SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: They'll be joining us in this Chamber soon, so welcome here today. So today we're going to voting on legislation.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Quiet in the Chambers please, quiet in the Chambers including Council Member elects.

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: All right today we're going to be voting on legislation to adjust the interest rate for unpaid charges owed by landlords for emergency repairs. The current rate owed for unpaid charges is 7% which is generally lower than

2 the rate of interest for non-payment of real property taxes. This bill will change that so that unpaid 3 charges for emergency repairs accrue interest at a 4 5 rate that matches the amount adopted by the Council in each fiscal year for non-payment of real property 6 7 taxes. This will better allow the City to recover money it spends doing emergency repairs. 8 interest rate has not been updated since 1974. Over 9 40 years ago. And it's time to make this change in 10 order to hold landlords accountable for the property 11 12 they rent and incentivize them to make timely I want to thank Jen Wilcox, Malaika Jabali, 13 repairs. Guillermo Patino, Jose Conde, Sarah Gastelum and ask 14 15 Council Member Williams the lead sponsor to say a few 16 words.

thank the Speaker, Rebecca Chasim (sic) who drafted the bill and the entire legislative division for helping us pass Int. No. 783-A which incentivizes property owners to conduct, remedy immediately hazards conditions in the building. Right now under the HPDs emergency repairs program commonly called ERP, the City foots the bill for repairs when immediately hazardous conditions are not cured on

2 timely manner. The current rate is 7% and has not been updated since 1974 and is lower than the rate 3 4 for unpaid property taxes by matching the ERP interest rate with the rate for unpaid property taxes 5 6 the City is taking a huge step in incentivizing those 7 bad acting landlords who fail to cure immediately hazardous condition in a timely manner to complete 8 the repairs in protecting New Yorker quality of life. 9 Under the bill the rate would increase between 7% to 10 9% for property accessed, up to 250,000 and up to 18% 11 12 for properties over 250,000. I was very happy that I 13 understood this from the work that I did in 14 organizing tenants the importance of this and this 15 legislation is not to get money into the City 16 (inaudible) but it is to really incentify landlords to 17 make the repairs if the interest rate is too low than 18 they can do it just as a matter of business and a matter of course there is too much time often between 19 20 an emergency situation that has to be fixed until the HPD can come in and fix it. My hope is that with 21 2.2 this increase which is on par with something that we 23 already have, it will incentivify landlords to go ahead and make the repairs sooner rather than later. 24 25 Again I want to thank the Speaker and Council Member

2 Wills and Rosenthal who co-sponsored the legislation.

3 Look forward to making this much needed improvement

4 to the emergency repair program and hopefully

SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: While in Office of Veteran Affairs currently exist within the Mayor's office; this bill will replace it with a full department dedicated to serving New Yorkers who are members of the armed services, veterans and their families. The department will focus on providing them with access to among other services, educational training and re-training services and facilities, health, medical and rehabilitation services and facilities, information on provisions of federal, state and local laws and regulations giving special rights and privileges to members of the armed forces, veterans and their families. An employment and reemployment services. The Mayor will appoint a Commissioner to lead this department and the 11 member veteran's advisory board, an appointed group of veterans from across the City would advise the Commissioner on all of these matters. is home to over 225,000 veterans who have bravely and selflessly served the United States. Our veteran's communities spends generations. They are young men and woman who went to Europe and the Pacific during World War II, Korea, Vietnam and the Gulf War. the way up to the young men and women who help to rebuild our City after 911 or went to Iraq in Indeed we must remember that we still Afghanistan. have young men and women in harms ways in both those countries. Those wars are not over. And when these young men and women come home they sometimes face a difficult transition to civilian life. Jobs, housing and healthcare are too often unnecessarily difficult to obtain. And the troubling high suicide rate among our veteran community shows that government has not stepped up as it should. We need to do better. they come home we must ensure they get the healthcare they are entitled to. That they have access to employment and they are housed. We can't allow ourselves to repeat the mistakes of the past. can't allow a generation of young men and women to slip through the cracks. And we can't become complacent to window dressed problems when they are structural and deep seeded. We've seen in Washington

2 with the VA what happen when don't pay close attention to our veteran's community. And it takes 3 more than just words it takes action and that is what 4 this council is doing today. Whether it's this new 5 department or the Council veteran's initiative, the 6 7 Council is sending a simple message to our veterans. We have your backs. New York can and should service 8 as a model for how we care for our veterans. New 9 York City must lead and today I proud to say that we 10 are. We all know that tomorrow is Veterans Day and 11 12 it's a day we celebrate all of our veterans across the five Boroughs and across the Country. And this 13 department is for them. It will be a one stop shop 14 15 for the City large and diverse veteran's community. 16 It will be for people like my father and my 17 grandfather who are veterans. For me this agency is 18 dedicated to him and to them to all of our veterans. For others it will be dedicated to their sisters, 19 mothers, father, uncles, aunts, grandparents or 20 2.1 friends who answered the call. It's a reminder of 2.2 our solemn commitment to our veterans of the compact 23 we must keep with them. And of our relentless drive as a City to take care of our own that no one should 24 25 be forgotten or left out in New York City, no one.

So this is a great day for New York City, I want to thank all of my colleagues for their support and especially to thank the leadership and advocacy in steadfastness of veterans affairs Committee Chair Eric Aldridge for all of his leadership on this

PUBLIC ADVOCATE: Council Member Barron.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you Madam
Public Advocate. We know that the history of the
Country is replete with laws, policies and platies
that are racist. The roots of racism are deep and
entwined throughout the political social economic
judicial legislative and educational systems of this
nation. What other racist tentical break forth and
they're vows scourge on humanity manifest itself, it
is imperative to take action. For those feeling the
pain of the injustice, actions calling for redress,

2 remediation or removal of those manifestation unnecessary. When those of position of 3 4 responsibility fail to acknowledge, address and 5 correct the situation, they are at best incentive or 6 at worst inept and complisite. I want to commend the 7 students at the University of Missouri for their actions and protest against the long standing 8 persistent, pervasive, racism, manifested at the 9 University that had students feeling targeted, 10 ridiculed and threatened. Racial epthics hurled at 11 12 the students President Payton Head who is black went unchecked by the then President Tim Wolf. Student 13 14 request to correct the situation were rejected. 15 Wolf dismissed their complaints and even blamed them 16 for the conditions that existed at the University. The President who had focused on reducing or 17 18 eliminating waste and redundancies that turned the blind eye and deaf ear to the culture of racism that 19 20 existed on the campus. The student protesters were joined by Jonathan Butler, a graduate student who 21 2.2 went on a hunger strike and by faculty administration 23 and other groups who saw the racist situation as part of pervasive culture. Then the powerful blow of the 24 football team threating action that would impact the 25

finances of the University joined the protest. The student protest has been successful. The University has pledge to institute initiative through address

5 the racial tension on campus.

This bill Int. No. 994 would create a unique email address for every tree so that New Yorkers can easily report problems directly to the City on a tree by tree basis. This has been tried and other forward thinking jurisdictions around the work with great results. Secondly I want to call my attention, my colleagues attention to Int. No. 995, which helps makes sure that regular New Yorkers who have fallen on tough economic times are not blocked out of renting an apartment. By restricting the ways in which building others can use credit scores to preclude people from renting. We don't want someone who's fallen on hard times and has picked themselves back up to be blocked from renting an apartment leaving them nowhere else to land except a homeless shelter. Our bill in a very targeted way determines the ways in which credit scores can and cannot be used so that building owners cannot penalize people for those elements of credit history which tend to

reflect pass problems not current delinquencies and those elements which tend to be most vulnerable to fraud and mistaken reporting. This is a bill that will help make housing more fair for everybody and will help prevent deescalating homeless crisis.

I also at this 18 time want to acknowledge unfortunately a last Thursday a 15 year old Clara Bartan High School 19 20 student name Malik Davis collapsed on his way home from schools just blocks away and later died at Kings 21 2.2 County Hospital.
