent outdoor dining program that will continue to serve our restaurants, residents, and visitors. During the COVID-19 pandemic outdoor dining became a lifeline for small businesses and New Yorkers seeking socialization and normalcy through a temporary program that expanded the opportunity beyond limited capacity primarily in Manhattan. This legislation incorporates lessons learned from this temporary program by making increased accessibility and inclusivity to outdoor dining permanent while addressing concerns to strike the right balance for restaurants, neighborhoods, and all New Yorkers. This legislation makes it possible for many

We will now move into Discussion of General Orders. We will first hear from Council Member Brooks-Powers, followed by Council Member Rivera.

COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you.

I am so excited today that we will pass a bill of crucial importance to my community and to communities all across the City, Introduction 384, which would create an Office of the Homeowner Advocate. We need to invest in homeownership, such that when New Yorkers in low income neighborhoods and communities of color buy a home, they know the City has their back. That is why I am proud to co-sponsor this legislation, which would create the Office of

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Homeowner Advocate within HPD to provide support to homeowners alongside nonprofits that are currently providing services to homeowners. It would also help homeowners to access resources and create a public awareness campaigns about the rights and responsibilities of homeowners. A special shoutout to the original prime sponsor, former Council Member I. Daneek Miller.

We will also vote through a Land Use item in my district, the Ocean Crest Rezoning, which will result in a 100% affordable homeownership project in my district. I want to express my appreciation to Jesse Batus (phonetic) of the Community Builders and the team at NEA Myer (sp?) for their partnership and for rising to the call for affordable homeownership. Together we have made a number of commitments on this historic project that will benefit the community including 50% hiring from Community Board 14, 35% MWBE utilization, a mutually agreed upon labor monitor, targeted outreach to NYCHA residents to provide them with homeownership opportunities, infrastructure investments, and the commitment to engage... to explore workforce opportunities. thank Speaker Adrienne Adams and her Chief of Staff,

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Jeremy John, for their leadership and guidance throughout this process. I also thank the Land Use staff and everyone at central staff [TIMER CHIMES] who worked on this. And I am ever grateful to my local elected partners including Congressman Gregory Meeks, Senator James Sanders, Assembly Member Khaleel Anderson, and Borough President Donovan Richards. also thank the Administration including Deputy Mayor Torres Springer, Chief Advisor Ingrid Lewis-Martin, Chief of Staff Camille Varlack, and the staff at HPD. Thank you as well to our state partners, the Governor's staff, including Stacy Lynch, Karen Keogh, and the staff at HCR, and especially Speaker Carl Heastie for his commitment to homeownership and recognizing the need. I am always thankful for my community and its members from the community boards to local civic organizations to everyday residents. That is who sent me to City Hall, and that is who I fight for when I walk through these doors of City Hall each day.

I want to close by recognizing that the City's

Black population has declined by nearly 200,000

people in the past two decades. So many of these New

Yorkers, low income New Yorkers, and New Yorkers of

Eighteen bike riders were killed in the first six 12 13 months of 2023, putting New Yorker on track to have 14 the second the second deadliest year to date for 15 cyclist on record. Additionally, on June 7th, the 16 100th New Yorker fell victim to traffic violence marking the earliest occurrence of such a tragic 17 event since 2014. Thousands of New Yorkers commute, 18 19 do business, shop, and visit this city through the 20 five boroughs by bicycle each day. And that is deserving of the same information and alerts alerted 21 to motorists and transit riders. 2.2 We must 2.3 dramatically speed up street re-designs and use all of the tools at our disposal to continue to bring 24 safer streets to New York City. That include 25

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piloting and implementing new technology and shared street designs, pedestrianizing open spaces, and increasing bus and bike lane networks. Our city's bike lane network is a transportation system like any other, and cyclists really do deserve real-time data. It can prevent a morning commute from becoming a treacherous journey. So, I want to thank all of my colleagues and advocates, of course my crew, the Legislative team, and I really do urge all of my colleagues to vote aye. Thank you for your support.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

I am excited to have two Land Use items this month. Land Use item number 247, which establishes Linden Street as a Historic District. And Land Use item 243, a mixed-use rezoning at 1160 Flushing Avenue in Bushwick. Linden Street, which is a variety of architectural styles from the late 19th century, is a rare well-preserved reminder of South Bushwick's past, a neighborhood in which so many landmarks have been lost to fires and gentrification, this designation is cause for celebration. I want to thank Landmarks Chair Louis and my partner in

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Bushwick, Council Member Nurse, for their support in pushing this through to a vote.

We are also voting on 1160 Flushing Avenue, where the applicant has contractually committed to mixed commercial industrial development in collaboration with our CBO partner, Evergreen Exchange. commitment aligns with the goals of Evergreen's North Brooklyn BOA planning study, uh, district 34 Land Use policy, and priorities established through extensive community engagement, and multiple studies within the North Brooklyn Industrial Business Zone. is a vital industrial hub, and the neighborhood must retain its manufacturing uses.

Today I also want to acknowledge our summer interns: Oliva, Kelly, Jay, and Chris who are also upstairs, who are helping us to run this office in the summer more smoothly. Thank you so much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER CARR: I would just like to confine 3 my remarks to Introduction 31-C. I think the portions 4 of this bill as they pertain to the sidewalk cafés 5 are truly excellent. It took a moribund, onerous, expensive process, and it really made it much better 6 7 while retaining community and council member input. And it is to the credit of the Chair, who is the 8 prime sponsor of the bill, that it turned out that way alongside all of the staff on both sides of City 10 11 Hall that have worked on this. And I am such an admirer of it that it would make a roadway skeptic --12 13 dining skeptic, like myself, support this bill if it 14 were identical in terms of the procedures, but 15 they're not. And, then, this is a crucial component for the roadway dining portion, which is the call-up 16 17 option that we have under the sidewalk café rules. 18 And I think that is something that we needed to have. 19 I know there are reticence about doing it, because it 20 would require a referendum to amend the Charter in 21 that way. But, I think when we are considering converting , you know, lane miles of public space to 2.2 2.3 the benefit of a particular commercial entity, a restaurant, that it is not a bad thing to ask the 24 public their opinion on such a grant of an ability. 25

But, also, in addition to that, it requires us as we give this authority to DOT as a legislative entity, basically, we are giving them a blank check. And I don't want to judge the situation based on my relationship with this mayor and this DOT, which is very good, it's about what is the worst case scenario between a relationship between a council member and an executive agency? And we have to make sure that in the future all of the processes are going to allow the community input and the council member input to be heard, and more importantly, to be heeded. that is one of the reasons why I cannot bring myself to support this legislation. Because, I don't want to trust or hope that the agencies will listen and heed to me or my successors. I want to be able to know that for sure. And a call-up would ensure that. So, I will be a no on Introduction 31-C, as well

transparency resolution is funding CUNY. So, I am declaring that my daughter is a student of CUNY.

We have met with city agencies and industry stakeholders about this issue for over a year. have gone on walkthroughs and have developed alternatives. And I am deeply disappointed that the recommendations from the people with the most experience of living next to and on top off -- and outdoor dining sheds -- were ignored. We even asked for a compromise, but we were rejected.

Midnight closings for outdoor dining is not for They're for drinking and partying. dining. keeps up the working class people of my district while gentrifiers are outside partying outside their windows.

The four-year window for review is undemocratic and allows bad actors to get away with it for years without repercussions, especially as we see City struggle to enforce even existing regulations.

To the thousands of Lower Manhattan residents who oppose this legislation, I am sorry that we have failed you today. I am still grateful for your advocacy and will continue to fight to make sure your voices are heard.

For these reasons, I vote no on Introduction 31-C, and aye on all the rest, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER VELÁZQUEZ: Good afternoon, there are many people who deserve credit for getting this bill up for a vote. But, for the sake of time, I want to thank Speaker Adams, Mayor Adams, and all of the New Yorkers have shared their voices on this important issue. This was truly a collaborative effort. This is a great way to celebrate Restaurant Week by passing legislation creating a permanent outdoor dining program. During the pandemic, outdoor dining was a lifeline for our city, having helped keep businesses open with the City was shutdown. The program kept people employed and gave our local communities an opportunity to connect with one another and be outside of our homes safely. What the Open Restaurant Executive Order proved is that not only were there potential benefits for consumers, but also an opportunity for the food service and restaurant industry to benefit. This bill is a combination of bringing everyone to the table in

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creating a uniform program that considers the unique circumstances in each borough and neighborhood.

Introduction 31-C provides the peace of mind for our businesses to have a permanent program and the space for our city to move forward and continue to evolve this program and how we utilize our spaces.

We heard your concerns from restaurant owners, workers in the food industry, constituents, and local businesses outside the industry that would be impacted by this legislation. Having spent the past year negotiating and modifying the bill to be as inclusive and equitable as possible, meeting the needs of the different types of restaurants and eateries across our city. The pandemic changed our lives, changed the way we live, and the way we do business for better or for worse. But, as New Yorkers, we continued to fight, and we evolved through these dark times. We now have an opportunity to build a stronger New York, not only an opportunity to revitalize our barren streetscapes, but also by giving our food and restaurant industry, particularly small business owners -- mom and pop stores -- around the five boroughs the tools to not only bounce back from the hardships created by COVID, but also to help

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72 with homelessness sweeps and other removals. only are homeless sweeps deeply counterproductive and ineffective, they are expensive, dangerous, and most importantly, they often result in civil and human rights violations.

Secondly, Introduction 1154, a bathroom bill that compliments the work of Council Member Rita Joseph's bill, uh, and mandates the City to, among other things, set a goal of creating one toilet per every 2,000 people by 2035; identify public and private sites that can be utilized for public toilets, and create a public map of existing and planned toilets with their design features.

And, lastly, with Council Member Cabán, Introduction 1152 would require the City to support access to our underutilized industrial areas for food production and distribution hubs and related industrial food activities in order to increase the resiliency of our localized food system. pandemic and other natural disasters have made clear, we must make concrete steps towards increasing food security and resiliency in New York City. I hope to have your support on all three bills. And I look forward to discussing them with you all, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER RILEY: Thank you, Majority Leader.

I am calling on my colleagues for their support for two bills I am introducing today.

Introduction 1157, which will rename
Williamsbridge Square in my district to Marcus Garvey
Square. Marcus Garvey was a Jamaican born visionary,
publisher, journalist, and political advocate who
united continents in lifetime. I would like to
celebrate this piece of legislation with a group from
my district called the Jamaican Progressive League,
in my district, for not only their partnership and
their advocacy for this piece of legislation, but
also for their deeply committed work to empower our
community with health, education, and resources. I
urge my colleagues to sign on to Introduction 1157
and join this rich history.

The last bill I am asking my colleagues to sign on is Introduction 1158, which is in relation to accessibility for the deaf, hard of hearing, or deafblind community in the implementation of text-to-911.

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Expanding equity and access to culturally competent systems for people with disabilities is crucial for fostering inclusivity and equal opportunities. This bill requires annual reports to now include information on the outreach efforts for hiring and retaining deaf, hard of hearing, or deafblind accessibility exports. In addition, by expanding reporting requirements for the implementation of Next Generation 9-1-1, we will be able to access the technology we are using to better understand the interconnected needs of our diverse communities. Introduction 1158 requires the description of the public education plans for informing people who are deaf, hard of hearing, and deaf-blind of the availability of Next Generation 9-1-1. I encourage my colleagues to support these two pieces of legislation today. Thank you so much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will now hear from Council Member Gutiérrez, followed by Council Member Cabán.

COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: Thank you.

This week the Bushwick Williamsburg and larger community of District 34 were shocked by the tragic events that resulted in the loss of two lives in East

2 Williamsburg. I am heartbroken by these deaths, and

3 our hearts are with the families and loved ones of

4 Karl Clemente and John Castic. And I just want to

5 | thank Speaker Adams for acknowledging them in her

6 remarks.

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These tragedies highlight the critical need for safety measures in our industrial areas. The industrial business zone has seen a significant expansion of nightlife in recent years, but lacks the infrastructure investments necessary for safe growth such as lighting, signage, connectivity and public transportation. Without these measures, the expansion of nightlife creates additional pressures and challenges in industrial areas. We must strike a balance of managed growth and public use to ensure the safety of all New Yorkers.

I am also proud to introduce Introduction 1144,

Know your Rep, a bill that was derived from my

longtime Bushwick and Woodridge organizer, Juan

Mayancela. The bill would require all building

owners to provide information to their tenants about

their elective representatives, as well as DOB and

HPD contacts. This bill will help to create

a

transparency and support tenants in advocating for their rights.

And, finally, I just want to thank Speaker Adams and her team, and Council Member Avilés, Council Member Krishnan, Council Member Dinowitz, Council Member Ariola, and Council Member Restler for cosponsoring and attending the Council's Columbian Independence Day celebration on July 20th. It was a great event, and as the Council's first Columbian, it was a big honor to bring it here to City Hall, and we look forward to next year. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will now hear from Council Member Cabán, followed by Council Member Hanif.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you.

If you have been following the news closely, you probably know that in Florida and other places run by right-wing bigots, including some places in New York State, those in power are sending big government censors into schools and libraries to strip people of their freedom to read. That includes not just banning books, but also changing curricula to teach such offensive absurdities as the benefits of chattel slavery for the kidnapped Africans ripped from their

2 homes, families, languages, and cultural traditions

3 who were then relegated to the legal status of

4 livestock.

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Today along with Council Member Abreu, I have introduced a resolution that will state clearly and proudly that such racist and other queerphobic human rights violations have no place in New York City.

Our libraries already offer free digital library cards, nationwide, to help those living under authoritarian oppression to circumvent the right-wing book bans being inflicted on them. With this resolution, the world will know that this council will defend the freedom to read, that we will defend inclusive democracy; that we will defend the lives of queer New Yorkers and New Yorkers of color; and that we are putting powerful bigots on notice.

So, we all deserve the freedom to read, and I am asking my colleagues to please support Resolution 727, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will hear from Council Member Hanif, followed by Council Member Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you so much.

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I would also like to share that I am joined by my summer interns as well. They have been here all day attending all of the rallies. I am so excited for them to see local government in work.

I am proud to be introducing two bills today:

Introduction 1145, which I am introducing

alongside Deputy Speaker Ayala, requires the

Administration to publish data related to the respite

centers and the HERCS, including sites, population,

demographics, length of stay, and discharge details.

Up until now, the Administration has not shared this

data with the Council or the public, leaving us with

an unclear understanding of how these locations are

functioning. Given deteriorating conditions,

including lack of showers or air conditioning at some

sites, this information is critical.

Introduction 1153, which I am introducing alongside Council Member Nurse, requires the Administration to publish data on homelessness encampment sweeps, including where and how they are conducted, what City resources are used to carry them out, and their long term impacts. Sweeps are cruel, an ineffective tool in the battle to end homelessness in our city. We must understood how this

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administration is utilizing them. I encourage my colleagues to join these bills as a sponsor. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you.

We will now hear from Council Member Brewer, followed by Council Member Farías.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you.

I am speaking on Introduction 1135, it is a big idea to establish a Wards Island Affordable Housing Task Force. I want to thank Council Member Ayala for joining me.

So, Wards Island is right next to Randalls
Island, for those of you who don't know it. It has
lots of land on it. It is something that could be
like Welfare Island which became Roosevelt Island,
with thanks to Ed Logue (phonetic), and there is no
reason why we cannot do the same thing, and it would
take some years. A city, state task force, the state
has their New York State police there, and, of
course, it has the very large psychiatric hospital.
Parks has materials there. Odyssey House and Help
USA have homeless shelters. The fire department has
a very small training program. And, of course,
Randalls Island has wonderful playing fields there.

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So, I am saying that I hope that you will join me in saying that if we want big ideas, that I think having a task force to talk about where we could have affordable, permanent Mitchell-Lama light (sp?) housing, would be an example of something that the City Council could be proud of initiating.

I also want to thank our wonderful interns, Jenna McCormick (phonetic) from Hunter College, Gregory Seewald (phonetic) from Marist College, Esther Omolola (phonetic) from Hunter College, Tene Odrago (sp?) from Deerfield Academy, thanks to Prep for Prep, Alex [INAUDIBLE] from Binghamton University, Rita Heinz from the Lab School and SYEP, and Zach Harwayne (phonetic) from Brooklyn Tech. Interns, thank you very much!

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will now hear from Council Member Farías, followed by Council Member Kagan.

COUNCIL MEMBER FARÍAS: Thank you, Majority Leader.

I would like to start by saying thank you to Speaker Adams for honoring Alexis Martinez today in your opening remarks. I am deeply saddened that we have lost a dedicated NYPD officer and a neighbor or

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my district due to a violent domestic dispute. Alexis Martinez was only 26 years old when he left us far too soon. My office and the Soundview community will continue to grieve this enormous loss. I send my sincerest condolences to his family, friends, and his colleagues during this heartbreaking time.

The first bill I would like to bring to all of your attention is Resolution 728, which calls on our partners in the state to create a linkage fee for largescale residential or commercial projects and a trust that would receive this fee to fund job training, education, and employment programs to support the surrounding communities that these projects take place in. Linkage fees are charged by the local government on real estate developments with the purpose of generating local funding to address the important workforce aspects of these projects such as job training programs. This resolution advocates for all residential or commercial construction that exceeds 100,000 square feet in a community to be charged with a linkage fee to offset the impact projects of this size can have on a community.

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Secondly, I am introducing Introduction 1139, which will allow rideshare drivers to opt in to place ads in the interior of their cars and allow them to maintain a passive income alongside their work as a driver. This bill puts drivers first, and gives then the opportunity to put more money in the back of their own pockets by making a percentage of revenue from the advertisements in their cars. This is especially timely with more fees incoming to our drivers from the outer borough communities like mine because of congestion pricing. I hope you will all join me in safeguarding our drivers from additional fees, and allow them to bring in more revenue each month by signing on to Introduction 1139, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will now hear from Council Member Kagan, followed by Council Member Vernikov.

COUNCIL MEMBER KAGAN: Thank you, today I would like to introduce Introduction 1149, this bill require The Department of Sanitation to provide an adequate supply of water while street sweepers are in operation unless the Commissioner of Environmental Protection has determined that there is a water shortage emergency or made another water supply-

2 related determination. I believe it is very

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3 | important, because several times street sweepers in

4 New York City are cleaning the streets without water

5 | in their tanks, creating large dust clouds. I have

6 personally witnessed this several times. This poses

7 a significant challenge for pedestrians, especially

8 those with asthma and respiratory diseases as the

9 dust can exacerbate their health issues and make it

10 \parallel difficult for them to navigate the streets safely.

Also, I would like to express my deepest condolences to the family 15-year-old Markel Artis who drowned last week in a section of Coney Beach without lifeguards. We need to do much better as a city to recruit more lifeguards. So, likely we need to increase their salaries. And we also need to make a much bigger effort to have more free swimming courses everywhere and to recruit lifeguards. My heart goes out to the community. We cannot have large sections of the beach, not just Coney Island, but all over the city, without lifeguards.

And, finally, I would like to mention another tragedy, a 15-year-old boy, Foridun Mavlonov, whose family immigrated from Uzbekistan, was killed simply walking on a peaceful Bensonhurst street in middle of

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the day. So, again, we need to increase the number of police officers, and we need to fight for bigger, better public safety in New York City. And, again, my condolences to the community, and I hope the perpetrator will be arrested very soon and will face justice, thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: We will hear from Council Member Vernikov, and finally Council Member Holden.

COUNCIL MEMBER VERNIKOV: Thank you, this past weekend, O'Shae Sibley was at a Brooklyn gas station, in my district, with friends late Saturday night and was stabbed to death. Stabbed to death while filling up gas at a gas station -- at a gas station -- and had the nerve to dance. O'Shae was stabbed, it seems, because someone didn't approve of his dancing, of his lifestyle, of his identity, because he was gay. This was his offense. This is pure hate. I would like to extend my deepest condolences to the family and friends of the victim and to everyone affected by this tragedy. Whenever acts of violence took place in the Jewish community, I always stood up for its victims. Whenever acts of hate and violence took place in an Asian community , I always stood up for its victims. Today, I stand with the LGBTQIA+

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community to condemn this horrific act of hate, thank
you.

4 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, we will now bear from Council Member Holden.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOLDEN: Thank you, Majority Leader Powers.

The two bills Queens Borough President Donovan Richards and I introduce today protect our communities and preserve the integrity of our neighborhoods.

Introduction 1146, This bill would require the owner of any vacant building that is not continuously guarded or not sealed and kept secure against unauthorized entry to seal building openings using a material other than plywood. Plywood on abandoned buildings creates an eyesore, contributing to neighborhood blight. By banning plywood, we can encourage better alternatives that maintain the quality of life in our neighborhoods.

Also, Introduction 1147, requires owners of vacant residential properties undergoing foreclosure to provide a \$5,000 to the Commissioner of Finance.

This bond will serve as safeguard ensuring that necessary housing maintenance, building repairs, and

NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL STATED MEETING sanitation violations are addressed promptly during periods of vacancy and foreclosure action. By holding owners accountable, we prevent neglected properties from becoming blights on our streets, maintaining the beauty and safety of our surroundings. I thank borough president, Donovan Richards for working with me on these bills, and I urge all of my colleagues to sign on, thank you. MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Council Member Holden.
